To the inhabitants of the Town of Chatham in the County of Carroll in said state qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chatham on Tuesday the 12th day of March next at 9 o'clock of the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
 - 3. To choose a Town Clerk.
 - 4. To choose a Road Agent.
 - 5. To choose a Selectman for three years.
 - 6. To choose a Town Treasurer.
 - 7. To choose a Tax Collector.
 - 8. To choose a Constable.
 - 9. To choose two Auditors.
- 10. To see if the town will accept state aid for highway maintenance and construction for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see if the town will raise \$511.50 for state aid construction.
- 12. To see if the town will raise \$600 for state aid maintenance.

- 13. To see if the town will vote to continue the winter plowing of highways.
- 14. To see what sum will be raised to pay debt created by purchase of snow plow.
- 15. To see what sum the town will raise to suppress white pine blister.
- 16. To see what sum the town will raise in order to co-operate with Stow and Fryeburg, or offer other inducements to a doctor to locate in this vicinity.
- 17. To transact whatever business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The equalized valuation for next year is \$345,517 and the \$5 tax to be raised will be \$1,727.59.

The state board of education was able this year to grant additional aid to Chatham so that there will be a substantial balance at the end of our fiscal year. This money can be spent for any purpose for which the district wishes to use it. All school houses should, of course, be kept painted and in good repair whether used or not.

The school at North Chatham was closed this year and the school at Chatham Center opened. The maintenance of more than three schools for less than forty pupils would not be justified, and we were highly gratified that Miss Chandler was willing to take the school at the Center. It is fortunate that this building meets the requirements of the state board of education. The South Chatham building could not be used without extensive changes.

Miss Flossie Thurston after two years at Green Hill resigned and her place has been filled acceptably by Miss Beatrice Osgood, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School.

The report of medical inspection indicates that

many parents should secure dental treatment for their children before next fall.
