TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

[L. s.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the several highways and bridges.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to obtain State aid for building state road and to decide where to build the same.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the State road.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow paths.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in conjunction with voluntary subscriptions, to grade and Tarvia the road leading from the Danville church to a point near the residence of Otterro A. Ladd.

8. To see if the Town will vote to buy Fire extinguishers to be placed at the discretion of the selectmen, and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in improving the cemeteries.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, to be expended under the direction of the State Forestry Dept.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town.

14. To see how much of the Parsonage funds the Town will vote to spend for preaching for the year ensuing.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for the erection of a tablet in Hampton Memorial Park.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

Herewith I submit to you my sixth annual report as superintendent of schools.

HOW MUCH EXPERIENCE HAVE DANVILLE TEACHERS HAD?

Since the summer of 1919 *twelve* new teachers have been elected in Danville. The average previous teaching experience of these teachers was *1 year 6 months*.

This lack of experience is a big handicap to these teachers in their effort to accomplish as much in their schools as do the city school teachers of this state whose average experience is *6 years*. Experience increases a teacher's value as long as she does not get into a rut and does keep up with the times.

Danville teachers.....1 yr. 6 mos.

N. H. city teachers.....6 yrs. exp.

Experienced teachers cost more, are worth more, and they increase the amount of state aid that the district receives.

HOW LONG DO DANVILLE TEACHERS REMAIN IN THEIR POSITIONS?

The twelve teachers that have given up their schools in Danville since 1919 averaged to have taught for Danville *1 year 4 months*. This idea is expressed by saying that their average *tenure* was 1 year 4 months.

Tenure in Danville.....1 yr. 4 mos.

Tenure in N. H. cities.....4½ years

Good salary schedules, desirable boarding places, and pleasing social opportunities help in increasing the tenure.

THE SCHOOL NURSE QUICKLY PROVED HER WORTH TO THE COMMUNITY.

Previous to the coming of the school nurse, Miss Lillian S. Mackintosh of Chester, last September, only 13% of the physical defects of the pupils reported by the examiners in this union were receiving treatment, and head-lice was an oft appearing nuisance. Miss Mackintosh has already

- 1—Encouraged many parents to secure treatment of their child's defects.
- 2—Accompanied several children to the hospital or doctor.
- 3—Secured payment of the charges of the hospital, oculist or doctor from some special funds in cases where payment would be a financial burden to the family.

In the first half of her year's work nearly as many defects have received treatment as were previously treated in a year's time, and some of them have been urgent cases of long standing.

Every month the nurse examines the pupils, especially their heads, and weighs them. Weight reports are occasionally sent to parents of under-weight pupils.

WHO PAYS FOR THE SCHOOL NURSE?

The school nurse is employed by a union of eight towns. To all of these towns except Epping the State gives \$1.50 per pupil for the employment of a school nurse, and this pays the major part of her salary and expenses.

ARE OUR SCHOOLS COSTING MORE THAN ELSEWHERE?

Comparative costs per pupil for elementary schools are as follows:

This supervisory union	\$64
New Hampshire	\$69
Some states	\$81

ARE DANVILLE PUPILS LEARNING AS MUCH AS THEIR MENTAL ABILITY PERMITS?

An *intelligence test* measures a pupil's *ability to learn*. Tests in arithmetic, spelling, etc., are *educational tests* and measure *how much a pupil has learned*.

Intelligence tests given last month to the grammar school pupils show that all together they average to have the ability to learn of an average child of 12 years, 2 months of age; hence, the average *mental age* of the school is 12 years 2 months. Stanford Achievement Tests, which are educational tests, showed the pupils to have learned as much as the average child 12 years 8½ months of age; hence, the average *educational age* of the school is 12 years 8½ months.

Mental age 12 years, 2 months.

Educational age 12 years, 8½ months.

This is probably due to industry on the part of the pupils, regular attendance, good health and good teaching.

WHAT TO TEACH YOUR CHILD BEFORE HE ENTERS SCHOOL.

It will help the progress of your child in school if he is taught as many of the following things as possible before he enters:

1. To tell colors.
2. To say the alphabet.
3. To count to ten, or higher.

4. To say the days of the week.
5. To tell time by the clock.
6. To know a penny, nickel and dime.
7. To say the months of the year.
8. Know how to hold a pencil. It is natural for a child to hold a pencil as an adult holds chalk, so he must be taught the right way.
9. To draw crudely a pig, man, cat, etc., and also be able to color them with crayons without coloring too much outside the lines.
10. Know a few little tunes and songs, and be able to follow a tune with others.
11. Be able to keep step to music, or keep time by clapping.
12. Know some nursery rhymes by heart.

The law requires that all pupils be vaccinated, and the best time for this is in the summer before he enters school.
