TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Eagle Hall in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise \$364.33 provided the state will contribute \$1,457.32 for Town Road Aid.

4. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.

5. To see if the town will vote and appropriate money for a \$75 war bond every month for the duration of the war, this money to be used to assist any disabled veteran of this war, this fund to be called the Disabled Veterans' Fund and not to be used for any other purpose, but can be placed back in the general fund if not needed for above purpose.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$93.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for re-charging the fire extinguishers and cleaning and repairing fire holes and use whatever balance remains for new fire holes if possible.

8. To see if the town will vote to purchase the Freight Station and appropriate for the same.

9. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$250.00 for the purpose of repairing the outside of the town barn.

10. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$300.00 to widen the road from the Larson corner towards the Dublin line.

11. To see if the town will make any change in the salaries of any of the town officers.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any property acquired by tax sale.

13. To see if the town will vote to borrow money on the Credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

14. To hear the reports of officers and committees heretofore chosen and passing vote in relation to the same.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with a vote taken at the last town meeting, an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Harrisville has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission, a report of which is submitted herewith. Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds, for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1942 and the current year to December 29, 1942.

SELECTMEN'S AND TREASURER'S ACCOUNTS

Vouchers issued by the Selectmen during this period were examined, as were also the supporting invoices and Road Agent's payrolls. The Treasurer's checks, issued upon orders of the Selectmen, were compared with the vouchers and found to be in agreement. The receipts of the Treasurer were checked by source insofar as it was possible to do so. Totals of receipts and payments were verified.

The Treasurer's cash book was not added or balanced at the close of the fiscal year January 31, 1942. It is customary to total and balance the cash book and carry the balance forward to the next page, at the close of each fiscal year. This practise should be followed by the Treasurer.

TAXES

The tax warrants of Tax Collector Annie M. Stewart for the levies of 1940 and 1941 were audited. Collection of the 1940 warrant has been completed and only one unredeemed tax remains on the tax sale account for the 1940 levy. The 1941 warrant was balanced as of August 20, 1942, when Mrs. Stewart resigned and Ralph B. Bemis was appointed as Tax Collector. All monies received on account of the collection and redemption of taxes were found to have been remitted to the Treasurer by Mrs. Stewart.

The tax sale for the 1941 levy was held and properly recorded by Mr. Bemis. Redemptions from this tax sale were checked and the unredeemed taxes are shown in Schedule I-1.

The balance of the 1941 warrant, as committed to Collector Bemis, was examined and audited. All collections of taxes and interest were properly accounted for.

The 1942 warrant of Collector Bemis was verified. All funds received on account of this warrant were found to have been remitted to the Treasurer or properly accounted for as cash on hand on the date of audit.

TOWN CLERK

The accounts of Town Clerk Madyline V. Winn, including the issuance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses and the receipts from filing fees, were examined for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1942, and the current year to date of audit. All funds received by the Clerk were accounted for through remittances to the Treasurer. It was found that one motor vehicle permit had been voided, the three parts being on file. Inasmuch as the Clerk had already remitted to the Treasurer for this permit, her account indicated an excess credit of \$1.49. This amount should be withheld by the Clerk to balance the account.

TRUST FUNDS

The savings bank books representing the invested principal and unexpended income of the trust funds were examined. All funds, as indicated by the trust fund records, were accounted for.

TOWN OFFICERS' BONDS

The surety bonds of the town officers were examined and found to be correct in form and sufficient in amount. A list of the officials required by law to furnish bonds, the amount thereof and the surety company that issued the bonds are included in Schedule L.

FINANCES

Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes: (Schedule A)

This statement has been prepared in order to present a comprehensive picture of the financial condition of the town during the last ten years and the changes which have taken place during this period. It is interesting to note that during all of these years a Surplus has been reported annually. The assessed valuation has been maintained on a fairly even basis and the local tax rate has consistently been well under the average tax rate for the State. In 1942 the rates compared as follows:

Average State Tax Rate,	\$3 23
Harrisville Tax Rate,	\$2 52

Revenues, Appropriations and Expenditures 1941: (Schedules C and C-1)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures and estimated and actual revenues are presented in detail in these Schedules. As indicated therein a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,329.09 and a net excess of estimated over actual revenues of \$556.71, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,772.38. This accounted for the reduction in Surplus during the year.

GENERAL COMMENTS

The accounts and records of all the town officials were found to be in good condition and the accounting procedure

in accordance with the uniform system of accounts prescribed by the tax commission. No irregularities, discrepancies or shortages were discovered.

It was noted that certain recommendations made in our last report have been adopted. In accordance with our suggestion the Treasurer has discontinued the practise of issuing separate checks for Selectmen's orders, and now countersigns the orders which are then used as checks. This method is more satisfactory and simplifies the accounting and auditing procedure. We commend the town officials for their cooperation in carrying out these changes. We also extend our thanks for the assistance rendered by them during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Harrisville:

I herein submit my twentieth annual report as superintendent of schools.

From a discussion on education after the war, I wish to quote from a report made by the Conservative Party, viz. "Of all the State's activities, education is the basic activity, because it conditions the future character of the entire community." "In war time, the maintenance of these services at a level of high efficiency should have maximum priority."

To meet the ideals of above quotations, I offer a few of the several objectives towards which we are aiming: (1) to maintain the purity of the English language, (2) to give greater emphasis on fundamentals, especially in mathematics, (3) to offer a total interpretation of history, geography and economics, (4) to imbue our pupils with a better understanding of the vital principles of our Constitution and the American Way of life. For the accomplishment of these goals we ask the cooperation of teachers, parents and citizens.

CALL FOR TEACHERS

Due to the call of war service, defense work and office work, many teachers have given up the teaching profession. As a result I have had to resort to commercial advertising in order to keep open some of the rural schools.

As conditions may be worse next year, I suggest that former teachers take advantage of the opportunity of attending the Summer School at Keene and thus place themselves in position to qualify with the regulations of the State Board of Education. I believe this to be a patriotic gesture.

In accordance with the request of the School District, as expressed by a vote taken at the annual meeting, an audit and examination of the accounts and records of the Harrisville School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1942, has been made by this Division. The report of this audit is submitted herewith and includes the following Exhibits:

- B-1—Summary of Activity in Treasurer's Accounts
- C—Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures

The Treasurer's cancelled checks were compared with entries in the cash book and with vouchers issued by the School Board and found to be in agreement. Receipts were checked by source insofar as it was possible to do so and traced to the depository bank. The Treasurer's cash book Balance was in agreement with the reconciled bank balance as of June 30, 1942.

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures and estimated and actual revenues are presented in Exhibit C and D. As indicated therein, a revenue surplus of \$32.98, and a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$504.39, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$537.37.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1942, the School District Surplus increased from \$21.23 to \$638.60, as indicated by Exhibit A. The reasons for this increase in Surplus are set forth in Exhibit E.

All accounts were found in good condition and reflected the painstaking efforts of the officials of the School District who are to be commended.
