REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

To the Taxpayers and Citizens of Haverhill:

A report of the Town Officers is submitted on the following pages.

The different departments were all within the Budget Estimates with the exception of Old Age Assistance and Highways.

Old Age Assistance payments have risen sharply during the past year and will call for a larger amount to be raised this year. \$4,525.35 was spent on Old Age Assistance in 1945 and \$6,221.12 in 1946.

The new grader has proved very satisfactory and a good sum (nearly \$3,000.00) has been earned by renting it to other towns and local farmers.

REPORT OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

To the Voters of the Towns in the White Mountains Region:

Your region association submits the following report for the year 1946:

Every town (46) contributed toward the support of association work. Some of the projects which these funds enabled the association to aid or accomplish were:

Locating a shoe-stitching plant in Lisbon employing 75 or more.

Locating a regional grocery warehouse in North Haverhill, nearing completion, to employ 50 persons and a large trailer-truck fleet.

Continuing Mountaineer summer rail service; fast through New York week-day service; week-end sleeper service; improved winter service.

Continuing prize contest for 4-H clubs and members to encourage young farmers.

Inaugurating prize meet for high school ski teams to encourage outdoor winter sports.

Assisting national ski races held at Franconia.

Continuing annual Ragweed Elimination campaign.

Surveying region vocational education needs and making recommendations to state commission.

Sending Real Estate prospect bulletins to agents and owners to promote sales; organizing region Real Estate Board.

Conferring with Boards of Trade to assist on local problems.

Holding sectional meetings with councilmen and selectmen to discover means to assist.

Securing assistance of state and national officials on region and town problems.

Cooperating with State Forestry and Recreation Commission to make plans for general regional development.

Cooperating with State Aeronautics Commission to insure region ports and service.

Representing region interests at conferences on industry, community welfare, winter sports, vacation business, etc.

Cooperating with State and New England agencies to secure data on accommodations, developments, etc.

Furnishing material and pictures for many stories in newspapers and magazines, data to schools, departments, etc., and cuts for use in town promotional material.

Printing and distributing 20,000 summer booklets and 20,000 winter folders, listing accommodations in all towns; distributing 10,000 fishing-hunting folders with sporting camps, laws, pictures, etc., and attending three shows to answer inquiries; arranging publication of 100,000 general four-season pictorial folders listing all towns; distributing 2,500 health folders; as well as several thousand pieces of other material.

Your association, with your help, can and will continue to do its utmost to promote along all lines the welfare of the region and its towns.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HAVERHILL, NEW HAMPSHIRE

We, the undersigned members of Haverhill School Board, beg to submit the following report:

With a view of conserving the building, the interiors of Pike and Center Haverhill School Houses were given another coat of paint last summer. The woodwork, as well as all the desks in both school houses were re-varnished. All this work was carried out under contract with George Blake at a cost of about \$377.00. At the Haverhill Graded School a new set of entrance doors was installed together with panicbar. This entailed an expense of about \$240.00. Minor repairs were made at Haverhill Academy and North Haverhill School House.

As in former years, the boilers at Haverhill Academy, Alumni Hall, North Haverhill and Pike Schools were cleaned by the Woodsville Hardware Co. There were also sundry plumbing repairs at those buildings, also at Center Haverhill School House.

We desire to call the attention of the Tax-payers and Voters of the District to the annual reports of Superintendent Wesley H. Douglass and of the Headmaster of Haverhill Academy, Friend H. Jenkins.

As regards the budget, covering the fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1947, the School Board has been confronted with serious problems, not only as they apply to the demands by teachers for substantial salary increases, but also to the increased cost of Textbooks, Scholars' Supplies, Maintenance, Janitor Service, Fuel, and Transportation of Pupils. We, as members of the School Board, fully realize that the most serious of all the problems is the matter of Teachers' Salaries. It is no longer just a problem which is troubling

local School Boards. It has become a National problem. The teachers all over the Country are demanding more adequate salaries, in some instances even by means of strikes. We feel that our citizens are fully aware of this very serious situation which has been greatly aggravated owing to the acute shortage of teachers.

Commissioner of Education, Dr. Edgar Fuller, in a recent address at the Hanover P. T. A. warned the members that "unless something is done immediately to remedy the situation we will find ourselves without any elementary teachers. We lose about 200 elementary teachers each year here in New Hampshire. In the freshman classes at Keene and Plymouth Teachers' Colleges we have only 45 students preparing for elementary teaching roles." Dr. Fuller further explains that the average salary for grade school teachers in this State is only \$32.00 while common labor averages \$42.00 a week.

In order to retain our present teaching staff, and, in the event, that our Superintendent will be called upon to replace certain teachers at a much higher salary-rate, we are obliged to ask the Tax-payers and Voters of the District to approve an additional \$4,500.00 for that purpose.

The total amount of the budget which we submit for your consideration is \$46,956.00 which compares with \$39,783.00 for the current school year.

The retiring member of the Board is Mr. Wm. H. Slight of Haverhill.

Teachers and Pupils. There are two changes to be noted at the Academy. Mrs. M. H. Towne was engaged to teach Home Economics succeeding Miss Phyllis Boles. Mrs. Towne is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College and has had several years of teaching experience. As mentioned in Mr. Jenkin's report a 4 year commerce curriculum was inaugurated and Miss Mildred Pennington of Quincy, Mass., a graduate of Salem Teachers' College, 1946, was secured to direct this work and to assist in Music. Miss Barbara Reed of North Haverhill, a graduate of the Academy and of Hope College, Mich., was hired to teach French and to coach girls' athletics. At Pike Rev. R. B. Nichols of Woodsville was hired to teach grades 5-8 and act as principal. At North Haverhill Mrs. Theda Cote of Woodsville, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College with several years experience was secured to teach grades 4-6 succeeding Miss Katherine Keniston. Mrs. Flora Palmer of Glencliff was engaged for the Center School succeeding Mrs. Emily G. Morrill. Christmas time Mrs. Chase, who had been principal of the North Haverhill School and Miss Verna Greenly, resigned. Mr. James Morrill returns as principal and Mrs. Thelma Henderson of Woodsville will finish the year for Miss Greenly.

Building and Grounds. For two years we have not been able to make only necessary minor repairs to the buildings. This was due to critical bottlenecks in builders' supplies and the scarcity of labor. This year we hope these bottlenecks will be relieved sufficiently so that some needed improvements can be made. There should be some additional play-ground equipment at all of the schools. I would suggest also that fluorescent lights be installed in the intermediate room at Haverhill.

I would like to call your attention especially to the Report of the School Board and to that of Headmaster Jenkins found elsewhere in this report.

I wish to express my very deepest thanks to the School Board, to the citizens of Haverhill and to the teachers and

pupils of the Haverhill Schools for their continued loyalty and support.

Scholarship honors were won by Marjorie Lee, Beverly White, and Lorraine Stevens in the order named. The Scholarship, Loyalty and Achievement medal was awarded to Lorraine Stevens.

The activities program is again operating on a pre-war level. Nearly half of the pupils enrolled are represented on the basketball squads.

Typewriting and stenography have been added to the program of studies and the whole program has been reorganized on a two curricula basis to include a complete program

in the commerce curriculum. A total of thirty-two subjects is offered in all. Since but sixteen are required for graduation, each pupil has twice as many from which to choose, as is required. Certainly the offering is wide enough from the standpoint of number. Whether or not it includes the right subject may be debatable. The current demand for more subjects of a vocation nature such as agriculture and mechanic arts can be met with the present number of teachers only by substituting such subjects for some now being offered. Even if it were mathematically possible to add more subjects, it would be impossible to find teachers adequately prepared to teach in so many different fields. Not only would they be unprepared to efficiently and effectively teach so many different subjects, but they could not meet the minimum requirements set up by the State Department of Education.

Standardized tests have been given in all subjects for which such tests are available. Classes as a whole are held to an achievement comparable with the national norms. Many of the pupils exceed these norms and should. Others do not attain them and cannot.

Such minor repairs only as were essential have been made about the building. Gas and modern-type Bunsen burners have been installed in the science laboratory. This equipment, together with an excellent 16 mm. sound projector, was made available through the action of the trustees and paid for by income from the trust fund. Both have added much to the effectiveness of the school program. The Academy lawn was graded and re-seeded during the summer vacation.

Appreciation is herein expressed for donations of time and equipment by many interested parents and citizens, especially to Frank Ellsworth for his time and use of his tractor in grading the lawn, to Dr. Speed for the gift of a First Aid kit to the atheltic teams, and to Herbert Swan for the use of his truck and chairs, and to all for their hearty and loyal support.

CURRICULA

The beginning of the school year of 1946 saw very little change in the curricula of the school, as the experience of the past year showed that the school program was well balanced. There was, however, a change made in one elective subject, and that was the substitution of General Mathematics course for that of Economic Geography, taught by Mr. Pendo. Also History of Civilization was put aside for one year to make it possible to have it offered the Sophomore year, as it has proven to be too difficult a course for the first year students. These were the only changes made.

Extra-Curricular Activities

The extra-curricular activities were many and varied. Dancing, socials, assembly programs, and intramural sports proved to be very popular, and ninety per cent of the student body participated in some sort of an activity during the year.

Both the girls' and the boys' basketball teams had a banner year, winning the Ammonoosuc League titles for the season of 1945-46. The boys won the league title by taking all of their ten games, the first time that this was accomplished since the formation of the league.

As the result of this exceptional basketball record, the boys' basketball team was invited to the Tournament at the University of New Hampshire, the first time that such honor was accorded to Woodsville High School in sixteen years. At the Tournament, the boys won their first game against New London, but lost in semi-finals in overtime to Lincoln High School.

Baseball season was also very successful, as the boys won eight games, and lost two.

In November of the school year of 1946-47, a successful school play was put on, "Almost Eighteen." It was directed by Mr. Frank Woodward.

The school paper, The Cycle, proved to be popular and of great interest to the student body.

Personnel. There are six changes in the teaching staff to be reported this year, two in the Grade School, two in the High School, Music Supervisor and kindergarten teacher. At the Grade School Mrs. Barbara Pike (nee Gove) of Wentworth, N. H., a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College, 1946, replaces Mrs. Hildred Hackett in Grade 4 and Miss Daisy Pierce of Grafton Center, N. H., a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College, 1946, succeeds Miss Lillian Kelley in Grade 7. At the High School Mrs. Frances Johnson of

New York City and Ryegate, Vt., was hired to replace Dorothy Richards. Mrs. Johnson is a graduate of Barnard College with a Master's degree from Columbia and has had several years' experience in the schools of New York City. To succeed Ruth Forsgren in the Commercial Department Miss Lois Perry of Medford, Mass., was secured. Miss Perry is a graduate of Salem Teachers' College, 1946. As supervisor of music Miss Emma Eldredge of Burlington, Vt., a graduate of Syracuse University, College of Music, 1946, was engaged. Mrs. T. H. Weed took over the Kindergarten, succeeding Mrs. Adella Crocker.

Budget. I do not think that any one who has read the papers and listened to the radio is really surprised that the School Board recommends an increased appropriation for the vear 1947-48. The amount of increase over last year is Everything purchased by the Board for use in the Schools has advanced in price from 25% to 40%. But the largest increase is in the appropriation for teachers' salaries. I believe Woodsville citizens want good schools and are willing to provide for the support of good schools. But to have good schools we must have good teachers, and just now we do have an excellent teaching staff, but to keep them or to replace those who may leave with competent and trained teachers will require more money. New England is a narrow competitive area and the other five states will compete with New Hampshire for the limited supply of qualified and efficient teachers.

Repairs. At the High School new and sanitary urinals were installed in the boys' rest room, replacing the old slate affairs that had become very unsanitary. The remaining class rooms were equipped with fluorscent lights. Plastic rock was also applied to the stairs leading to the basement.

At the Grade School plastic rock was applied to the basement stairs and the main stairs leading to the second floor. The third and sixth grade rooms, the darkest rooms, were equipped with the newest type of fluorescent lights. The

walls in the seventh and eighth grade rooms were painted two coats. The District voted \$1,500 for the improvement of the grade school yard. After much study the Board decided to grade and gravel the yard this year. It is planned to gravel and grade it again this summer and then surface the whole yard.

It is presumed that this amount will finish the job. I hope that, at least, two more rooms may be equipped this year with fluorescent lights.

Repeated reference has been made in these reports calling attention to the need for a broader curriculum at the High School particularly the need of a vocational course for boys. Looking forward to that day we have been working for two years to secure donations of machines and tools from the U. S. Air Forces. We have already received several thousand dollars worth at no expense except for crating and transportation. We hope in the near future to receive more so that we can announce at some future date a course in Mechanic Arts.

I would be ungrateful indeed if I did not express my appreciation to the School Board, to the citizens of Woodsville, and to the teachers and pupils for their continued loyalty and cooperation.

REPORT OF NORTH HAVERHILL FIRE CHIEF

During the year 1946 we answered 26 calls. Seven of these were within the precinct and 19 were outside.

The Fire Department was greatly in need of a new truck, so last spring we used \$2,000 from our Treasury and borrowed \$4,000 from interested individuals around town to pay for a truck. We bought a fire truck from the Maxim Fire Equipment Co., of Middleboro, Mass., the contract being made on March 30, 1946, for \$5,814.52. Before the truck was delivered we had ordered extra equipment bringing the total cost to \$5,919.07. The truck was paid for on date of delivery, Jan. 20, 1947.

By making the contract last March the Fire Equipment we now have at \$5,919.07 netted a saving of \$2,196.19, as the same equipment now sells at \$8,115.26.

The Department expects the precinct to pay the \$4,000 balance we owe but as soon as possible we hope to repay the precinct thus making a gift of the \$8,000 equipment to the precinct.

WHITE MOUNTAIN FORESTRY DEPT. REPORT

To the Selectmen, Town of Haverhill:

Many wardens have asked that something be prepared on forest fire work and published in the annual town report. Because of lack of available time the following is being sent direct to you. Will you kindly include it in your annual report?

W. S. CADMAN, District Fire Chief.

Help Your Forest Fire Warden Prevent Fires-It Pays!

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves manpower and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy forest fire wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult of accomplishment as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this—

- 1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
- 2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
- 3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
 - 4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge

others to do so.

5. HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PRE-VENT FIRES—his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, 1946, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners and any other town officers heretofore chose, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, one or more Highway Agents, one or more Auditors, one Library Trustee for the term of three years, one Cemetery Commissioner for the term of five years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the town, as recommended by the finance committee in its budget report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for the purposes so determined, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V highways as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945, and to raise and appropriate the sums required for this purpose.

- Article 11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a loan of Federal funds from the Federal Works Agency for the planning and surveying of a Municipal Airport.
- Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

CARE OF CEMETERY LOTS

In order to clarify a condition which exists currently throughout this country and to make clear to all cemetery lot owners just what policy and action the town will take the following statement is made:

- I. At the present time the low rate of interest paid on funds left to provide perpetual care for cemetery lots is inadequate in many cases.
- II. Funds left to the town for this purpose are administered by the trustees of Trust funds elected by the voters; the Trustees are bonded to protect the town from any loss of these funds, and the bond is paid by the town out of general funds and not out of Trust fund income.
- III. Labor shortage and increased wage demands have made the cost of lot care more than in former years.
- IV. Some people have left one hundred dollars or even less to provide perpetual care for their lot in a cemetery in this town. This would provide an income of about two dollars annually and is obviously insufficient to care for a lot.
- V. When funds are left to the town for care of cemetery lots, the town may accept only those which do not impose any liability upon the town beyond the amount of the gift and the income thereof. (See Chap. 51, Sect. 20, Rev. Laws.)
- VI. In 1945, the last year in which all figures were available when this was prepared, there were 210 lots in Haverhill Cemeteries which had funds for perpetual care in the Trustees hands. These totaled almost \$35,000.00 and showed an income of about \$670.00. This means an average fund of \$167.00 for each of 210 lots and an average income of about \$3.20 per year.

- VII. The income for each individual fund must be expended in care of lot named in the Trust gift.
- VIII. Where the income is inadequate, the town through its Cemetery Commissioners can not legally take funds from any other source to provide perpetual care or any special care of the lot.

IX. It is recommended that:

- A. Wherever possible existing funds be increased or the income from said funds be supplemented by lot owners to make proper care of these lots possible.
- B. A fund when established should be at least \$250.00 and preferably a little more.
- C. Lots which have improper care because of lack of supporting income should be cared for in part by the family or friends.
- D. You realize when care fails on any of these lots it is in no sense the fault of the town but is due to lack of fund income.

Board of Selectmen Haverhill, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Haverhill covering the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the town. Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, Trustees of Trust Funds and the Haverhill Cemetery Association.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets—December 31, 1945-December 31, 1946: (Schedule A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1945 and December 31, 1946, are presented in Schedule A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$20,932.23 during the year.

Reconciliation of Decrease in Net Debt: (Schedule A-1)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the town during the year is made in Schedule A-1, with the factors which caused the decrease in Net Debt indicated therein. Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Schedules B & C)

Comparative Statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, are presented in Schedules B. and C. As indicated by the budget summary a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,131.19, plus a net revenue surplus of \$6,692.87, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$7,824.06.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Schedule D)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Schedule D. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of December 31, 1946, is indicated in Schedule D-1.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depositary banks.

Tax Accounts

Tax warrants for the levies of 1946 and previous years and the tax sale accounts were examined. Summaries indicating the activity in these accounts during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, are presented in Schedules E, E-1, E-2, E-3, E-4 and E-5, respectively.

Town Clerk

The financial accounts and records of the Town Clerk were examined and audited. All funds received by the Clerk on account of the issuance of motor vehicle permits, dog licenses, sale of town histories and filing fees were properly accounted for through remittances to the Treasurer and fees retained. (Schedule F).

General Comments

It is important that each tax collected and each redemption from a tax sale be recorded by the collector in the cash book and posted to the tax warrant or tax sale record therefrom. If this is done and the report which accompanies each remittance from the Collector to the Treasurer is properly made out from the totals as shown by the cash book columns, there should be no difficulty in balancing the Collector's accounts at any time.

It is also suggested that tax deeds be given to the town by the Collector for properties on which there are unredeemed taxes and more than two years have elapsed since the date of the tax sale.

Conclusion

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition and the accounting procedure, with exceptions as herein noted, conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Haverhill for their assistance during the course of the audit.
