TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Child's Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Twelfth Day of March, Next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects.

- Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.
- Art. 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.
- Art. 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R., to be used Memorial Day.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- Art. 7 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the Fuller Public Library.

- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of the late Hannah M. Grimes which reads as follows: "I give and bequeath to the Town of Hillsborough, N. H., the sum of one hundred dollars to be used by said Town for the care and maintenance of the cemetery lot at Hillsborough Center, where my husband, Daniel Murdough, is buried."
- Art. 10. To see if the town will accept the sum of two hundred dollars from Lizzie S. Tuttle, the interest to be expended for the perpetual care of the George H. Tuttle lot, monument and markers thereon, in Maple Avenue Cemetery, Hillsborough, N. H.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to accept from Edith S. Jones the sum of \$200.00, the income to be used for the care and maintenance of the family lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of cooperating with the state and federal government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, or act in relation thereto.
- Art. 13. (By petition.) To see if the town will vote to construct a concrete sidewalk from the end of the present walk at S. Mellen's residence to Myrtle St., raise money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 14. (By petition.) To see if the town will vote to reimburse Andrew J. Crooker in an amount not in excess of \$50.00, for cash paid for medical attendance for his child, necessitated by said child being bitten by a dog in said town, in August 1928, or take any action in relation thereto.
- Art. 15 (By petition.) To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk from the residence of Philip Jordan to the present sidewalk on Park St., raise money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to accept gifts and bequests of funds hereafter made to the town in trust for the care of any cemetery lot.

- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise any money for the support of band concerts the coming season.
- Art. 18 (By petition.) To see if the town will vote to construct a concrete sidewalk on Whittemore St., from the residence of Chas. S. Perry to the present sidewalk on Park St., raise money for the same or pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 19. To see if the town, upon contract with the Contoocook Mills Corporation, will vote to abate, as to town taxes for the years 1929 and 1930, the taxes assessed against the Contoocook Mills Corporation and / or any subsidiary Corporation owned by it upon its water power, machinery, stock and mill buildings in an amount sufficient to reduce its entire tax (excepting taxes upon tenement property) to \$4000.00 each year; or take any action relating thereto.
- Art. 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

For the fiscal year beginning July 1st, 1927, ending June 30, 1928

To the Inhabitants of Hillsborough:

The Board of Education of the Town District respectfully submits its annual report with that of its Treasurer, Superintendent and Auditors.

There have been six schools maintained in the District, and the work accomplished deserves much credit for the pupils and teachers.

The school-houses were thoroughly renovated and many other necessary repairs made. The wood-shed at the Lower Village school was in a very dilapidated condition, the building and its underpining was repaired and we now have a fine room for storage in the basement, with a wide cement front step that cannot disintegrate by decay.

We have added new equipment that was much needed. We are very grateful to the citizens of the district for their co-operation in all our efforts, and their generous appropriations of money for our use, when we were deprived of State aid. It has made a small increase in our tax bill, but we have tried to give all expenditures our conscientious consideration and hope that when you have carefully examined the reports of your district officers, they will meet with your approval.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of the Hillsboro Town School District, the report of the Superintendent of Schools for the school year 1927-1928 is hereby respectfull submitted:

A list of our teachers, with their salaries, location, amount of experience, education, and form of certification, is given below. C stands for certificate, the highest form of State approval. L stands for license, the next grade, and P stands for permit, granted from year to year. All teachers not having a certificate are expected to prepare, by study, for an examination for a certificate, and unless this is done within a reasonable time, the teacher may lose the license or permit. Our teachers have ample experience, but they lack somewhat in Normal training, and that training was gained almost wholly in summer sessions. Some of our teachers are planning to attend Normal School the coming summer.

In addition to her summer Normal work mentioned above, Mrs. Evans is also a graduate of New Hampshire University. She resigned for personal reasons, during the year, and Miss Charlotte Colburn was elected to the position thus made vacant. During the latter part of the school year we found ourselves able to pay a Normal School Senior to act, on the Cadet Plan, as Music Supervisor, and we now hope to have a regular music supervisor hereafter.

Data taken from the teachers' registers show that the total enrollment was 136, with an average membership of 112.4, and an average attendance of 105.1, divided as follows:

A careful study of the above table reveals many interesting facts. 47% of our 136 pupils were boys. We would expect a larger average membership than 112.4 from an enrollment of 136. The large difference is accounted for in these ways: 8 did not come to town until some time after the school year had begun, 13 moved from the district during the year, 2 left as soon as the law would allow, and 6 were summer visitors whose parents did not leave town until after the fall term had begun. cent of attendance should be around 96. The average for one of the largest schools pulled down the average for the district. The Merrill School has the best record for attendance, and a really exceptional record for punctuality, as not one pupil was tardy during the whole year. teacher can do a great deal toward making these records good, by being present every morning at least twenty minutes before school time (some are found at school by eight o'clock every morning, and it pays, in more prompt preparation for the day's work, and a neater room), by believing that punctuality is a virtue

taught, by impressing its value upon the pupils, and by properly treating each case of tardiness. Of the 141 cases of tardiness in the Upper Village School, 104 cases were caused by children from two families, one of which has since moved away, and I feel sure that this school will have a better record next year. An epidemic of mumps pulled down our attendance somewhat.

An extra large number of visits were made by the Superintendent to the Flat School as that is the storing place for supplies and text books, and he called to deliver or to distribute them.

The National Bureau of Education has started a series of Home Education Letters, and its letter No. 1 is

entitled "Why Parents Should Visit their Schools." Briefly stated it says that parents should visit schools because, first, the school cannot assume full responsibility for the success of the pupils in their school work. By visiting schools, parents can better understand their share in the work. Second, criticism often comes from those who never look inside a school room, but depend upon gossip for their information. First hand information is always best. Third, the effectiveness of the schools of a community depends largely upon the interest parents take in them. Fourth, parents should visit schools because of the direct effect it has on their children. It is stimulating to pupils to know that their parents and teachers are pulling together.

In addition to the above regular teachers, Mrs. Lena M. Ball was supervisor of music, and Miss Edith Messer supervisor of drawing. An extra teacher was needed in the High School and it was decided to try out the Cadet System. This proved unsatisfactory, and Mrs. Mary B. Holden completed the work of the year. The Cadet plan was also followed in the Grammar School, and as it proved unsatisfactory there also it was decided to discontinue its use in this district. Mr. Bowley resigned in November to become Superintendent of Schools in a New Hampshire Union, and at the recommendation of the State Dept. of Education Mr. H. W. Dow was elected to succeed him as Headmaster of the High School.

Our total enrollment was an increase of 47 over last year's enrollment, and an increase of 7 in the High School, although with 95 pupils in that school, 48 were tuition pupils.

The percentage of attendance was 96.1% and that for the whole state was 95.9%. Our percents varied from 94.2% to 97.6% in Miss Shedd's room. Our punctuality record is improving each year, and this year there were only 159 tardy marks among 376 pupils.

Two grades did exceptionally well, and we wish to express our appreciation to the parents of these pupils as well as to the young people themselves. There was not a single case of tardiness among the 38 in Miss Shedd's room and only two cases in Mrs. Doble's room. With just three exceptions the tardiness record was excellent. The three cases were one high school girl who was tardy 20 times, an eighth grade boy tardy 11 times, and a first grade girl eight times.

There are recorded thirteen visits by school board members, 557 by parents and friends, and 509 by the superintendent.

The scholarship was awarded to Miss Frances Craige who entered the Keene Normal School. In the essay contest the prizes were awarded as follows:

The typewriting department has been doing excellent work. Different typewriting concerns make awards

for rapid and accurate work on their machines and our pupils received 63 certificates, 39 bronze pins, 17 silver pins and 11 gold pins. A very beautiful bronze medal was given by the New Hampshire branch of the Sons of the American Revolution for evidence of good citizenship which was won by Robert Herrick.

Miss Gile has done her accustomed follow up work of the medical examination closely, and has reported the amount and kind of work done. Her work has been beneficial to many children.

From a statement of the average cost per pupil in New Hampshire Elementary Schools, I find that our elementary school cost us, this year, \$43.72 per pupil. does not mean much when stated by itself, but when we learn that of all the 241 elementary school districts in the state, the Plymouth district alone has a lower average cost, and that is due to a special financial concession made to that district by the State Department. So that of all the districts in the state, not having special financial concessions, our per pupil cost of education in the grades is the lowest. The per pupil cost runs as high as \$508.18. Our per pupil cost in the high school was \$115.66, and 60 of New Hampshire's 85 high schools had a higher per pupil cost. This paragraph will be of interest to those who think our schools may be run extravagantly. They surely are not, and we could use more money to advantage.

From a series of tests given to New Hampshire high schools we learn that the mark indicating the real intelligence of our seniors was above the median for the state as a whole. In the History tests the scores ranged from 21 to 72, with our seniors scoring 40. In English the scores ranged from 62.5 to 196.6 while our score was 106.6, which was above the median score.

The Grammar School graduation was held in the school hall at 2 P.M. on June 8. The honor pupils were Barbara Severance and Kenneth Ryder. The High School graduation was in the Opera House on the evening of June 7th. The valedictorian was Miss Velna Kelso, and Miss Frances Craige was the Salutatorian.
