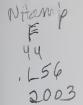

The Lempster Board of Selectmen has had a busy and productive year. We have made a number of changes throughout the town, some of which you will be able to vote on at town meeting, others have developed into Town Ordinances to meet the growing needs of the community.

When looking at the Town Warrant you will immediately notice its length. This is due to several ordinances that require a town vote to institute. There is a noise ordinance, a Long Pond Beech ordinance as well as a town numbering ordinance. While we have had policy for each of these items in the past, by making them into ordinances, they can be enforced to a greater degree. We would ask that you take the time to read each of these carefully and come prepared to ask questions prior to voting on them. Each item has a particular sense of safety for all within the community.

Several projects were on the burner this year. One was the "closure of the dump." Thanks in part to Senator O'Dell who took an active role in support of the bill to prevent the need for capping small dumps, and to your participation in writing letters to your representatives we successfully closed our landfill. There are a few things that must still be done, but they are minor compared to what we would be in the midst of had this bill not passed. Thank you Senator O'Dell.

As you all know we have had a successful re-assessment process. A professional assessment company has reviewed EVERY building and piece of land within the town and evaluations have been brought up to current values. The majority of people were quite satisfied with the results, those that were not had an opportunity to have a meeting with Avitar Associates, the assessment company. Most people, after a complete explanation, went home if not satisfied with the results at least understanding how the total figure was reached.

The Capital Improvements Program has again become an active part in the budgeting process. This committee reviews all capital projects (those that cost over \$3,000 and will last for more than three years) and makes recommendations for the raising of money to be placed in Capital Reserve Funds. These are basically savings accounts maintained until a percentage of the cost has been raised so that we can purchase a large item. Reviewing your warrant shows you some of the needs of our community that this committee has reviewed. Thank you Rudy Adler for coming back to the planning board as an alternate and taking on the chairmanship of this committee. Our thanks also go to the rest of the planning board that participated in this committee.

We wish to thank all of the members of all committees within the town. There are many commissions, committees, trustees, etc. that get little notice throughout the year. However your neighbors faithfully commit time and energy to these required parts of running a legal and thriving community. Thank you all!

Governing a town is never an easy job. This board has had its disagreements as well as its enjoyments in working together throughout the year. Sometimes it is hard to let "pet projects" go and other times it is even harder to make decisions on things that will particularly effect our friends and neighbors. However throughout all meetings respect has been shown even if the temperatures did rise. We hope that each of you will understand the need to vote for warrant articles that are in the best interest of the Town of Lempster and our community of people as we move forward in 2004.

2003 DEDICATION Alan Rauscher

Lempster entered the field of technology in 1988 through the introduction of the town's first computer which was the brain child of Selectman Rudolf Adler.

In 1990 Auditor Don Allen proceded to push the town toward the direction of using a computer for bookeeping.

In 1992 the Selectmen pondered the use of the computer for in-house tax billing. At that time the town was paying an outside firm to print the bills. It was agreed by the Selectmen that use of in-house billing would assure a more timely and correct billing process.

Low and behold, a gentleman who owned property in town, but resided out of state decided to retire in Lempster. His name is Alan Rauscher. Mr. Rauscher, it was sooned learned, was a retired excutive from IBM (these things are learned quite quickly in a small town). Selectman Harrison Stover had the good insight to speak with Mr. Rauscher one morning at the Lempster Transfer Station. He asked Mr. Rauscher if he would be interested in trying to assist the Selectmen in developing an in-house tax billing system that would save the Town money. Mr. Rauscher agreed. That was the beginning of the good fortune for the town.

Mr. Rauscher worked many, many hours to develop a program and then again many more hours training office personnal how to use the program. How much did this cost? Nothing but for the required hardware and new software program. Who has been over-seeing this program since that time? Mr. Rauscher, and again, at no cost to the Town. The services provided by Alan Rauscher normally cost \$150.00 to \$200.00 per hour. Alan Rauscher has charged <u>nothing</u> for his time. We estimate that in the last 12 years he has saved Lempster over \$200,000.00 in professional services. He has become known as the town computer guru (an apt title given to him by Trustee, Barbara Richards). He never refuses assistance and he is always there when we need him. People may be interested to know that Alan Rauscher was the gentleman who installed the first computer on the Stock Exchange Floor, Wall Street, in New York City, NY in the 1960's. He tells us that at that time the computer itself was as large as a small bedroom. As one of the town employees stated, after being introduced, to Mr. Rauscher – "I was so impressed with his excellent ability to work through a problem, he is definitely a problem solver and he explains the problem in layman's language which was much appreciated".

Therefore, the Board of Selectmen dedicate the 2003 Town Report to Alan Rauscher with much appreciation for the great amount of money he has saved the town, and for his patience, understanding, pleasant attitude and valuable assistance for many, many years. Thank you to our computer guru!

TOWN WARRANT

TOWN OF LEMPSTER State of New Hampshire 2004

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lempster, in the County of Sullivan, in said State qualified to vote on town affairs,

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School in said Lempster on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, 2004 at two thirty (2:30 PM) in the afternoon to open the polls for the voting of candidates, and at seven o'clock (7:00 PM) in the evening for the discussion of the articles of the warrant.

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2: To receive all reports and act thereon.

ARTICLE 3: "Shall the Town vote to modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Lempster? The exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 74 years, \$40,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 79 years, \$60,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$80,000. To qualify the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his/or hers spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$13,400, or if married, a combined net income of less than \$20,400 which includes social security and pension payments; and own net assets not in excess of \$50,000 excluding the value of the person's residence."

ARTICLE 4: Shall the Town vote to adopt the following ordinance relating to the use of the Long Pond Beach by residents and taxpayers?

Section 1 Access Prohibited

I. It shall be unlawful for any person to trespass on property owned by the Town of Lempster known as Long Pond Beach, except as provided in this chapter. Any person who is found to have violated this section shall be guilty of a violation and sentenced in accordance with section 10 of this chapter.

Section 2 Long Pond Beach Access Exceptions

- I. No person shall be found to have violated section 1 of this chapter if one of the following applies:
 - (a) The person is a resident of the Town of Lempster and has been issued a permit by the Town to access the Long Pond Beach.
 Only one (1) permit is required per household and shall cover all members of the household; or
 - (b) The person is a taxpayer, spouse or companion of a taxpayer, or minor child of a taxpayer and has been issued a permit by the Town to access the Long Pond Beach; or
 - (c) The person is the guest of a resident, taxpayer, spouse or companion of a taxpayer, or minor child of a taxpayer and the resident, taxpayer, spouse or companion of the taxpayer or minor child is present with the person on the beach; or
 - (d) The person has a permit issued by the Town granting access to Long Pond Beach.
- II. The exceptions outlined in sub-section (I) above shall not apply to any person whose permit to access Long Pond Beach has been revoked or suspended by action of the Board of Selectmen in accordance with Section 7 of this Chapter.

Section 3 Possession of Permit Required

I. Every person required to have a permit granting access to the Long Pond Beach shall have said permit upon his/her person, in or on his/her vehicle or in some easily accessible place and shall display the same on demand of any law enforcement officer or beach monitor. No person charged with a violation of this section shall be convicted if, within a period of 48 hours, he/she produces at the office of the arresting officer evidence that he/she held a valid permit at the time of his/her arrest.

Section 4 Duration of Permit's

I. Long Pond Beach access permits shall be issued by the Town Clerk and be valid for twelve (12) months from the last day of the month in which the permit was issued. Section 5 Fee's

- I. A fee for the permit may be charged at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.
- Section 6 Number of Permit's Required
 - I. Only one (1) permit shall be required per household.
- Section 7 Suspension or Revocation of Permit's
 - I. The Chief of Police may suspend or revoke any person's beach access permit for any action which occurred at the Long Pond Beach which would be a criminal violation, misdeed or felony offense under New Hampshire Law, a violation of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 179:10 (Unlawful Possession of Alcohol by a Minor), or any action which violates any section of this Chapter.
 - II. Any person who's beach access permit has been suspended or revoked by action of the Chief of Police may appeal said action to the Board of Selectmen. Said appeal must be filed with the Town Clerk in writing within ten (10) business days of the action taken by the Chief of Police. The appeal must outline the action taken by the Chief of Police and the reason the affected person disputes the action.
 - (a) The Board of Selectmen shall hold a hearing in public on the appeal within twenty (20) days, from the date the appeal was filed;
 - (b) The Board of Selectmen is granted the authority to adopt administrative rules for the conduction of any suspension or revocation hearing. The adopted rules will be made known to the parties prior to any hearing;
 - (c) After hearing the evidence the Board of Selectmen shall either uphold the decision of the Chief of Police, overturn the decision, or modify the decision. The decision of the Board of Selectmen shall be provided to the parties in writing no later than ten (10) days following the hearing.

Section 8 Glass Prohibited

I. No person shall have any glass bottles or containers in their possession while at Long Pond Beach.

Section 9 Long Pond Beach Operating Hours

I. Long Pond Beach shall only be open for public use from 6:00 A.M. to 10:00 P.M. and any person, regardless of whether they have an access permit, found trespassing on the beach at any other time shall be guilty of a violation and sentenced in accordance with section 10 of this chapter.

Section 10 Dogs Prohibited

I. It shall be unlawful for any owner, handler, or keeper of a dog to allow said dog to be on the Town owned property known as "Long Pond Beach". This includes but is not limited to the beach, boat access, picnic, and parking area's.

Section 11 Penalties

I. Any person found to have violated any provisions of this chapter shall be fined not more than fifty dollars (\$50) for a first offense, and one hundred dollars (\$100) for any subsequent offense.

Approved by the Board of Selectmen at a meeting held the 28th day of May 2003.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance relating to Street Naming and Numbering:

Section 4.1 Definitions

The following words, terms, and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meaning ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Building: Any structure whether public or private, primarily used as a residence, business, school or other public use.

Way: Any street, road, highway, lane, alley, or court whether public or private.

Driveway: Any access way leading to a building designated for vehicular traffic.

Section 4.2 All Buildings Visibly Numbered

All buildings shall be numbered in accordance with the statewide emergency 9-1-1 system. All buildings that are numbered shall affix a number not less than two (3) inches in height. All numbers shall be clearly visible from the way and be of contrasting color to the background. Buildings more than fifty (50) feet away from a way shall have a number affixed at the intersection of the driveway and way. Numbers shall be placed to the left of the main entrance. All apartments will be numbered in a similar manner.

Section 4.3 Way's Named

All ways with more than two (2) buildings shall be named. All ways less than two (2) buildings may be named. Ways that are required to be named shall have the name posted and clearly visible. Street name signs shall be posted on the left corner of the intersecting way. Street signs will be erected and maintained by the Town of Lempster except for private developments, which shall be the responsibility of the property manager or owner.

Section 4.4 Numbering System

In accordance with the Emergency 9-1-1 system, buildings on ways shall be numbered. The system to number buildings will be as follows:

- 1. Buildings on the left side of ways will have odd numbers and buildings on the right side will have even numbers. Buildings currently numbered will be grandfathered as to sequences.
- 2. Numbers shall be assigned form low numbers to high numbers as the way leads away from the center of town. Those Buildings currently numbered contrary to this section shall be grandfathered as to sequence. (United States Route 10).
- 3. For the purposes of this section, the center of town shall be the intersection of Mountain Road and United States Route 10.
- 4. Low numbers shall start at the end of the way that is closest to the center of town.
- 5. Where condominiums and developments have an established numbering system suitable to this system, those numbers will be used.
- 6. The system will be based on fifty (50) foot increments, with a number assigned to each of the said increments. Only those properties with existing structures will be recorded on maps.
- 7. Where lot sizes are such that various numbers may apply to one lot, numbers will be assigned based on the driveway location.
- 8. Any existing driveway serving three or more dwellings will have it's own name and assigned numbers. On a driveway serving two houses, the low

number will go to the house, which is closest by vehicular access to the low numbered end of the way.

9. The owner of a building or way shall be responsible for naming or numbering such property. Owner identification may be made using the Lempster Tax Map.

Section 4.5 Prohibited Acts

No person shall fail to number the buildings that they own. Building numbers shall be maintained so that visibility will not be infringed. Owners of private ways shall have their ways named and signs visible. Acts prohibited under this section include, but shall not be limited to the following:

- 1. Failing to affix building number or affixing a number less than three (3) inches in height.
- 2. Failure to name and post a name sign for a way that has three or more buildings located on it.
- 3. Failure to maintain building number or failing to have building number visible from the driveway or way.

Section 4.12 Penalties

Any person who violates this chapter shall, in the first instance, be given ten (10) days to comply with this chapter. Following the ten (10) day period, a civil fine of five dollars (\$5.00) per day shall be imposed. Any person who fails to pay any civil fine imposed within thirty (30) days of issuance of the fine or fails to comply with this chapter for thirty (30) days or more shall be brought before the district court. The District Court Justice upon a finding of guilty may impose a fine of not more than ten (\$10) per day for each day of non-compliance with this chapter.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Fire Department Expendable Trust Fund. All proceeds from sale of fire equipment to be placed in this account. (Submitted by Petition)

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to seek bids on an agreement with an area hauler for service for trash containers for residences and businesses in the Town of Lempster. (Submitted by Petition)

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish a committee to explore the concept of zoning as it might relate to the Town of Lempster. (Submitted by Petition) ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town of Lempster will petition the Board of Selectmen to create a noise ordinance that will establish a "quiet time" from 10 PM to 7 AM, seven days a week to preserve the rights of Lempster residents to use these hours, typically devoted to rest and sleep, without infringement. (Submitted by Petition)

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance relating to nuisances;

Section I – Findings

It is found and declared that:

(1) The making and creation of loud, unnecessary or unusual noises within the limits of the town during night time hours is a condition which has existed for some time and the extent and volume of such noise is increasing.

(2) The making, creation or maintenance of such loud, unnecessary, unnatural or unusual noises which are prolonged, unusual and unnatural in their time, place and use affect and are a detriment to the public health, comfort, convenience, safety, welfare and prosperity of the residents of the town.

(3) The necessity in the public interest for the provisions and prohibitions hereinafter contained and enacted, is declared as a matter of legislative determination and public policy, and it is further declared that the provisions and prohibitions hereinafter contained and enacted are in pursuance of and for the purpose of securing and promoting the public health, comfort, convenience, safety, welfare and prosperity and the peace and quiet of the town.

Section II – Definitions

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning.

A-weighted sound level shall mean the sound pressure level in decibels as measured on a sound level meter using the A-weighting network. The level so read is designated dB(a) or dBA.

Impulsive sound shall mean sound of short duration, usually less than one (1) second, with an abrupt onset in rapid decay. Examples of sources of impulsive sound include explosions, drop forge impacts, and the discharge of firearms.

Noise disturbances shall mean any sound, which endangers or injures the safety or health of humans or animals, or annoys or disturbs a reasonable person of normal sensitivities, or endangers or injures personal or real property.,

Sound-amplifying equipment shall mean any machine or device for the amplification of the human voice, music or any other sound. Sound

amplifying equipment shall not be construed as including standard automobile radios when used and heard only by occupants of the vehicle in which installed or warning devices on authorized emergency vehicles or horns or other warning devices on other vehicles used only for traffic safety purposes.

Section III: Specific Acts Prohibited

Between the hours of 10:00 PM and 7:00 AM:

No person shall cause any noise which, due to its volume (considered alone or in connection with its pitch or frequency or other characteristics), has a tendency to annoy, disturb, or injure persons of ordinary sensitivity, or to endanger the comfort, repose, health, peace, safety, convenience, welfare, or prosperity of such persons within the limits of the town. Acts prohibited under this section include, but shall not be limited to, the following.

- (1) The operation of any sound reproducing or amplifying device or machine on, or within fifteen (15) feet of a public way so as to be plainly audible fifty (50) feet or more from the device or machine.
- (2) The operation or playing of any sound reproducing or amplifying device or machine or musical instrument so as to be plainly audible on the interior of a building through closed windows. This subsection shall not apply to sound plainly audible only within the same building in which the device, machine, or musical instrument is operated or played, or within a building all of whose lawful occupants either consent to the sound or occupy only sections thereof in which the sound is not plainly audible.
- (3) The operation or playing of any sound reproducing or amplifying device or machine or musical instrument so as to be plainly audible on the interior of a dwelling unit, through closed doors, within the same building. This subsection shall not apply to sound plainly audible only within the same dwelling unit in which the device, machine, or musical instrument is operated or played, or within a dwelling unit whose occupant consents to the sound.
- (4) The operation of a motor vehicle so as to exceed tire traction limits, whether in acceleration, deceleration, or braking; to race or gun the engine; to rapidly accelerate; to use the horn other than as a warning signal; or to use the vehicle in any manner to create noise which is not incidental to the vehicles use as a mode of transportation. This subsection shall not apply to sounds made in response to an emergency reasonably perceived by the operator.
- (5) No person who is the owner or occupant, or who is otherwise in control, of any building or structure, or any section thereof, or other property in the town shall permit or tolerate on his

premises any conduct which violates this chapter or which, because of the number of persons gathered on his premises, has the effect which this chapter seeks to prohibit, after having been advised of same.

Section IV – Exceptions

Any person, corporation, or entity may seek an exception to this article by written request to the board of Selectmen. Requests for exceptions shall be in writing and shall be placed upon the posted agenda of a meeting when the request is to be considered. Any request for more than a single event or episode shall be mailed by the applicant to any and all abutters by certified mail, return receipt requested. In deciding whether to grant an exception the board may consider whether the exception sought is commercial or recreational in nature; the purpose of the requested exception; the impact of the exception on abutters and others; the length, manner, extent, and nature of the exception. Under no circumstances shall the Board of Selectmen grant an open-ended exception. The granting of an exception is not to be deemed to be a license, and no right to the allowance of any future exceptions.

Section V – Acts Prohibited, General

Between the hours of 10:00 PM and 7:00 AM:

- (1) The making, creation or permitting of any unreasonably loud, disturbing or unnecessary noise in the town is prohibited.
- (2) The making, creating or permitting of any noise of such character, intensity

or duration as to be detrimental to the life, health or welfare of any individual, or which either steadily or intermittently annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, peace or safety of any individual is prohibited. The following standards shall apply:

(3) continuous airborne sound which has a sound level of sixty-five (65) dBAs one hundred (100) or more yards from the point of generation.

(4) Impulsive sound in air which has an impulsive sound level of eighty (80) dBAs one hundred (100) or more yards from the point of generation.

Noises greater than these standards are prohibited.

Section VI – Penalty

Any person who violates this article shall be guilty of a violation and fined not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00). Any such person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for every day during any portion of which any violation of this article is committed, continued, or permitted. ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$631,798.0 for the purpose of General Town Operations. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required)

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to allow a one percent (1%) discount on taxes if paid in full within ten days of issue.

ARTICLE 33: To transact any other business that may legally come before said Town Meeting.

TOWN OF LEMPSTER State of New Hampshire TOWN MEETING MINUTES March 11, 2003

By Town Warrant and Budget posted February 14, 2002, the voters of the Town of Lempster were notified to meet at the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School in said Lempster on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, 2003 at two thirty (2:30 PM) in the afternoon to open the polls for the voting of candidates, and at seven o'clock (7:00 PM) in the evening for the discussion of the articles of the warrant.

Motion to open polls at 2:30 PM was made by Claire Thurber. The motion was seconded by Alice Bard and carried unanimously.

Moderator Michael Shklar opened the business portion of the meeting at 7 PM. M. Shklar asked those that were not registered voters to raise their hands so that it could be noted by himself and the audience.

Selectman Harold Whiting, Sr. informed those present that an error existed on the inside cover of the 2002 Town Report. The Wednesday hours of the Transfer Station are 10 AM to 2 PM in both the summer and winter months. The summer hours are no longer 1 PM to 5 PM as noticed in the report.

M. Shklar proceeded with voting on the articles as follows:

Article 1: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

M. Shklar noted that the polls were opened at 2:30 PM and will remain open for voting until declared closed later in the evening.

Article 2: To receive all reports and act thereon.

Motion by: Harold Whiting, Sr. Seconded by: Rudolf Adler

Discussion: Deborah Stone wished to compliment those involved with the compilation of the 2002 Town Report.

The motion carried unanimously.

Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote of the 2002 Town Meeting taken under Article 7 which provided that the highway department take over the Transfer Station/Recycling Center operations effective March 2003, and to see if the Town will vote to establish that the Transfer Station/Recycling Center operations become a part of the highway department effective January 1, 2004.

Motion by: Harold Whiting, Sr. Seconded by: Richard Shaw

Discussion: H. Whiting explained that the newly hired Road Agent and his employees were not yet certified to operate the Transfer Station as he is. The Selectmen felt that another year would allow certification and would give the Road Agent the opportunity to familiarize himself with the operations of the station. Doris Adler added that the Road Agent was in full agreement with this article.

The motion carried unanimously.

Article 4: Shall the Town vote to adopt, as the organizational form of the Lempster Fire Department, the provisions of RSA 154:1 (III) which provides that the Fire Chief, Officers, and Firefighters are to be chosen by vote of the Firefighters. This article does not change the existing practices of the Fire Department. The Selectmen recommend passage of this article. (Majority Vote Required)

Motion by: Philip Tirrell, Sr. Seconded by: Barbara Chadwick

Discussion: P. Tirrell stated that this was a "custodial" article to clearly represent the State RSA's that were passed years ago. This

insures that the Town and department are within the letter of the law.

The motion carried unanimously.

Article 5: Shall the Town vote to adopt an organizational form for the Lempster Rescue whereby the Department shall consist of a Captain who will act as head of the department. The Captain and members will be elected by vote of the members, subject to any licensing requirements of RSA 153-A. This article does not change the existing practices of Lempster Rescue. The Selectmen recommend passage of this article. (Majority Vote Required)

Motion by: Barbara Chadwick Seconded by: Bruce Adams

Discussion: It was explained by B. Chadwick that this article was being acted upon for the same reason as the preceding article.

The motion carried unanimously.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$590,904.00 for the purpose of General Town Operations. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required)

The proposed budget is a little higher than 2002 due mainly to a 3% increase in salaries and the cost of health insurance. D. Adler wished to thank all of the department heads for keeping within their budgets.

James Grenier wished to thank Harold Whiting, Sr. for this hard efforts at the newly constructed Transfer Station.

Linda Lane questioned the salary of the librarian as listed in the 2003 Report. It was explained that this was a typographical error and the salary item had been switched with the quarterly payments to the library. Salary should read \$6,240.00.

Carla LaBounty wished to address the Highway Dept. budget with regard to the monies received from the State Highway Block Grant. She would like to amend the Highway Budget to allow \$32,000 of the Block Grant Funds be allocated to pave the Allen Road. The Moderator stated that this was out of order at this time and should be taken up during discussion of the article to pave Allen Road.

William Robinson wished to address the recent article in the "Lempster Owl" which proposed to rename the Lovejoy Road after Selectman Harold Whiting with a public dedication on April 1, 2003. The article was submitted in fun by one of the editors of the Owl, Erik Walker. It was agreed that the article was enjoyed by all residents. W. Robinson also wished to thank Harold Whiting for his hard work and efforts in the construction of the new Transfer Station.

W. Robinson wished to address the new maintenance of a "unmaintained" section of Cutler Road where he lives. He stated he was informed by H. Whiting at the Transfer Station that an article would appear on the Town Warrant to ask that this section of the road be maintained as was done in the past and brought back to Class V status. When he found that an article did not appear, he was disappointed that the voters of the Town did not have any say in this matter. He would not have spoken against it as he understands the reason for maintaining this section, but would have asked that speed limit signs at 35 MPH be erected to insure the safety of his children that walk this road daily. H. Whiting responded that the Board had the right to start up maintenance under RSA 229:5 and once this was discovered, the Board decided not to address this on the warrant. W. Robinson agreed that the Board had this right but still would have thought it best to address the question on the warrant for the public's input.

Judy Patterson asked about funding in the Police Department budget for a beach monitor for Long Pond. Chief Shady Blackwell explained that the position would be part time and would not be manned by a certified police officer. The creation of the position came about because of the increased complaints of use of the beach by non-residents and loud parties.

The motion carried.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$83,000.00 for the purpose of conducting a town-wide revaluation in 2003 and for the purchase of hardware to support the new revaluation program and to withdraw the sum of \$50,000 from the capital reserve fund previously established for this purpose. Of the remaining \$33,000.00, \$29,400.00 to come from the 12/31/02 Unreserved Fund Balance and \$3,600.00 to be raised by taxation. (CIP Article) The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Doris Adler

Seconded by: Keith Fulton

Discussion: D. Adler explained that the State of NH DRA is requiring that the Town be re-evaluated by 2004. Sales ratios for Lempster have historically been between 94% and 97%. The sales ratio for Lempster for 2002 is 73%. This drop in ratio indicates to the State that the Town is in need of a re-evaluation. The project would begin in the spring of this year. D. Adler explained that this may mean an increase for some in their property assessment, but should follow with the tax rate being reduced. Harry Stover asked if the Selectmen had contracted with a firm for this service. D. Adler responded that the Selectmen are in the midst of contracting with Avitar and signing of the contract is contingent upon approval at this Town Meeting. David Kelsey asked what the outcome would be if the Town refused to perform the re-evaluation. D. Adler responded that the State would take it in their hands to insure that it was done. Philip Tirrell asked if the price included hardware and software. D. Adler explained that it did. Marco Gagnon asked when the last re-evaluation was performed and the response was that it was in 1993. Charles Brookens asked if the Town would be able to continue the use of the hardware and software for re-evaluations in the future or was this the property of the firm performing the service. D. Adler responded that the Town would own both the hardware and software. Brad Lane suggested that this be put off for another year if possible due to the ever-changing property sales. H. Whiting stated that postponement would only complicate matters and possibly allow loss of the contract to perform the service in 2003. Mary Grenier, former Selectman, stated that the State has been discussing this with the Town for some time and if the Town does not agree to do this, the State will do it for the Town.

The motion carried.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 5,500.00 to purchase self contained breathing apparatus (ten bottles and air masks) for the Fire Department. The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Philip Tirrell,Sr. Seconded by: Rudolf Adler

Discussion: P. Tirrell wished to offer an amendment to this article to exclude the wording "ten". He is concerned that this limits his departments ability to purchase more than 10 if funds are available. Motion on the amendment was seconded by Barbara Chadwick. The motion to amend carried. P. Tirrell explained that his department is in need of this equipment to meet NFPA standards.

The motion as amended carried unanimously.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 to purchase up to ten pagers for the Fire Department. The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Philip Tirrell,Sr. Seconded by: David Richards

Discussion: P. Tirrell explained that the cost of the pagers is \$425 each. His department hopes to purchase eight. Carla LaBounty offered a suggestion of purchasing pagers that are used by her company. P. Tirrell explained that the pagers his department requires are used for emergency services.

The motion carried unanimously.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,450.00 to purchase updated software and printer for the Town Clerk's motor vehicle registration, dog licensing and voter registration program. The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Doris Adler Seconded by: Phyllis Clark

Discussion: D. Adler explained that the Town Clerk's department is currently using a leased DOS program that needs to be updated with a windows version. The lease will run out on the DOS program and the Clerk will be without any program if this is not approved. P. Clark, Town Clerk, explained that if this article does not pass, she will have to revert to using the typewriter for registrations. W. Robinson asked if the price included a computer. P. Clark responded that it did not. D. Adler explained that the price did include a new printer, that was required for the new program. Shaun Best expressed concern that the Town could use one computer for all its programs rather than two or more. D. Adler explained that the Town Clerk's computer is for use for her office and the computer for the re-evaluation will be in use in the Selectmen's Office for assessing purposes. Richard Fairweather asked if the State would assist with the cost of the software. D. Adler responded that the State would not assist with the cost.

The motion carried unanimously.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,500.00 to make improvements to the Town Office to include a new heating system, repair and replacement of windows, insulation, replacement of exterior door to meet life safety codes and the painting of the exterior of the building. (CIP Article) The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Harold Whiting, Sr. Seconded by: Roger Ferland

Discussion: H. Whiting explained that the building is old and in need of a new heating system, insulation and painting. These repairs would be cost effective.

The motion carried.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 to help in assisting for the cost of the printing of the newsletter "The Lempster Owl". The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Keith Fulton Seconded by: William Robinson

Discussion: K. Fulton stated that he thought this newsletter was great for the Town and thanked the staff, Deborah Stone, David Diehl and Erik Walker. D. Adler explained that the individuals sited requested a lesser amount than submitted by the Selectmen, but it is the hopes of the Selectmen that more issues can be printed as the newsletter is very popular. D. Adler congratulated the Owl staff as did K. Fulton adding that this was all volunteer on their parts. D. Stone thanked the Board for their compliments but wished to offer an amendment to raise \$1,800.00 for the printing of the "Owl". She explained that a new printer has been found at a lesser cost. Barbara Richards asked if this provided more copies of the newsletter. D. Stone replied that it did. The motion to amend was seconded by Erik Walker. The motion as amended carried unanimously.

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to assist West Central Behavioral Services, an agency that supplies counseling and other therapeutic services to citizens of Lempster. The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Doris Adler Seconded by: Carol Whitman

Discussion: D. Adler stressed that services such as this are available to residents of Lempster and others are outlined in the operating budget. This is a new service and a first request and therefore, appears as a special article. D. Adler stated that over \$2,000.00 in services were provided to Lempster residents in 2002. M. Shklar asked about reimbursement by Medicare or Medicaid. Was this investigated? Kevin Onnela asked who funded this service now. D. Adler replied that it was funded by the federal government, state and county. K. Onnela stated that the town is already paying for it then. Kevin C. Onnela asked if this was considered a donation. D. Adler explained that it was. Thomas Verdiccio asked if passed would this now appear annually in the budget. D. Adler replied that it would if requested. Carol Whitman asked if residents of Lempster would be denied services if this article did not pass. D. Adler responded that she would not think so. William Robinson expressed concern that this opens up the "flood gates" to other agencies to request funding. D. Adler stated that the town can't be sure of this but that this is a first time funding request of any agency for a very long time. Wendy Thomas asked if residents of Lempster used this service. D. Adler replied that they have as outlined in a report from West Central.

The motion carried.

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for improvements to the new cemetery and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Cemetery Improvements Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (CIP Article) The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Harold Whiting, Sr. Seconded by: David Diehl

Discussion: D. Diehl explained that this was again removing funds from Capital Reserve for the creation of a new cemetery. Funds were removed in 2000 but had to be returned in 2002 because they could only be carried over for expenditure for two years. Construction of the new cemetery did not start as anticipated. Surveying work has been done but that is all. Patricia Nash asked where the new cemetery was. D. Diehl explained that it is property adjacent to the current cemetery and abuts Dodge Pond. James Grenier asked when the new cemetery would be established and when could residents purchase lots. D. Diehl hopes within the next year. J. Grenier asked how many lots would be available on the new site. D. Diehl responded that approximately 300 would be available. K. Fulton recommended that the beaver dams be removed from Dodge Pond. This would allow for more dry land for lots. William Rodeschin asked how many burials were performed each year. D. Diehl responded approximately 3. Danny Morse asked if the \$9,000.00 would complete the project or would more be required later. D. Diehl stated that it was hard to say as the trustees do not have established plans. It could be possible that more funds would be requested in a year or two. H. Whiting reminded the voters that they are not being asked to raise the funds as they exist in a capital reserve. Shaun Best asked how many lots were available in the old cemetery. D. Diehl estimated approximately 60.

The motion carried.

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to be placed in the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (CIP Article) The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: R. Mark Adams Seconded by: Harry Stover

Discussion: D. Adler explained that this is an established CIP fund. Erik Walker asked what the annual mileage was on the cruiser and where was it stored. Chief Blackwell responded that the cruiser mileage is approximately 6500 to 7000 annually and it is parked at his home.

The motion carried.

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 to be placed in the Town Building Expendable Trust Fund previously established. (CIP Article) The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: David Diehl Seconded by: William Rodeschin

Discussion: D. Adler explained the purpose of the fund as it is for use for Town buildings. W. Rodeschin further explained that this money would be available for maintenance and updating of town buildings. Kevin C. Onnela asked how much was used in 2002. D. Adler replied that none was used. Shaun Best expressed concern that the Town just voted to raise \$15,500.00 for work on the Town Office and now an additional \$7,000.00 for a savings account. He feels that this is too much to raise in one year. W. Rodeschin explained that the fund was set up mainly for the Meeting House and it is hoped that it will not be depleted. E. Brookens asked about the Town Offices moving to the Meeting House. W. Rodeschin explained that this was not received well in the past and that the Town Office building is in need of repairs. W. Rodeschin spoke on the history of the work on the Meeting House and although stagnant for the past few years, he hopes that work will begin to continue. soon.

The motion carried.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Bridge Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (CIP Article) The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Keith Fulton Seconded by: Harold Whiting, Sr.

Discussion: D. Adler explained that this fund was created to assist with the repairs and maintenance of the town's approximately 6 bridges. Discussion was raised on the town's responsibility to maintain the Mountain Road and bridge. K. Fulton explained that the Selectmen are working on trying to get the State to take back the responsibility of the Mountain Road. Nothing has been accomplished to date but the Board has not given up. Rudolf Adler stated that this has been discussed for years and during his tenure as Selectman. He informed those present that the Town of Washington must be in agreement to have the State take back responsibility of Mountain Road.

The motion carried.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be placed in the Cemetery Improvement Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (CIP Article) The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: David Diehl Seconded by: Patricia Nash

Discussion: D. Diehl explained that this was a CIP fund established for future improvements to the cemetery.

The motion carried.

The polls were closed at 8:30 PM by Moderator Shklar.

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$61,000.00 to pave Allen Road in 2003. (Submitted by Petition)

Motion by: Carla LaBounty Seconded by: Terry Spada

Discussion: C. LaBounty explained that when she moved onto the Allen Road years ago it was a paved road. In 2000 the residents of Allen Road were told that the pavement was being removed from the road but that it would be re-paved in 2001. This never happened. She would like the Town to vote to pave the Allen Road with the use of Block Grant Funds that are contained in the Highway Department budget. She has investigated the use of farmer's mix on the road but was told that the cost would be approximately the same as the paving cost of \$61,000. M. Adams asked if H. Whiting would like to comment on the article as he was Road Agent for years. H. Whiting stated that he had investigated the use of farmer's mix. The

process could be done with the use of town employee's and equipment at approximately \$35,000.00 and be paid for from the Block Grant Funds. He is not sure that this is the correct avenue now as the Road Agent has plans for use of some of the remaining Block Grant Funds. With this being the case, the money would not be there for the farmer's mix. He also understands that the Road Agent has plans to pave a portion of the Mountain Road with Block Grant Funds. John Tremblay asked how many residents live on the road. H.Whiting responded that there were 10 homes on the road, the road is used by approximately 100 vehicles daily, 2 school buses and it is a mail route. Kevin C. Onnela asked how many vehicles use the Mountain Road. The Selectmen responded that they were not sure but that many did. Kevin Onnela asked if the paving of the Allen Road should be a CIP project. It was asked what the Road Agent's opinion was with regard to this. Jeremy Hodskins explained the history of the reclamation of the road. Kevin Onnela asked if the road could be graded to provide a better surface. J. Hodskins responded that it could but that it would have to be graded several times due to the large amount of traffic on the road. K. Onnela stated that he did not feel the road had a good enough base to be paved. Danny Morse asked J. Hodskins if he had other plans for the Block Grant Funds and would his budget be short changed if he were to spend it all on the Allen Road. J. Hodskins stated that his other projects would not be done if the money were voted to be used on the Allen Road. Larry Conley stated that he had driven on the road and does not feel it is ready for paving as it needs some tree removal, drainage and lacks a good base. D. Adler explained that out of the Block Grant Funds available, \$25,000.00 is for a truck payment, \$7,300.00 for a wing plow, \$8,500.00 to crush gravel, \$3,500.00 for culverts and \$2,000.00 for hired equipment. This leaves a balance of \$26,800.00 in the Block Grant Funds which were originally planned to be used to pave a portion of Mountain Road. D. Adler added that these remaining funds can be voted to be used on the

Allen Road instead of the Mountain Road. It is up to the voters to decide. K. Fulton stated that he feels the Allen Road needs to be paved, if not this year, possibly next year. J. Schuler asked why there is nothing in writing regarding plans for the Allen Road. Brad Lane asked if the Allen Road did contain a base for paving. K. Fulton replied that he thought it did but if it was not going to be paved, then it should receive good maintenance and care this year. C. LaBounty asked if the residents agreed to putting off their request for paving, could they be assured that it would be addressed in next year's highway budget and not by article so they would not have to come before the town to request this a second time. H. Whiting responded that the Board could not guarantee the paving of the road. R. Adler stated that K. Onnela was correct when he asked if this should be a CIP article. R. Adler also stated that he felt the Planning Board and CIP could address this in their CIP program for 2004. Nick Scalara asked if past Road Agent, Phil Howard, would be willing to express his opinion of the paving of the road. P. Howard stated that he did not feel the road had an appropriate base and that paying \$61,000 for paving would be a waste of money. Danny Morse made a motion to call the question. The motion was seconded by Harry Stover. The motion to call the question was carried. Debate ceased. Motion was made by Kevin Onnela to have a ballot vote on the article. The motion was seconded by H. Stover and carried.

The article was defeated by ballot vote of 65 No and 36 Yes.

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in the Landfill Closure Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (CIP Article) The Selectmen recommend this article.

Motion by: Doris Adler

Seconded by: Keith Fulton

Discussion: D. Adler explained that the town had established this fund in anticipation of closing the landfill. D. Adler informed those present that a new House Bill 593 is being introduced that would not require towns with populations of 5,000 or less to close their landfills - only to continue to monitor the water through wells. D. Adler presented a list of individuals residents should contact to show their support of this house bill. It would save the town thousands. Representative John Cloutier voiced his support of the bill stating it is a "win-win" situation in that it not only saves the town money but the state as well. Senator Robert Odell also spoke in favor of the bill.

The motion carried unanimously.

Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution as presented by petition by Health Care for New Hampshire:

Whereas, New Hampshire residents pay the 12th highest cost of insurance in the country; and

Whereas, the cost of health insurance premiums for families has increased by 45% over the past three years; and

Whereas, 100,000 New Hampshire residents have no health coverage and 77% of them have a full-time worker at home; and

Whereas, due to these rising costs almost half of New Hampshire's small business cannot afford health coverage for their employees, therefore be it resolved

That we, the citizens of Lempster, New Hampshire, call on our elected officials from all levels of government, and those seeking office, to work with consumers, businesses, and health care providers to ensure that:

- Everyone, including the self-employed, unemployed, and un-

and under insured, and small business owners has access to an affordable basic health plan similar to what federal employees receive;

- Everyone, including employers, consumers, and the state, local and federal government makes a responsible and fair contribution to finance the health care system;

- Everyone receives high quality care that is cost efficient and medically effective; and

- That these efforts help control the skyrocketing cost of health care.

(Submitted by Petition)

Moderator Shklar stated that he is declaring this article out of order. He feels that it is not appropriate for action at Town Meeting as it does not address local government and is not in the purview of the purpose of Town Meeting. He stated that anyone could object to his actions if so wished. Keith Fulton wished to object stating that it is his feelings that this article should be considered as it effects all of those present and the feelings of these individuals should be considered. M. Shklar asked for a voice vote on K. Fulton's objections. The vote was in favor of the Moderator and his declaration.

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to allow a one percent (1%) discount on taxes if paid in full within ten days of issue.

Motion by: Doris Adler' Seconded by: Margaret Kemp

Motion was carried.

Article 23: To transact any other business that may legally come

before said Town Meeting.

A. Fire Chief Phil Tirrell wished to obtain a consensus of the meeting with regard to his department applying for a federal grant which would provide the fire department with equipment, building, etc. at a cost of 90% government and 10% local. He would bring all information and total costs before the Town Meeting. It was the consensus to approve the application for the grant.

B. D. Adler stated that Senator Sununu will be sending a representative to the Town Office on Thursday, March 13 between the hours of 10:30 AM and 11:30 AM.

C. D. Adler informed those present that the Fire and Rescue are seeking individuals interested in becoming a member. A flyer was circulated throughout the meeting informing this.

D. D. Adler stated that residents should keep in mind that when Selectman Harold Whiting expresses his opinion at the Transfer Station, it is his opinion and not necessarily that of the Board of Selectmen. She stated that residents should attend the meetings of the Board in order to address them as a whole and not individually.

E. D. Adler stated that a joint meeting of the Fire Department, Planning Board and Selectmen is scheduled for May 14, 2003.

F. H. Whiting thanked W. Robinson and J. Grenier for their kind words of his efforts at the Transfer Station. He wished to thank everyone for their cooperation at the facility.

G. D. Diehl wished to clarify the caption under the photograph of the Conservation Commission 2002 Report . Those pictured are local boy scouts and not boy scouts from Camp Kirkham.

H. D. Adler recommended everyone read the dedication in the report.

Moderator Shklar thanked everyone for their cooperation during the meeting and asked for a motion to adjourn.

Motion to adjourn was made by Kevin Onnela at 9:45 PM. The motion was seconded by Kevin C. Onnela and carried unanimously.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT 2003 REPORT

It has been one year plus for me as Road Agent for the Town of Lempster. It has been an experience of learning my position and I am ready to learn more and work with the residents of this town to insure that their monies are being spent on needed projects.

We had a very long and tedious winter in 2002-2003. A lot of cold and a lot of use of supplies such as salt and diesel/gasoline to keep up with the sanding, salting and plowing. We also experienced a lot of equipment break downs which needed quick repairs because we did not know what was coming next.

After debate, we paved the Mountain Road. This road is the most traveled road in town. The department has records on travel on the main roads used in the town and the Mountain Road contains the most - often to the maximum of 900+ vehicles per day on summer weekends. We must remember that a lot of the community use this road to get to their employment in the Concord or Manchester area. I have often encountered cars waiting at the base of the Mountain Road in the early morning hours that are ready to follow me up the mountain so that they can get to work safely. We realize that this is a main route and will strive to keep it safe and maintained for its travelers.

I am requesting a new truck this year through the Capital Improvements Program Committee. The committee established a few years ago that the trucks be replaced every fifteen years. Our oldest truck is a 1989. You can well imagine the cost of repairs to a truck of that age. This vehicle has served the town well but needs to be replaced. The other equipment we are running for trucks are a 1994 International and a 1999 MAC. A new truck will assist us in reducing costs for repairs on vehicles. Remember the oldest truck is now, should you approve the purchase of a new truck, a 1994 that is now ten years old. These vehicles are run hard and heavy - not like our own personal vehicles and the costs for repairs are great. The approval of a new truck for this department will assist us greatly.

In 2003 the Highway Department took over the responsibility of maintenance of the cemetery. Through funds provided under the cemetery budget we were able to purchase a rider lawn mover, push mover and hedge trimmer. We spent approximately one week per month to maintain the cemetery through May and August. Thank you to the Cemetery Trustees for their support of this department.

The Highway Department is scheduled to take over the operations of the Transfer Station January 1 of 2004. We have prepared for this and I and one of my employees are now certified to run a Transfer Station. We have learned new ways to save the town money - such as recycling all paper products and steel/metal. I have arranged for companies to take these products. Trucking will be subtracted from the total tonnage received and the town will still receive a check which will show a profit for the town. The previous Manager, Harold Whiting, should be thanked and honored for his service to the community and for his direction in the construction of the new station.

I wish to thank all of the departments, Fire, Police and Transfer Station, that have helped me through my initiation into my position as Road Agent. We are a good working team. Special thanks as well to the highway department employees, Peter Cooley and David Howard for making my life easier with their constant support and assistance. I also wish to thank the Board of Selectmen for their understanding and patience during this learning experience and the residents of the community who have supported me.

The Department will continue to work with the public to assist in any way we can. Please call us at the garage when you have a concern or need assistance. The number is 863-6779. We will do all that we can within our budget to assist you.

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Report of the Fire Chief Philip J. Tirrell, Sr.

For the last 27 years I have sat down to write my report about the previous year and wonder where the time has gone. It seems that it was only yesterday that I was having the fire department's first meeting of the year and making plans for what was to be accomplished in 2003. During that meeting we talked about how to increase our membership and what is the life expectancy of our current fire equipment. The fire station was also a topic of discussion and it was agreed that the replacement of the puilding was to be a priority for the next ten years. Unless, of course, a grant could be gotten and then we would look at replacing it sooner. Second on our priority list was the replacement of our next fire engine. This was also to be accomplished within that ten year window. We also talked about our current turnout gear, coats, pants, boots, gloves, noods, masks, and self contained breathing apparatus(SCBA), and it's current condition and the needs of the members. We accepted Aaron Watson as a member at this meeting. He has been a real asset to the department. The meeting concluded with a reminder of our nunicipal government class that was taking place next week.

February's meeting dealt with the maintenance of the fire trucks and Ron Clark discussed their needs. We discussed a new fire station and spent too much time haggling over the possibilities. We also talked about the usable water supplies throughout town ind what, if any, access we had to them this month. The lack of membership was talked about and a plan to advertise at town meeting for members took place. A fund raising Mudd Bogg was suggested by Barbara Chadwick, and we agreed to look into it further. Meeting adjourned with a reminder of the upcoming budget hearing.

The Windy Month meeting started with me presenting an opportunity to apply for the fire grant. We discussed the grant and decided to apply for a turnout gear washer/extractor, drying cabinet, and personal alert signaling system (PASS) devices. This grant would be a 90/10 match grant and we would ask for \$17,170.00. We discussed a plane crash that had killed a Swanzey family and how we would deal with a similar incident. Dave Magoon reported on a snow blower he had located for doing the roofs of the station. We discussed the repairs needed to our multi-gas detector. Jim Richards suggested that a new one could be purchased for less than the repairs to the old one. That seemed to make the most sense so we voted to do that.

April showers brought us Joe Brookens, a retired Navy Master Chief, a needed and appreciated member. We completed our application to the Fire Grant program and submitted it. 10 new air bottles that had been on order came in and were inventoried by Bruce Adams. Dave Loring took charge and issued the new Minitor pagers that had also arrived. A discussion was held on the new Knox Box program, a safe system for keeping keys on the premises of buildings for rapid access in emergencies. The meeting ended with a reminder of the class next week dealing with municipal bureaucracy.

May brought us new rules from the State of New Hampshire on incinerators, there were to be no more burn barrels. Some work and training was done on the ladder truck. Much of the meeting dealt with the brush season and hopes to purchase a used brush truck from Keene. The meeting ended early with a reminder that next week we would have training in East Lempster.

In June, Ron Clark joined Jim Richards and me as a member attaining the thirty year mark. We invited family members to help us celebrate his achievement. We were joined by the U. S. Postal Service who presented Lempster's Firefighters with a plaque and pins in memory of September 11. A reminder was made to all members that we would be meeting with the CIP committee and planning board to discuss the future building repairs and replacement plans next week.

Independence Day found us planning a Mudd Bogg to raise money for the Firefighters Association. We also discussed the new automatic external defibrillator (AED) that was acquired through a grant for the school. The New England Fire Chief's Convention in Springfield, Ma. allowed Mark Magoon, Jim Richards, Loretta Hull, Barbara Chadwick and Dave Loring and I to look at new apparatus, get new ideas in fire suppression, and try new tools and equipment, and the opportunity to visit with other firefighters from around New England.

August we filled out a Homeland Security radio needs survey, listing what ours communication needs would be in the case of a large scale incident. We signed up several members for a First Responders Class including Frank Earthrowl, Aaron Watson, Bruce Adams, Dave Loring and Ron Clark and also sent members to Meadowood Area Fire School.

Build it and they will come, is a line from a movie, but on September 1 that is exactly what happened. The Firefighters Association had a mud bog track built at Silver Mt Speedway. This happened because of the generosity of the land owner, Marco Gagnon. We held a very successful Mudd Bogg Madness Race that attracted racers from all over New England. We also presented paperwork for the proposed repairs to the fire station. The fire department also requested that the land across from the current station be looked at as a future site for a new public safety building.

October is fire prevention month and the fire department did their annual program at the Goshen-Lempster School. We also had our first Knox Box installed on a residence at Long Pond. Anyone wanting information about a Knox Box for your home or business please contact me. Their use can save time and damage in the case of an alarm. We also placed a request for an article for the warrant about establishing an expendable trust for placement of funds from sale of fire equipment. Currently if we sell an old truck, that money goes back into the general fund, rather than in an account where it could be used to offset costs of future purchases.

November fire meeting held at the Goshen Lempster School. New members need to have a tour of our school facility with hopes that what they learn will never be needed. This building has the greatest threat to loss of life in town. We always hope that our vigilance for fire safety will protect us from having an incident here. I received a last minute notice of grant monies available through NH Office of Emergency Management. This grant is a 75/25 grant to buy a generator to power the station. I have a good feeling about this grant and we apply for \$10,950.00. We also apply for a forestry grant for a foam unit this month. The forestry grant is a 50/50 grant and we ask for \$960.00. There is a change in the way our dispatch center will charge this year and the Rescue Squad will pay an amount equal to what the fire department pays.

December is the merriest month and that was partly because we got the \$10,950.00 grant for the new generator. The Firefighters Association offered to pay the 25% match \$2737.00, so it will cost Lempster tax payers nothing for the new generator.

We got word that we were selected to receive a \$960.00 forestry grant for the foam unit. Last but not least we were chosen in round 31 as a winner of the Firefighters Grant of \$17,170.00 of which we will be asking the town to pay the 10% match \$1717.00. All in all a pretty busy year.

I invite anyone with a desire for excitement to come see what is happening in 2004 at your fire station. Did you ever have a thought of being part of a team, or doing something good for your neighbors? Well all it takes is for you to come up to the firehouse the first Wednesday night of the month and have a coffee with us. We are an equal opportunity employer and welcome everyone.

LEMPSTER POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2003

During 2003 the police there were 710 calls for police service in the Town. In August 2003 four part-time officer's resigned from the department. Their primary reason for resigning was that they were unable to provide the level of service the town deserved because of commitments with their employment with the Newport Police Department.

In September I resigned my position with the Newport Police Department and focused my energies on providing police service to the Town of Lempster. I now work an average of 32 hours of duty per week. I am also available "on-call" most of the time. At times the workload is very high and at other times it is not. It is my belief that the best possible police service has been provided taking into account staffing and budget limitations. 274 of the 710 police calls for service were handled between September and the end of the year (38 percent).

This year I have asked for, and the Board of Selectmen has approved, a major budget increase. Most of this increase is in the salary portion of the budget, which reflects the added hours I am working for the town.

2004 was the scheduled year for my cruiser to be replaced. I appeared before the Planning Board and it was decided not to replace the cruiser this year. Additional money is being requested for the capital reserve account to replace the cruiser. I expect to request cruiser replacement in 2005.

I would like to inform the community that the department performs a service called a "house check". If you are going to be away on vacation or are not a year round resident a request can be made for the department to specifically check on your home. If you would like the department to check your house please give me a call so I can fill out the form.

It has been brought to my attention that the police department office phone number is not correct in the phone book. The office number is (603) 863-7908, and the fax number is (603) 863-8105. If you call the office number and no one is in the office your call will be forwarded to Newport Dispatch who provides dispatch services for the department.

As many of you are aware 2003 was a difficult year for me in other areas of my life. I want to thank all the members of the community who supported me, by giving me a call or stopping by the office and offering their support and encouragement. I also want to thank the Board of Selectmen for their understanding during those turbulent times.

Below is a listing of the 2003 police calls for service.

2003 PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT

Three alternates to the Planning Board were appointed this year: Richard Fairweather, for a term of three years; Rudolf Adler, for a term of 2 years; and George Peck, for a term of one year, all terms expiring at town meeting in their respective years. We welcome the service of these three men.

In April Mark Adams was elected Planning Board chairman, Bill Rodeschin vicechairman, and Kevin Onnela secretary.

A minor subdivision was approved in June for the Norman Pollard property on Lempster Street. Other subdivisions were proposed and the Board awaits additional information.

Rudy Adler accepted the chairmanship of the CIP Committee early in the summer. The committee's report is shown separately.

Late in the year the Board began the process for the regulation of earth excavations according to RSA 155-E.

In recognition of the Planning Board's responsibility to update the town's Master Plan from time to time (RSA 674:1), the Board requested that the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission draw up a proposal to assist in this project. The current plan dates from 1987. The Board is planning that the Master Plan process move forward beginning mid-2004. This is a 2-3 year project. Broad public participation will be sought.

The Board continues to meet on the 2nd Monday of each month at 7 PM in the town offices. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

Report of the Lempster Capital Improvements Projects Committee (CIPC)

In August of 2003 the Lempster Select Board and Planning Board revived the Lempster Capital Improvements Program, forming and authorizing the CIPC to contact and meet with Town departments, committees, boards and commissions. The purpose being the review of planned capital expenditures and recommending to the Planning Board and Selectmen a schedule for implementation.

The Lempster CIP was originally adopted by a vote of the Planning Board on November 15, 1988. The purposes listed then remain relevant today:

1. To assist in financial management by planing for capital expenditures, coordinating activities of various departments and <u>stabilizing the tax rate</u>.

2. To assist in the ability of the Town to accommodate growth and to better serve its residents by identifying, prioritizing and providing for the needs of the community.

3. To assist with managing growth. The CIP is a planning tool, which will enable the Town to:

- a) plan for public expenditures and in that way guide growth
- b) develop a schedule of impact fees
- c) implement a growth management strategy.

The intent of the Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) is to identify and prioritize the Town of Lempster's capital improvement needs and to recommend a schedule for the funding and purchase or construction of those improvements. In Lempster, a capital improvement is defined as a major expenditure or project undertaken by the Town or School District that is generally not recurring on a "year in, year out" basis. The Selectmen have defined a major expenditure as one costing over \$3,000 with a life expectancy of three years or more.

Capital projects include:

- all projects requiring debt obligation or borrowing
- any acquisition or lease of land.
- purchase of major equipment, vehicles or furnishings for buildings
- construction of new buildings or facilities, including engineering, design and other preconstruction costs.
- major building improvements that are not routine maintenance
- major studies that require the employment of outside consultants
- road improvements

The Planning Board has announced its intention to continue the work of this committee in 2004. Consequently, Town Departments, Committees, Commissions and Boards can expect to receive notification of meetings in the August time frame. The CIPC remains willing to discuss projects at any time and encourages representatives to attend all meetings.

Roger and Yorick have kept busy by cleaning fallen trees along Duck Pond Trail.

LCC made a contribution to the Cold River Water Shed Committee to help them purchase a water quality monitoring instrument for future analysis.

We have videos to share with the public on: New Hampshire Lakes/ Exotic Plants, and Lake Hosts: protecting NH lakes. If anyone is interested please call a member to view.

Tami displayed an exhibit at the Minor Library on different types of birds nests during the month of June.

Tami still continues to monitor frogs for NAAMP (North American Amphibian Monitoring Program).

Roger, David, and Yorick attended New Hampshire Ass. of Conservation Commission workshop. Topics of interest were: Wetland Protection, Town Forest Management, and Trail Building.

MINER MEMORIAL LIBRARY Annual Report for 2003

The Library is bustling. Patrons are coming in at the rate of 15 to 20 people a lay, and circulation is growing by leaps and bounds as people learn how many wonderful new books, videos and audiotapes the library has.

For as long as anyone can remember, the library has been open only Mondays and Wednesdays for five hours in the afternoon and early evening. People have been asking for Saturday hours, and Librarian Gail Warren and the Trustees feel that it would be a boon to open the library for three hours on Saturday mornings from 9 am to Noon, in addition to the traditional hours. Gail is willing to work the extra hours and we are hoping to have a monthly Saturday morning children's program.

The extra salary for the librarian is the reason for the modest increase in our budget request this year—salary being the library's biggest expense. The trustees cut back our budget in some other categories to help alleviate the increase.

Please note that we have no money in our budget for programs. The library has been a catalyst and sponsor of numerous activities in town, including the Christmas Socials, the Harvest Festival, Abe Lincoln, the Raptor Show, Pizza and Poetry eves, the play-reading at the Meeting House, story tellers, children' parties, summer reading programs, two Children's Literacy Foundation programs at Goshen-Lempster school, and more. All of these programs are supported with volunteer time and money raised by Friends and Trustees. We plan to continue supplementing money we receive from the town with our own fundraising efforts.

For past three years, we've sponsored two book sales per year (Cabin Fever in February and one in the fall), each of which usually nets \$200-\$300. Lempster folks are very generous, and usually donate way more than the "price" of the books. There is no price, because when Sue Fratus was librarian, she started a tradition of making all the books free and asking people to donate whatever they wanted.

This year, the Library held Lempster's first Harvest Festival in a long, long time. Trustee Sandy Odell chaired it and organized many arts and crafts vendors, children's activities, a white elephant table, book sale, bake sale, and live music. The Harvest Festival raised \$965 for <u>three</u> community causes:

\$612 for the library (from book sale, bake sale and vendor fees)\$208 for Sonny Armstrong (proceeds of the White Elephant Table)\$145 for the Lempster Owl (the Stetsons donated all the proceeds of their sales)

The Friends of Miner Memorial Library are most generous and active (as are so many townspeople to who contribute to the Friends). Their and your contributions have paid for not only programs, but also helped the library purchase some new children's furniture. The Friends also pitch in to help clean and maintain the library building, and t provide refreshments for events.

We are proud of Miner Memorial Library and its contributions to the community and we are grateful to the Town for supporting the library. We respectfully ask you to support our budget request.

THE FRIENDS OF THE MINER MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The Friends are volunteers who contribute time and other resources to support the activities and needs of the Library that are not paid for by the annual budget appropriation from the town.

Our Rabies Clinic, held every spring with Dr. Jolyon Johnson presiding, raised \$233 in 2003.

The now annual "Turkey and All the Trimmings Basket" raffle raised \$330. Friends donated the contents of the basket so all proceeds go to support library and community activities. In addition to the basics for the holiday dinner, this year's basket included a pecan pie made by Laura Pinkney, Jane Skeie's cranberry relish, Claire Thurber's biscuits, sweet bread mixes, candy, and candles for the table. We thank Bud Newton and his dog for selling \$103 worth of the raffle tickets at the Harvest Festival. The winner of the basket was Dorothy Hathaway's grandson, David Mercier of Henniker.

A donation from the Friends paid for a display rack for children's picture books, \$200 was given to the library to purchase videos in memory of May McCullough, and \$50 was contributed for the expenses of the Summer Reading Program.

The Friends host an Open House on the Sunday of Old Home Day Weekend, and this year's event honored Emily Fairweather and Yorick Hurd. The Friends and Trustees presented Emily and Yorick with framed tributes detailing their years of service to the Library as librarian, trustees, and volunteers, and a collection of books on New England life was donated in their honor.

Friends and Trustees co-sponsored the Cabin Fever Book Sale in February; a champagne reception and talk by author Jim Morone on his new book, <u>Hellfire Nation</u>; the appearance of Mr. Phil, a magician who kicked off the Summer Reading Program; the Poetry and Pizza night; and the Harvest Fair. Besides contributing money to these activities, the Friends provide refreshments, decorate and clean the Library and Town Hall, and donate their time and talents to planning, coordinating, and staffing the events.

The Friends meet in the Library at 6:30pm on the third Monday of the months of April through October. We welcome new members who wish to promote the opportunities for learning and recreation provided by the Library. Dues are \$2/year.

This last May, we were fortunate to again have the Lempster 4H Club volunteer for our spring clean-up of leaves and pine branches, needles and cones. Many thanks to all the kids and adults who worked quite hard on a cool but glorious spring day. We did miss John Terrell's donuts.

Flags were placed on 91 veteran's graves for Memorial Day, thanks to Susan Robert's 4th grade class at Goshen/Lempster School. The class absorbed some spring rain as well a bit of Lempster history.

Some of you may be interested in helping to care for our two Veteran's Monuments, one is across from the library, the other on the Lempster Street Common. Regular mowing is needed, along with decorating with flowers.

Lempster Historical Society-Old Home Day

The 104th Old Home Day, sponsored by the Lempster Historical Society, was held on August 22-24, 2003. The celebration started on Friday evening with a very stimulating talk by Dartmouth professor, Jere Daniel, on Lempster history. He is especially well informed on how and when NH towns were first founded, with Lempster being among the earliest, in 1735.

On Saturday morning the Historical Society Museum, which is upstairs in the Meeting House, was open for display of Lempster artifacts and historical documents. Also in the Saturday forenoon, an historic house tour was available. This year we were fortunate to have two houses to tour, one old and one brand new. The older one is the home of Bill and Janice Baker on South Pitkin Road. Of great interest was the progression of alterations and building additions, covering many generations of owners. The new house was that of Chad and Brenda Thurber, just completed on Lovejoy Road. Much of the construction and finishing was by Chad himself, with invaluable assistance from his father Everett, and many friends. It would seem a great house to live in, with fine views of the surrounding woods, and plenty of room for a growing family.

At noon the traditional chicken barbeque was served, attended by a hungry crowd and a beautiful day. A great chance to table-hop, greeting old friends and neighbors and catching up on the latest gossip. This was followed by a gathering to share town reminisces in the great hall. This was initiated by a salute to our flag, patriotically upheld by Yorick Hurd, our afternoon moderator. Brother Albert lead the way on the piano for our National Anthem (or was it *God Bless America*).

Always eagerly awaited was the evening program, produced by impresario Erik Walker, being the final highlight of the day. A showcase of local talent began, energetically emcee'd by Jim Morone. It was kicked off by a hilarious sketch by Erik, about the ugliest man in the world. Foot Stetson entertained us with harmonica, song and saw. Our keyboard virtuoso Doug Fellows braved the limelight with a set of pieces for piano, followed by an outhouse-related poem from Albert Hurd. Briana Dube, accompanied by friendly guitar, gave us two songs, with her mother, Donna Dube, coming along afterward with a poem about an eagle. A sing-a-long came next, encouraged by Gerri Ruddenfelst on the piano. The first act closer was a threesome skit on Lempster's flash news of 100 years ago, with narrator and lyrics editor Deborah Stone, narrators Jim Morone and Richard Fairweather.

Following intermission, hosted by the Lemspter 4H, Sheila and Larry Drew brought to us, in sound and light, his Lempster history tidbit entitled "Damn That Torpedo", the story of Lempster's Captain Samuel Harris. A bit of our history I'd bet few of us were aware of. Becky Fairweather hit the footlights with a show-stopping rendition of "You Can't Get A Man With a Gun", from Annie Get Your Gun, which was followed by two thoughtful poems, recited by the poet herself, Maggie Kemp. The fame of our local poets continued with 3 opuses from bard Bud Newton. The evenings entertainment concluded with a duet with the impresario himself, Erik Walker and lovely daughter Lydia, with two vocal pieces, backed up by Erik's masterful guitar artistry.

On Sunday morning the Miner Memorial Library held an Open House, allowing visitors to socialize and enjoy the historic character of this former Universalist Church. Refreshments were congenially provided by the Friends of the Library.

At 2 PM, Erik Walker led a grand tour of old Lempster Mountain history. This included weaving us through an old mill site and well preserved dam, located on an off-shoot of the Ashuelot River. We were then led through the woods and over the hill to the Spaulding Cemetery, less than a half mile away (honestly). Well worth the effort for 20 hardy OHD celebrants.

Please feel welcome at our Historical Society meetings and to join the Society if you like. We meet about 10 times a year, on first Mondays, either at the Meeting House or the Miner Library. increased our print run from 400 to 700. But numbers don't tell the real story. *The Owl* is no longer a good big newsletter. It's a great little magazine.

Thanks to you, *The Owl* has fantastic writers and story ideas. Thirty-four people contributed articles, poems, and drawings during this past year, many of them more than one. Seventeen authors contributed to Issue Number 13 alone. *The Owl* even had an international correspondent covering the war in Iraq: Doug Morris sent his diary of a medic via e-mail from a U.S. military base in Germany. *The Owl* didn't shy away from controversy: Erik Walker took on the delicate task of covering the church issue, because so many people told us that the closing of Lempster's only church affects everybody and is too important to ignore. Feature articles covered activities in Lempster and beyond: Jim and Mary Grenier's hay making operation, Kayla Pope's drive to help birds injured by a Cape Cod oil spill, the Cold River Local Advisory Committee's water monitoring project, remembrances of John Wirkkala, Harold Whiting's memoir of his service in World War II, the inner life of a cemetery trustee; and several awesome projects going on at Goshen-Lempster School.

The Owl not only records the present for the future. It is retrieving long-forgotten episodes from Lempster's heretofore unwritten past. This year, readers could track the story of Bert Smith's wooden railroad and trace the evolution of Lempster as a shopping mecca. They could relive everyday life a hundred years ago, or get a feel for the aftermath of a unique event, 1938 hurricane.

And true to its namesake's spirit, *The Owl* featured lots of material about the outdoors, our wildlife, our trees, even our bugs, and our surprise encounters with animals and birds who shared their live with us for a moment or two. Who will ever forget Gregory the Grouse, Chickee-Dee, or the Courageous Loons of Long Pond?

Want High Culture? *The Owl*'s got book reviews, including one by Lempster's town moderator and attorney, Michael Shklar, reviewing *Hellfire Nation* by Lempster's peripatetic author, Jim Morone. Want Hip Culture? Neville Walker tells you twelve CD's you can't live without. Want homegrown poetry without any curses? Just open *The Owl* to read some verses. Don't want to read? Just want to look? Dave Diehl's photos could fill a book.

Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Regional Planning Commission Annual Report for 2003

The UVLSRPC is a not-for-profit association of 30 communities in Vermont and New Hampshire. We provide a mechanism for communities that live, work and recreate together in the Upper Valley, Sullivan County and Lake Sunapee area to work together on issues of common concern. Each year we strive to focus on activities that will best meet the needs of each of these three areas, while we balance the differing concerns of larger and smaller communities. Your community's membership in UVLSRPC provides you with a voice in regional activities, as well as decision-making at the state level in both states that affect the future of your community.

We provide the communities of the region a mechanism to work together toward balanced growth, in part by developing and implementing a comprehensive regional plan. In 2003, we completed work on both a new Regional Transportation Plan and new Economic Development element for the Regional Plan, as well as updates on Population Trends and Natural & Scenic Resources. In other activities, we:

- Worked with area and state organizations, businesses and communities to seek opportunities to improve the balance between economic growth and residential development in the Upper Valley.
- Helped several communities obtain grant funds for a variety of projects, including emergency management equipment, village highway corridor redesign, recreation facilities and transportation system enhancements.
- Completed incorporation of Grafton County communities in North Country Economic Development District for federal Economic Development Administration (EDA) grant eligibility; obtained EDA approval of East-Central Vermont Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) developed in partnership with Green Mountain Economic Development Corporation and others to ensure business growth meets the needs of our communities; and began work with Western Region Development Corporation on CEDS for Sullivan County. Continued to support tourism organizations in the Region.
- Assisted 11 communities with updates of their master plans and 10 with local land use regulations.
- Provided technical assistance to local committees addressing a number of issues such as affordable housing, interstate interchange area development, open space, capital improvements programming, downtown revitalization, sewers, and bicycle and pedestrian facilities.
- Developed guidelines for balancing state highway needs with those of a downtown or village area utilizing a concept plan for Charlestown as a case study.
- Facilitated Upper Valley Conservation Network and provided technical assistance to Upper Valley Trackers.
- Continued our assistance to watershed organizations planning for the stewardship of the Connecticut River and its tributaries, including Lake Sunapee, and the Cold, Mascoma and Ottauquechee Rivers. Actively participated on Connecticut River Joint Commissions and Connecticut River Scenic Byway Council Steering Committee.
- Organized five hazardous waste collections that gave 1,170 households a way to keep approximately 13,100 gallons of hazardous chemicals out of the region's groundwater; and assisted with public education on household hazardous waste.

- Conducted 911 readdressing in Claremont to improve emergency response. Completed hazard
 mitigation plans for 4 communities as required for continued eligibility for federal disaster
 assistance and hazard mitigation funds; arranged funding to complete several more in the coming
 year, including, all 3 Vermont towns; and continued to facilitate well-integrated emergency
 planning within the core Upper Valley communities.
- Provided suggestions for minimizing potential regional impacts associated with several proposed developments through Act 250 in Vermont and RSA 36:56 in New Hampshire.
- Collected traffic data in 24 communities, and completed road inventory in 5 communities to make sure that full state aid for maintenance is received. Developed plans for Upper Valley traffic model to increase ability to predict and avoid traffic increases. Provided traffic data to communities, residents and businesses on request.
- Continued to work with public transit providers serving the area's residents, employees, and visitors to identify opportunities to improve service using currently available funds, and to prioritize needs for additional funding. Assisted Upper Valley Transportation Management Association in efforts to involve area employers in programs to reduce commuter traffic.
- Provided monthly circuit rider services to 5 communities to review subdivision and site plan applications for compliance with local regulations.
- Held several informational and training sessions for local officials on land use planning issues, (including siting wind power facilities, how to avoid sprawl, and programs available to keep historic villages healthy), natural resource protection issues, (including stormwater management and Vermont's new septic rules), and board member skills, (including fostering productive citizen participation in the planning and development review processes). Facilitated discussions on future plans of Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center, Dartmouth College, and the Mt. Sunapee Ski area, and potential impacts on growth-related factors such as housing and traffic in the region.
- Responded to day-to-day requests from local board members and staff for guidance on, e.g., application of NH Shoreland Protection Act, policies on unmaintained roads, management of excavations, implementation of floodplain ordinances, capital improvement programming and impact fees, road acceptance policies, coordination of review of applications among various local boards, regulation of telecommunications facilities, interpretation of local land use regulations, hiring consultants, and planning and zoning board procedures.
- Continued to increase the ability of our geographic information system (GIS) to perform land use analysis and natural resource planning; provided GIS services to communities and partner organizations.
- Maintained a library with the latest technical guidance, planning literature, and sample regulations; continued to incorporate 2000 Census information into digital regional socioeconomic database as it became available; and responded to numerous requests for information from local officials, businesses, and other area organizations.

We appreciate the high level of participation and support we receive from our communities, and look forward to continuing to serve the needs of the region in the coming year. We count on feedback from the Commissioners each community appoints, as well as local officials and residents, to ensure that our work program focuses on regional issues that are of the highest priority to you. In addition, this year we have established a new committee to enhance the exchange of information with member communities. As you begin planning for your town budget for the next year, you no doubt have many requests for support. At the same time I'm sure you are scrutinizing each item to be sure the request for funding is credible and meets the needs of residents of the town.

Support from the towns *does* make a difference in the lives of your friends and neighbors who need home care and hospice services. Town funds are used primarily to provide care for adults and children who either have no insurance or who have inadequate insurance. Services can run the gamut from counseling and teaching for a young woman experiencing a high-risk pregnancy; to home monitoring for a child who had a recent heart transplant; to an adult needing teaching for newly diagnosed diabetes; to the 91 year old gentleman who is able to stay at home with the support of a home care aide and a homemaker a few times a week; and finally, to the young mother dying of cancer who is able to stay at home surrounded by family and friends.

In addition to the direct patient care we provide, Lake Sunapee Region VNA provides community services like influenza clinics, health fairs, foot care clinics, bereavement support groups, immunizations in the schools, assisted living at home services and much more. Our home telemedicine program allows us to monitor vital signs for patients each and every day and intervene whenever necessary and to fax trending reports to the patient's physician.

We are grateful for the support of the town of Lempster and for your interest in ensuring a healthy community. This year, Lake Sunapee Region VNA respectfully requests an appropriation for 2004 in the amount of \$2,664.00. This figure is based on a per capita assessment of \$2.625 per person on a total population of 1015 residents according to New Hampshire Office of State Planning figures.

We at Sullivan County Hospice are requesting \$250 from the Town of Lempster.

Sullivan County Hospice has been in existence since 1984. We are a volunteer agency, governed by a 12 member Board of Directors, all of whom reside in Sullivan County.

Our mission is to provide practical and emotional support to terminally ill patients and their families within Sullivan County. The majority of the individuals we serve are home hospice patients, who have decided to remain at home under the care of their families. It is in this setting that we provide most of our services. However, we have the flexibility to follow and serve our patients and their families in a hospital or nursing home setting, as well. Our volunteers are fully trained in areas such as death and dying, the grieving process, active listening and universal precautions. A few of the ways our volunteers provide practical support include respite for caregivers, running errands and light meal preparation. Our volunteers also provide emotional support to both the patient and their family, by being available to listen and offer reassurance and encouragement.

Our referrals come from doctors, nurses, visiting nurse associations, discharge planners, as well as from family members or patients themselves. Our only requirements for service are that the patient be terminally ill and that they reside in Sullivan County. We accept all referrals on that basis and there is never a charge for our service.

In addition to providing volunteer services, Sullivan County Hospice offers a bereavement support group. This group is scheduled for six sessions a year, each lasting a period of five weeks. These groups are open to anyone working through the grieving process.

We thank you in advance for your consideration. We hope that you will continue to support our work with your financial contribution, as we continue in our efforts to support the terminally ill and their families in Sullivan County.

Factoid About Meals-on-Wheels

History

The Meals-on-Wheels (MOW) program delivered it's first meal in Philadelphia, PA in 1954. The program was modeled after a similar program that was started in England to support seniors during World War II. In 1972, the federal government made the program a permanent program through the implementation of the Older American's Act. The act provide a basis for providing meals to seniors (60 years or older) or people with qualifying disabilities. As a integral part of the act the framework for funding not only involved federal support but also monies from local sources. The general formula put forth by the grant is 75 to 80% garnered from federal sources, 15 to 20% to be raised from local support (counties & municipalities) with the balance derived through private donations. Obviously these are general guidelines but it points out that community participation and personal commitment are key elements.

Sullivan County Nutrition Services (SCNS) started it's participation in the MOW program in 1973 and operated out of a department store's basement in Newport. The initial program served 25 meals per day and had an initial operating budget of \$20,000. In 1980 the program established meal sites in Claremont and Charlestown to meet an ever growing need for service. 30 years later we are serving over 100,000 meals per year with an operating budget of \$650,000. All but four communities in Sullivan County receive meal services through this program (Acworth, Plainfield, Cornish, and Langdon). We have not received any requests from these communities. Should there be a request we would make every accommodation to service the request.

Community Support

SCNS requests each community that is being served to support the MOW program. Our request reflects the number of meals and individuals that have been served in your community during the past year and the historical trend that has been experienced. If your community is not served, no money is requested. If your community has few meals and people being served historically then it is conceivable that your requested support would be reduced. Should you community have an increase in meals served a modest increase is often requested. The bottom line is that we simply ask for support that is commensurate with the degree of service provided and seldom is equal to the total cost of service. Any difference is raised through private donations, and is consistent with the funding formula that was put forth by the Older American's Act.

<u>SCNS</u>

Sullivan County Nutrition Services is a part of the Newport Senior Center. a 501(c)3 organization. SCNS operates three congregate meal sites in Newport, Earl Bourdon Center (Claremont) and at the Town Office Complex in Charlestown. We have an annual independent audit performed each year and must comply with all aspects of the program grant guidelines. Oversight is provide by the State of NH, Department of Elder and Adult services. We encourage communities to visit us and to discuss any questions they have about any aspect of the program. Thank you in advance for your support.

West Central Behavioral Health requests an appropriation of \$1,000 from the Town of Lempster that will enable us to continue offering free or low cost services to residents of the community who are uninsured or underinsured. In FY 2003, West Central Behavioral Health provided residents of Lempster with \$6,628 of free or reduced cost mental and behavioral health services for which we received no reimbursement. We are committed to making quality mental health services available regardless of ability to pay to all communities in our service area, and are asking the cities and towns we serve to help us sustain that commitment to many of our most vulnerable neighbors.

West Central Behavioral Health is the NH designated Community Mental Health Center for Lempster, as well as Sullivan and Southern Grafton Counties. Our mission is: "to promote, preserve, and strengthen the mental health and quality of life for individuals and their communities through the delivery of integrated, comprehensive services." Our consumers suffer from a range of disorders and illnesses: life threatening severe, chronic mental illness such as psychosis, schizophrenia, and bipolar disorder; all forms of addiction; as well as anxiety, depression, divorce or relationship related stress, and other impairing, but highly treatable, conditions. We work with all ages in outpatient clinics, homes, jails, nursing homes, schools, and residential supported living programs, offering a broad variety of counseling, psychiatric services, case management, and emergency consultations.

Some of the services provided to residents of Lempster this year include:

- 8 Children and their families received 27 therapy sessions at our outpatient clinics in Claremont, Newport, and Lebanon.
- 22 Adult residents received 88 sessions of outpatient counseling for depression, anxiety, addictions, family issues, and other critical issues.
- 3 Residents contacted our Emergency Services, available 24 hours, 7 days a week.
- 10 Residents received 133 sessions of other services such as case management or participation in our Academy Programs for people who have committed substance abuse related offenses.

We hope you will help us provide quality mental health care to all who need it.

The committee consists of citizen representatives appointed by selectboards from the five towns in the watershed that touch the river: Acworth, Alstead, Langdon, Lempster, and Walpole. The CRLAC is developing a River Management Plan that will guide its long-range work. The committee also reviews all projects needing state and federal permits which could impact the river.

CRLAC ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2003

- Organized the third annual Winter Workshops series, which provided education about wetlands, amphibians, winter wildlife tracking, and birds. In addition, a tracking session on snowshoes in the Acworth Wetlands and a spring walk along Lempster's Dodge Brook to find Migratory Birds got lots of people outdoors having a great time. Many thanks to Alstead's Shedd-Porter Library for letting us hold our indoor workshops there. We also worked with the Acworth Historical Society to organize a summer walk along the river behind the Village Store to study native plants and streambanks.
- Produced the River Journal Calendar for 2004. Travis Hussey, our terrific environmental educator and AmeriCorps volunteer, completed his work with 82 students and their four teachers in grades 3-6 at Acworth, Langdon, Goshen-Lempster, and Alstead's Vilas School. Among other things, they studied water conservation, macroinvertebrates (such as stoneflies, mayflies, caddisflies), and wildlife habitats. They also kept nature journals during the year. All this work contributed to a remarkable calendar, sales of which will help fund more environmental education in schools through our partnership with the Fall Mountain Educational Endowment Fund. We are grateful to support from the Vermont Institute of Natural Science, the Connecticut River Partnership Program, the town of Alstead, local conservation commissions, and an anonymous grant source for assistance with projects.
- Completed our first full year of water quality monitoring using the state's VRAP equipment. Test results for pH, temperature, conductivity, dissolved oxygen and turbidity continue to show that the Cold River generally has excellent water quality. Heavy rains, however, have put large amounts of sediment into tributaries, often discoloring the entire river and possibly disrupting aquatic life cycles in certain time of year. Through grants and local donations, the LAC has purchased its own water quality monitoring equipment, complete with weather station and velocity meter, as well as nets and other gear. In addition, we trained with NH DES and started a biomonitoring project to track macroinvertebrates in a long-range project.
- Participated in the review of the trout habitat project in Walpole designed by the NH Coldwater Fisheries Coalition and Trout Unlimited. We acknowledge and appreciate Cold River Materials for their participation in habitat improvement, redesign of a dam, and removal of an aging overhead "trolley" in their stretch of the river.
- Continued work on a voluntary river management plan for the Cold River.

The Advisory Committee welcomes your participation on any or all of our projects. If you are interested in joining our committee, please speak with your selectboard. If there is an opening, they may make a nomination to the board. However, with or without official membership status, we

welcome all volunteers! We meet on the third Thursday each month, 7-9PM, usually in the Alstead Town Offices. To be on our email notices for workshops, call any member to let us know.

We thank everyone who has worked with us during the past year. With your interest and enthusiasm, our work continues to be enjoyable and productive.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School gymnasium in Lempster on the 6TH day of March, 2004, at seven o'clock PM to act upon the articles set forth in the Warrant. Articles 1 & 2 of the Warrant covering the election of Moderator and Member of the School Board from Lempster will be acted upon at three o'clock PM., and voting will be by official ballot and checklist. The polls will remain open for this purpose from three o'clock (3:00) PM until seven thirty (7:30) PM.

ARTICLE 1.

To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2.

To choose a member of the School Board from Lempster for a five year term.

ARTICLE 3.

To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of THREE MILLION TWO HUNDRED SIXTY-ONE THOUSAND NINETY-SEVEN DOLLARS (\$3,261,097.00) for the support of the school, for the payment of salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment for the statutory obligations of the district. This article does not include appropriations voted in other warrant articles. The School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority Vote required)

Note: The Board anticipates that \$1,605,214.00 from sources other than general taxation will be available to apply towards these expenditures.

ARTICLE 5.

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of sealing the gym wall exterior. The School Board recommends this article. (Majority vote required)

ARTICLE 6.

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$5,000.00) to be added to the School District gym floor replacement Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

Five years ago I had the distinct pleasure of being selected to serve the Goshen-Lempster School District as its Superintendent. Since then, I have seen many positive accomplishments occur that have allowed us to move to a new level of service to the students and citizens of the Goshen-Lempster community. This past year our school has continued its efforts to provide quality educational services in a fiscally prudent manner as evidenced by the following:

- NH Assessment Analysis Training with Kathe Symonds
- Our in-school "Get Caught Reading Program"
- Personal safety and awareness program for Healthy and Safe Student Behavior.
- The TIGER program from Plymouth State University, which involved the entire school.
- The Language Arts Curriculum Renewal effort using a federal grant.

As many of you may recall, last year's Annual Meeting saw a significant reduction in the School Board's proposed 2003 - 2004 budget approved by a majority of voters present. Indeed, the overall reduction amounted to a 10% cut. This year the School Board is bringing forward a proposed 2004 - 2005 budget that is less than it proposed at this time last year. Certain actions have allowed for this proposal to occur, most significantly long term savings achieved in special education obligations, a reduction in the number of professional staff, and the creation of a high school tuition cap.

In light of the above, I believe the school district is poised to continue its efforts to be a district that its citizens have great pride in and who are strongly committed to provide the support needed to achieve our mission as a public school.

The impact of a community (through citizen involvement and political support) on its school's environment influences the social, emotional, physical and cognitive factors which affect the hearts and minds of the students. Community involvement combined with the careful planning of the Goshen-Lempster School program, through the efforts of an outstanding school staff and a very diligent School Board, have resulted in a productive and exciting school experience for the children of the community. While it is beyond the scope of this report to outline all of the events of the past year, several of the highlights of the year 2003 are:

JANUARY

Bob O'Dell, New Hampshire State Representative from Lempster, was instrumental in obtaining a new New Hampshire State Flag and a new American Flag (through Senator Gregg's office) for the Goshen-Lempster School. A Flag Raising ceremony was conducted at the school with a school assembly at the flag pole.

School Nurse Rhonda Colcord arranged for a health presentation to students in grades four through eight on the prevention of injuries to the brain and the spinal chord. The <u>THINK FIRST PROGRAM</u> focused on the awareness of the potential dangers of "risky" behavior.

Donna Hatch, special educational assistant, implemented two reading programs. In the first program, AFTER SCHOOL READING CLUB, Ms. Hatch volunteered her time to conduct a reading program that focused on the joy of reading. The other program, GET CAUGHT READING, involved photographing several students each week who were "caught reading" for pleasure during school. Each month, the students received a treat and their pictures were posted on a bulletin board reading display.

Snow Sports Industries America sponsored a cross-country ski program for students in grades four, five and six. The students received an introduction to the program which included safety tips and fittings for equipment. The rest of the day was spent on skis in the school yard.

Jodi Mileti was the winner of the local National Geographic Spelling Bee. Her name was added to an official National Geographic plaque which is posted in the main foyer for school year 2002 - 2003. Other student on the plaque are Helen Powell (2001 - 2002), Hilary Porter (2000 - 2001), and Megan Williamson (1999 - 2000.

FEBRUARY

Vicky Goss organized a series of computer skills workshops for the parents and grandparents of students. Several of Ms. Goss' students assisted her in the skills training sessions.

The Goshen-Lempster School Math Team participated in the annual MATH COUNTS competition at Keene State College. It was an exciting day of meeting other students and teachers from around New Hampshire. The members of the Math Team were eighth grade students Ira Fellows, Christopher Halamoutis, Honi Heino, Angela Jones, Jennifer Luppold, Tania Ross, Rachel Shklar, and Alyssa Wilcox.

The students were treated to a performance of the TIGER Program (<u>A Bully Isn't Your Friend....Yet!</u>) by Plymouth State College. TIGER is an acronym for Theatre Integrating Guidance, Education and Responsibility. The focus of the program was to provide an entertaining presentation with actors, puppets, theatre, movement and music to enable children to step back from the trauma of bullying to find peaceful and effective solutions.

MARCH

March is always a month of much trepidation in terms of monitoring the status of the current operating budget and anticipating the public reaction to the proposed budget for the next school year at the School District Meeting. Due to unforeseen special education costs, which created a potential short fall in our current budget, a necessary "freeze" of discretionary spending was enforced. The effect was the cancelling of many student activities. At School District Meeting, \$150,000.00 was cut from the proposed budget for 2003 - 2004; that resulted in the cutting of programs, supplies and student activities.

This year's Project Fair was a Science Fair. On the evening of March 27, many parents and guests viewed a variety of outstanding projects and activities presented by the students. Prior to the Fair, Ms. Tirrell's Third Grade Class provided a spectacular meal with its traditional annual Cheap Night Out dinner.

APRIL

At strategic points throughout the school year, the school administration arranges for consultants to come to the Goshen-Lempster School to conduct workshops as professional development activities for our staff. The focus for staff development in April was on <u>Differentiated</u> <u>Instruction</u>, led by nationally renowned Susie Girardin. The reality of a classroom setting is that the student group is heterogeneous with students who struggle academically and others who are advanced beyond their peers. Differentiated classroom instructional strategies insure that the needs of all learners are met. Tuesday, May 6 was declared as National Teacher Day. As a celebration for teacher appreciation, the P.T.C. (under the direction of Debra Dustin) provided a spectacular luncheon for the staff. The faculty room was set-up in style with a delicious buffet that was prepared by parents of students.

Dr. Lilyan Wright (Goshen-Lempster School's <u>Super</u> <u>Volunteer</u>), who created the district's Field Hockey Program years ago, initiated a Lacrosse Program for our students. The students were very excited about this new program. Dr. Wright is an amazing person; not only does she volunteer an enormous amount of time to work with children, she also is a member of the School Board (not to mention numerous other community organizations).

The Childrens' Literacy Foundation (CLiF) made a grant award to the Goshen Public Library. There was an assembly at school to celebrate the grant award and to showcase the Goshen Library's book purchases. Duncan McDougall of the Literacy Foundation presented the books to the students and read them a story. Goshen Librarian Ethel Nilsen made the books available for check-out to all of the students.

JUNE

Eighth Grade Graduation Exercises were held on the evening of June 18. Class Co-Salutatorians Alyssa Wilcox and Laura Groat welcomed parents and guests, and Co-Third Honors students Tania Ross and Ira Fellows introduced the graduates. Class Valedictorian Honi Heino bid farewell to the Goshen-Lempster School on behalf of her classmates. Ms. Chadwick and Mr. Bonfiglio presented awards to the graduating students, and School Board Chairman Eric Walker issued the diplomas. The P.T.C. and parents of the seventh graduation students sponsored the graduation reception.

JULY

The Goshen-Lempster Curriculum Team (comprised of classroom teachers Beth Titlon-Wahlert, Frances "Kitty" Davis, Janis Bellavance, Sue Roberts, Sandra Lord, Rachel Tirrell, and Christine Santerre) revised the Language Arts Curriculum across the developmental span of kindergarten through eighth grade in accordance with Federal and New Hampshire standards for Literacy. This cohesive teaching instrument enables the classroom teachers to have a common foundation for instruction, providing reading and writing rubrics for consistent assessment throughout the grade levels. The curriculum also includes a "traveling writing portfolio" system from kindergarten through eighth grade. Reviewing and updating each student's portfolio from year to year will assist the teachers with the student's writing skill development.

AUGUST

The staff returned to school to begin a new school year on August 21. Prior to the students arrival, professional and paraprofessional staff members engaged in a series of workshops and staff development activities. Dr. Kathe Simons led a workshop, entitled <u>Harvesting the</u> <u>NHEIAP</u>, in which the common test items of the New Hampshire Assessment were examined and explored to develop improved teaching strategies. As part of the Professional Development Academy with S.A.U. #43, our staff participated in a session on <u>Thinking Strategies</u> to teach students to ask poignant questions of reading material for the improvement of comprehension. In addition, the staff participated in the workshop <u>Determining Importance</u> which focused on skill development for students as they sift through a multitude of information.

The P.T.C. under the direction of Debra Dustin, sponsored the "Ice Cream Sunday" Social as an opening event for the new school year. Students, parents and staff members came together in a social setting to make acquaintances and to discuss the upcoming year while enjoying an ice cream sundae.

SEPTEMBER

The new school year opened with a welcome back assembly to introduce new staff and students and to kick-off the year on the theme "Anything you can conceive and believe - you can achieve". There were some changes in staffing and in the building arrangement. The fourth grade class was moved from the primary educational team to the middle level educational team, and the special educational facilities were relocated to be closer to the school office. During the summer, School Nurse Rhonda Colcord relocated to Florida, and registered nurse Heidi Wilcox of Goshen was hired as our new school nurse. With the resignation of Librarian Tanna Cota, the School Board made the decision to transform Vicky Goss' position of Technology Facilitator into Media Generalist. As a result, Ms. Goss is in charge of the operation of our Media Center (with a newly created computer_center); she is also in charge of technology school wide.

OCTOBER

On October 10, the Lempster Fire Department conducted a Fire Safety Program for our students which consisted of two presentations. One presentation was entitled <u>How Flames</u> <u>Grow</u>; the other presentation, <u>Midnight Fire Alarm</u>, included a relay race of putting on fire equipment. The Fire/Rescue Team members who presented the programs were Lempster Fire Chief Phillip Tirrell, Captain David Loring, Lieutenant Barbara Chadwick, Firefighter Mark Magoon, and Fire Rescue Personnel Loretta Hull. Our Physical Education Teacher, Christine Williams, received a PEP Grant as part of the Physical Best Project. The focus of the grant was to train schools in a wide research effort to measure the effectiveness of strategies that are being utilized to assist our youth to compensate for sedentary lifestyles. The grant provides training in data collection, laptop computers, and equipment such as pedometers. The grant also provides assistance with the implementation of new Physical Education Programming.

NOVEMBER

The Goshen-Lempster Cooperative School District continued its project with Women's Supportive Services of Sulliavan County to provide age appropriate training for our students in Conflict Resolution, Bully Proofing, and Personal Safety & Awareness. The students, depending on the grade level, deal with such issues as peer pressure, harassment, bullying, sexuality and substance abuse. A special fourteen week program is implemented for our eighth grade students. The primary focus of these programs is to increase our students' decision making and assertiveness skills.

DECEMBER

On the evening of Thursday, December 18, the students delighted parents and guests with a Holiday Concert. Under the direction of Music Teacher Patricia Waltzer, the students assembled in tiers for choral presentations of a variety of festive selections. The school band also performed a number of instrumentals. Cindy Phillips and Eric Walker volunteered their talents for guitar accompaniment. Seventh grade student Stephanie Bagnall announced the performances, and there were solo singing presentations (Caitlin Robinson and Joshua Jude) and solo instrumental performances (Doug Fellows and Abe Shklar).

Each year, all grades, with the exception of kindergarten and first grade, participate in achievement testing. Grades 3 and 6 receive the New Hampshire Assessment while grades 2, 4, 5, 7 and 8 take the Terra Nova Battery. The New Hampshire Assessment classifies results into proficiency levels through the use of <u>mean scaled scores</u>; NCVICE (200 - 239), BASIC (240 - 259). PROFICIENT (260 - 279), ADVANCED (280 - 300). Our **grade 3 results** were far better than any results in the past with an English score of 257 (very nearly into the Proficient Range) and a Mathematics score of 266 (well into the Proficient Range). The **grade 6 Assessment scores** also improved over last year (5 points higher in English at 243 and 2 points higher in math at 243). Although the scores did improve, there certainly is room for improvement. The Terra Nova Battery uses proficiency levels that closely align with those of the New Hampshire Assessment. There are five levels: Step 1 (ie. NOVICE), Progressing (lower BASIC), Nearing Proficiency (upper BASIC), Proficient, and Advanced. The following is an account of the results by class in terms of percentages of the class scoring in each level of each test area.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE GOSHEN-LEMPSTER SCHOOL DISTRICT

for FISCAL YEAR JULY 1 2003 - JUNE 30, 2004

Meeting Held March 8, 2003

Polls opened at 3:00 for ballot voting on Articles I and 2.

Voting was by official ballot and check list.

Article I. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year. Michael Shklar was elected.

Article 2. To choose a member of the School Board from Goshen for a five year term beginning March 9, 2003.

John P. Hopkins was elected.

The business meeting was called to order at 7:06P.M. by the Moderator. Ground rules for conduct and voting were reviewed. The Warning for the Meeting was read out loud. Articles 1 and 2 were read aloud. Article 3 was read:

"To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto." The article was moved, seconded, and passed. Article 4 was then read:

"Whereas N H School Districts face ever tightening budgets; and Whereas N H School Districts are finding it increasingly difficult to raise and appropriate sufficient dollars on the local level to provide their students a quality education; and whereas newly enacted and existing federal mandates have placed an undue and heavy burden on local school district budgets:

Be It Therefore Resolved: That the voters of the District vigorously oppose any and all unfunded and underfunded federal educational mandates, including but not limited to, those contained in the recently enacted No Child Left Behind Law as well as those mandates historically unfunded within the IDEA/Special Education Laws."

Mcticn made by Mr. Rcbinscn; second by Phyllis Clark.

Discussion followed; opened by Lilyan Wright who gave background explanation of the laws. A greater definition of unfunded and underfunded was asked for, and State Rep.John Cloutier was allowed to speak to update this. A citizen commented following which Doris Adler gave further explanation of the NCLB law..Next Erik walker made points also

on NCLE. Bud Newton spoke with examples about money from Washington going for pork and other private projects rather than to needy districts.

The Moderator then called for a voice vote. Article 4 passed nearly unanimously.

The Mcderator then asked if anyone in the room was not a registered voter. Those few were asked not to vote and neighboring parties to keep watch.

Article 5 was then read."To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of THREE MILLION THREE HUNDRED ELEVEN--THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED SIXTY-NINE DOLLARS(\$3,311,969.00) for support of the school, for the payment of salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment for statutory obligations of the district. This article does not include appropriations voted in other warrant articles. The School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Note: The Board anticipates that \$1,829,201.00 from sources other than general taxation will be avail-

able to apply towards these expenditures."

The Mcderator called for a motion on this article.

Chmn. Erik Walker made the motion; seconded by Marianne Dennis. Mr. Walker began the budget presentation by explaining the budget process done by the Board and expressing the frustration shared by the Bcard over rising costs. Particular reference was made to the tuition cap, tough teacher negotiations, and technology items. The fact that every line item had been reviewed and scrutinized was stressed. At the Mcderator's call for anyone to be heard on the article, Kevin Onnela made a motion to amend the article to \$3,020,833(level funding). This was seconded. There seemed to be no discussion, then Mr. Fred Smith moved to call the question. This was seconded. The Mcderator called for more discussion, allowing M. Dennis to speak tc explain what a cut would mean tc the school. Mr. Smith renewed his motion to cease debate. A show of hands passed this motion. The action moved to a vote on the amendment. There were 55 votes and 91 against this amendment. The amendment was defeated. Discussion returned to the main article. A number ci questions were asked such as the savings realized by the tuition cap, the per cent increase of the budget, how a previous year's surplus was treated, etc.

Carla Labounty addressed the effect on regular ed. students vs. required expenditures for other obligations. Mike Newton spoke on transportation issues.

Deris Adler made a meticn to reduce the budget figure to \$3,161,969. This was seconded by Korrie Goodspeed. Explanation was offered that due to reduced numbers of students, there could be a reduction in staff, both professional and paraprofessional. Reference was also made to the technology position. There were further questions, statements from the Chair, and clarification by Ms. Adler. Then the motion was called. That passed on a voice vote. Moving to the amendment, the Mcderator called for a vote by show of hands. On count, there appeared to be 83 for the amendment and 89 against. This count was contested by Kevin Onnela who asked for a ballot vote, which was joined by many others. A vote by paper ballot and checklist ensued. At the close of voting and counting of votes, there were 99 yes for the amendment and 95 nc against the amendment. The main motion as amended on Article 5 was then called and it passed with a show of hands. Article 6 was then read: "To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of NINE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$9,000) for the purpose of repairing the root over the library. The School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required)." This article was moved by Janet Gibson and seconded by John Fabrycky. Short discussion followed, including the point made that this should gc cut tc bid. Article 6 passed with a show of hands. Article 7 .: "To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of FIVE THOUSAND(\$5,000.00) to be added to the School District gym floor Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vcte required)." The article was moved by Lilyan wright and seconded by Janet Gibson. Discussion followed. This is essentially a savings account for the eventual replacement of the sym floor. There is still a moisture problem not fully solved. Point was made that the problem should be solved before any more money set aside. The article was defeated by a show of hands.

ARTICLE 8. : "To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of FOURTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS(\$14,000.00) for the purpose of implementing Phase II of the School District's three year technology plan. The School Board recommends this appropriation. (Majority vote required)." read by Moderator. The article was moved by Marizanne Dennis and seconded by Carol Whitman. Ms. Dennis cutlined the purposes for the money: changing the library into a media center, networking all computers, purchase of 8 new computers. A grant will help if the school receives it. There was an extended question and answer period, also with commentary from various citizend. The ques-

tion was called by Paul Barrett, with second by Everett Thurber. This passed by voice vote. The main motion was then brought up for vote and appeared to pass, but was questioned by Kevin Onnela. A specific hand count showed 94 for this article and 66 against. The article passed.

Article 9. : To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

There seemed to be no other business and so a motion to adjourn was made. At the moment of the second the Moderator was led to observe that a citizen was attempting to make a motion. Gary Dennis was then recognized and he moved to reconsider Article 5. This was seconded, but on a voice vote this motion was defeated. The motion to adjourn was then accepted and the meeting adjourned on a voice vote.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the School Board Goshen-Lempster School District Lempster, New Hampshire

The individual and combining fund financial statements and schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Goshen-Lempster School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.
