

Motion by David Mayhew that the reading of the complete warrant be passed over. Seconded by (unknown). Vote in affirmative.

ARTICLE #2: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Motion by Robert Leclerc to accept the sum of \$22,239 for town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Seconded by Richard Clogston. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

Motion by Roger Stewart to open up Article #2 for further consideration. Seconded by Roger Thompson. Vote Affirmative.

Motion by George McGee to add \$1,398 for the North Country Council and \$250 for planning board. Seconded by David Mayhew. Voted affirmative as amended.

ARTICLE #3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for District Court expenses.

Earl Rannacher moved that the Town raise and appropriate \$6,345 for District Court Expenses. Duncan Riley seconded. Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation and maintenance of the Town Building.

Duncan Riley moved that the Town raise and appropriate \$6,-770 for operation and maintenance of the Town Building. Clifton Dauphine seconded. Vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Employees' Retirement and Social Security Taxes.

William McGee III moved that the Town raise and appropriate \$10,000 for Employees' Retirement and Social Security Taxes. Wallace Rennie seconded. Vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE #6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Contingency Fund.

Roland Bourassa moved that the Town vote and raise \$500 for a Contingency Fund. Michael Peltier seconded. Vote was affirmative.

Explained that the land behind mill is being considered for new dump. Leslie Sargent expounded further.

Motion by Roger Landry that the Town raise and appropriate \$2,500 for Legal Expenses, seconded by Earl Rannacher. Vote in affirmative.

ARTICLE #30. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Patriotic Purposes.

Motion by Daniel Bourassa that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,000 for Patriotic Purposes. Seconded by Roger Landry. Vote Affirmative.

ARTICLE #31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 for the research and/or development of a solid waste disposal system.

Roland Bourassa moved that the Town raise and appropriate \$25,000 for the research and/or development fo a solid waste disposal system. Duncan Riley seconded. Vote in affirmative.

Motion made by Robert Alger that the Town raise and ap-

Some discussion as to the fact that the Department of Revenue Administration should be notified as to the dollar amount in this account. Seconded by Harold Bothwick. Vote affirmative.

Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the report for, design of, and construction of a Sewage Disposal System, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in NH R.S.A. 33:7-B ET SEQ. as amended, and to pass any vote relating thereto with authorization only. Seconded by George McGee. Vote in affirmative.

ARTICLE #37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the improvement and enlargement of the Municipal Water Systems, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in NH R.S.A. 33:7-B ET SEQ., as amended and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Motion by Marie McLaughlin that the Selectmen be authorized to apply, for, negotiate, etc., by authorization only to improve and enlarge the Municipal Water Systems and to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance. Seconded by Robert Alger. Vote Affirmative.

ARTICLE #38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of preparing a facilities plan on sewage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 ET SEQ.) and will qualify the Town for Federal Funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes not to exceed \$15,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act. (NH R.S.A. 33.1 ET SEQ., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the construction grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 ET SEQ.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

George McGee, Sr. moved that the Town raise and appropriate \$15,000 for Facilities Plan Engineering. He explained that this would be step one and before we could go any further we must have a fifty year sewage system. He explained that of the \$15,000 the Town would contribute \$3,000 and the State would contribute \$12,000. Seconded by David Mayhew. Vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #39. To see what sums the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of improvement and enlargement of the Municipal Water Systems including pump stations, treatment works, and such other related facilities inclusive of land acquisition, easements, and rights of way as are required, such sums to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chap. 33 of the NH Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale, and delivery of such bonds, as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln, and pass any vote thereto.

Motion made by George McGee that Articles 39, 42, 43, Resolution A, 44 and 45 be passed over and that a recessed Town Meeting be held on June 28, 1977 at 7:30 P.M. at the Lin-Wood High School gym. Seconded by Marie McLaughlin. Motion by Edmond Gionet that the date be amended to 5/23/77. Seconded by David Mayhew. Amendment voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to select either the NH Department of Revenue, Division of Municipal Accounting or a private accredited or professionally capable auditing firm to audit the Town of Lincoln books.

Motion by Robert Leclerc that the Selectmen be authorized to select either the NH Department of Revenue Administration, Division of Municipal Accounting or a private accredited or professionally capable auditing firm to audit the Town of Lincoln books. Seconded by Earl Rannacher. Vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #41. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate

and authorize the Selectmen to apply to budget items the interest received on taxes and deposits.

Motion by Duncan Riley that the Selectmen be authorized to apply to budget items the interest received on taxes and deposits. Seconded by Roger Landry. Vote affirmative.

ARTICLE #46. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

At this point Murray Clark read articles in the Woodstock and Thornton warrants relative to Tripoli Road improvements. He then made a motion that the Town of Lincoln go on record against Tripoli Road being improved upon beyond general maintenance as was now being done. Mr. McGee explained further that improvements might weaken the Livermore land transaction. Mike Peltier seconded the motion. Vote was affirmative.

Marie McLaughlin moved that the meeting adjourn at 9:50 P.M. Harold Bothwick seconded. Vote affirmative.

**RECESSED TOWN MEETING
LINCOLN, NEW HAMPSHIRE
MAY 23, 1977**

The recessed Town meeting of the Town of Lincoln was called to order by moderator Fred Branscombe at 7:30 P.M. in the Lin-Wood High School Gymnasium.

The moderator explained that the main issue under consideration was Article #42 involving whether the Town would agree to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program. A discussion was held concerning legislation pending that would delete the clause stating that in order to be eligible for federal funding a municipality must have accepted the National Flood Insurance Program. It was agreed that in light of this pending legislation it would be best to wait and see what develops.

Edmond Gionet moved that the meeting should be recessed until September 12, 1977 in hopes that more information would be available at that time. Earl Rannacher seconded the motion. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

39. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for and expend any monies that may be forthcoming for the Federal Emergency Manpower or CETA Programs.
40. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the Eligibility Application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

RESOLUTION A

WHEREAS, certain areas of Lincoln are subject to periodic flooding from streams, rivers, etc., causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require

the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire RSA chapter 31, 36, 156, and 136A.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved, that this Town Meeting hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the criteria set forth in section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

2. Vests (the Planning Board or other duly authorized Municipal Officer) with the responsibility, authority, and means to:

(a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.

(b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain.

(c) Cooperate with Federal, State, and Local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify flood plain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.

(d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility and annual report to the administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.

3. Appoints the Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector) to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.

41. To see if the Town will vote to establish the following building regulation pursuant to RSA 156 as follows:

1. The Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector) shall review all Building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must be (I) designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (II) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (III) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Town Planning Board to approve or disapprove in its discretion new subdivisions and plats thereof as provided New Hampshire RSA Chapter 36:Section 19-29 inclusive and Section 34.

45. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

No person, firm or corporation shall erect any new building or structure, or make substantial improvements to an existing building or structure, or cause to be done, within the Town of Lincoln without first obtaining a permit from the Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector).

46. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new Police cruiser.

47. To see how much the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new welder.

48. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the paving of Town Streets.

49. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of a new Solid Waste Disposal Facility.

50. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate for the closing and restoration of the old Town Dump site.

51. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate and do all other things necessary in entering into a contract with the Paper Mill for treatment of their industrial waste water. Said contract to comply with the Town's existing discharge permit as prescribed by Federal and State regulations.
52. To see what action the Town will take in setting up a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with R.S.A. 35:1 for the use of future water & Sewer Development projects.
53. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of funds from the Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Fund established under the provisions of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976 (Public Law 94-369 Title II of the Act) for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purpose and in the amount indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

Appropriation	Amount
Town Hall and Other Town Buildings	\$ 5,600

54. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 72:43-B and 43-C for Expanded Exemptions on Real Estate which provides for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, a \$10,000 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption. Provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000 and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of \$50,000.
55. Be it resolved by the Town of Lincoln that the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Lincoln, in the State of New Hampshire, that said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project, for elderly persons under Section 8 of the US Housing Act of 1937 as amended, for

any of the following accommodations or a combination thereof: (a) existing standard housing (10) ten dwelling units; (b) substantially rehabilitated housing (50) fifty dwelling units; (c) newly constructed housing (50) fifty dwelling units; the total amount of the foregoing not to exceed (60) sixty dwelling units.

56. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

It seems that when one reads about crime one particular point always sticks out. This point is **INCREASES**. It seems like crime is always on the increase. In 1977 crime in Lincoln rose significantly over 1976.

Currently the police department is made up of 4 full time officers and 7 part-time officers. In 1977 4 new part-time personnel were added. They are Roger Landry, Libby O'Brien, Jeff Mayhew, and Larry Drew. Libby O'Brien is the first woman to be appointed a police officer in Lincoln. She serves as a matron for the department.

In January and the early part of February Martin Bean attended the N.H. State Police Academy. He graduated number 6 in his class. In May he attended the Accident Investigation school sponsored by the state. In October Patrolman First Class Philip English attended the breathalyzer school sponsored by the state. His attendance at this school has allowed him to be a certified breathalyzer operator for the police department. In the spring Clifton Dauphine and Roger Landry attended the Part-time Officers Training School.

Again this year the Lincoln Police Department and the U. S. Forest Service worked together under a cooperative agreement to provide part-time police coverage on the Kancagamus

Highway during the busy summer months.

Also because of a high increase of crimes at night the department found it necessary to break up the town into two patrol zones: one being the center of town and the other being on Route 3. After instituting this new patrol procedure crime taking place at night dropped.

On December 1st. Loon Mountain and The Village at Loon Mountain contracted with the town to have a full time police officer work a security detail at those two areas. Larry Drew has taken over the duties there. He is paid for by the residents and management of both the areas.

At this time I would like, on behalf of the department, to thank the dispatchers at the communications center and the N.H. State Police for their assistance, and to the taxpayers and residents for their constant on-going support of the police department. Without such support our jobs would be impossible to handle.

REPORT OF THE LINCOLN COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

1977 saw the first full year of operation for the Lincoln Communications Center. During the year the center has seen several improvements to provide better and faster service to the taxpayers.

This year a new telephone system was installed. A new emergency line, 745-2222, began operation in late summer and everyone calling this number will be provided emergency police, fire and ambulance service. Again this year the dispatchers also answered the Lincoln District Court Phone.

Also this year Burndy Corporation added an annunciator panel for its burglar and fire alarm systems. The School Committee placed an annunciator in the center for its fire alarm system and several other businesses have inquired as to the feasibility of placing alarms there also.

In the spring the dispatchers began monitoring citizens band radio on channel 9, the F.C.C. designated emergency channel. The CB radio was donated to the town. Again this summer the dispatchers monitored a U.S. Forest Service radio. This allowed the dispatchers to be in direct radio contact with forest rangers throughout the White Mountain National Forest.

In 1977 there were two switches in manpower. Dee O'Rourke and Larry Peltier left their duties and were replaced by Pat Reardon and Libby O'Brien. Dee and Larry have both stayed on in a part-time capacity though, we are happy to say.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given to the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent records.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

Financial Statements

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets — As of December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets disclosing the financial condition of the general fund as of December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the current unappropriated surplus of the Town decreased by \$117,767, from \$453,396 at December 31, 1975 to \$335,629 at December 31, 1976.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of change in current financial condition of the

Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$29,779, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$61,733, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$91,512.

Long-Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets showing the outstanding long-term indebtedness of the Town, as of December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976 are contained in Exhibit A-5. As indicated therein, the long-term debt decreased by \$235,000, from \$1,070,000 to \$835,000 during the year.

A statement, showing the activity in the revenue sharing fund account in 1976, is included in Exhibit B-2. As indicated therein, there is an unappropriated fund balance of \$36,927 as of December 31, 1976.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

General Comments

Limitation of Appropriations— Municipal Budget Law:

The provisions of R.S.A. 32:8 states that “. . . The total amount appropriated at any annual meeting shall not exceed by more than ten percent the total amount specified in the budget for said meeting, and no appropriation shall be made for any purpose not included in said budget, provided, however, that the budget committee may also submit, without approval items which they do not wish to recommend but which they believe the voters should be allowed to consider and act upon, either favorably or unfavorably. The ten percent increase herein allowable above the total amount specified in the budget for said meeting shall be computed on the total amount recommended less that part of any appropriation item which constitutes fixed charges.”

However, the actual vote of the Town at the 1976 annual meeting exceeded the ten percent limitation in the amount of \$23,406.33, as follows:

The Town, therefore could only increase the recommended budget by \$40,530.68 (ten percent of \$405,306.81). However, actual increases as voted by the Town totaled \$63,937.01, thereby exceeding the ten percent limitation by \$23,406.33 (\$63,937.01 less \$40,530.68).

**Limitation on Powers of Towns to
Raise and Appropriate Money:**

Our prior year's audit comments stipulated that the power of Towns to raise and appropriate money is not absolute, and such power is derived solely from statutory provisions found in the Revised Statutes Annotated, which provisions restrict the power to appropriate to certain specified objects of expense and other necessary charges. These remarks were stated as the result of a vote at the 1975 Town meeting to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for snow removal from private driveways.

Our examination for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976 disclosed that although a separate appropriation was not made for snow removal from private driveways, such snow removal was done during 1976 and the cost thereof, charged to winter maintenance.

It must be stated again, that there is no statutory authority in the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated which allows municipalities to raise and appropriate money for this object of expense.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.
