Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Milan in the County of Coos and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the West Milan Town Hall on Tuesday the 8th day of March, at 9:00 A.M. in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all the town officers for the following year.
2. To see if the town will vote by secret ballot to hold its town meeting at 6:00 P.M. (by petition)
3. To see if the town will vote that a secret ballot be taken for monies appropriated over \$500.00 on future warrants and including this year's warrant. (by petition)
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the town officers' salaries.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town officers' expenses.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for summer and winter road and bridge maintenance.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$361.04 and the State will give the sum of \$2,419.23 for Town Road Aid.
8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$30,000.00 for the purpose of reconstructing the Stearns Brook Bridge under the State Aid Bridge Program, the town share being one fourth of the total cost.
9. To see if the town will vote to discontinue winter maintenance of Chickwolnepy Road above the bridge crossing Chickwolnepy Stream.
10. To see if the town will vote to reclassify to Class VI, subject to gates and bars, a portion of the former State route 110, running south from the entrance to Milan Excavating, Inc. to the Milan-Berlin line.
11. To see if the town will vote to require that all roads offered for acceptance by the town be submitted to the Selectmen one year in advance for study of acceptability, and that a report be submitted by the Selectmen and a vote taken at the Town Meeting the next year.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Police Department.
13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Fire Department.
14. To see if the town will vote to raise \$3,000 to equip the new fire truck.
15. To see if the town will vote to accept the deed for the West Milan Fire Station lot.
16. To see if the town will vote to agree that equipment donated by the Fireflies Fire Department Auxiliary be permanently assigned to the West Milan Fire Station.
17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Town Poor.
18. To see if the town will vote to accept the New Hampshire Welfare Guidelines and to elect a welfare officer.
19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Old Age Assistance.
20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for aid to soldiers and their families.
21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the White Mountains Region Association.
22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for civil defense.
23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for North Country Community Services.
24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for their share of the North Country Council.
25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of the Milan Home Nursing Center.
26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Regional Ambulance Program.
27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated or take any action herein:
Appropriation: Tax Mapping Amount: \$4,000.00.

28. To see if the town will vote to establish a municipally funded garbage removal service and appropriate \$15,000 to defray the expense of same.
29. To see if the town will vote to agree to restrict the sale of cemetery lots to residents of the town of Milan.
30. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee to study the desirability of adopting, alone or in conjunction with other neighboring towns, a modified Selectmen-Town Manager form of government, said committee to report at the next Town Meeting.
31. To see if the town will vote to accept the balance of the budget as prepared by the Selectmen, and to raise such sums of money as may be necessary.
32. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen the authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
33. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

YEAR 1976

1976 our Nations Bicentennial Year has come and gone, it proved to be a busy year for our Police Department. With the patrol that we had on during this past year we were able to keep our problems on an acceptable level.

Each year brings new and varied events that are becoming increasingly difficult to deal with.

With the experienced Officers and the training given us by Sgt. Martin we have been able to cope with our new problems.

You will notice an increase in our budget for the coming year for the following reasons:

In the past the Police have been paid \$2.50 per hour and \$.10 per mile. The cost of our uniforms and our personal equipment has soared to an all time high. We don't have to tell you what it costs for a gallon of gas. We are asking \$3.00 per hour and \$.12 per mile for the use of our vehicles.

We also have times when we are able to get good deals on radios and police equipment that is necessary for the department, and need a few dollars to take advantage of these one shot deals.

We want to thank the people of Milan and the Selectmen for the backing given us in the past and we look forward to serving you again in 1977.

We request that the town raise the sum of \$5,000.00 for Police services during the year 1977.

Fire Chief's Report

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city warden and several other persons as town or city deputy wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Milan, N.H.

The Bicentennial Committee members worked hard and diligently to make Milan's celebration of the 200th Birthday of the U.S.A. an outstanding year of events.

Several permanent and well-defined projects planned in honor of the National Bicentennial Programs of Heritage, Festival, and Horizons were carried forward with the help of many. Because of these futuristic plans, Milan became the 126th New Hampshire community to be recognized as a Bicentennial Community at a special presentation on April 4, 1976 at which time it received its Bicentennial Certificate from Mrs. Edna A. Flanagan, a member of the N.H. American Revolution Commission, and its Bicentennial Flag from Mrs. Georgia Ireland, Regional Director of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration, Boston, Mass. U.S. Representative, James C. Cleveland, presented the town with an American Flag and an accompanying Certificate certifying that it had flown over our U.S. Capitol on March 18, 1976; Emily Flint Rebekah Lodge No. 62 presented us with a Betsy Ross Flag and the Women's Auxiliary of the West Milan Fire Department presented us with a Bennington Flag. These were accepted by Selectmen Rodney Young, Chairmen, on behalf of the town. Your committee purchased staffs and stands that each of them might be on public display.

during the year projects of fun and enjoyment included a fashion show, the making of a Bicentennial quilt, a three-day weekend birthday party early in June which included a Queen Contest which was won by Miss Ginger Rich, a musical entitled "I Love America" which has already been presented three times, a parade, a musical program featuring The Jolly Seniors, Herbert Bunnell and The Continentals of Portsmouth, N.H., a public supper, ecumenical church service, picnic lunch, hymn sing, parachute jumping, and entertainment rides for the children. At other times a Flea Market and a Hobby Show were held in West Milan. A special patriotic program sponsored by the V.F.W. and L.A. V.F.W. and assisted by the American Legion and D.A.V. helped us to observe the Battle of Bunker Hill honoring Gen. John Stark and all N.H. men who fought in this battle as well as those who have participated in any way in the defense of our Country in its battle for continued freedom. Our Gold Star Mothers, Mrs. Evelyne Hamlin and Mrs. Mildred Wentworth, were our special

guests. Bishop Robert Hatch gave the history of the life of Gen. Stark. During the year the Elementary School Children carried out special projects which included a hand-knit Betsey Ross Flag, a scrapbook, hand-craft subjects, costume party and musical programs.

Projects of lasting significance included the purchase of American flags and permanent flag poles for Hillcrest and Riverside cemeteries. The town building vault received a new coat of plaster and a new portable humidifier and an electric baseboard heater with thermostat were installed. New electric wiring was completed for the first floor rooms. The obsolete 20cell jail was removed and the space used to install book shelves and two cupboards for filing space. The Town hall project included the installation of paneling on two walls and a new ceiling installed in the dining-room area. A second Bicentennial quilt is being embroidered as a duplicate of the original one and will remain in the community as a part of our historical heritage. An album of the events of the year is being prepared and a scrapbook is being prepared for preservation along with other town records. An "Open House" later this year will give everyone a chance to review our accomplishments and memorabilia that will be on display at that time.

Several projects were not completed. The bound copies of the annual reports, the Field Day for the Children, Arbor Day activities, and the completion of the skating rink sponsored by the P.T.A. have not been accomplished. It takes good public support and willing volunteers working together to make such efforts fruitful and successful.

The N.H.A.R.B.C. invited committees in N.H. to remain as a unit until the Battle of Bennington has been observed in August, 1977. This met with the approval of our Selectmen.

It is not a well known fact that 97 communities have joined in honoring America by giving gifts of lasting value, by visiting our country this past year, and by having birthday parties in our honor in their own country. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and His Royal Highness Prince Philip of England were two of the many distinguished guests who paid special honor to our land. We thank every country for honoring our 200th Anniversary.

A very special thank-you comes from your chairman for the beautiful wood-and-bronze Minuteman plaque presented to me during our festival week-end in June. It was a delightful surprise. I love it.

My thank-you is extended to each and every one who in any way helped to make this the best of Milan's years of activities for public benefit. A very supportive committee and the wonderful response and participation of our citizens, our friends, and our neighbors from near and far-away places have made this patriotic effort a worthwhile success.

It was moved by Roma Labrecque, seconded by Avis Croteau and a vote in the affirmative that the District vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all gratis grants or other gratis funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, private individuals, corporations, or any Federal or State agency and to expend same for such projects as it may designate.

Mr. Bellavance was asked to explain what is expected of the School District when accepting Federal Funds. He first explained that gratis grant means with no matching funds. If the District asks for federal aid they must expect to meet many government requirements. The requirements are increasing each year and are already involving the Athletic programs, textbooks, school lunch and a self evaluation program in languages soon. School lunch program is a state requirement whether the district accepts federal funds or not.

State laws govern certain school district requirements anyway.

There are no federal laws connected with school unless accepting federal funds.

The voting members asked the opinion of the School Board. Dan Bennett was for dropping it. Robert Potter would like to try another year. Ronald Hawkins agreed with both of the other members but was inclined to keep the federal fund programs for one more year and then observe the situation again next year.

Article 4 To see if the District will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, II, III, & IV, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary & Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the District under such Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the School Board. Further, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for such funds and to expand same for such projects as it may designate.

It was moved by Beverly Hawkins, seconded by Ronald Hawkins and a vote in the affirmative that the District vote to accept the provisions of Title I, II, III, & IV, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary & Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the District under such Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the School Board. Further, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for such funds and to expend same for such projects as it may designate.

It was explained that this article pertains to specific federal monies. Sweepstakes is state monies.

- Article 5 To see if the District will authorize the school board to establish a policy permitting the recitation of the traditional Lord's Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag in the Milan Village School.

It was moved by Robert Vashaw, seconded by Beverly Hawkins and a vote in the affirmative that it is the feeling of the town that the recitation of the Traditional Lord's Prayer and the Pledge of Alligiance to the flag be allowed were it possible.

According to findings after printing of this warrant it is no longer allowable through the vote of the people.

- Article 6 To see if the District will vote to use the interest on the Building Fund to reduce taxes for the 1976-77 school year.

It was moved by Eugene Cordwell, seconded by Alfred Lindsay and a vote in the affirmative that the District vote to use the interest on the Building Fund to reduce taxes for the 1976-77 school year.

\$1,170.35 interest has accumulated on this account as the money was being drawn to pay the contractor as the work was being completed. This is a bonded loan and the interest cannot be applied to the principal.

- Article 7 To see if the District will vote to accept the provisions of Title X, Job Opportunities Program, and appropriate the sum of \$932.20 to extend the program through June, 1977, and to pay social security and retirement benefits on those funds received under the grant.

It was moved by Kristin Young, seconded by Beverly Hawkins and a vote in the affirmative that the District vote to accept the provisions of Title X, Job Opportunities Program, and appropriate the sum of \$932.20 to extend the program through June, 1977, and to pay social security and retirement benefits on those funds received under the grant.

This program is a Teacher's Aide which is very helpful to the school presently.

- Article 8 To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District officials, and for the payment of the Statutory obligations of the District.

It was moved by Donald Rich and seconded by Avis Croteau that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$241,587.46 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

It was moved by Ronald Hawkins and seconded by Peter Neville and a vote in the affirmative that the motion be amended to include the sum of \$2,260.97 to be used for teachers salary increases and to establish a \$7000. base pay scale, making a total appropriation of \$243,848.43.

So that the main motion reads "the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$243,848.43 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. The motion was passed.

A pay scale was strongly encouraged by Ronald Hawkins based on a 2½% to 6½% increase. This increase is a reward not a cost of living increase to give job value and keep experienced teachers in our school.

Article 9 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

It was moved by Alta Campbell, seconded by Beverly Hawkins and a vote in the affirmative that the School Clerk be directed to notify the proper authorities on the consensus of the people on Article 5.

It was moved by Peter Neville, seconded by Rodney Legendre and a vote in the negative that the School Board be required to show evidence of solicitation and explanation of funds from private sources as Article 3 suggests by public notice.

It was asked why the new addition actual expense was \$74,000. when the appropriation was \$72,000. It was explained that it was the lawyers fees and bond which made the increase.

The \$35,000 loss in aid from the state to the School District was due to the raise in evaluation in town revenue consequently a decreased aid.

It was moved by Alfred Lindsay, seconded by Homer Frizzell and a vote in the affirmative that the meeting adjourn. Meeting so adjourned at 9:50 P.M.

Report of the Superintendent

To the Citizens of the Town of Milan:

As has been the case in past years, the purpose of my report has been to keep the citizens of Milan informed of those educational issues which have a direct or indirect effect on their children. If my report serves that end reasonably well, I feel I will have met my obligations to you, the citizens of Milan.

SCHOOL WARRANT

Several articles in our lengthy school warrant deserve comment from me or from the school board. I shall not comment on the petition articles as they were submitted by people other than the school board and should be explained and/or supported by that group.

Article 7 of your warrant reflects the total cost for the implementation of the Minimum Standards in Milan. For next year this will mean adding one more program: physical education to your school. The article was added to your warrant to allow the voters of Milan the opportunity to make the final decision on the implementation of the standards for the coming school year.

The Minimum Standards for N.H. Elementary Schools date back to 1967 when work on the Standards first began. Some three years later the Standards were adopted by the State Board of Education as requirements to be met by the local schools over a period of years. In Milan a local study committee was formed and the recommendations of that committee presented to the voters in March of 1971 and approved. Since that time yearly efforts have been made to implement the standards. Progress has been slow but next year, 1977-78, should see them fully implemented for the first time. I hope you will give serious consideration to the full implementation of the Standards and that you will reflect that consideration in a supportive vote on March 7.

Article 3 is perhaps a second article needing to be thoroughly discussed. It is the feeling of several of us that the present well is marginal. It will get us by during a wet year or a year when we are not having any particular plumbing problems at the school. However, if for any reason we require an unusual amount of water it is quite possible we will have problems of some kind.

The article we have placed before you is to use some anticipated surplus funds to enlarge the well to increase its capacity. Though

this would not solve all our problems, it would help us avoid having to close the school during an exceptional dry year or during a period of heavy water use.

It is hoped we will be in a position to give you some idea of cost at the Annual Meeting. Present thinking would be in the area of \$400-\$500 to complete the necessary work.

UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

The federal government recently passed a new law requiring all school districts to budget funds to provide unemployment benefits. This law becomes effective on January 1, 1978, and would require some kind of funding as early as April 1, 1978, at the end of the 1st quarter of the year. The date of implementation falls well within the time frame of our proposed budget. However, because the law is not clear at this time no money has been placed in the budget for this purpose. It is hoped the law will be clarified in the coming months and we will all know what costs will be involved. In summary, this all means the added costs will have to be raised next year as a deficit appropriation at your March meeting.

TESTING

A great deal of misleading and misinterpreted information has been circulated in Milan about the results of the achievement test given to the children of the Milan Village School last spring. With some exceptions much of what has been said and brought to my attention is not correct. This is not to say that I or the teachers at the school are satisfied because we all feel some improvements could be made. At the same time none of us feel we have anything near a critical situation at the school. In fact, most of us feel that great strides have been made over the last three years making the school the best it has been since my arrival in the spring of 1971.

To illustrate the results found on the testing given in the spring of 1976 I have included several charts in my report. Each will show the achievement of your children in several variations and thereby give you a fairly clear picture of what the results really show. Also, I will comment on each chart as a means of explanation.

G.E. means grade equivalent. The average score for a grade one child for example should have been G.E. 1.8 or 1st year 8th month at the time of testing.

%ile is a score which gives a comparison ranking of a child in relationship to other children in his group. The average class, with some children following below and above the average should rank at the 50th percentile. An above average class should rank above 50th percentile while a below average class should rank below the 50th percentile.

The results as illustrated in Charts I & II indicate that the achievement in grades 104 since their entrance in school has been excellent. Grade 5 achievement since its entrance in school has been average or slightly below average. Grade 6 achievement since it entered school is slightly below average. It would appear that with the exception of one grade the achievement of your children have been average to excelling, In my judgment, the teachers owe no apology to anyone for the fine quality of their work.

My third chart shows a different way of looking at the test results. Here I have taken children attending school in 1974-75 and 1975-76 and have shown their total growth for the year. Under normal circumstances these children should have grown on the average 1.0 years from one testing period to the next.

Chart III shows 3-4 areas in which some classes fell below average and did not gain as much as they should. In comparing Chart II with Chart III grade 4 (grade 5 in 1975-76) was a relatively average class as 5th graders even though they showed little gain. On the other hand, grade 5 (grade 6 in 1975-76) which was quite far below average as a total class had gained nearly a year's growth in all areas even though they were below average to begin with.

The test results for grades 1, 2, & 3 (grades 2, 3, & 4 in 1975-76) did an excellent job overall. Chart I also indicates excellent results in the same areas.

In making use of figures in Chart III one must remember that not all children in each class were counted in the computations. Some children attended Milan in 1974-75 and did not return in 1975-76. Other children attended Milan in 1975-76 and had not attended the previous year. In a few cases children were ill or absent at the time of the testing. Therefore, the results do not show a 100% true picture as measured by the test for the entire class. There could well be some children who were tested in 1974-75 or 1975-76 but not both who could have raised or lowered the average.

WHAT CONSTITUTES A GOOD SCHOOL!

I am a firm believer that a school reflects to the community in which it is located what the community itself really is. If one finds a community in which education is important to the people, then one will find a school in which the children take the advantages of education seriously. If one finds a community where there are problems, where vandalism runs rampant, where truancy is accepted without question, where money is the one and only measure to be given any consideration, then I personally believe you will find the same traits in your school. Your school will be only as good as you are and as good as you want it to be. Nothing more, nothing less!

The very foundation of an educational system is its teaching staff. To be effective, to realize the maximum potential capable of being realized from a child requires the best teachers one can find. It also requires keeping those teachers as long as possible. It requires providing teachers with the materials to do the job that needs to be done. It requires support from the home and from the community. And it requires the leadership from your school board. If all of these can be provided in a community, a school system is capable of reaching the highest aspirations of its people.

Without providing the best teachers available and giving them the materials and support required to help them produce at their maximum potential you have wasted and will continue to waste what resources you have available. Give a poor quality teacher all he/she needs and the results will be the same. You will receive in return what you have been willing to put in. Just as we will get out of life what we are willing to put into it, so is it with your schools. One should not expect to invest in or encourage the employment of a poor quality teacher on the one hand and look for maximum yield on the other. It just will not happen!

FEDERAL INTERFERENCE IN LOCAL SCHOOLS

In recent years I have grown so concerned with the problem of federal interference in the public schools of this country that I hope to include each year in my report some comments about what is happening. In this way I hope to alert people to the problem.

Perhaps one of the greatest dangers facing the public school system today is the gradual take-over of public education by the federal government. This may seem strange to many of you because we have been told or led to believe that the U.S. Constitution clearly leaves education as a responsibility of the states and not of the federal government. When our present form of government was formed education was thought to be too precious to be placed in the control of a central government because of what some people felt government could do to control the minds of the people. One does not need to look far around the world to find examples of just this problem. To protect themselves against total government control the states at the time of the formation of our Nation gave the federal government only certain powers, one of which was not education. Education remained a responsibility of the states. For nearly 200 years the concept of government has endured. Now, however, we find that federal control of our free public educational system is fast becoming a reality.

Some may ask how this could possibly have come about. The answer is simple. As in other countries of the world which have lost their freedom, government merely passes laws giving itself the power to take over vast areas of responsibility which in our case were once under the exclusive control of the states. Government has also passed laws establishing vast regulatory agencies to implement these laws. Regulations resulting from these laws and being implemented by these regulatory agencies have now reached the point where every one of us is controlled to some degree every day of our lives.

In areas under state and local control, where the federal government has not been able to dictate what and how regulations will be carried out, the federal government has placed barriers requiring huge sums of money beyond the means of a local community or a state to comply. Then, as an aid to these communities and states, grants have been made available. Because of the grants and the controls attached to them, control has been lost to Washington.

In the early days, funds, if applied for at all, required controls only in those areas for which funds were being requested. Now, however, the federal government has found itself upon the states and local communities by adding additional requirements which are not related to the original intent of the legislation. By so doing, they have been able to circumvent the Constitution and have been able to take over areas of responsibility clearly reserved by the states to themselves. An example of just such a case can be found in the program to provide 90% road construction aid to the states to develop a modern and safe road system. Accepting these funds has led to a national speed limit law not only on federally constructed roads but also on all state roads. Non compliance would mean loss of road construction aid for all future projects. Along the same lines but more recently the federal government has told the states that they must meet the requirements of Standard No. 17 on bus safety. Again the states have been directed to comply or lose all road aid funds. Similar examples to the ones cited can be found in OSHA, flood zoning, land use, and numerous other areas.

With the problems in education and other areas of state responsibility being taken over by Washington, one has to ask if the end justifies the means. Is the money we get from Washington worth the loss of our freedom, regardless how seemingly worthy the federal scheme may be? No one doubts that the benefits from many federal programs are good. We know, for example, that the 55 mile per hour speed limit saves lives. However, that is not the point. The point is whether the federal government,

Congress to be specific, has such a right and in effect is not exceeding its power. In my judgment, it clearly does not have such a right and is exceeding its power. It is clearly circumventing the wording, spirit, and very foundation of our country; all on the premise that it knows what is better for us than we do ourselves. In my judgment, Washington should be told to keep hands off! We, as a state and as a people, are quite capable of taking care of our own needs.

PUBLIC LAW 94-142

Public Law 94-142 is another fine example of the federal government's unnecessary interferences in the lives of its people. This law, like many federal laws of this kind, is well intentioned. This particular law was established to provide an education for the handicapped from ages 3-21. I don't believe anyone can argue that this is not a fine thing. All handicapped people should have an equal educational opportunity. God knows they need a fair break. However, there are two problems with the law. First, education is a right guaranteed by the states, not the U.S. Constitution, and is therefore a responsibility of the states. Second, the law discriminates against all non-handicapped children by forcing the use of regular educational funds to provide programs far in excess of what is provided to non-handicapped children. In my judgment, this is nothing more or less than reverse discrimination.

BUDGET SUMMARY

The proposed gross budget for 1977-78 is down from 1976-77 by some \$7,742.16. Though this is a substantial amount, some \$5,831.58 of the total is a reduction in the tuition area. In a budget of the type found in a town like Milan few areas exist where major reductions may be made. In Milan's situation tuition is one of these.

The proposed net budget or the amount to be raised through local taxation is down only \$1,295.22. The reason for the smaller drop in the net budget is a reduction in anticipated revenues. Last year, though large, the surplus will be much smaller.

For those individuals who may feel the total budget is excessive, I only ask that you compare Milan's costs to those of other towns and to the state average. The average cost for the education of an elementary school child in New Hampshire is \$1,061.00. Milan's per pupil is \$675.24, the fifth from the bottom in a list of 154 school districts. We fall substantially

below Bath (\$1,372.27), Berlin (\$1,048.04), Colebrook (\$821.86), Errol (\$809.40), Stark (\$744.97), etc. In fact, Milan has the lowest per pupil costs for elementary education in the northern part of New Hampshire. In my judgement, Milan is receiving a good return on its investment.

SUMMARY

To operate a school well takes the cooperation and efforts of many people. To those parents who have shown an interest in their children's education, to those members of your school board who have provided the leadership, to those dedicated teachers who have given of themselves to their students, and to the taxpayers of the community who have been willing to tax themselves for the welfare of their children, I extend my sincere appreciation and thanks. Without you we could not have hoped to achieve what we have accomplished to date.
