# Warrant for Annual Meeting

---

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Milford, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to appear at the town house in said Milford on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary town officers, for the year ensuing.
2. To hear the reports of all town officers, agents and committees, and pass any vote in relation thereto.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and sidewalks.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed at the January session, 1905.
6. To see if the town will vote to buy an oil distributing wagon for use on the highways, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sewers, or take any action relating thereto.
8. To see if the town will vote to build a bridge across the Souhegan river from some point in East Milford to a point near the electric light station.

9. To see what action the town will take for the improvement of the base ball field at Endicott Park, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the Town will build a sidewalk from corner of Union street and Mason road to King street and provide a street light at King street.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the destruction of insect pests.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for lighting streets, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town house expenses.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the free library.

15. To see if the town will take any action in relation to granting the use of the room now occupied by Geo. F. Jewett & Co. in the town house to the Milford Free Library at the expiration of the present lease, July 1, 1914.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the fire department.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for police department service.

19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers, hydrants, etc., state and county tax; interest, floating debt, sinking funds, board of health, town poor, printing, and miscellaneous expenses.

20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, if necessary, as provided by law of 1907.

21. To see if the town will adopt a code of by-laws or take any action relating thereto.

22. To see if the town will put the care and management of Shepard Park into the hands of a Commis-



sion of three persons to be appointed by the selectmen, or take any action relating thereto, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# REPORT OF SELECTMEN

---

*To the Citizens of the Town of Milford :*

## HIGHWAYS.

The highway department is one which calls for a high grade of intelligence in its management, as much so as any department of municipal activity.

With the coming of heavy trucks and speeding autos, which are destroying our "State Roads" that have been constructed at great expense, and are being maintained at a cost of which the tax payer does not dream, it seems that we should take the time necessary to study our needs, our resources and the best methods of building permanent roads. Spending a large amount of money in the building of a road does not always mean that it is worth that cost.

Road building for modern traffic is in the first stages of experiment and we do not believe that this town can afford to put much money into experiments.

Let us go slow and if we build a road aim to make it permanent, without a great annual outlay for maintenance.

## INSECT PESTS,

Our moth agent reports that the brown tail moth is being controlled and is not as numerous as in previous years but that the gypsy moth is doing a thorough job in the way of increasing its own particular brand of population as shown by the amount of creosote used in destroying its egg clusters.

One gallon will destroy from three to four thousand egg clusters and up to this date nearly thirty eight gallons have been used for this purpose.

We consider the money spent for spraying elm leaf beetles was well invested for the town as it destroyed the brown tail at the same time.

This is a work that should be carried on and our study should be, not to stop the fight but to seek for the best and most economical methods which may be available.

## INVENTORY

During the past year the selectmen and assessors of New Hampshire have been bereft of all friends. In the re-adjustment of values which had been manifestly unfair and had been changed very little for many years it was

of course to be expected that those who had kindly allowed their fellow citizens to pay taxes which belonged to themselves to pay, would be provoked ; but when your Board found upon completion of their work as assessors that they were as strangers in their own town they were certainly three sad hearted men.

This work is one vital to the welfare of every tax payer and every town and is one which we believe if carried on with judgment and discretion will be of great benefit; but it has just begun, and mistakes in judgment and errors have occurred which your future boards will improve and correct. The move is in the right direction and should not be retarded.

### POLICE

Any report regarding this department would not seem necessary, as it has been so prominently before the citizens for the past year. But we think we may say that if other departments could be managed as this one has been we think that Milford would stand as high as any town in the state as regards its municipal affairs.

The adoption of a code of by-laws by the town, as called for in Article 21 in the warrant, covering some of the minor offences not taken care of by the Public Statutes, would be of much assistance in this department.

### SEWERS

We found conditions last summer were unfavorable for the extension of the end of the main sewer down the river and as it was not disturbing the inhabited side of the river, we did not attempt to build it.

We built two short lines to accommodate houses being erected.

There is need of a sewer on Oak street, and also on Knight and West streets.

It seems as though we should build a certain amount each year, taking the localities first which need the sewers most.

### STREET LIGHTING.

Several months ago we received a notice from the Milford Light & Power Co. that the prices we had been paying for street lights were no longer in force and that they proposed to run the lights all night at a new price based on the candle power and hours of service. Our answer to this was that as the appropriation for the year

was made on the old schedule we had no money for a raise in price or hours of lighting. We have paid the old price although they have for several weeks kept the lights on all night.

We are of the opinion that a new deal should be made as to the candle power of the lamps and the hours of lighting. The matter of entering into a contract for a term of years should be carefully considered before any action is taken.

### TOWN HOUSE

Our Town house needs repairing. It is getting rather seedy and we should spend some money to improve its condition and appearance. The outside needs painting and should not be longer neglected.

The sanitary arrangements which are absolutely necessary are in very bad condition, and should be radically improved at once.

### TOWN LINE SURVEY

Disputes over location of property caused a meeting of the selectmen of the towns of Milford and Brookline, and after looking into the matter it was considered advisable to have the line surveyed and marks and bounds erected and a record made that would prevent all disputes in the future.

The cost, \$578.00 which seems on first thought to be much, will, we are confident be found to have an equivalent for every dollar expended. This is a work for all time and we endeavored to have it so thoroughly done as to leave nothing for future boards to do except their sworn duties as regards perambulating town lines.

### TOWN TEAM

A pair of horses was purchased for this department and a pair of old ones sold. A horse has been hired for the purpose of making two pairs and it is the opinion of this board that the town should own two pairs of good horses, which would necessitate the purchase of either one or two new ones as deemed advisable and the sale of the odd horse which we now own. This department should we think, be transferred to that of Highways and not be under the direct charge of the selectmen as at present. This would increase the efficiency of the Highway department.

## REMARKS

During the year 3 were committed to the County Farm and 7 were held to await the action of the Grand Jury.

In suppressing the illegal sale of liquor I would say that I have had issued 7 warrants for search, and seized liquor in 4 places, getting conviction in each case where liquor was seized.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS.

---

To the Citizens of the Town of Milford :

The Board of Water Commissioners herewith submit their annual report for the year ending February 15, 1913, together with the statistical and financial report of the Treasurer.

The property of the water works is in practically the same condition as last year. Repairs are made each year and it has always been the policy of the Commissioners to keep everything in first class condition. All income after paying running expenses, repairs, interest on bonds and sinking fund, to pay bonds when due, is annually paid over to the town treasurer to be used for town purposes. No provision is being made for extensive repairs and enlargements of system which must come sooner or later. Water mains and standpipes deteriorate and it is only a question of time when they will have to be replaced with new ones.

Taking this into consideration would it not be well for the town to vote to lay aside some portion of the surplus, when we have it, in anticipation of such repairs and enlargements ?

We would make this as a suggestion for your careful consideration.

Our supply of water is of course limited. Thus far it has been equal to demands. If users of water will guard against the unnecessary waste of water during the dry season we shall appreciate it very much.

We are of the opinion that the best way to sell water is by meter and we hope the time will come when all services will be metered.

The water main on Highland Avenue has been extended to the property of J. B. Ford a distance of 312 ft. and an extension of 255 ft. has been made at East Milford. The old 4 inch main on Clinton St. has been replaced by a 6 inch pipe and the 6 inch main on Nashua St., from the corner of Nashua and Clinton streets to the French & Heald property replaced by an 8 inch pipe thus making the service in that section much better.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

*To the Citizens of the Town of Milford :*

The School Board herewith submit the following report of the condition of the public schools of Milford, for the year ending February 15, 1913, together with the statistical and financial report.

The various schools of the town are in a satisfactory condition. At the beginning of the school year a radical change was made in the teaching force of the High school. All the instructors who left us to teach elsewhere, were offered larger salaries than we were able to pay. The students, with their new corps of teachers, quickly adjusted themselves to the new order, and work began promptly without delay or friction. The new teachers are well qualified for their work which has progressed harmoniously and satisfactorily. Measures have been taken to broaden the scope of the work in all departments and make it more practical each year. The practical work done in the science department is worthy of special note. A smaller percentage of students have left the High school this year and it is hoped that a larger percentage of students will finish their High school course as a result of this determination to remain. Interest and enthusiasm has been manifested in the work.

While there was a change in the teaching force of the High school, we are glad to report that the teachers in our grades have remained with us. The long term of loyal, faithful service given to the town by many of our grade teachers has been deeply appreciated. Miss Starret has taught here nineteen years, Miss Knight, eighteen years, with an additional ten years experience elsewhere; Miss Pettee has been with us nine years; Miss Tobie, eight years; Miss Morrill, seven years; and Miss Loring has taught six years in our schools. Other teachers who have been with us several years on our teaching force here, have come to us with a long and successful experience. Among them are Mrs. Lilly who

has taught thirty years; Mrs. Manning, sixteen years; Miss Follett, thirteen years; Miss Parker, twelve years; Mrs. Trumbull, eleven years; Miss Brown, eleven years; and Mrs. Marsh, ten years. Considering these facts, our citizens should feel assured that our schools are in the hands of experienced and successful teachers. We are strongly of the opinion that few towns of this size can show longer terms of service or better records of faithfulness.

A serious problem which forces itself upon us, and which is not only of urgent importance but of imperative need, is the necessity of additional class rooms in our High school building. We need at least two more rooms for the accomodation of the students who will reconvene next September. We have the space on the third floor. This year one of the seventh grades was somewhat smaller than usual, and we were able to place them in one of the class rooms usually occupied by High school students on their floor and a large class of High school students were compelled to come down stairs and occupy one of the large grade rooms. Such an accomodating condition of numbers is not likely to occur again. Our High school students are increasing in number each year and we need additional room for them.

The work of a superintendent is a large and intricate task. This work in Milford has been efficiently and intelligently performed. All necessary apparatus and supplies have been seasonably distributed to each school, accurately accounted for and economically used.

Many necessary improvements have been made in various school buildings and rooms. The steel ceiling in the laboratory of the High school building has been completed; the worn boiler was removed from the Old Brick school and a new one installed. The law requiring sanitary drinking facilities was complied with and the modern fountain bubblers were installed to replace the common drinking cups previously used. All school buildings have been kept in a clean and sanitary condition; walls have been cleaned, scrubbed and painted and rooms have been fumigated. Pine Valley school house has received a coat of paint. The heating, ventilation, plumbing, sewerage, electric wiring and lighting have all received necessary attention and supervision.

An important need is that of industrial training. An investigation of the public school systems of our Amer-

ican cities and towns reveals each year a greater effort to reconstruct a course of study which will give a training along practical lines and aid pupils to be better prepared for some life work when they withdraw from school. Some provision should be made here in Milford as in other towns. Such a course requires extra funds. The four teachers of our primary grades, one and two, have made a good beginning in teaching sewing. The children have done some very creditable work in that line. This may be a small beginning but is along practical lines.

The classes in drawing, under the supervision of Mrs. Bacon show a commendable degree of improvement during the past two years. The pupils in the grades have improved in their ability and work and the students of the High school have executed some eminently practical and excellent work while their completed designs in architectural, mechanical and free-hand drawings are of special merit.

In all schools improvement has been shown in music. Greater ease and facility in reading and interpretation is noticeable.

Besides thoroughly covering the work prescribed by the regular course of study, the teachers have entered most heartily into plans for the observance of Memorial day and other days of a patriotic nature by fittingly and impressively observing them with exercises in the Town hall and in their various school rooms.

During the year the schools have received several gifts, among which are ten birds from Mrs. Kaley, fifty-six records from Mr. Frank H. Heald and science apparatus from the Whittemore estate.

The members of the School Board express their appreciation of the spirit of unselfish loyalty, co-operation and devotion that has characterized the work accomplished by all the teachers.

There has been a unity of purpose to serve faithfully the people in the administration of affairs pertaining to their children and the teachers have shown a cheerful and ready response to all plans and measures adopted to promote the interest, well-being and progress of our schools.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

I herewith present my fifth annual report and the eighth in the series since supervision was established.

The following summary of movement of pupils through the grades accounts for all schools in town :

The past year seventeen percent failed of promotion. One year ago the report showed ten percent, and the previous year the record was sixteen percent. The record the past year as given for the whole state was twelve percent. The 99 not promoted, if placed by themselves, would require the services of three teachers. This shows that there is a great loss to the town by these failures as well as a greater loss to parents because of requiring their children to attend school longer. It would be cheaper to provide one or even two teachers to work with backward children than to allow these failures to continue. We could not eliminate failures but we could and should reduce this number by half.

The fact that a pupil has repeated a year is no assurance that he will be well prepared for the next grade. He may become mentally lazy because of not being required to do his best at all times, or he may have become stupefied by repeated failures the year before.

An intermediate room between grades one and two has been provided this year. Five pupils already have been sent to grade two from this room and we hope to promote a dozen or more to the third grade at the close of the year. A few of these would have been tried in the second grade this year if we had not provided this intermediate room. This would have made our number of nonpromotions from the first grade look better.

The primary grades were required to dismiss two weeks in January because of measles and other sickness. Some of the time schools were in session the attendance was very small. This will add to our difficulties in regard to promotions this year.

The following record of pupils in attendance Jan. 10, 1913, shows 45% of our pupils in the grades were born in other towns.

A bubbling drinking fountain was installed in each basement of the high school building and in each room of the other village schools last spring. These have given perfect satisfaction. We are very proud of them and now consider them a necessity. The next step in this direction should be supplying paper towels.

An exhibition of drawings of which the town may well be proud was given June 6 and 7. A noticeable feature of the exhibition was that all the work belonged to the pupils. There were no tracings, no outlines filled in by pupils, no copies, and no work of any kind that did not show it was done entirely by the pupils. An exhibit of drawings was sent to the state teachers' meeting at Manchester, October 20. Milford was the only *town* represented, but the work compared favorably with that from any of the cities.

The high school situation demands serious attention. We no longer take high school graduates without training or experience for our graded schools, yet we continually take teachers directly from college for our high school. Even these remain but a short time on account of the small salaries offered. It has often been remarked by the teachers themselves that they cannot afford to honor us long with their presence for fear they will be considered inferior and incapable of securing other po-



sitions. When a vacancy occurs, we cannot visit a teacher in another school with a view to offering her a better salary to come here, for the salaries we offer are too small for her to consider. We must go to the college for a recent graduate. This year every high school teacher resigned during the summer vacation.

During the summer vacation I communicated with each pupil in the high school whose course was doubtful determined the number of pupils for each class, ordered books, and prepared the daily program ready for the opening of school. If this preparation had not been made the first week or two would doubtless have been spent in confusion. There are many details of class work that cannot be adjusted with a new corps of teachers in less than a term.

The maximum salary of each position should be increased two hundred dollars. About three hundred fifty dollars for this purpose should come from an increase in the rate of tuition. The present rate is forty dollars. Even at this rate the district profits by receiving tuition pupils.

It is impossible to determine the extra cost to the district of tuition pupils. There seems no doubt but that the district profits by them as the following figures show. Our records, now available, are not uniform. I have taken years when the average attendance was given. There seems to be little difference so we may infer that the records for the years omitted are quite similar.

Dividing 94.13 by 20.59 we find that it would take four teachers on whole time and one teacher on half time to give us the same kind of school we had ten or twenty years ago, and exclude tuition pupils. The extra one and a half take care of the tuition pupils and give us the high school as it is today. Counting the salary of an assistant at \$600, which is higher than at present, our tuition pupils cost us \$900. The high school tuition bills last year amounted to \$1560, leaving a profit of at least \$660.

Although this shows it is profitable for the school to take tuition pupils, it does not prove the tuition rate is correct. There seems to be no reason why outside pupils should be admitted for less than it costs to care for our own pupils. The following figures give a fair estimate of the cost of maintaining the school last year.

Music once a week required of all.

Although only four subjects each year are required for graduation, those preparing for certain colleges should take five subjects one year. Our state law requires that we teach U. S. Constitutional History but some colleges give no credit for this on entrance.

The number electing the Scientific course is small. The two modern languages do not appeal to the boys and the extra amount of mathematics does not appeal to the girls, so it is shunned by both sexes.

The parents of each child in the eighth grade are requested to decide before the close of the school year which course they wish their child to take in high school next year. In case of any doubt they should consult with the teachers. Last June nearly all pupils elected the Latin course but half of them changed to the English course when interviewed during the summer. It is very necessary that no changes be made after June as books are ordered and prepared and the program for the next year is made out at that time.

Better conditions prevail at the Pine Vally school than before the sixth grade was removed. There are now five grades with seventeen pupils in the school. Milford has five pupils in the Grammar school at Wilton.

Excepting Laurel and Osgood the other rural schools are small. We have six pupils at the North school, two at Federal Hill, and one at Shedd. Wilton pays the greater part of the expense of the Shedd school. Three grade pupils from the North district, five from Federal Hill, and two from Osgood attend the village schools.

The amount of money raised last year by taxation per pupil of average membership exclusive of non-resident pupils was \$23.80. After deducting the sum spent on the high school the amount per pupil of average membership in the grades exclusive of non-resident pupils was \$21.25. Including the sums received from the state and other sources to determine the sum of money available each of these amounts would be increased \$2.05. For this amount we have good schools of the same type we have had for half a century or more. We have in this time provided better opportunities in music and drawing but practically all our education is obtained by means of "books" while the more enterprising towns

and cities have been making use of Manual training, Manual arts, Domestic science and agriculture as a means of education. Alton, Antrim, Berlin, Claremont, Concord Union, Conway, Dover, Hillsborough, Hopkinton, Jefferson, Keene, Laconia, Lebanon, Littleton, Manchester, Marlborough, Nashua, Peterborough, Plymouth, Portsmouth, Salem, Tilton, Walpole and Whitefield for some time have made use of Manual training in their elementary education, and sixteen out of seventy-six high schools in the state offer courses in vocational education. Yet this state is by no means at the head. I hope we can have an equipment for elementary manual training in Milford before another year. The expense would not be over five hundred dollars.

I shall mention only a few of the most needed repairs. Luxfer or similar prismatic glass should be supplied for the upper sashes of the windows of the high school room and for the two middle rooms downstairs. The extremely poor lighting of these rooms has caused trouble ever since the building was completed, but each year's electric light bill has been less than would be the initial cost of equipping the windows with proper glass and curtains so the defect has been allowed to remain.

The number of windows at the left of pupils in the White building should be doubled and such other changes made in the lighting as will make writing on the blackboards visible without eye strain. Three rooms in this building need new blackboards.

The toilet rooms in the high school building, which received repairs last year, will have to be newly equipped this year.

After the school began last September it was found impossible to handle the high school without at least one more large room. One of the large rooms on the lower floor used by the grades was taken for this purpose and a small seventh grade was placed in a recitation room on the second floor. While this is by no means a satisfactory arrangement, it has sufficed for this year. If this seventh grade is larger next year, as we expect it to be, this condition will present the most difficult problem in remodelling the School Board will have to solve. It is doubtful if this can be solved without providing additional room.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

*To the Citizens of the Town of Milford :*

The past year has been a successful one for the Milford Free Library. The excellent work accomplished by our efficient librarians, the steady growth and the increasing usefulness of our library are most gratifying to the trustees.

The statistics show a marked increase in the circulation of books, exceeding that of last year by three thousand and ninety volumes.

The reading room has been patronized to an extent which proves that it is an educational and practical factor for usefulness in our community and one which our citizens fully appreciate.

Miss Grace Parker, whose work is satisfactory, has succeeded Miss Rebecca F. Doane who so efficiently served the library for a term of twenty years.

Miss Annabell C. Secombe has worked with zeal and interest for the highest welfare of every department of the library. Few persons realize the arduous duties and the amount of work demanded and accomplished, but all the intricate details have received systematic and careful attention.

There has been a mutual cooperation between the schools and the library and the reference work is yearly increasing.

Larger accommodations are urgently needed. A stack room is not the place for reference work, nor is it a suitable place for a children's department. This problem is now our most serious question, for all the available space in the stack room is at present taxed to its utmost. Our Free Library is the only town institution that has not called upon its citizens for a material increase in appropriations during the past fifteen years. Every other

town department has been substantially aided as its volume of work has grown. The increased volume of work at our library has been conducted year after year with practically the same appropriation. Several years ago the town would have been called upon to provide additional room for the library's growing needs, had it not been for the wise and efficient management of its self-sacrificing librarians, who have not only been constantly inconvenienced themselves, but have been compelled to crowd the children into a narrow space at one end of the stack room; while dozens of students, who come for reference work, have been obliged to congregate around one table. In other libraries, even in towns smaller than Milford, we find a juvenile room, ample room for a reference department, a suitable work room for the librarians and often a basement for storage purposes. This subject of additional space has been agitated for several years but there comes a time when we must cease to talk and begin to act. We have reached that time now. The initial step should be taken this year.

This year our library has been greatly enriched by the most generous and valuable gift of the kind it has ever received. This gift, of such exceptional worth and usefulness has been made by Mr. George A. Worcester of this town and it consists of a collection of eighty-six volumes of histories; seventy of which are histories of New Hampshire towns. His gift includes a fine book-case containing these volumes. The following letter was read at a meeting of the trustees and the gift was unanimously accepted.

To the Trustees of the Milford Free Library :

For many years I have been making a collection of New Hampshire town histories, with the thought in mind that ultimately they would come into the possession of our public library for the use of our citizens. The collection is now so complete that I have decided not to keep their use from the public any longer. I therefore present the entire collection, together with the case containing them, to the Milford Free Library. As books of this character are only used for reference purposes, and many of them are so scarce and valuable that it would be difficult to replace them if lost, I make the following condition as to their care and use: "That they shall be kept together in the case in which they are, or other



suitable place, and shall not be put into general circulation but retained in the library for reference, and each volume shall contain a book plate stating that it is the property of the Milford Free Library and belongs to the Worcester Local History Collection."

It is my intention to add to the collection such books and pamphlets as may come into my possession, relating to local matters, to the end that it may prove of value to all desiring such information. Annexed hereto is a list of the books and pamphlets now in the collection.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

---

*To the Trustees of The Milford Free Library:*

I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending February 15, 1913.

The library has been open 306 days, during which time 32,490 books have been given out. This exceeds the circulation of last year by 3,090. The average daily circulation has been 106. This is a very gratifying increase.

There are now 11,493 bound volumes in the library, 538 have been added during the year, 370 by purchase, 118 by gift and 50 by periodicals bound.

Mrs. F. E. Kaley presented 59 books to the library. Many of these were books that are in constant demand and frequently have to be replaced. Thus the gift was especially helpful to the finances of the library.

Mrs. B. F. Jerome presented a number of bound volumes of Scribner's Monthly magazine which were desired toward the completion of the set.

The first of June, the retirement of Miss Doane after twenty years of most devoted service to the library and the interests of its patrons made a vacancy which was acceptably filled by Miss Grace Parker. Miss Parker had had an apprenticeship of a year in our own library, had taken the summer course in Simmon's college, and had been some months at Worcester City library, which she left to return to us.

Your librarian attended the annual meeting of the American Library Association at Ottawa, Canada, in June.

This year has shown us no way of increasing the area of our plant. We trust it may not be long before some way may be found. We have been cramped for some years, and each year naturally makes it more difficult for us to do our work satisfactorily. We desire our trustees and the citizens of Milford to keep the interests of their library before them and endeavor in all ways to advance its usefulness. Just now this can best be done by giving us more space.

Of the deaths in town in 1912, 25 were buried out of town; 10 in Amherst, 6 in Wilton, 2 in other towns in the state, 4 in Massachusetts, 2 in Maine and one in Vermont.

There were in the 25 brought from out of town several who were only away temporarily and others who have been away from the town many years, who were brought to the old home for burial. Six of the number were laid to rest in the Amherst Catholic Cemetery.

The average age of death for the year was 41; there were 14 under school age; the oldest person was 102 years, 2 months and 25 days; one other was 90 years; between 80 and 90, 5; between 70 and 80, 9; between 60 and 70, 6; between 50 and 60, 4; between 40 and 50, 4; between 30 and 40, 4; between 20 and 30, 2; between 10 and 20, 2.

The sex was: Males 36, females 18; 40 one or both parents were born outside the United States; 14 themselves were born in other countries.

Of the 79 births 45 were males, 34 females; 53 of the number one or both parents were born in other countries.

The Vital Statistics of a town are one of its most important records, not merely for today but for generations to come. If every one would see to it that the records of their own family were correctly and fully made out on marriage, birth and death certificates when handed in, it might be of great use to them and their descendants at some future day, and a great help to us in making out the records of today.
