REPORT OF SELECTMEN

The end of 1975 has found us more than half way through our reappraisal program. For the first time in Nelson's history, we will have complete measurements, specifications and other factual data of all our buildings on file for appraisal use. This has been the bulk of our reappraisal work so far. This upcoming year, we will be working with the new State of New Hampshire Property Appraisal Manual, to actually establish assessment values for these buildings. We hope this coming year will complete our reappraisal.

The Tax Map is well underway and a copy of the map showing work that has been done to date will be on display at the Town Hall on Town Meeting evening. This is a continuing project, to be completed by 1980, and we again ask for any additional information that any of you may have.

The unfortunate circumstances of having Selectmen over the years who have not been qualified bookkeepers has resulted in a sizeable accumulated deficit. This year, the State was unwilling to give us our annual tax rate without first auditing our books—and our bookkeeping system. As you all now know, we have been operating on deficit spending for some time, and this must be made up over the next several years. Also, many errors and inefficiencies in our bookkeeping system were pointed out to us. The auditors suggestions are printed elsewhere in this Town Report.

Our own suggestion is to operate on a system similar to Harrisville's where the Selectmen have appointed a competent bookkeeper for a fixed annual fee. (See Article 43). Hopefully we will be able to find someone who will be willing to keep the job for a number of years, thus creating efficiency and continuity, and lessening the work load now carried by the Selectmen.

It has been a rough year, but with the reassessment well underway, and with the hope of some help with the books, we feel that the coming year will be a little brighter.

NELSON TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS of the Town of Nelson, in the County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED to meet in the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 2nd day of March, at 7:00 of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

- 1. To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$17,010.00 to defray Town Charges for the year ensuing.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the year 1976.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction to any proper buyer any and all parcels of property conveyed to the Town by the Tax Collector or other deeds and to execute, acknowledge, and deliver appropriate deeds thereof.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Nelson.
- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to receive monies from the State under the Highway Grant, these monies to be used to supplement Summer and Winter Road Maintenance.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,568.00 for the support of the Town Library.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$125.00 to help defray necessary and proper expenses of the Old Home Day; the sum of \$175.00 for the same purpose of Memorial Day.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the care of the Town Common.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,100.00 for the maintenance of the Cemetery.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$340.00 as its fair share of the operating expenses of the Cheshire Hospital.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$195.50 as its fair share of the operating costs of the North Cheshire Home Health Services.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$195.50 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Family Mental Health Services.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$268.60 as the Town's share for the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$251.00 for the support of the Monadnock Region Association.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Board of Adjustment and the administration of the Nelson Land Use Plan.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Conservation Commission.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH PROTECTION

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for rubbish disposal.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense purposes.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the proper expenses of the Police Department.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,250.00 for the maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to pay for damages done by dogs.

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of renovating the all wheel drive fire tanker to serviceable condition.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purchase of a new radio for the Fire Department. Note: the Town expects to receive matching funds; if these funds are available, the cost to the Town will be \$500.00.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$618.00 as a subsidy for Ambulance Service for the ensuing year, March 15, 1976 to March 15, 1977, it being understood that townspeople will still be charged for individual calls.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$304.20 to buy equipment for the Nelson Rescue Squad. It being understood that \$152.10 is to be paid through State matching funds and \$152.10 to be paid by the Nelson Rescue Squad through donations.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$31,400.00 for the maintenance and repair of the roads and bridges.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 to crush gravel.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$14,000.00 for General Highway expenses gas, repairs and supplies.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$495.06 as its share of the TRA construction costs, the State's share being \$3,300.41.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of \$1,500.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town for purchase of road equipment and upon recommendation by the Town Equipment Committee. (This committee includes the Selectmen, Road Agent, Frank Upton, Jr., Lawrence McClure, Jr., John Bunce.)
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw a sum not exceeding \$5,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the purpose of a

body sander.

33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to improve a stretch of road going from Apple Hill Camp to the Zeller property.

ARTICLES OF A SPECIAL NATURE

- 34. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to add to the Dump Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by a vote of the Town.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00. This sum to be held in a Special Reserve Fund for the renovation or remodeling of the Town Hall and/or the Old Schoolhouse, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the Fund except by a vote of the Town.
- 36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,500.00 for the Reassessment of the Town.
- 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for a property map of the Town, the next step toward meeting the 1980 State deadline for a Tax Map of each town.
- 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and further to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rate reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action thereto;

Appropriation Amount Related Article Highway Maintenance \$11,000.00 27

- 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to help make up a deficit in our budget. (Total deficit being approximately \$16,000.00.)
- 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,817.15 to cover the cost of the State Audit.
- 41. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 as a trust fund from Neal and Harriet Perkins,

the interest thereon to be used for the perpetual care of lots in the Cemetery.

- 42. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Provisions of RSA 72:62 for property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system. This exemption shall be in an amount equal to 100% of the value of the solar heating or cooling system. This exemption would be in effect for a period of ten years from date of installation.
- 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a qualified bookkeeper to do all of the routine bookkeeping on a regular basis for a fixed sum of money, and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay such a bookkeeper.
- 44. To see if the Town feels that a relocation of the present Route 9 around Granite Lake is necessary.
- 45. To see if the Town will vote to send representatives to the Democratic and Republican National Conventions.
- 46. To see if the Town will vote to accept the resolutions and changes to the State Constitution adopted at the recent Constitutional Convention.
- 47. To transact any other business or discuss other Warrant proposals as they may legally be brought before the meeting.

The Olivia Rodham Memorial Library has had another

growing and eventful year.

Adventure Time is still holding the attention of the young with an average attendance of twelve children each week. We were most fortunate to have Nancy Stretch volunteer to take over some of the programs. Our sincere thanks to Nancy and her friend "Mr. Mouse." Thanks also to the mothers who helped with the children and furnished the transportation.

The Librarian taught a library course to seven sixth graders at the Library for nine weeks last winter. This helps to prepare them to better use the library at Keene

Junior High School.

Many thanks to Sydney Plant and Joan Warner for carrying books to the Preschool, and to all those who carried books to the Munsonville Elementary School.

The Librarian completed a Library Techniques course at Keene State College on Cataloguing and Classifying

books during the Fall session.

The Librarian is Vice Chairperson of the Southwest District Advisory Council and Chairperson of the Planning Board. She attended four Council meetings held in Keene, Rindge, and two in Newport, and three Planning Board meetings, as well as a Salary Survey committee meeting in Concord. state requirements.

A summer reading program entitled, A Trip Through Historic New Hampshire envolved twenty-eight young people. They were given ice cream at the end of the summer program.

We are still showing excellent films the second Wednesday of each month at 7:30 p.m. The attendance is low but those who attend feel it is a worthwhile program.

The Bookmobile left 2627 books during the year.

One hundred eight books were obtained on Interlibrary loan.

Books were taken to two shut-ins during the year.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The activity of this department for 1975 pretty much follows last years pattern, a bright spot being the reduction in traffic accidents. This is in keeping with the national average and is due, in part, to the reduced speed requirement. In Nelson this officer has made increased patrols and in addition the State Police have increased their patrols and also the use of radar equipment in the town. Early morning patrols have been increased in an effort to control commuter traffic during those hours.

The number of house breaks and complaints has been held at the same level as last year in spite of the marked increase of these incidents in surrounding towns. I feel that this is due in great part to the voluntary efforts of Messers Pierce and Zeller who have voluntarily and at their own expense spent many late night hours patroling our roads in an effort to discourage prowlers. It is my feeling that their efforts deserve a vote of thanks and should be encouraged. With this in mind and to at least partially compensate them for the cost of operating their vehicles I have requested under article

\$1,000.00 for the operating expenses of this department for 1976.

I also feel that this meeting should consider the compensation paid its police officers - it might be interesting to note that it is the lowest of any town in the state.

Again it is a pleasure to report to the town of the cooperation given by other agencies without whose help the work of the department would be most difficult. Thanks are due Troop 'C' of the State Police, the Sheriffs Department, Keene Police Department and the Dispatch Center of Mutual Aid.

Thanks also to those townsfolk who have alertly noted and reported strange vehicles or unusual occurances in Nelson - all such information and descriptions are most helpful in controling criminal activity.

Out mobile radios are old and cost between 6 and 7 hundred dollars a year to maintain. We should start replacing them this year, with solid state units.

The purpose of the unit is to answer all fire, accident, and home emergency calls and to render first aid where indicated.

Presently the squad is in the process of securing needed emergency equipment and supplies. Money for the purchase of this equipment has been obtained from two sources at no cost to the town - the Governors Committee on Highway Safety which has approved funds to be matched by the squad. The sum needed by the squad to match the grant was donated by Ms. Lawrence McClure Jr., raised through dances sponsored by her.

Sincere thanks are due Natalie for her effort and

interest.

The Rescue Squad has responded to 7 calls since its inception in July.

Interested persons are needed to insure proper coverage of Nelson and volunteers may learn more about Nelson

Rescue Squad by contacting the Chairman.

At the present time we are waiting for the Red Cross to set up an advanced First Aid Instructors program so that the Chairman and Director may take same and teach our own personnel in town. TOWN MEETING MARCH 4, 1975

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Town of Nelson, N.H.

The meeting was called to order at 7:15 p.m. by the Moderator, John Bradshaw, who read the opening clause of the Warrant.

The motion was made by Frank Upton that the reading of the Warrant be waived. Motion was seconded and carried.

Maurice Collins, Jr. announced that he was resigning his duties as Selectman, effective at the end of the meeting.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers:

Town Clerk: Mrs. Charlotte H. Pratt was elected Town Clerk, one vote being cast by the Moderator, and sworn into office by the Moderator.

Selectmen: Theresa M. Upton was elected Selectman for 2 years, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Selectmen: The following were nominated for Selectmen: Bernie Pierce and Robert Call.

The Moderator appointed Joseph Skinner, Frank Upton and Donald Bennett as Tellers for the meeting.

Bernie Pierce was declared elected by the Moderator.

Peter Parker was elected Auditor, one vote being cast by the Clerk.

Trustee of Trust Funds: Frances B. Tolman Cemetery Board: Rodger Tolman Trustee of Library: Marion E. Bingham

All duly elected officers were present and were sworn into office at this time by the Moderator.

Motion made and seconded to continue the Town Meeting and take up and act on all Articles in the Warrant. Also to instruct the Selectmen to petition the General Court to legalize the March 4, 1975 Town Meeting held in the Town of Nelson. Motion carried without one desending vote.

Edward Schillemat, Jr. thanked the Town for their support while he served as Selectman.

Sidney Partridge pointed out so called errors in the Town Report.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$22,465.00 to defray Town Charges for the year ensuing. Motion made to accept article as read and seconded:

Amendment: Motion was made by Barry Tolman to change figure to \$22,965.00. Motion was seconded. (He explained that it is the responsibility of the Town to help a family in real need.) Amendment carried.

Amendment: Motion made and seconded (Motion made by Sidney Partridge) It is the sense of this meeting that the Selectmen reinstate the Detailed Statement of Payments in the Town Report of 1975 and in the reports for subsequent years. Prevailed. Article accepted as amended.

Article 3. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the year 1975.

Article 4. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction to any proper buyer and all parcels of property conveyed to the Town by the Tax Collector or other deeds and to execute, acknowledge, and deliver appropriate deeds thereof.

Article 5. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Nelson.

Article 6. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to receive monies from the State under the Highway Grant. These monies to be used to supplement Summer and Winter Road Maintenance. (approximately \$6,200.00)

Article 7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,553.00 for the support of the Town Library.

Article 8. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to help defray necessary and proper expenses of Old Home Day; the sum of \$150.00 for the same purpose of Memorial Day; and the sum of \$150.00 for the care of the Town Common.

Article 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the maintenance of the Cemetery, this sum to be paid to the Secretary of the Cemetery Board on or before May 1, 1975.

Article 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$340.00 as its fair share of the operating expenses of the Cheshire Hospital.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$251.60 as the Town's share for the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. Motion made and seconded to accept article as read:

Request for a written vote: Mary Shonk, Joseph Skinner and Donald Bennett appointed Tellers for this Article:

Total of votes cast 111, necessary 56 Yes 63 No 48

Article accepted as read.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$251.00 for the support of the Monadnock Region Association. Motion made and seconded to pass over the Article, motion carried.

Article 13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the proper expenses of the Nelson Board of Adjustment and the Administrator of the Nelson Land Use Plan.

Article 14. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to support the services of the Monadnock

Region Humane Society.

Article 15. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$185.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the North Cheshire County Home Health Service.

Article 16. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$152.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

Article 17. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,440.00 for rubbish disposal. (Mr. Collins explained this would be paid to Keene)

Article 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the proper expenses of the Police Department.

Article 19. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense Purposes.

Article 20. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Maintenance of the Fire Department.

Article 21. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 for the purchase of a high capacity portable pump for the Fire Department.

Article 22. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,000.00 for the maintenance and repair of the roads and bridges.

Article 23. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to crush gravel.

Article 24. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,000.00 for General Highway expenses--gas, repairs, and supplies.

Article 25. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.89 as its share of the TRA construction costs, the State's share being \$3,339.24.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by vote of the Town for purchase of road equipment and upon recommendation by the Town Equipment Committee. (Committee includes The Selectmen, Road Agent, Frank E. Upton, Jr., Lawrence McClure, Jr. and Bernie Pierce.)

Amendment: Motion made and seconded to change the amount to \$3,000.00.

Standing vote requested.

Motion carried and Article was accepted and amended.

Article 27. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00. Said sum to be held in a Special Reserve Fund for the ultimate replacement of the Town's present Dump arrangements, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town. Motion made to accept as read, seconded.

Standing vote Yes 72 No 23

Motion carried and Article was accepted as read.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00. This sum to be held in a Special Reserve Fund for the construction or renovation of Town Buildings, it being understood that no withdrawals may be made from the Fund except by vote of the Town. Motion made and seconded to accept as read.

Amended: Motion made and seconded to have the Selectmen appoint a committee of 3 interested people to serve as a committee to work on project involving Capital Reserve Fund. Prevailed.

Amendment: Motion made and seconded to change the words Town Buildings to Town Hall and/or Old School House. Prevailed.

Article accepted as amended.

Article 29. It was voted to approve expenditures not to exceed \$500.00 for making the 2nd floor small room of the Old School House suitable for Selectmen's Office.

Article 30. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the continued support of the Munson-ville Association. (pre-School.)

Article 31. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the newly formed Nelson Baseball Association.

Article 32. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the Reassessment of the Town.

Motion made and seconded to pass over article.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Board of Selectmen Town Office Nelson, New Hampshire 03457

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts and records of the Town of Nelson for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, which was made by this Division in accordance with your request dated November 20, 1975. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the audit.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given to the Town Clerk for retention as part of the permanent Town records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, Trustees of Trust Funds, Trustees of Library and Cemetery Board.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets:

December 31, 1972-December 31, 1973 (Exhibit 1) December 31, 1974-December 31, 1974 (Exhibit 17)

Comparative balance sheets disclosing the financial condition of the general fund, as of December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973, are presented in Exhibit 1. As indicated therein, the current deficit increased by \$777.50, from \$7,544.62 to \$8,322.12, during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973.

Comparative balance sheets, as of December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974 are presented in Exhibit 17. As indicated therein, the current deficit increased by \$3,461.31, from \$8,322.12 to \$11,783.43, during the

fiscal year ended December 31, 1974.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1973 (Exhibit 2) Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1974 (Exhibit 18)

Statements presenting an analysis of the factors which caused the change in current financial condition of the Town during the fiscal years ended December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974 are presented in Exhibits 2 and 18 respectively. The factors which caused the increase of \$777.50 in current deficit during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973 were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues:

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1973 (Exhibits 3 and 4)

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1974 (Exhibits 19 and 20)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973, are presented in Exhibits 3 and 4. Similar statements for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974 are contained in Exhibits 19 and 20.

As indicated by the Budget Summaries (Exhibits 4 and 20), a revenue deficit of \$5,706.20, less a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$4,177.31, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,528.89 during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973; a revenue deficit of \$7,315.66, less a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$3,170.73, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$4,144.93 during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974.

TREASURER

General Fund:

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibits 5 and 21)

December 31, 1972 and December 31, 1973 (Exhibit 5) December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974 (Exhibit 21)

Summary statements of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1973 and December 31, 1974, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts are included in Exhibits 5 and 21.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes

was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Pertinent comments regarding accounting procedures which are necessary to safeguard the resources of the Town and provide effective internal controls are incorporated in these comments and recommendations.

Prescribed Cash Book For Selectmen Not Maintained:

It must be noted that for the periods under audit the prescribed selectmen's cashbook was not maintained. It was found that the alternate records kept by the incumbent selectmen during these periods were inadequate. At our suggestion, the current Board of Selectmen are now maintaining the prescribed cashbook. Authorization should be obtained from the Commissioner of Revenue Administration, whenever any departure is made from the prescribed forms.

Most of the supporting documents for receipts were not kept on file by the Selectmen. We suggest that all such documents be retained in the office of the Selectmen after recording and posting of receipts has been duly made in the cash receipt journal.

Current Deficit:

It was previously stated in the financial information section of this report that the Town's accumulated current deficit, at December 31, 1974, is \$11,783.43. This was brought about by several factors. The most significant factors contributing to this deficit are enumerated below.

1. Taxes were raised under budgetary requirements in 1973 and 1974. This resulted from the inadvertent omission of several authorized appropriations, from the statements of appropriations which were submitted to the Commissioner of Revenue Administration by the Selectmen for computation of annual tax rates. This factor alone accounted for revenue deficits which amounted to \$9,655.57 in 1973 and \$3,494.60 in 1974.

- 2. Several sources of estimated revenues, such as income from trust funds, were not realized. During 1973 the loss of revenue from this source amounted to \$660.00 and during 1974, \$1,086.00.
- 3. Other revenues were not realized because the Selectmen failed to apply to the State for reimbursements on account of Motor Vehicle Road Tolls and bounties.

Expenditures For Appropriations Not Statutorily Authorized:

During the periods under audit, the Selectmen expended town funds for objects of expense not statutorily authorized. These expenditures were for the Monadnock Region Humane Society and the Munsonville Pre-School System.

In accordance with R.S.A. 41:15, these appropriations had been deleted from the 1973 and 1974 annual statements of appropriations by the Commissioner of Revenue Administration.

Improper Transfer of Revenue Sharing Funds:

It was noted that in 1973 and 1974 excessive funds were transferred from the Revenue Sharing Fund to the General Fund mainly because the Selectmen were not fully aware of the criteria applicable to the use of Revenue Sharing Funds. In this regard, we urge the Selectmen to refer to the instructions and guidelines which have been published by this Division relative to use of Revenue Sharing. These guidelines are sent to the Selectmen on an annual basis.

The net excess transfer to the General Fund during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1973 totaled \$308.50; the overremittance for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1974 totaled \$4,082.57.

We, therefore, recommend that reimbursement be made by the General Fund to the Revenue Sharing Fund in the amount of \$4,391.07. Future transfers of Revenue Sharing from this fund should be closely scrutinized in order to prevent misuse of Revenue Sharing entitlements.

Revenue Sharing Funds are governed not only by federal regulations but also by applicable State statues. Expenditures from this fund cannot be made in excess of appropriations for each project authorized. On the other hand, if an authorized project is completed at a cost

lower than the amount appropriated from Revenue Sharing, the amount not required must be retained as part of the unencumbered Revenue Sharing Fund. Such unexpended balances cannot be utilized to supplement other approved projects, without the specific approval of the Town Meeting.

The procedures outlined hereabove and applicable statutory limitations pertaining to unused Revenue Sharing entitlements have been brought to the attention of the current Board of Selectmen.

Road Agent's Account:

During the fiscal years covered by this audit, the Road Agent's payroll manifests were used not only for the payment of wages, but also to make disbursements for the rental of equipment and machinery, for the purchase of certain materials and supplies and for the payment of contracted services. These manifests were submitted to the Selectmen by the Road Agent when requesting reimbursements from the Town for expenditures made from this account.

The Road Agent has not maintained a columnar cash journal to account for the financial transactions pertaining to his area of activity. Consequently, there was a insufficient accountability over the funds in his custody. Other significant deficiencies noted in the Road Agents accounting and business practices are outlined.

- 1. Disbursements made from this account were not supported by detailed vendor invoices.
- 2. Several expenditures were not inserted on the manifests. As a result, the Road Agent was not reimbursed therefor.
- 3. Those monies reimbursed to the Road Agent by the Town were not recorded in the agent's checkbook. In addition, there were no balances shown in the checkbook.
- 4. The agent's checking account was not reconciled with the bank statements for the periods examined.
- 5. Individual employees earning records were not maintained by the Road Agent.
- 6. In many instances, the payroll manifests were added incorrectly.

Because of the above described inadequacies, our auditors recommend that hereafter all town maintenance expenses be administered directly through the Town's general fund. This recommendation has already been implemented.

Public Officials Barred From Certain Private Dealings:

During the course of our examination, it was noted that certain town officials personally provided contracted services to the Town but did not follow the procedures set forth in R.S.A. 95:1 regarding open competitive bidding in such cases.

In this regard, we quote herewith the pertinent provisions of R.S.A. 95:1:

"95:1 No person holding a public office.... for which renumeration in the form of wages, salary, or per diem is paid, in city, county, or state governmental service shall, by concontract or otherwise, except by open competitive bidding, sell or buy goods, commodities, or other personal property of a value in excess of twenty-five dollars at any one sale to or from the city, county, or state by which said official is paid."

Whenever incumbent public officials are to provide services or goods in excess of \$25.00 to the Town, we recommend the solicitation of public bids to satisfy the requirements of R.S.A. 95:1. The Selectmen should award contracts for the rental of equipment, machinery and other services in a Prudential manner, always to the best interest of the Town.

Olivia Rodham Memorial Library:

During the review of the financial activity of the library funds, it was noted that a columnar cashbook is not kept by the Trustees of the Library. Also, disbursements to vendors are made by "bank money orders." As a result of this method of payment, funds are withdrawn directly from a savings account passbook and there are no cancelled checks available to substantiate payments made.

We recommend that a special checking account be established to administer the operation of the Library general fund. All financial activity should be processed through this checking account. We further recommend that a columnar cashbook be kept to record all receipts and classification of expenditures.

Trust Funds:

Under current practice, the Trustees of Trust Funds remit income derived from cemetery trust funds and the sole library trust fund directly to the Cemetery Board and to the Trustees of the Library, respectively.

It is required, however, that income from these trust funds be paid to the general fund of the Town. Likewise, all expenditures applicable to the purpose for which these trust funds were established, should be made from the Town's account.

Cemetery Funds:

The Cemetery Board currently administers all the cash transactions involving the cemetery funds, including the actual disbursement of funds to supplies and vendors.

Under R.S.A. 41:29, the Treasurer of the Town must have custody of all monies belonging to the Town. In addition, it is more practical to administer all disbursement functions through as few checking accounts as possible.

We therefore, recommend that all cash transactions pertaining to these funds be administered through the Town's general fund account, utilizing the same disbursement procedures applicable to other general fund monies.

Note, Bond and Coupon Register:

The provisions of R.S.A. 33:12 require that the Treasurer keep a note, bond and coupon register, as prescribed by the Commissioner of Revenue Administration, for every bond or note issued by the municipality.

We recommend that the prescribed register be duly maintained by the Treasurer in compliance with the said statute.

Town Officers Surety Bonds:

During the course of our examination, the surety bonds furnished by the Town officials covering the periods under audit could not be located by the Selectmen, and, therefore, were not available for audit.

Surety bonds should be held in safekeeping and should always be readily available when needed for audit or other purposes.

According to the records disposition schedule prescribed in R.S.A. 33-A:4, the period of retention for these documents is six (6) years after expiration. The bonds may be destroyed after the expiration of the statutory retention period.

Payments to Vendors Not Properly Supported:

The Selectmen authorize the disbursement of Town funds in many cases solely on the basis of statements which only indicate the "balance due," to vendors.

During 1973 and 1974, this practice resulted in the making of several duplicate payments to vendors. Some of these duplicate payments were refunded by the vendors; other payments were credited by the vendors to the Town's accounts.

The practice of paying vendors from statements without itemized invoices should be discontinued inasmuch as it may result in sizeable and permanent financial losses to the Town.

Original vendors bills or invoices, made out in detail should always be filed with approved vouchers issued in payment thereof. We further suggest that annotations be made on the face of each vendor's invoice showing the date of payment by the Treasurer and the check number covering the payment.

Other General Comments:

For precautionary and safety measures, we recommend the acquisition of fireproof and burglarproof equipment for the protection of the records and funds of the tax collector, town clerk, and treasurer.

We also recommend that liability insurance coverage be furnished for the offices of treasurer, tax collector and town clerk.

Conclusion:

The prosivions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, of the Revised Statutes Annotated require that the Auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in the audit report is optional, at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

He announced that the polls would remain open until after 9:00 p.m. The meeting was recessed until 8:00 p.m. At 8:00 p.m. the Articles were acted upon as follows after the reading of the Warrant by the Moderator.

Mr. Ethan Tolman recognized Mr. Donald Bennett who introduced and welcomed Mr. Charles Larracey and Mr. Joseph Giuliano of the Supervisory Union, and asked that these guests be allowed to speak at the meeting when asked. Mr. Bennett also spoke briefly to clarify the three separate bodies known as the Nelson School Beard, the Keene School Board, and the Supervisory Union 29 Board.

Article 2. A motion was made by Mr. Bennett that the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen as found in the Annual School District report be accepted and placed on file. The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article 3. Mr. Bennett moved that the District authorize the School Board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or thereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof; or any federal, state, or private agency. The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article 4. Mr. Bennett moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$4280 to provide for the services of an Associate teacher at the Munsonville School and suitable instructional materials and to authorize the School Board to effectuate the purposes of this Article. Seconded. Much debate ensued, which clarified the distinction and services of an associate teacher who must work under the direct supervision of the two certi-

fied teachers, and the regular certified teacher who could handle a group of students equal in responsibility with the existing two teachers. Priscilla Walter moved to amend the motion to read: That the District raise a sum not to exceed \$7,250 to provide for the services of a full time certified teacher at the Munsonville School, and suitable instructional materials; and to authorize the School Board to effectuate the purposes of this Article. Standing vote: 76 cast, needed 39; yes 28, no 48. Amendment defeated.

Mr. Ray Huber moved to defer further action on this Article until Article 11 had been discussed. This motion was seconded and passed. (At the conclusion of action on article 11, Mr. Bunce moved to consider Article 6 before Article 4--which motion was seconded and passed.) At the conclusion of action on Article 6, Mr. Parker moved that we resume Mr. Bennett's original motion for Article 4. This motion was seconded and prevailed without further discussion: The District raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,280 to provide for the services of an Associate teacher at the Munsonville School, and suitable instructional materials; and to authorize the School Board to effectuate the purposes of this Article. (Seconded and passed.)

Article 5. Mr. Bennett moved that this article be passed over. The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article 6. Mr. Pierce moved that the Nelson School District purchase and provide operating costs for one or more school buses. Seconded. Mr. Steuart of the transportation committee passed out summary sheets and explained the findings of the study made by the transportation committee. Based upon reduction of the feeder route system, the committee's report indicated that the school district could save money by either leasing a bus or purchasing its own bus. The most saving would be rendered by purchasing. Due to other considerations such as finding reliable drivers, housing, repairing, etc., the committee recommended that the district follow the leasing option. Mr. Bennett was asked to comment for the school board. His own recommendation was to keep the status quo because of the additional problems involved in either leasing or owning a bus.

Mr. Pierce withdrew his original motion and moved that the District lease a bus. Seconded. Nancy Hilton moved to amend the motion to retain the present feeder route system. Seconded. Written ballot: Total 68, needed 35; yes 35, no 33. The amendment prevailed.

Discussion emphasized that reduction of feeder

routes made the difference in the cost of the three options. Mr. Pierce withdrew his motion. Mr. Steve Staples moved that the district renew contract with Cheshire Transportation. Seconded. Written ballot. Total 72, needed 37; yes 45, no 27. The motion carried.

Article 7. Mr. Bennett moved to pass over the article. Seconded and prevailed.

Article 8. Mr. Barry Tolman moved to pass over. Seconded. Mr. Bennett commented the consensus of caucus and the School Board was that it would be better to present the motion and soundly defeat it. Mr. Tolman withdrew his motion. Mr. Bennett moved that the District institute a lunch program at the Munsonville School pursuant to RSA 189:11-A, further to raise and appropriate funds for the support of said program, further to authorize the School Board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such funds as may be available from any federal or state agency; to make such contracts and/or agreements as may be necessary; and, to take such other action as may be deemed appropriate to effectuate the purpose of this article. Seconded. Mr. Huber stated that the feeling of some was to raise the necessary funds from taxes to take the state education department to court if necessary; that the state was overstepping its bounds. The motion was unanimously defeated.

Article 9. Mr. Bennett moved that the District establish a Facilities Study Committee composed of not more than seven members, three appointed by the moderator, a Town Selectman, and the three members of the School Board with said committee to meet, review facility problems, formulate alternatives, make recommendations and report to the District no later than the 1976 District Meeting; further to raise and appropriate \$100 for any expenses that would be incurred by said committee in the performance of its cited duties. Seconded. Karen Tolman moved to amend the motion to insert the words "explore tuition contracts and relations with the A.R.E.A. contract," following "formulate alternatives." Seconded. The amendment prevailed. Motion also prevailed (unanimous)

Article 10. Mr. Pierce moved that the District raise and appropriate \$5,000 to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund established at the March, 1972 District Meeting for "the purpose of the construction, reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes," such funds not to be withdrawn without the vote of the School District. Seconded.

Written ballot on Article 10 was called for. Written ballot: Total 59, needed 30; yes 23, no 36. Motion defeated. Mr. Frank Upton moved that the District raise and appropriate \$500 to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund. This motion was seconded and prevailed.

Article 11. This article was discussed and acted upon before Article 4 was completed. Mr. Bennett moved that the District raise and appropriate \$115,015 for the support of school, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Seconded. Carol Neil moved to amend the motion to effect a decrease in the total which would result from giving across-the-board raises to teachers, janitor, health personnel, etc., in the amount of 4% rather than 7%. The amendment was seconded and prevailed by voice vote. The tuition increase and A.R.E.A. contract were discussed. It was explained that tuition is based upon the prior year's expenses, and that the contract was very tight. Although we do appreciate the good program provided by the Keene system for our 7th through 12th graders, Mr. Huber requested that our views about increased costs be carried back to those concerned. Mr. Bunce moved to amend the motion to eliminate the \$12,666 transportation item until further action on Article 6. This brought the final figure (correcting for both Neil and Bunce amendments) to \$101,711. Seconded and passed.

After Articles 4 through 10 were acted upon, Mr. Bennett moved to reconsider Article 11 to read that the District raise and appropriate \$114,377 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Seconded and prevailed.

Article 12. (To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.)

Mr. Walter moved to have the District vote for three members of the Facilities Study Committee. Seconded. Ruled out of order. Mr. Pierce moved to reconsider Article 9. Seconded. Standing vote: total 47, needed 24; yes 26, no 21. Passed. Mr. Pierce moved that the three members of the Committee be elected by the District rather than appointed by the Moderator. Seconded. Standing vote: Total 38, needed 20; yes 11, no 21. Motion defeated and the original motion stands. The Moderator received names of interested persons from whom he would appoint three to serve on the Facilities Study Committee. Names received were Millie Huber, Richard Steuart, Carol Neil, Ronald Bogue, Dave Sobel, Peter Parker, Marion Frazier, and Frank Upton.

Article 13. (To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.)

Mr. Bennett moved that the District recognize with gratitude and appreciation the devoted service of George E. Cass, Business Manager, Supervisory Union #29, deceased January 27, 1975. The motion was seconded and prevailed.

Mr. Bennett moved that the District also recognize and give thanks to Millie Huber who has served on the School Board for 16 years. She received a standing ovation.

The Moderator expressed appreciation for the forbearance of the voters and entertained a motion to adjourn. The meeting was adjourned at 12:36 a.m.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

The State of New Hampshire has mandated a school lunch program for the district. Under the direction of your school board, your principal, and our new business manager, Mr. Caye, a bag lunch program was initiated this year. The District should realize that in the long run this required State program will increase the community's cost of operating our school. Mrs. Miriam Brown of Keene, and Mr. Bussell of the State Department have worked closely with your principal and board along with central office staff in making this transition a success.

In the fall of 1975 Mr. Charles Howard, formerly a Keene board member, was appointed by the Nelson School Board to serve the District. He brings to Nelson a great deal of expertise and should make the decision-making process more meaningful as it relates to the education of children.

The new resource teacher aide possesses excellent qualifications and should be a great asset to the children and the community. Even though this service is a direct cost to the district, the benefits derived are making the educational program for Nelson's youngsters more successful.

Supervisory Union 29 employed a new member of the administrative team, Mr. Ralph E. Caye, Jr., our new business manager. Mr. Caye replaces the late Mr. Cass who was deeply loved and respected. Mr. Caye brings to the supervisory union a background of experience and he looks forward to working closely with the communities of our union.

Mr. Larracey, our Assistant Superintendent for Administrative and Special Services, with the Staff Development Committee have finalized a staff development plan. We are currently utilizing computerized personnel data forms. Many opportunities for in-service training directly related to staff development are available and have been taken by members of the staff.

The school districts of Supervisory Union 29 in conjunction with the Monadnock Children's Special Services Center have developed procedures to comply with the regulations of P.L. 93-380 (State Plan for the Education of Handicapped Children under Part B of the Education of the Handicapped Act) which became effective July 1, 1975. Each school in Supervisory Union 29 has established evaluation/placement teams to deal with requests from parents for placement or changes in placement of their

handicapped child. The procedures ensure that the school districts will comply with 1) due process guarantees, 2) placement of handicapped children in the least restrictive alternative, and 3) non-discriminatory testing and placement procedures.

Title IX of the educational ammendments of 1972 prevent discrimination on the basis of sex in the operation of most federally supported educational programs. This regulation became effective September 1, 1975. The impact of this regulation prevents discrimination on the basis of sex in the operation of any interscholastic sport or program offered by any educational institution. This law will have a definite impact on our school budget.

CHESHIRE VOCATIONAL CENTER

The course of study has been completed and counselors are encouraged by the enthusiasm of the students. They are currently meeting with students on an individual basis concerning course selections. Upon invitation, the Vocational Director and the counselors would welcome an opportunity to make presentations concerning any aspect of the new Cheshire Vocational Center to citizens in the communities of the participants.

The administration would like to express its deep appreciation to the many communittees involved in the planning of our new vocational facility; to the staff at Keene High School, and other local educational institutions, to the construction workers and to the public at large for their tremendous support of this project.

"Individualized instruction" and "simulation" are the key words for the expanded opportunities in the Business and Office Education Department. One of the most innovative programs to be offered will be Radio-TV Broadcasting a first in any high school in New England. Students in this program will have an opportunity to learn and work in a complete simulated radio and television station--WKHS. As part of the data processing portion there will be opportunity for key punching, programming, and other data processing skills in connection with the computer program. The office occupations cluster (secretarial, clerical, and accounting) will offer exploratory simulations in legal, medical and educational secretarial skills, another first for our area. There will also be a word processing unit and a new offering in reprographics where students in the clerical program will learn many means of duplicating materials and will have opportunity to assess for themselves which process they will use for a given job, including a cost analysis to justify their

choice. Accounting skills will be enhanced by the use of individual simulations and up-to-date office equipment such as electronic calculators and bookkeeping machines. Distributive Education classes will be expanding their program by operating a full size, college type book store and a mini mall which will house three individual shops.

The Technology Department of the Cheshire Vocational Center includes thirteen course offerings such as masonry, sheet metal, and diesel and hydraulic mechanics. The expansion of the Technology Department is best illustrated by the growth of the Building Trades program. Four years ago one teacher worked in a converted storage closet of 746 square feet. In the Cheshire Vocational Center teach-/ ers will have an area of 10,000 square feet serving the students of Cheshire County in the Building Trades program. Vocational Technology education provides training which develops skill, ability, understanding, appreciation, attitudes, working habits, and imparts knowledge and information needed by workers to enter and progress in employment on a useful and productive basis. Grades nine and ten offer exposure through the regular high school Industrial Arts program. Vocational Technology courses offer "performance," using basic skills required for job entry. A student may choose to participate in the co-op program -- on the job training for those who do not seek to increase knowledge and skills via post-secondary (2 or 4-year programs) education. Offerings in the Technology Department will be approximately 600 instructional hours over a two-year period. The additional 20,000 square feet enables us to offer these additional instructional hours.

The Home Economics Department is planning three new courses and will be expanding the Food Service Program, including the addition of a small dining room for catering experience on special occasions. New programs are Health Occupations, Child Care Services and Careers in Textiles. The health occupations area includes a three-bed hospital ward, a mini testing lab, a small kitchen, classroom and storage areas. Students will receive a general background in basic patient care and in community health problems. Clinical and community experience will be a part of the learning program. The health occupations program will train students to meet job entry qualifications for such positions as orderly, nurse's aide and lab aide. The child care program, provided for those interested in working with children, combines study with observation and hands-on experience in the Day Care Nursery which adjoins the classroom. Working with children in the nursery will help students understand behavioral patterns of children, food and eating habits, learning through play and guidance and discipline. Careers in textiles

covers the basics of working with textiles as used for clothing or in home decorating. Students will be exposed to dressmaking, garment alterations, tailoring, slipcovers draperies, upholstery, chair seating and commercial sewing.

In addition to preparing students for direct entry into many jobs, vocational courses are also the basis for further post-secondary education if a student so desires.
