THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

Yor are hereby notified to meet at the Grade School Auditorium in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Free Public Library.
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance and construction of highways.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the oiling of streets.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for town maintenance in cooperation with the State.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred eighty-eight

dollars (\$288.00) to the Lakes Region Association, which is (1/100th. of 1%) one one-hundredth of one percent, of the assessed valuation, for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town together with other Towns in the Lakes Region.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital of Plymouth, New Hampshire.
11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Band Concerts during the summer of 1947 by the Plymouth Community Band.
12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for the care of the Plymouth Common.
13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Sidewalks.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.
15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to establish and maintain suitable coasting and skating places in the Town.
16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to issue and distribute circulars and other written and printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town.
17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the Town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the Town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.
18. To see what action the Town will take regarding the purchase of a snow loader and raising money for same.

19. To see what action the Town will take regarding Federal aid to the Plymouth Airport and raising the necessary funds for the purpose.
20. To see if the Town will vote to raise five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for construction and maintenance of the Plymouth Airport.
21. To see if the Town will adopt airport zoning regulations (or ordinance) for the protection of the approaches of the Plymouth Municipal Airport, in accordance with the Airport Approach Plan of the New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission.
22. To see if the Town will vote to appoint an Airport (or Aviation) Committee (or Commission) consisting of three members to be appointed by vote and authorized to act for the Town in all matters pertaining to the establishment, construction and operation of aircraft landing areas and to confer and consult with State and Federal Officials and to execute in the name of the Town any and all necessary or desirable instruments and agreements in connection therewith.
23. To choose a Library Trustee for a term of three years.
24. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
26. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount on the early payment of taxes.
27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay the Town share of cost of installation of signal lights at the "Weeks Crossing", so-called on the highway leading from the Daniel Webster Highway to the Rumney Road, so-called on the northerly side of the Baker River.

28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

AUDITORS' REPORT

Plymouth, New Hampshire

February 16, 1947

We have made a complete audit of all the books and records kept by the Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Overseer of the Poor, Road Agent, Trustee of Trust Funds, Treasurer of Library Trustees, and Justice of the Municipal Court.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

We verified cash balances and reconciled bank statements for all officials having bank accounts. The individual entries for all expenditures were verified by checking on authorization and comparing cancelled checks for all amounts with vouchers and accompanying invoices and payrolls. We checked payrolls to see that they were properly signed. Column totals, extensions, page footings were checked for each set of books and proven.

In addition to auditing the books of various officials we prepared or approved statements showing the financial condition of the various departments and the results of operation for the year. We believe that our signed statements correctly show the facts of the audited books.

The securities of the trustee of trust funds were submitted for examination. All funds are invested in U. S. Government Bonds or deposits in the Plymouth Guaranty Savings Bank. Detailed receipts and expenditures appear in the report of the trustee.

We examined the surety bonds of the town treasurer, tax collector, town clerk, trustee of trust funds, and road agent, and found that these officers were properly bonded.

In all cases involving inventories, we made no attempt to take a physical inventory. Schedules submitted to us by various officers were accepted without verification.

We burned one \$600.00 Town of Plymouth Bridge Bond, No. 13, and 8 interest coupons totalling \$96.00.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We again recommend that all invoices and original signed payrolls be attached to vouchers to facilitate proper auditing in the future.

There are several discrepancies between individual reports and the report of the selectmen. This is due to the fact that checks are written on December 31st, and given to other departments which do not deposit them until some time in January. As a result, total payments and receipts for any one year do not check between departments. This practice should be discontinued.

We started our audit on January 8, 1947, and finished February 16th. Individual audits were made as soon as books were presented. It appears to us that if all books were closed promptly on December 31st, that we should be able to get them in time to complete our audit at an earlier date.

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Plymouth in said County of Grafton, qualified to vote in legal affairs of said District, was held in the New Grade Auditorium in said District on the twenty-sixth day of March, 1946, at eight o'clock in the evening.

Moderator Leon M. Huntress being absent, the meeting was called to order, and the Warrant read, by Alice Wiles, Clerk. Articles, as listed in said Warrant were voted on as follows:

I. Luther J. Pollard was elected on motion made and carried, by one ballot cast by the Clerk, as Moderator for the ensuing year, and took oath of office before Robert G. Wakefield, Justice of the Peace. The chair was turned over to him and he proceeded in connection with the remaining articles.

II. Merlin F. Connary was elected on motion made and carried, by one ballot cast by the Clerk, as Clerk for the ensuing year, and took oath of office before Robert G. Wakefield, Justice of the Peace, and he replaced Alice Wiles, and proceeded in connection with the remaining duties of the meeting.

III. Merlin F. Connary was elected on motion made and carried, by one ballot cast by the Moderator, as Treasurer for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1946 and ending June 30, 1947, and he took oath of office before Robert G. Wakefield, Justice of the Peace.

IV. The Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years was elected by ballot. The Moderator before ballots taken, instructed that only legal voters of this District might cast ballots and R. G. Wakefield, T. H. Evans and N. L. Samaha were nominated as Tellers, to count voters and assist in counting ballots, which, upon ballot taken, were found to agree. Upon ballots taken:

and said Richard A. Messer was declared elected to to serve as Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years, and later took oath of office before Robert G. Wakefield, Justice of the Peace.

V. Voted: That the District shall raise the sum of One Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$125.00) to pay the salary of the Truant Officer, and expense of taking the School Census for the ensuing year, by motion made and carried.

VI. Voted: That the District shall raise the sum of Three Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$350.00) to pay the salaries of the District Officers and fix the amount of said salaries to that amount, by motion made and carried.

VII. Following a discussion of District receipts and disbursements, between H. K. Sturtevant, Esq., and the District Officers, and a discussion of funds to have been and to be used for athletic purposes between John Gadd, R. L. Stevenson and Supt. Arthur S. Rollins it was Voted: That the District shall raise the sum of Forty-seven Thousand, Five Hundred Thirty-one and 10/100 Dollars (\$47,531.10) for the support of schools for the ensuing year, and, on motion made and carried, from this amount the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) shall be paid to the Plymouth Athletic Club, Inc., of Plymouth, for athletic purposes, to help maintain the so-called Ball Park owned and maintained by said Club, and used by students of this District in connection with normal and usual school athletics.

VIII. Voted: The School Board shall borrow money to pay the debts of the District and to give therefor notes of the District, countersigned by the District Treasurer, by motion made and carried.

IX. Moses A. Batchelder and Narceep L. Samaha were elected on motion made and carried, by one ballot cast by Clerk, as Auditors for the ensuing year. Later, each took oath of office as prescribed by law.

X. Discussion on use of the New Grade Auditorium for Sunday basket ball purposes was opened by Charles H. Bowles, Member of the School Board, that the Board might learn the concensus of the voters, and the issue was voiced by the School Board members, Hazen K. Sturtevant, Esq., John Gadd, Loys A. Wiles, and others. The motion was made and carried that the School Board should give permission to residents of this District only, to use the New Grade Auditorium for Sunday basket ball purposes but only provided such use does not interfere with Church hours; that admission to Sunday games will be charged at the discretion of the users; that a charge for use of the Auditorium, if made, is to cover only expenses of the District because of such use; that use of the Auditorium will not be granted to athletic groups located outside the District, or others, for commercial purposes.

No further business coming before the Meeting, it was adjourned by the Moderator at 9:01 in the evening.

It will be noted that the Monday or Friday immediately before or after a legal holiday on Tuesday or Thursday has been scheduled as a day of no school.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Plymouth School Board:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Plymouth. While it is intended to present items of information that are of major interest to you and the people of Plymouth, space does not permit a detailed discussion of all phases of operation of your schools. Requests for additional information will be cheerfully acknowledged and granted.

The retirement of Mr. Charles E. Moors from the headmastership of Plymouth High School at the close of the school year in June 1946 was an event of more than usual significance. For a period of seventeen years Mr. Moors had been at the head of our high school. In his capacity of able instructor, wise administrator, and understanding friend of youth he exerted an influence on the lives and character of young people which only the future can measure. The sincerity and devotion which he put into his work won the admiration and respect of his associates in the field of education.

The vacancy created by the retirement of Mr. Moors was filled by the election of Mr. Elliott W. Keach, who for five years had served as Headmaster of Peterborough High School. The manner in which Mr. Keach has directed the high school since last September justifies his selection for that important position. Progress to date promises still greater strength and advancement in our high school in the near future.

A comparison of the 1946-1947 list of teachers with that of one year ago discloses several other changes. At the close of the school in June, Miss Beatrice Lawrence, Miss Alice Beaubien, and Miss Carolyn Gove terminated their services. During the summer Miss Marian L. Billings asked to be released from her contract that she might accept a teaching position in Willsboro, N. Y. In October 1946 two other teachers

resigned—Mr. A. L. Davis, Jr., to teach in Oregon, and Miss Barbara A. Barsantee to be married. New teachers and their subject assignments are recorded in the 1946-1947 list of teachers.

After an interval of one year we were able to secure the services of a teacher of physical education who also coaches football and baseball. Mr. Harry A. Lehman, a graduate of Springfield College and a veteran, was elected to that position. Due to conditions which will be more specifically discussed by Mr. Keach in his report, our program of physical education is being progressively organized beginning with freshman and sophomores. It will be extended to other classes as soon as we can do so. If any one fact has been more forcibly demonstrated than another by our experience thus far it is the complete inadequacy of gymnasium facilities to serve high school, elementary school, and community groups successfully.

On January 22, 1946, a meeting was held at the Plymouth High School to afford business men and employers of our high school pupils an opportunity to discuss with school officials the thoroughness and completeness of training those pupils are getting. They were urged to express their opinions freely and fully and to make any suggestions they cared to for improvement. The meeting was not largely attended but several valuable suggestions were made. The program of work submitted to the Commission of Education for approval for the current year duly recognizes the points made at that meeting. It so happens that the greatest number of changes were made in commercial work where at least three new courses were added and junior business, previously an elective for freshmen, was made a required subject. Any school that hopes successively to meet the demands of a supporting public must be alert to the needs and requirements of that public. Friendly discussions between employers and educators are fruitful sources of understanding and increased cooperation for the more efficient training of our youth.

A comprehensive guidance program, which will be considered by Mr. Keach, is being organized to the end

that pupils may be more wisely advised and more effectively directed than we have been able to do heretofore. Here again progress cannot be hasty lest we defeat our own purpose. However, a good start has been made to provide another service to high school pupils.

An active Student Council is a means of promoting real school democracy as well as of developing a sense of responsibility. Such an organization is now functioning in our school. Spectacular results cannot be expected but steady and sound progress is being made. This is another agency in the preparation of boys and girls for the real business of living. The termination of school experience by graduation or otherwise cannot accomplish the miracle of worthy citizenship for which no effective training has been provided.

We do not expect youth to solve those problems that perplex maturity but we should constantly aim to help them assume responsibility as rapidly as they are able.

Poise, initiative, broader interests, and personality growth can all be developed through extra-curricular activities. Provision has been made for a wide choice among such offerings and one period each day has been set apart for activities. In this way every pupil has an opportunity to meet the school board requirement that pupils must have participated in at least one activity each year of their high school course to be eligible to receive a diploma. Since the above requirement became effective in September 1946 one activity will be required of those who graduate in 1947; two in 1948; three in 1949; four in 1950. The purpose of our activity program is preparation for living and for satisfactory use of leisure time.

As services and offerings have increased one fact has demanded recognition. There are limitations on teacher time and on space in which to operate. With our present staff and facilities further additions must be critically examined. Substitution or elimination must be considered together with further suggestions for change.

June graduations from Sargent School and the transfer of three other pupils to the New Grade School reduced membership for 1947-1948 to a number which made economical or profitable maintenance of that school impossible. The school was closed for the current school year and until such time as the number of pupils increases to the point where re-opening can be justified.

Our contract with the State Board of Education for the operation of the New Grade School by the Teachers College as a training school expires in 1949. Before a renewal of that contract is due for consideration, the people of Plymouth may be interested in a summary of the terms of the present agreement.

1. Plymouth provides the building with all necessary heat, light, water, janitor supplies, and janitor service.

2. Plymouth annually pays \$10,000.00 to the State Board of Education.

3. Plymouth agrees to permit the reasonable use of the school as a practice and observation school for college students.

4. Plymouth may enroll up to 400 pupils without paying additional tuition charges; any number over 400 must be paid for at the rate of \$25.00 for each pupil.

5. The State Board of Education provides all scholars' supplies and materials of instruction.

6. The State Board of Education employs all teachers, at least eight in number, and agrees to provide instruction that will fit pupils for entrance to a first-class high school.

7. The State Board of Education has sole control of the classification and promotion of scholars, courses of study, confirmation and rejection of teachers, and rules of discipline.

8. The State Board of Education has the right to assign student teachers who are completing their

last year in the Plymouth Teachers College to work under the direction of critic teachers.

The standards of preparation and experience set by the Teachers College are higher than could reasonably be set by the School Board for the employment of teachers. Although the contract calls for only eight teachers, there are nine regular teachers and a laboratory teacher who does testing and special remedial work with children needing extra help. In other words, the State Board of Education is providing twenty-five per cent more teaching service than stipulated by the contract.

The financial picture should also be of interest to the people of Plymouth. In return for an annual payment of \$10,000.00 Plymouth is receiving services from the Teachers College which represent total payments of \$24,142.00 for the current year. It can thus be appreciated that the current cost saving to Plymouth is \$14,142.00.

As previously stated, we probably could not demand the same amount of preparation and could not offer as high salaries as are possible for the Teachers College to pay but a conservative estimate is that local costs would immediately advance roughly \$12,000.00 without the contract. We should not overlook the fact, either, that great difficulty would be experienced in employing teachers for the large grades now enrolled if we were to offer lower salaries without benefit of whatever prestige may accrue from acting as critic teacher. The contract is decidedly favorable to Plymouth.

Specific Recommendations

The crowded condition in our elementary rooms clearly indicates that careful thought must be given to the acquisition of more classroom space if Plymouth children are to receive all the advantages to which they are entitled. When the building survey that is now being completed is placed in your hands it will carry definite proposals for the alleviation of overcrowding. Expansion cannot long be deferred.

You are asked to consider changing the present biology room on the first floor of the high school into

a combined sewing and cooking room for home economics classes. This change would release two small rooms on the third floor for equipment as class rooms.

Both chemistry and physics can be offered in a single laboratory in a school of our size. The recommendation is here made that one of the science laboratories now in use be equipped for double duty and the other made available for biology. Full time use of two more classrooms in the high school can thus be provided with no ill effects on instructional efficiency if the above changes are made.

The introduction of a vocational course in agriculture should be investigated. This suggestion is offered, not with the idea that it can be made in the immediate future, but in order that we may know all of the possibilities if later needs and conditions point to the advisability of that extension of high school offerings. In the area served by the Plymouth High School, where agriculture is a leading occupation, our next expansion may well be in that direction.

Throughout a period of change and increasing difficulty, Plymouth has been fortunate in the quality of teaching provided. People have been interested and helpful in their attitude toward public education. School board members have at all times been actuated by high and commendable motives and have given freely of their time and energy. These factors have made educational work in Plymouth a pleasant experience for which my sincere appreciation is now expressed.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my annual report as Headmaster of Plymouth High School.

This report will be in more detail than is usually necessary as changes have been made that parents and citizens should know about. Since visits to the high school are not as frequent as I should like, I am using this medium to let them know what we are doing and what we are planning to do in our efforts to have Plymouth High School best serve its community.

The change from elementary school to high school calls for considerable adjustment. The pupils are not alone in this adjustment; parents also are affected by the change. To assist the pupil in orientation we are planning to give each elementary group a day to visit high school. For example, if it is Campton Day the eighth grade pupils from Campton will be guests at the high school where each pupil will have a host or hostess to be with for the day. They will have the opportunity to visit classes and familiarize themselves with the building and teachers. In addition, they will have the opportunity to meet with a counselor for the purpose of choosing subjects to be taken during their Freshman year. This selection will be subject to the approval of their parents. We hope that Get-Acquainted-Day will be profitable to all concerned.

Latin III was not offered this year as there were no pupils who indicated a need for this subject. A beginning typing class that served to give pupils knowledge of typing for personal use was dropped because of lack of facilities. For the purpose of economy Algebra II is now alternated with Solid Geometry and Trigonometry. Another change was to teach Commercial Geography as a half year subject, as were Salesmanship and Business Organization.

The addition of another teacher in the Commercial Department would allow further improvement of

our offerings in this field and would also make possible some new offerings in other fields, as subjects now taught by Social Science teachers would then be taught by Commercial teachers. It would be possible to again offer typing for personal use, Salesmanship as a full year course, Commercial Law as a half unit course, Consumer Buying as a half unit course and Human Behavior as a half unit course. This addition to the teaching staff would also make it possible to offer a course in Group Guidance for Freshman. This course would be offered for the express purpose of giving incoming pupils a better opportunity to achieve high school success by teaching them how to study, how to plan their school day, how to plan their high school career based on vocational plans, and a discussion of teen-age problems. The subjects mentioned above would be of particular interest to the pupils not contemplating post-secondary education. This group constitutes the larger per cent of pupils attending high school.

The addition of physical education as a required subject for Freshmen and Sophomores this year gives deserved attention to building a sound body, a cardinal principle of education. The appointment of a school physician, who gives general examinations to all pupils, is another step toward promoting better health among the pupils in our schools. Lack of facilities prevented a complete physical education program for all pupils this year, however, it is hoped that adequate equipment can be obtained so that a full program can be offered to all pupils in the school next year.

The employment of a full time physical educator instructor this year made it possible to have a regular football schedule. At the close of the season Seventh and Eighth grade boys were given the opportunity to practice until weather conditions drove them indoors. It has also been possible to have intramural basketball in additions to the regularly scheduled games. It is our purpose to give more pupils the opportunity to become active participants in game situations. Varsity athletics provides opportunity to the few, physical education programs provide opportunity for many.

The Activity Program has been broadened this year to the extent that all pupils are participating in at least one co-curricula activity. Each activity is scheduled to meet twice a week during the last period of the day.

Participation in the activity program is required, however, there is a wide field from which to choose. The choices available this year are: football, basketball, baseball, school paper, newstaff, dramatics, chorus, dancing, cooking, cheer-leaders, sports managers, aeronautics, skiing, and Junior Red Cross. It is hoped that debating, public speaking, and auto driving can be added to the list next year.

The Activity Program provides a balance to the subject matter part of the educational program. It is education that can best be provided through a co-curricula program. Pupils are encouraged to help in the planning, leadership and fellowship qualities are developed, success which cannot be attained by some in subject matter fields may be attained in an activity. The program gives an opportunity for the large number of commuters to take part in school activities which would be impossible if the program was not included in the regular school day.

The Student Council is an activity to which a pupil is elected by his or her classmates. Each class is represented by its president and two elected members. The council is a medium for the student body to present ideas and suggestions that will help the administration to better meet the needs of the pupils. The council has discussed such items as the need for a special study hall for noon hour pupils use of the radio-victrola, athletic awards, use of the Activity Association Funds, pupil conduct at assemblies, school socials, and athletic events. Any pupil has the right to ask his class representative to make a suggestion or to appear before the council to present an idea or suggestion that is within the province of pupil responsibilities. Pupils will find it difficult to be good citizens unless they have the opportunity to practice citizenship. We are trying to give them that opportunity.

Educational and Vocational Guidance is an important service to our youth during their high school years. In addition to help in these fields there are many problems that have major significance to a boy or girl of high school age. We are trying to meet this need for help by having personal talks with each pupil at least once a year and following up cases that need more attention. For this purpose two teachers are using one period a day after mid-year for personal interviews with girls while the headmaster is using part of his time in talking with the boys. A great deal of planning and thought must be given by pupils and parents in choosing an educational program and making a vocational choice. Counselors cannot make the choices, however, they can point out trends, give the benefit of advice gained from experiences with other boys and girls, and give the benefit of information available to them from educational sources.

Teachers meetings have been held on the average of twice a month. These meetings are held with the view to discussing problems of the school and for professional advancement.

Because a school is, to a major extent, as strong as its teachers, their contributions and suggestions are solicited in these meetings and in individual conferences. Topics that have been discussed have included remedial programs, minimum requirements for acceptance of written work, grades and standards of achievement for college recommendation, the activity program, report cards, discussion of pupils and their problems, and teaching techniques. An example of teacher participation in making our school a better school is shown by the development of a remedial English program and minimum requirements for all written work in the school. A program developed by the teachers has the advantage of the thinking of all members of the staff.

The Activities Fund started last year is continued this year on a similar basis except that a double entry bookkeeping system has been inaugurated and the books are kept by a commercial teacher. All bills have the approval of the headmaster before payment is

made by check. Periodic reports are made to the superintendent and to the secretary of the School Board. Copies of these reports are on file in the Headmaster's office.

New report cards are being used this year which include in addition to the usual letter grading on achievement a report on the effort being made by the pupil. The activities are graded differently than subject matter, U indicates unsatisfactory accomplishment, S indicates satisfactory accomplishment while P indicates achievement with praise. An additional progress report is made to parents of pupils who are not doing satisfactory work at the mid-point of each marking period. These reports indicate areas in which deficiency occurs and makes suggestions for improvement. The reports are mailed to parents and a duplicate copy is placed in the pupil's individual file.

I believe that our attendance and tardy record is good. The cooperation of parents and pupils has materially aided in making this possible.

The changes indicated and the changes contemplated are with the view of making maximum use of facilities which includes both buildings and teaching staff. There is a limit to effective and economical use of facilities. Further increases in services may call for increase in facilities or discontinuing some of the present services.

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, Superintendent Rollins, the Citizens, Teachers, and pupils for their help and cooperation during the past year.

PLYMOUTH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL REPORT

To the School Board, Parents, and Citizens
of Plymouth:

This is the first annual report concerned primarily with the administrative and educational program of the Plymouth Elementary School. In submitting it, an attempt will be made (1) to describe briefly certain significant accomplishments of the past year, (2) to mention a few typical school activities and organizations and (3) to set forth some general practices in the democratic guidance of all children in the elementary building. Certain major problems confronting our educational program will also be stated here.

New Teachers

Five new teachers were added to the staff in September 1946:

Mrs. Lyman Batchelder, Kindergarten.

Mrs. Sam Clay, Grade 2 (New Class Group)

Mr. J. Kenneth Linaberry, Grade 5, replacing Mrs. Philip Tapply.

Mr. Albert Merrill, Grade 7, replacing Mr. Norton Bagley.

Mrs. Henry Vittum, Grade 2, replacing Mrs. Dorothy Guyotte.

Housing and Enrollment

Approximately three hundred and twenty-five children were enrolled on the opening day of school in September, 1946. Although this figure has now dropped to three hundred eighteen, the crowded condition of many classrooms still presents an acute problem. There were fifty pupils in Grade Two on the opening day. An immediate division of the group was necessary and an additional teacher was engaged.

Grades three, four, and six have averaged more than forty children for the entire school year. In

classrooms which will accommodate comfortably only twenty-five to thirty children, this crowded condition leaves no room to work with those creative activities which are a vital part of the educational experience of every child. Due to the initiative and ingenuity of teachers however, many worthwhile activities were planned and carried out.

Curriculum Activities

At all grade levels the study of the community occupies an important place in our elementary curriculum. Plymouth's early history, its present organization as a town, the most important industries, significant geographical factors and recreational facilities are a few of the topics selected for presentation to children at various age levels. Certain activities which result naturally from these topics are construction, creative dramatization, preparation of exhibits and the presentation of informal assembly programs. All have proved stimulating and worthwhile to the groups of children by whom they were chosen.

Since each activity in the school program is a natural outgrowth of the study of some subject in the curriculum, the pupils are encouraged to select only those in which they are most interested and from which they may gain valuable experiences and worthwhile information.

The Student Council

A student council composed of a president and other officers, a faculty advisor, and a representative from each grade, has been very helpful in securing democratic co-operation with regard to school safety patrols, building regulations and assembly programs.

On Armistice Day and again at Thanksgiving time, the student council organized for presentation to the school, two excellent and appropriate assembly programs. Each grade was given an opportunity to participate. Parents and friends of the school were invited to attend.

The Reading Laboratory

The remedial reading laboratory which was begun under the direction of the late Guy E. Speare, has served over forty children in the past three years, and is particularly designed for children with severe reading disabilities. One of the staff members who has had training in clinical procedures in reading difficulties is in charge of the laboratory. Children from grade four and above are most frequently referred for special work, since it is in these grades that the greatest difficulty with reading of content subjects becomes apparent. Each pupil is tested and his difficulties are analyzed before remedial work, suited to his grade level, is begun. Results as shown by the laboratory records are most encouraging.

Besides improvement in the grade level of reading, certain less tangible gains, such as increased self-confidence and a new interest in reading, offer the greatest of satisfactions to both child and teacher. Due to the crowded condition of the building this year the laboratory room had to be given over to the extra division of the second grade. The amount of remedial work and testing which can be done, is, therefore, considerably less.

The Noon Lunch Program

Through the initiative and interest of the local American Legion and Auxiliary Child Welfare Committees, in addition to the co-operation and financial support of several other organizations and individuals, a hot lunch supplement will be served to the children during the winter months. It will be suggested that twenty-five cents per child each week may be paid by those children who wish to share in the expense of this project.

The regular staff members with the assistance of the student teachers, supervise the lunch hour.

There are eighty-five pupils who either come by bus or who live too far from the school to go home for the noon meal. In order to provide temporary lunchroom space for so many children, the school

board this year authorized the building of seven folding tables ten feet long. These tables are set up each noon hour in the gymnasium and are removed at the end of the meal.

The Visual Aid Program

On one afternoon each week, educational films which are carefully chosen for their value in the curriculum, are shown to the children. They have proved especially helpful for the purpose of introducing or supplementing certain units of work at different grade levels.

Class trips to centers of educational interest also have a place in our program of visual aids.

Guidance

Although there is no special guidance counselor in our building, each classroom teacher works constantly toward the adjustment and development of the child at his own particular stage of growth. The report card which is issued every nine weeks contains a section which may call the attention of the parent to certain problems of adjustment, or which may suggest a conference with the teacher. Contact with the home through friendly visitation and school conference is also an integral part of our guidance program.

Major Problems Confronting the Educational Program

Most of the problems faced by the elementary school staff are the result of inadequate building facilities. More children are assigned to classrooms than the rooms were designed to accommodate. The pupil load carried by the teachers is too heavy in most grades. The emphasis in modern education is upon knowing pupils as individuals and upon adjusting school work to meet the needs of such individuals.

The teacher who does this has a full-sized job if he or she has a class of twenty-five pupils.

The demands upon the auditorium-gymnasium are such that the physical education work in Grades One through Six has had to be curtailed. There are no free gymnasium periods for essential physical education

classes in Grades Seven and Eight. It should be noted, though, that Saturday afternoon recreation periods, properly supervised and under the sponsorship of the school board, have assisted greatly in the recreational program for students in the upper elementary grades.

The playground space is totally inadequate for over three hundred children to share. This is creating a very difficult problem.

More shelf space is needed in the school library since books are being added constantly.

Satisfactory solutions to these major problems will not be easy to find, nor, in all probability can they be solved immediately. The statements set forth here are intended, however, to give a better understanding of the serious difficulties which confront us daily.

In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere appreciation, and that of the other teachers in our building, to the school board, parents, and friends of the community, who have shown interest and understanding toward the work of the elementary schools during the past year.

The Red Cross Chapter also helped to finance 17 dental cases.

On February 27, 1946, a patch-test Clinic was held for High School pupils, sponsored by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association. 172 children were skin-tested, of whom 19 showed positive reactions.

These children had chest X-rays.

Two Toxioid Clinics were held in May and June, 1946, at which 173 inoculations were given. These clinics were sponsored by the State Board of Health and the State Board of Education.

Milk was again served daily to those who wanted it.

The usual inspection was given in the Fall 1946, with the exception that Dr. McIver gave the physical

examinations at the High School. Following is the report of these examinations:
