

#### COUNTY CONVENTIONS.

EXTRACTS FROM THE GENERAL LAWS OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

The County Convention shall consist of the representatives of the towns of the county. They shall meet on the second Wednesday of the June session of the General Court, or other day in the same week, shall choose a chairman and clerk, and may adjourn as they see cause.

The County Convention shall appoint two auditors biennially, one each from the two leading political parties, for the two years next following, whose duty it shall be to examine the accounts of the County Commissioners and County

Treasurer, &c.

The County Commissioners shall furnish said Auditors all the aid and information required by them in the performance of their duties, and shall recommend to the county convention the sum necessary to be raised for the county for each of the two years ensuing, stating in detail the objects and purposes for which the money is to be appropriated and applied.

The County Convention for each county shall, during the session of the Legislature, raise or grant a county tax for its county for two years; but the tax for each year shall be voted separately for that year, and shall be collected for the

year in which it was voted.

The sheriff, the jailer, the physician, the clerk of the court, the solicitor, the treasurer, the county commissioners, and the superintendent of the county farm, of each county, shall make up their reports, separately, to May first, annually, and the same shall be printed together in pamphlet form, in said month of May, and said reports shall be distributed as

now provided by law.

The reports of the several officers named shall contain a summarized account of all their transactions which concern the county, for the current year ending as aforesaid, and the report of the superintendent of the county farm shall contain, in addition, a list of the paupers actually supported at the farm, and the number of weeks each was so supported; and also, a statement of the average cost per week for each pauper, with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculation was made.

# COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

To the Legislative County Convention:

In compliance with the laws of New Hampshire, the reports of the Commissioners, the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Physicians and Chaplain, Sheriff and Jailers, Solicitor, Clerk of the Supreme Court and Treasurer of Rockingham County, are herewith submitted.

The year closed, although somewhat eventful, has been in the main successful to the interests of the county. (\$29,100) Twenty-nine thousand one hundred dollars of the County bonds falling due the current year have been paid, and the county debt decreased (\$31,149.76) thirty-one thousand one hundred and forty-nine dollars and seventy-six cents.

The financial trouble which engulfed the late Treasurer was a source, at one time, to the Commissioners, of grave apprehension, and such measures were taken as were deemed prudent, looking to the safety of the county. Subsequently, however, some solution of his difficulties was effected by that officer, which enabled the entire amount found in his hands by the Auditors to be paid over to his successor.

Since the death of Superintendent Scott, in December, the management of the County Farm has been successfully conducted by Mrs. Scott up to this time when she retires with the sincere regrets of all connected with the institution or its management. The assistants in the several departments are to be commended for their fidelity, especially during the

protracted illness of the late Superintendent, as well as under the administration of Mrs. Scott, who had their entire respect.

Mr. and Mrs. Gayton O. Reynolds, of Derry, has been selected to succeed Mrs. Scott at the County Farm. They have come with the highest recommendations and we hope may prove equal to the trying and onerous duties of Superintendent and Matron of that institution.

The success of Miss A. S. Tucker, of Portsmouth, has fully warranted her continuance in the capacity of teacher. The children of suitable age are organized as a school a considerable portion of the year, and their progress is by no means discouraging, in view of nature's endowments.

Drs. Burnham and Spaulding have attended the sick and the insane, as for several years. Their ability no one questions. That quite a number of deaths occurred during the year cannot be a surprise, where so many persons come in the extremity of age and sickness.

Chaplain Ober has been unwearied in his attention, and services at the chapel have been held regularly.

Acknowledgments are due all who have contributed books, papers or flowers. Mrs. Albert L. Jones and Miss Lizzie Pearson, of Portsmouth, and Mr. Charles Burley, of Exeter, are among those who have been especially thoughtful in this regard.

## PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF ROCKINGHAM COUNTY:-

Gentlemen: The sanitary condition of the County Almshouse, House of Correction and Insane Asylum during the past year has been similar to that of the past cleven years. No epidemic has prevailed, and no diseases have been prevalent that could be attributed to imperfect ventilation, defective drainage, want of cleanliness or the use of improper food. The mortality, however, has been somewhat larger than formerly, occasioned undoubtedly by the many sudden climatic changes of the past winter, which predisposes to, and produces pulmonary affections, especially penumonia, a disease usually fatal to patients of advanced age.

By your request, all the inmates of the institution were vaccinated with pure bovine virus during the past winter, and in nearly every instance with success.

There are fifty-six confined in the Insane Asylum. Within a few months past several have been received from the asylum at Concord. They usually arrived in a state of great excitement, occasioned doubtless by their journey and the change in their surroundings. Decided improvement is invariably manifested within a few days after their arrival. It is the design of this department of the institution to ameliorate their condition and make them as comfortable as their unfortunate condition will admit.

We are grieved to record the death of our late Superintendent, H. L. Scott, Esq., who died of a nervous affection

induced or greatly aggravated by too close confinement and application to his duties here. It is with pleasure we note our appreciation of the services rendered by Mrs. Scott, a lady of keen perceptive faculties and rare executive ability. Under her judicious management, the buildings have been kept scrupulously clean, the dormitories of the aged and infirm neat and tidy.

There have been two births and twenty-nine deaths in the institution during the year:

John Edmunds died May 2, 1881, of apoplexy, aged 90 years; admitted Nov. 6, 1880; from Nottingham.

Frank F. Blaisdell, insane, died May 6, 1881, of Epilepsy, aged 28 years; admitted Jan. 6, 1876; from Candia.

Charles Ham, died June 6, 1881, of general debility, aged 63 years; admitted Sept. 28, 1869; from Portsmouth.

Patrick D. Hartnett, died June 10, 1881, of acute peritonitis; admitted Dec. 4, 1880; aged 66 years; from Exeter.

Hezekiah Ayer, insane, died June 12, 1881, of paralysis, aged 84 years; admitted June 9, 1881; from Hampstead.

Louisa Stevens, insane, died Aug. 3, 1881, of apoplexy, aged 75 years; admitted May 25, 1881; from Candia.

Furber Brown, died Aug. 23, 1881, of diarrhea, aged 79 years; admitted Nov. 18, 1880; from Epping.

William P. Brown, died Aug. 28, 1881, of consumption, aged 37 years; admitted Sept. 3, 1877; from Hampstead.

William Moran, insane, died Sept. 18, 1881, of typhoid fever, aged 70 years; admitted Sept. 3, 1881; from Portsmouth.

Thomas Ingalls, insane, died Sept. 20, 1881, of marasmus, aged 66 years; admitted June 10, 1879; from Atkinson.

Mary Davis, insane, died Sept. 23, 1881, of maniacal exhaustion, aged 39 years; admitted June 18, 1880; from Derry.

Percy Doty, died Sept. 29, 1881, of debility from uri-

nal disease, aged 50 years; admitted June 5, 1881; from Londonderry.

Mary E. Currier, insane, died Oct. 3, 1881, of epilepsy aged 39 years; admitted July 31, 1879: from East Kingston.

Blanche H. Allen, died Oct, 9, 1881, of malnutrition, aged 3 months; admitted July 8, 1881; born on farm.

Eliza Adams, insane, died Nov. 12, 1881, of paralysis, aged 65 years; admitted Nov. 15, 1880; from Derry.

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

TO THE HON. COMMISSIONERS OF ROCKINGHAM COUNTY:

Gentlemen:—During the year just closed the special labors of the Chaplaincy of the Rockingham County Farm at Brentwood have been conducted with undiminished attention and success. The health of the Institution has called for less special visitation at the couches of the sick; and the many removals of deceased inmates, have rendered less of funeral service necessary. Except on the occasion of the sickness and death of Mr. Superintendent Scott, and when prevalent epidemic was thought possibly to endanger the health of the people, the regular ministrations of the gospel have been held in the chapel. We have endeavored there to inculcate the fundamental lessons of religion with earnestness and Christlikeness of manner and spirit. Visiting friends have occasionally assisted, and opportunity has frequently been given to any among the inmates "to witness" their own experiences to the power and preciousness of the gospel faith. We have had the voluntary services of Mrs. Stephen Sleeper and Miss Nellie Veasey at the organ, and singers from the neighborhood. These chapel services are always anticpated by the inmates with delight, and are also largely attended by friends from outside. We cannot but feel that to many a weary, sad, wayward heart they have proved a means of enlightening and uplifting, and that some of the poor unfortunate victims of ignorance, lust and crime have been persuaded to turn resolutely away from

their own weak treacherous selves to "Him who was tempted in all points as we are, yet without sin," for divine light, help and salvation. It has been an unspeakable comfort to many to have the ministration of the word in the chapel, sympathy and prayer in their sick room and the assurance of immortal hope

"When death stills the heart's last emotion."

In such institutions as this there is always the greatest need, not of theology but of *heartology*, and here it can find abundant scope.

We still mourn the loss of Superintendent Scott, whose relations to us were always most cordial and helpful.

The striking contrasts of character and condition which this field affords is calculated to awaken responsibility, quicken dilligence and stimulate hope "if by any means we may save some." We have some extremely pitiable and hopeless cases brought here quickly to die, the last spark of manhood or womanhood burnt out with rum and lust, the last flicker of moral sense extinguished; and again, others bereft of every earthly tie and comfort, are feasting upon 'nidden manna," bearing with perfect patience all the good pleasure of the Father's will, rejoicing daily in the "great consolation," and falling asleep in Jesus at last.

We need, and hope to provide, something in the way of Sabbath school instruction for those who wish or may profit by it. And we shall give more direct attention to temperance work.

An important feature of our work here is to obtain and circulate helpful moral reading. Some Sunday schools in the neighborhood have given many volumes of second-hand books. Something of the better class of magazines and periodicals are needed. We have also special need of temperance literature. We acknowledge the generous gifts from some art publishing houses. The silent lesson of a picture card, wood cut, or chromo, is the only one we can give to those who have never learned to read.

As Superintending school committee a pure sense of pleasure and pride leads us to say of the County Farm school, under Miss Tucker, that in the direction of mental culture nothing better could be desired. With such a class of children, extreme patience, kindness and every virtue needs constant and sometimes heroic exercise. And we are confident that under the administration of the new Superintendent all the moral and humane interests here will be greatly encouraged and faithfully secured.

At the time I made my last report, one year since, there were in the Portsmouth Jail 14 inmates; since that time, and up to the date hereof, there have been 84 admitted, and now in Jail 8. The court expenses this year amount to \$1284.39, against \$2661.55 for last year. The expenses of the April term of this year are not included in this year's report, inasmuch as the bills were not audited in time. In round numbers the April term, 1882, expenses were \$790, which would have made the total court expenses for this year \$2074.39—a reduction from last year of nearly \$600.

The jail expenses have increased, owing to the large number of prisoners committed to the Exeter Jail this year, as compared with last year, viz.: 28 last year, and 79 this year, an increase of nearly \$700 for board and clothing.

At the Portsmouth Jail the number of committals were slightly more than the previous year, and the increase in board and clothing nearly \$200; while needed additional repairs to the amount of about \$400 have been made to the buildings at Portsmouth by the Commissioners.

Reading matter has been thoughtfully and generously contributed to the Portsmouth Jail by Alfred Haven, Esq. (every Sunday), E. P. Kimball, Esq., Hon. Wm. H. Sise, Miss Lizzie Pearson, Mrs. Albert Jones, Judge Charles Batchelder, ex-Judge Calvin Page, Miss Alice Lee, Boston, Mrs. John T. French, Andrew J. Penhallow, Rev. Alfred Elwyn, Hon. J. S. H. Frink, Col. W. H. Hackett.

I incorporate in this the report of Dr. J. F. Hall, also that of the Deputy Jailer at Exeter.

#### PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

It becomes my duty to report the condition of the Rockingham County Jail in Portsmonth for the past year. The average inmates for the year, I judge, has been between fifteen and twenty prisoners. There has been no malignant epidemic or long continued sickness, but considerable sickness of brief duration. No deaths have occurred during the year. The same cleanliness enforced, of both apartments and inmates; the same good discipline and judicious feeding that has characterized the management of the institution for the last few years has been observed, and contributed largely to the good sanitary results obtained. Having good opportunities for judging, it gives me pleasure to commend the management of the institution.
