## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways in addition to the amount required by law.
4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Library.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Cemeteries.
7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of the Common.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to secure from the State \$2,000.00 for permanent road from Rumney Village to Stinson Lake.
9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
10. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying a new snow plow and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$7,300.00 to secure \$20,000.00 from the state and \$7,700.00 from the Federal Government to build a new bridge over Baker's River between Rumney Village and Rumney Depot.

12. To see what action the town will take in regard to making repairs on the covered bridges over Baker's River and raise and appropriate money for the same.

13. To see if the town will vote to allow 2% discount on all taxes paid before July first.

14. To see if the town will vote to have the inventory blanks distributed at the time of taking appraisal of property.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the benefit of the Emily Balch, Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hospital.

17. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Chapter 99, Section 22, Laws of 1933.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board and Citizens of the Rumney School District:

I hereby present my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Since my last report Doris Rowell was transferred in September from Quincy to Mont View on account of the illness of Beatrice Putney. The Board was fortunate in securing Lela C. Munson of Rumney, a teacher of wide and successful experience, to continue the work at Quincy. For sometime the policy of the supervision has been to stress the fundamentals of Arithmetic and these having reached a reasonable expectancy, attention is now being directed to written English, punctuation, penmanship and spelling. Music is being continued and fire drills insisted on.

The attendance of the district for last year is highly commendable. Not only did the district as a whole exceed the percentage for the state, but every school in the district did likewise. Stinson Lake had a percentage infrequently reached in the experience of the writer.

During the summer the inside walls of the Village School were cleaned and Mont View painted on the inside. Quincy was painted on the inside this winter. Stinson Lake will have water in the school this spring. Fence has been purchased to partially enclose the Quincy school yard.

The Grange prizes are now available for every school in the district. Miss Beatrice Warren of Plymouth, kindly gave an organ to the Village School.

These gifts are gratefully acknowledged and are in line with a splendid trend of people elsewhere giving to public as well as private schools. The Depot Parent Teachers Association made a long needed ce-



ment walk at the Depot School. During last May a number of trees were set out under the auspices of the Association and Henry W. Herbert, oldest citizen of the district, gave an interesting and instructive talk on trees in the district.

Owing to leaving town, Frances H. Eastman resigned from the School Board. Mrs. Eastman was a splendid member, very much interested in the schools and a tireless worker for their good. Mrs. Zena B. Jaquith was appointed to fill out the vacancy. The district is fortunate in having a citizen of her experience and judgment to continue the work.
