STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday the ninth day of March next, ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To elect a town clerk, one selectman for a term of three years, town treasurer, collector of taxes, three constables, highway agent, three overseers of the poor and all other town officials for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the expense of the general government, for the protection of persons and property, for health and sanitation, for highways and bridges, for the support of the town poor and all other necessary expenditures for the year ensuing.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on anticipation of taxes, and to renew and refund town notes.
- Article 4. Upon petition of Irving N. Perkins and nine others. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the Seabrook Municipal Court, and the same to take effect upon the passing of this article.
- Article 5. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of forty (\$40.00) dollars for the observance of Memorial Day.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

- Article 8. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for material and expense for projects that may be allotted to the town.
- Article 9. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to defray the expense of collecting garbage from the residents of Seabrook Beach, the same to be left in the hands of the Selectmen.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to empower the Selectmen to sell the gravel pit and land at the Point at the highest price available.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fourteen hundred twenty eight (\$1,428.00) dollars for State Aid construction the State to contribute twenty eight hundred fifty six (\$2,856.00) dollars to total forty two hundred eighty four \$(4,284.00) dollars, the same to be expended on the Folly Mill Road.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred seventy nine dollars and ninety six cents (\$179.96) the State to contribute seven hundred nineteen dollars and eighty three cents (\$719.83) total eight hundred ninety nine dollars and seventy nine cents (899.79) for Class V assistance.
- Article 13. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the overdrafts for 1936.
- Article 14. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$78.49.
- Article 15. Upon petition of Frank E. Jones and eleven others. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred (\$300.00) dollars, to be used on the lower part of Farm Lane Road so called.
- Article 16. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to sell at public auction any or all of the properties now owned by the town by virtue of deeds from tax collectors.

Article 17. To see what action the town will take in regard to the protection of our clam flats, and clams.

Article 18. To hear the report of the Budget Committee on the conditions found in the town accounts, also as to the advisability of a general audit and to take any action thereon, also to raise the necessary sums of money to defray expenses of same.

Article 19. To see what action the town will take upon the following question. To wit. Is it expedient to revise the constitution.

Article 20. To transact all other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of Seabrook:

I herewith submit to you my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools:

The figures in this report cover the school year from September 1, 1935 to June 30, 1936—the last complete school year. There is also a supplementary report giving the pupil enrollment for the fall term of 1936 and the district payments for the current school year to January 30, 1937. These supplementary figures will also be included in next year's report. This double reporting is done simply to inform the people of the condition of the district at the present time.

It is a great satisfaction to report to you and the school district that the crowded condition of your schools has been relieved by the new addition to the South School. Not only has this done away with an unsatisfactory condition but it has given to a number of our pupils one of the best school rooms in New Hampshire. It is ample in size. The lighting is according to the best architectural laws. The finish is attractive. The warm cloak room and the supply shelves placed behind sliding doors are the most modern in principle. The spreading of the pupils of the South School among five teachers will result in more individual attention on the part of each teacher to each pupil.

In building the addition Seabrook did not make the mistake of many towns in that it looked forward to the future as well as the immediate present. While we speak of our extra room a second room was also built and is ready for the installation of seats and desks when the need is apparent. Also mention must be made of the fact that two of the old rooms were completely rebuilt including increasing and rearranging the windows and seats. Thus we really have four modern rooms.

Another important improvement has been the installing of electric lights in all the schools of Seabrook which have not before had the benefit of these. While this will add somewhat to the expenditure, good eyesight can easily be spoiled by eye strain.

The people of Seabrook intend that their children shall have all the advantages that can be given them. This is proven by the vote at the last district meeting for enlarging the South School. They are, however, limited in their resources and are, therefore, at a disadvantage when compared with other towns. This disadvantage is partly counterbalanced by the money that the State Board of Education allots to the district each year. This amount has been the maximum allowed by law-\$6000 yearly for the past six years. Even with this help, your school board has been economical to such an extent that the actual cost of your schools on a per pupil basis has been, and still is, the lowest in the state. Tables furnished by the State Board of Education place the median per pupil cost for elementary. schools in the state, for the year 1935-1936 at \$77.93. The cost in Seabrook during that year was \$44.66. Since State Aid amounted to \$6000 and the elementary enrollment was 333, the actual per pupil cost to the town was \$26.65. This cost was, however, too low for efficient schooling. The crowding had to be removed and the people of Seabrook built the extra room.

It is interesting to note that the average number of pupils per teacher in the state of New Hampshire for the year 1935-36 was twenty-six for village elementary schools. This is the type of school which Seabrook's unique system of grade distribution approximates. In Seabrook the average number of pupils per teacher is now thirty-one.

In a further attempt to improve school efficiency we have improved our text books, for, next to good teachers, good text books are most essential. It will be noticed that we spent \$406.86 for books last year. This is \$1.22 a pupil. This is the largest amount so spent for a number of years. We believe it money well invested.

As an economy measure the school board did not employ a supervisor of music this year. This is a loss to which our children should not be subjected. Let me recommend that, if it is at all possible, a supervisor be employed next year. While it will, of course, entail extra cost, it seems that it would be a wise investment. Our children like to sing, they want to sing, and they can sing. Let's give them the opportunity.

During the current year absences have been too frequent. The school programs are arranged so that all pupils should be present every day in order to make satisfactory progress. Every day's absence means so much opportunity lost. Too many absences make promotion doubtful.

Much credit is to be given your school nurse, Mrs. Dorothy Lindsey, for her work on behalf of your children. During the illnesses of the winter months she has given unsparingly of her own time and expense to prevent the spread of contagious disease. I bespeak for her the complete cooperation of parents in her efforts to safeguard the physical welfare of the pupils in our schools.

It is an example of excellence of the school opportunity offered to the children of Seabrook that three of our graduates of last June are on the Honor Roll for Amesbury High School during the first semester of this year. These three pupils, Florence Dobson, Earlene Eaton and Gertrude Eaton, were consistently faithful pupils while in our local schools.

May I express my thanks to the school board for continued help and guidance in the duties of my office. Such help must result in more effective work through the entire system.

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Report of School Nurse For Year 1936 Ending March 1937

The annual report of the school physical examinations conducted by Dr. Coleman, assisted by School Nurse is as follows:

Underweight children, 10 percent, 80; corrected, 35.
Defective vision, 1; corrected, 4.
Defective hearing, 39; corrected, none.
Anaemia, 2; corrected, none.
Nervous condition, 4; corrected, none.
Pulmonary Disease, 1; corrected, 1.
Defective teeth, 51; corrected, 72.
Diseased tonsils, 56; corrected, 8.
Adenoids, 11; corrected, 8.
Enlarged glands, 10; corrected, 3.
Defective speech, 1; corrected, none.
Unvaccinated, 116.

During the winter of 1936 we had the following cases of communicable diseases: chicken pox, 4; scarlet fever, 2; measles, 125; mumps, 1.

There are still a number of children who are not vaccinated. Every child should be vaccinated as a safeguard against small pox.

A Dental clinic was held at Hampton at the office of Dr. Hanrahan. Each child was examined at school by the dentist and an estimate of the cost of work to be done given to the parent. These children were transported to Hampton by the nurse. Sixty-seven children were treated at the clinic. Another clinic has been planned for this year.

Mr. Irving Marston has been very kind and helpful to me in my work.

The nurse visits Seabrook schools two days weekly and tries to visit each school. Sometimes this is not possible, owing to the amount of work to be done in the different school districts. Children are examined by the nurse, classroom talks given, the weights of the children recorded, and visits are made to homes when a child is absent for sickness.

During the past few months we have been unfortunate to have had scarlet fever in some of our schools. Schools were fumigated thoroughly and all children directly exposed were excluded from school for the exposure period.

A Toxoid clinic is to be held this Spring for prevention of diphtheria and it is to be hoped that all children will be inoculated.

In closing this report may I thank the School Board, Superintendent, teachers and parents for the cooperation and valuable assistance they have given me in my work.
