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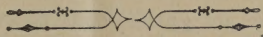

CONCORD, JUNE SESSION, 1889.

*To S. F. Rossiter, A. S. Bartholomew and H. N. Hayward,
County Commissioners of Sullivan County. The following
copy of the record of the proceedings of the Sullivan County
Convention, at the first meeting in June, 1889, is submitted
as by law prescribed:*

CONCORD, June 12, 1889.

At a meeting of the Sullivan County Convention, at Room No. 4, State House, Concord, in accordance with the provision of Sec. 4, Chap. 23, General Laws, on the second Wednesday of June, 1889.

The Convention was called to order by Hermon Holt of Claremont. On motion of Mr. Farnum of Plainfield, Hermon Holt of Claremont, was chosen chairman of the Convention. On motion of Mr. Whipple of Claremont, Fred W. Cheney of Newport, was chosen clerk: *Sworn.*

The County Commissioners submitted the following recommendations:

REPORT.

The Commissioners of the County of Sullivan, having examined into the financial affairs of said County, respectfully represent to the County Convention, to be holden at Concord, on the second Wednesday of June, 1889, that it will be necessary to raise the sum of twenty-eight thousand three hundred and fifty dollars (\$28,350.00), for the current expenses of said County, for each of the following two years, 1890 and 1891, as follows:

To the People of Sullivan County :

In compliance with law and custom, we submit our Report for the year ending April 30, 1890.

COUNTY FARM AND ALMS HOUSE.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin A. Herrick having satisfactorily performed the duties of Superintendent and Matron for the last five years, are retained the coming year at a salary of seven hundred dollars. The State Board of Commission of Lunacy relieved the institution somewhat last autumn, by taking six of its inmates to the New Hampshire Asylum of Insane to be supported at the expense of the State. The number supported at the farm for the year past, averages sixty-seven, and there are ample accommodations for fifteen or twenty more and we are of opinion that there are many poor persons in the county (receiving partial support away) who would be much better cared for at the farm but cannot be induced to go. Some improvements of a sanitary character have been made at a reasonable expense which we hope will prove beneficial.

FINANCIAL CONDITION.

It will be seen by the Treasurer's Report that the disbursements are increasing from year to year, and we see no way to reduce them while the county continues to support her poor, maintain her courts, pay her officers, insure her property, and repair her damaged records.

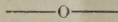

The legal status of the somewhat notorious cases of State vs. Emma T. Cornish and J. F. Lewis, for bringing a pauper from the State of Massachusetts and leaving the same in the town of Claremont, we understand to be as follows: the suit vs. Mrs. Cornish was tried at the September Term and a verdict obtained for the plaintiff—the defendant carried up the case on exceptions to the full bench. Some questions arose as to jurisdiction in the suit vs. Lewis, which was submitted to the full bench and the case rested until the questions should be answered. The Law Term of Supreme Court for Sullivan county commences Tuesday, June 3d, 1890, and it is more than probable that answers to all the questions in both suits will be made before the September Term of Court.

Physician's Report.

During the past year there has been the usual amount of sickness at the County Farm, but corresponding to the unusually large mortality throughout this section of the country the number of deaths has been larger than several years past. Many of the deceased had passed the allotted three score and ten years, while others had become prematurely old through previous hardship and exposure. The oldest was 82 and the youngest 7 years of age, the latter dying from consumption.

There has been no birth, no severe accident, and no parasitic disorder, which latter is prone to appear where many are dwelling under the same roof. This fact is indicative of the cleanliness and general sanitary condition of the buildings.

The epidemic of La Grippe did not favor the institution with a visit, which, had it appeared among the aged and infirm would have caused a mortality unprecedented.

Scarlet Fever in a mild form appeared this Spring among the children, who are recovering with no unfavorable sequelæ. At present, the institution is free from sickness.

The facilities for treating the sick are not of the best, for no room can be separated from the noise and other disagreeable features of the main buildings, and its help is only such as the institution affords.

The importance of cleanliness, pure air and proper diet, has been recognized and all means to this end employed. The care and consideration shown by the Superintendent's family towards the sick and unfortunate have been highly commendable.

Chaplain's Report.

Thirty-five religious services have been held by me at the County House, during the year ending May 1st, 1890. Of these, eleven were funerals, one of which was held at the regular time for worship. No appointments have been missed during the year.

The inmates of the institution, so far as they could, as a rule, have attended the exercises and have given excellent attention. The singing has been especially appreciated. The people of West Unity have also usually been present and some of them have greatly assisted in the service of song. Two praise and sacred concert services have been held. For a portion of the time during the last six months, Mrs. Etta

Tebo loaned the use of an excellent cabinet organ, and has given her services as organist. We would respectfully recommend that either the County, or some of our kindly disposed citizens, furnish a good organ for use at the religious meetings in the institution. It is needed; it would be appreciated.

So far as I could I have visited the sick and have tried to minister consolation to the dying. We should rejoice that we live in a land where even to the poor, the gospel of Christ is preached. As in other similar establishments, so also are here found some peculiar, some wicked and some very ignorant persons, while a few combine two and even all three of these characteristics. I would therefore, advise that those of the children, who must of necessity considerably associate with such persons, be removed to the New Hampshire Orphans' Home at Franklin, or to some other place equally good.

The Superintendent with his family and assistants, to the best of my knowledge, are doing everything that is reasonably possible for the wants and comfort of the unfortunate people under their care. The sick testify to their kindness. They take especial interest in the children, for which we should be glad, as some of the older ones have already wasted their lives, at least for this world; but the children, we hope will be led by the kind influences thrown around them, to grow up to become good men and good women. "Even so it is not the will of your Father, which is in heaven, that one of these little ones should perish."

The Superintendent with his associates have also encouraged and assisted the Chaplain in the performance of his peculiar duties, for which they have my thanks. In closing this report I ought to call attention to the fact that the closing of the saloons would probably necessitate the closing of our county house. "The drunkard shall come to poverty."
