

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, and all other town officers.
- Article 2. To see what action the town will take upon the budget submitted by the budget committee.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following town charges for the ensuing year:
 - a. Town officers' salaries.
 - b. Town officers' expenses.
 - c. Election and registration.
 - d. Town hall and other buildings.
 - e. Parks and playgrounds.
 - f. Legal fees and vital statistics.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for snow removal and sanding.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for oiling and general maintenance of highways and bridges.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction and maintenance of Class 5 roads, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$304.28 for same to which the State will contribute \$2,028.51, if appropriated.

- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to close the road leading from the Ristinma farm to the Marlboro line subject to gates or bars.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$180.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.
- Article 9. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to sell or remove and store the town scales, which are on Boston & Maine Railroad land for which the town pays \$6.00 per year rent.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of painting the interior of the Town Hall.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the installation and maintenance of four additional street lights on North Main Street.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for street lighting.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor and old age assistance.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes, excepting poll taxes, paid on or before dates designated at this meeting.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.

- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the police department.
- Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the water system.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to pay water bonds at maturity, and \$1,935.00 interest.
- Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the employment of a district nurse.
- Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 toward the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.
- Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of the town dump.
- Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of shade trees.
- Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.
- Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the continuation of the War Memorial Program.
- Article 26. To see if the town will accept from the Troy Blanket Mills the use, for the current year, of the so-called Sand Dam lot for recreational purposes under the sole supervision of the War Memorial Program. It is understood that the water level cannot be guaranteed but will be kept up as well as possible after meeting the mill requirements.
- Article 27. To see if the town will vote to allow the American Legion the use of the Town Hall one night each month without charge.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the public library.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$179.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay town charges.

Article 32. To hear the reports of agents, officers, or committees heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

WAR MEMORIAL RECREATION PROGRAM REPORT

Another season has been completed with many new additions and accomplishments.

Thanks to Mr. Russell McLaughlin, Troy now has two New Hampshire State swimming champions. Mr. Ralph Staples added an Arts and Crafts and Nature program which gave several Troy children an opportunity to do things which would not have been available to them in any other way.

Additions to the Sand Dam equipment were 1 canoe and 2 row boats. These fit well into the water safety program.

The Sand Dam property itself had a tremendous face lifting. A gift of \$200.00 from Mr. Henry Lloyd, a summer resident was matched by gifts from local town folks and organizations. For this \$400.00 the C. V. Rossi Construction company put in 45 hours with a large bulldozer and pan but was not able to finish the new ballfield. Mr. Felix Tommilla finished the ballfield with his light equipment and trucks. His bill of \$338.00 was paid by Dr. Samuel Paul. Mr. Lloyd then made a further offer to pay for a backstop if the labor was donated. Heavy gauge playground fence material was erected on creosoted telephone poles. The poles were gifts from Mr. Roy Hale from the Aldrich farm and the Derry Electric Company. Mr. Lloyd made good his promise and footed the bill for \$217.50 for the fence material.

Many people donated time and trucks for raking the new ballfield and spreading grass seed and hay for mulching. The boys of the 7th and 8th grades should be specially mentioned for their work in collecting and spreading six truck loads of hay.

The War Memorial Program Committee has been discussing various ways and means of improving the program. Any suggestions from any of the townspeople would be welcomed.

WAR MEMORIAL SUMMER PROGRAM TOWN REPORT

The War Memorial summer program, once again, has had a very successful season. Reliable figures show that this program has provided recreation for some 4,000 people during its eight week existence. This figure is based on 100 people a day for 40 days. It also includes people who visited the area every day and different **does not** mean 4,000 people. It should be noted here that many parents took advantage of this area and were very welcome. There were also inquiries concerning adult swimming classes.

For seven weeks, every Tuesday we were visited by the children of Marlboro. A bus load of some fifty children would come, with lunch in hand, and spend the day participating in healthful outdoor activities with the children of Troy. These children conducted themselves as ladies and gentlemen and we highly recommend that they be invited to our area this coming year.

A new innovation was added to our swimming program in the form of an effective swimming team. This team, composed of Gwendolyn Hurst, Harold Johnson, Bobby and Raymond Carlson, journeyed to the Rock Rimmon Pool in Manchester and proceeded to walk away with many honors. All four qualified to participate in the final events by eliminating some of the states best swimmers. When the final tally was added, we realized our team stood at the top. Bobby Carlson took second place in the ten to fourteen year old class and Harold Johnson placed second in the men's backstroke. This type of teamwork should be encouraged as it contributes worth while experience to those participating and adds incentive to others.

A program of leather work, metal craft, and other craft work was started this summer at the Scout Club-house. This proved to be very popular and should be carried out again next summer.

A start on a Nature Museum was made with the children collecting, labeling, and displaying the specimens. This was

very worthwhile as it gave the children further ideas of the world around them.

We had a program of basketball, softball, baseball, and volleyball. Our baseball team played in Marlboro and in Keene. At the playground other organized games were used to take care of all the children.

The special events held this summer were as follows: an all day track and field day, with over one hundred children participating; a trip up Mount Monadnock with twenty-five children; and a bicycle rodeo which was held on July 25, 1952. The purpose of this rodeo was to promote bicycle safety. Prizes and trophies were given to those worthy. The bicycle rodeo should be continued in future years.

Special thanks should be given to Mr. Clinton Royea for the use of his bus by the baseball teams.

The children of Troy and the staff of this program thank Dr. Paul for the opportunities and guidance that he has rendered in their behalf.

The staff wishes to thank all those who helped make this program a success. It would be impossible to mention the many good people who contributed their time and services to this program.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Troy qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March 1953, at 11:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be

received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the payment of tuition and transportation for grades 10, 11, 12 at Keene High School.
- To see what sum of money, not to exceed 8% of the assessed valuation of the district, the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of constructing and equipping an addition to the present school building; said addition to consist of classrooms, a gymnasium-auditorium, a kitchen, and other facilities, and for necessary alterations to the present building and for necessary architect fees, and for this purpose to authorize the school board to issue and sell notes or bonds in the name of, and on the credit of, the district; under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds statute as amended, and of Chapter 5 of the law of 1951 of New Hampshire or amendments thereof, and to see if the district will vote to delegate to the school board authority to fix the time and place of payment of the principal and interest of said bonds or notes, and the interest thereon, and the principal amount of each bond or note, and to sell the bonds or notes, and to take such action with respect thereto as may be necessary and advisable.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to build an addition to the present Troy school building consisting of classrooms, a gymnasium-auditorium, kitchen and service rooms, and to make necessary alterations and to provide equipment and to take any other necessary action thereto.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to re-appoint the building committee of last year to work as an advisory committee to the school board in the construction and equipping of a school addition and to authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary in connection with the construction, remodeling and renovation of the said school, or take any other action related thereto.

- 14. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand seven hundred dollars (\$3,700) for the purchase of necessary equipment for the new addition.
- 15. To see what action the district wishes to take upon the offer of the following property as a gift to the school district: as follows:

Beginning at the iron pin on the Northeastern corner of the lot on South Main St. known as the Ripley Memorial and belonging to the Troy School District, proceeding northerly along South Main Street a distance of about 58 feet to the land of F. J. Cumings Estate, thence Westerly along this boundary a distance of 190 feet, thence in a Southerly direction to the land of Miss Belle Spooner, then Easterly along this boundary a distance of 190 feet to South Main Street, then Northerly along South Main St. a distance of about 100 feet to an iron pin on the Southeast corner of the aforesaid lot, together with a two story shed attached to the Ripley Memorial Building, and a detached two car garage. The total land area of the above is approximately 33,240 square feet, and the above building floor area approximately 1930 square feet. The above being offered by George K. Ripley and Margurite G. Ripley.

- 16. To see what action the district wishes to take regarding the use or sale of the Ripley Homestead property.
- 17. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the district, benefits of title 2 of the Federal Social Security Act (Old age and survival insurance) as authorized by chapter 234 of the laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the necessary sums of money to defray the school districts share of the costs thereof.
- 18. To see if the school district will vote to adopt the provisions of chapter 34, sections 112 to 120 of the revised laws, namely the non-partisan ballot system for the election of all officers of the school district which have been customarily elected by ballot at previous meetings, the article if adopted to become effective at the annual meeting of 1954.
- 19. To take up any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE TROY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my second report as principal of the Troy High School.

In presenting this report I wish to stress the major activities in our program which are new and have proven of value in providing a fuller and more interesting year for the pupils of Troy.

Relatively few changes were made in the teaching staff during the past year. Mr. Elmer Pierce retired as Shop teacher and was replaced by Mr. Leonard Littlefield. Mr. Gordon Decato and Mr. Russell McLaughlin joined the Junior High faculty. The stability of the teaching staff is a healthy condition for it enables us to pursue some long range planning and programing.

The High School faculty has been meeting regularly to discuss problems concerning the program and much work has been done in the field of group and individual guidance. Some other important developments arising from these meetings have been a well integrated film program, a club program reaching all of the pupils through one of the following clubs: Science Club, Knitting Club, Crafts Club, Photography Club, or Chorus. The annual Halloween Festival, a greater success than last year, depended largely upon the cooperation and effort of the teaching staff.

The Student Council resumed its place in the program this year and the calendar of school activities was completed during the early part of the year to the satisfaction of all classes. The council has joined the State and National Associations of Student Councils and last fall took an active part in the statewide meeting. The group recently discussed and debated methods of providing better assembly programs and a fuller activity

program and offered a Student Activity Association plan to the student body who accepted it with over a two thirds majority vote.

I am particularly proud of our War Bond Savings Program which has been exceptionally successful. This program was suggested by Mrs. Harvey Gaseau as a good activity to provide much practical experience for her Junior Business classes. Under her able guidance, the sale of Savings Stamps each Friday has become an ideal savings plan.

We have been working towards a special reading program for the small number of pupils who need the extra help in this all important subject and this fall a regular program called Special Reading was introduced. The services of a special reading supervisor are shared with Marlboro and already there is ample evidence to predict that this will become a permanent part of our program.

We are experiencing our second year under the two shift program. I am glad to report that the Junior High program is operating exceptionally well under the circumstances due mainly to the fine teaching and guidance of Mr. Decato and Mr. McLaughlin. They will be the first to admit, however, that this arrangement is by far from a fair treatment for our children. Mr. Decato voluntarily offered to work mornings with physical education for the group and this has helped their morale considerably. Also providing a great deal to the program has been the time and energy donated by Mr. Charles McGinness for dancing instruction. He has come into the school faithfully each Friday afternoon offering instruction in the waltz, foxtrot, and square dancing.

During the past year I have had the privilege and pleasure of attending all of the School Board meetings and have watched, and sometimes helped, a hard working board and superintendent seek the answers to our local problems. Not only have their problems been multiplied by our crowded conditions, but they have also been burdened with developing a proposal which will eliminate the plight we are in. I have come to know the problems better and I have come to know the pupils better and

I am convinced more than ever that we are constricting beyond repair the potential of our community.

ATHLETICS

We are restricted by space and lack of proper facilities here at Troy but never-the-less our interscholastic athletic program does provide a great deal for our pupils. We have our winter program which consists entirely of basketball. We use the Town Hall for our practice and for most of our home games. Of the seventy high school pupils enrolled this year we have approximately half participating in our basketball program; this includes six cheer leaders who have done a fine job this year. I believe a program of this nature provides much more for the pupils than just a chance to demonstrate skill with a ball. It is providing them with an organized daily activity which they enjoy, for there are daily practice sessions for both boys and girls. We cannot overlook the proven fact that a strong and healthy body does much to insure a strong and healthy mind. Providing activities which pupils enjoy does much to help the regular class room atmosphere of learning.

We play a total of 18 basketball games playing on a home and home basis with other schools of our same size. Because half of our games are played at other schools it provides an excellent chance for interchange of ideas and the making of many friendships between schools.

In the spring we have baseball for the boys and softball for the girls and play games with the schools we played in basketball with the exception of a few. Again the major importance is not in the playing and winning of games but in the daily experiences of physical exercise and cooperative activity.

We are reaching about 50% of our school population with our present program but because a person has the athletic ability it should not mean that he is the one to receive the benefits of our program, whereas a person with a lesser ability has no form of physical education. We are neglecting those who probably could benefit most for we lack the facilities for a regular physical education program. During the summer months the War Memorial Program does a fine job in this area but we need badly an improved school program.

ELEMENTARY REPORT

In the primary grades (1-3) the main objective is that of developing basic reading skills. Classes are divided into groups, allowing each child to work at the group level which best meets his needs. Much work is done in phonics and this proves of much value in silent reading.

In the second grade, building a vocabulary and reading for comprehension is a continous task throughout the year. Reading is worked into every subject from arithmetic through the social studies. The school board and superintendent have been very cooperative in supplying our needs.

Grades one and two were pleasantly surprised upon returning to school after the Christmas Vacation, to find the old desks and chairs removed and new furniture in their place. Being of the movable type the new chairs and desks allow much more activity in the rooms.

We are using the Kittle Series for our writing in the elementary grades. This system uses the manuscript writing until the middle of grade three when the change is made to cursive (long hand).

When school opened in the fall, the State Library Bookmobile service was introduced in the grades. The bookmobile visits the school every two months leaving about twenty five books per grade. The books are of a variety of choices which the teachers and pupils choose as supplementary reading material. The teachers feel that this has boosted the interest in reading and furnishes much added information to the pupils.

A School Patrol has been established this year to provide self government for the pupils during their recess and noon hour activity periods. This program under the direction of Mrs. Catherine Glenday is doing much to provide pupils with responsibilities as well as insure orderly conduct.

We have used many fine films from the University of New Hampshire Film Library which have helped make our social studies program more interesting. We regret that room isn't available to show films to everyone at one sitting for much time is wasted when we have to show a film several times. We need an auditorium very badly.

ART REPORT

The elementary grades are gaining confidence in their own individual creative powers. They are enjoying experiences, supervised but not commanded, that they might not have in a lesser situation. The sixth grade, for instance, has been intensely interested and active working this year with sheet aluminum, paper sculpture, charcoal drawing, watercolor painting, and some very good linoleum block printing. The expressed needs of the teachers in other grades, and also the requests of the children themselves direct the trend of art teaching.

After school classes are held by request of pupils in groups, and also when some ask for extra individual instruction.

In the total program, grades one through twelve, we have done weaving in wool as well as with paper; drawing in pen, pencil and charcoal; ceramics; snow sculpture; clay modelling; enlargement of pictures; block printing; lettering and poster work; chip-carving; and other techniques according to ages, ability and willingness.

Recently the state director of Art and the head of the Art Department at UNH paid us a visit. They looked with wonder and amazement when shown the Art Dept. here: Twelve Lockers. The program means so much to a majority of pupils in Troy—many of them generously talented in the arts—

that it deserves a room well-equipped for more efficient work, for greater service to the children and the community.

HOME ECONOMICS REPORT

The Home Economics Department at Troy High School this year is offering a course in Foods and Nutrition. The students are taught to prepare and serve nutritious, tasty meals with an eye to economy.

The high school girls have become members of the state and national branch of the Future Homemakers Association of America. As a group they attended a fall meeting held on the campus of Keene Teacher's College. They exchanged ideas with home economics students and leaders from all over the New Hampshire state.

For three weeks the 8th grade girls took a course in shop with Mr. Littlefield while the boys of the 8th grade received a course in Foods dealing chiefly with party foods. At the conclusion of the course the boys entertained the girls and Mr. Littlefield at an informal party where they did all of the planning cooking, and entertaining.

I wish to thank the Troy School Board and Mr. Bowlby our superintendent for their cooperation in providing sinks, stoves, and cabinets which really make our program much improved.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

There was an old woman
Who lived in a shoe
She had so many children
She didn't know what to do...

is very descriptive of the school condition Troy faces today, and will continue to face until the citizens of the community stop putting off a decision which will solve the problem.

For the past few years, one expedient after another has been used to house the increasing pupil enrollment. The lunchroom was divided into a kitchen, cafeteria, home economics and art room. The basement corridor became a lunch room, a coat closet is now the principal's office, another coat closet is a reading room and a third closet is the nurse's room.

The school now operates on a two-shift basis from 8 A.M. until 5:15 P.M. and still the building does not have adequate space for either the educational program or the pupils.

Faced with a first grade class of 54 pupils in September 1953; the school board invited parents to enter under-aged children in 1952. About ten younger children were accepted to form a beginning group of 38 pupils, and thus next year's grade one was reduced to about 44 pupils, roughly 14 more children in the grade than good educational standards recommend.

With every nook and cranny now filled with children, it looks as though the old lady would finally have to decide on sending some of her children elsewhere, or get a bigger shoe in Troy.

The hopes that the Ripley Homestead could be converted into a two classroom elementary school faded when it was found that the costs would be much higher than anticipated and the room sizes below standard. The possibility of a coopera-

tive school to solve Troy's problems has definitely faded from the picture, and Troy now must find its own solution based upon a building program or high school attendance at Keene. Waiting will only increase the problem rather than solve it. Meanwhile, the years go by and the educational advantages lost to the children of the community can never be recaptured.




