To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, 1938, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Auditors, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Collectors of Taxes, Trustees of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers, all other necessary officers; and two Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Art. 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and such other current expenses as may accrue.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 4. 'To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$8,500 to oil the streets of Walpole Village, North Walpole, and town roads.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$10 for Memorial Day.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 to tear down the brick shop on Turnpike St. and erect a new jail.

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Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$750 for repairs and refinishing the interior of the Town Hall.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to drain and resurface South St. in Walpole Village.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,500 for a permanent hard surfaced road on Spruce and Pine Sts. in North Walpole.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to improve and gravel the March Hill road, beginning at the end of last year's improvement and continuing easterly to the Stevens road.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,200 for a culvert on the Valley road near Charles Garrity's place, and also the culvert on the Cheney road, and lower the Blanchard Brook near the Napoleon Porter place.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000 for the County road, provided the State contributes a like amount.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$745.51 for Class V roads, the State to contribute \$2,974.06.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid, and raise and appropriate \$2,027.25, the State to contribute a like amount.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to improve and gravel the two pieces of unimproved road on the Prospect Hill road to Christian Hollow.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,200 for road signs for the streets of Walpole Village, North Walpole and Drewsville, and outside roads. Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to buy new road equipment and raise money therefor.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 for equipment and material to carry on W. P. A. road project.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$365 to the Monadnock District Association of Scenic New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising calling attention to the natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other 37 towns of the Monadnock District.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, dispose of and deed any real estate acquired by the town by tax collectors' deeds.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds as have been left it during the past year.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200 for eradicating the White Pine Blister Rust.

Art. 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TOWN LIBRARY

The library committee is pleased to report a successful year with increased circulation of books and magazines. The number of books taken out at the home library was 9,166, of which 5,180 was adult fiction and 953 non-fiction, with 3,000 juveniles and 725 magazines. This compares favorably with other towns of the state.

The interest of the people in the library has been shown by the ladies who gave their time in helping at the library and by the many gifts received.

The anonymous gift of 326 volumes through Yale university in memory of Charles P. Howland is much appreciated. When the need of new shelving to accommodate the collection was recognized, Mrs. Hudson Bridge gave a new stack and through the efforts of Mrs. Clifford Bellows and the generosity of several townspeople another stack was purchased.

We wish to express our appreciation for gifts of books and magazines by Mrs. Niel Stevens, Mrs. William Kingsbury, Miss Clifton, Mrs. Alice Gilbert, Miss Lila Pierce, Dr. Charles Houghton, Mrs. Harley Rogers, The Book Club, and anonymous friends.

580 books have been added this year of which 377 were gifts. 102 books have been purchased for the North Walpole branch in addition.

New shelves have been built to give additional room for the books of the small children.

There are twenty papers and magazines in the reading room.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

A revision was made this year in the Program of Studies for Walpole High School and several desirable changes were made in the teaching assignments. The work of the school is now departmentalized with all teachers assigned to the courses in which they have had their major preparation. Biology is offered as an elective course in grade 10. The courses in English, mathematics, physical and social science have been departmentalized in grades 7-12. A correlated course in the social studies has replaced the traditional courses in history and geography in grades 7-8. College preparatory pupils will have one foreign language in grade 9 instead of two as previously. French 1 has been advanced to grade 10 and three courses in French are offered in the curriculum. Algebra and geometry have been stepped up to grades 10 and 11 respectively and offered as elective subjects. General and applied mathematics will be given to all pupils in grade 9 and will serve as a terminal course in mathematics for many of the vocational pupils. Junior business training will hereafter begin in grade 9 instead of in grade 8. The high school course in commercial geography will be discontinued. The requirement in Latin for the college preparatory course has been reduced to two years. The work in the upper two years in Latin will be elective. wider range of electives is now possible with courses arranged as a part of the work in pupil guidance. School activities have been more fully correlated and placed more directly under the direction of the teachers. An effective guidance program is in operation to assist pupils in the selection of courses, to regulate pupil participation in school activities, and to adjust misunderstandings or difficulties which may arise in connection with the work and school life of the pupil.

A reorganization was made in the teaching assignments at North Walpole to permit a reduction of one teacher. Reassignment of courses was made on the basis of the academic qualifications of the teachers remaining and in accordance with state professional requirements.

The following teachers resigned at the close of the school year: Miss Edith Swett, Miss Claire Moynihan, Miss Ruth Kelley, and Mr. Gordon Ayer.

Miss Dorothy Plaisted was employed to teach the courses in social science and English. Miss Plaisted is a graduate of the four-year secondary curriculum of Keene Normal school.

Mr. Kenneth Bishop, University of New Hampshire 1937, was elected to teach mathematics and science. He will also have charge of the boys' physical activity program.

Miss Dorothy Stewart, Keene Normal school 1937, is the new teacher in grades 1 and 2.

The quality of instruction in the schools is of a high standard. The teachers are well qualified by education and professional training and they are interested in the welfare of the pupils as well as in the work of the school.

Reading is the most important single subject of the elementary school and it is the basis for the successful development of the other fundamentals. Investigation has revealed that many children fail in new subjects principally because of their inability to read with understanding in these subjects.

It is now recognized that intelligent reading in such specialized subjects as mathematics, science. history and geography may be developed by gradually building up a vocabulary and establishing simple fundamental concepts. This is the aim in much of the newer reading material which is supplied in the elementary grades. The program of standard and diagnostic tests, as outlined in previous reports, will be continued. These tests together with the remedial instruction designed to correct deficiencies in the fundamental processes have become established as an important part of our instructional procedure.

A hot lunch is served each day during the winter term to about thirty pupils in the village school. These lunches are intended as a hot dish to supplement the lunches brought from home and are served in accordance with weekly menus prepared for each month in advance. The members of the Walpole Grange have continued to support this program by the contribution of vegetables and prepared food.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The sewing machines in the Home Economic department were exchanged.

Swing standards with six swings erected on playground.

North Walpole:

The pupil desks in both buildings were scraped and varnished.

A new baseball backstop was erected on the playground.

A new storm porch was constructed at entrance to Kilburn building.

Drewsville:

Five new screens were provided. The rope swings were replaced with permanent metal swings and ball bearing hangers.

No. 14 School:

The fence around the school playground was reinforced with heavy wood posts.

Additional playground equipment was provided.

The Constitution is a subject of intensive study in both the elementary and high schools with special emphasis placed on a thorough study of the historic development and interpretation in the senior year. The gift from the D. A. R. was an excellent contribution to the libraries of reference material in American history and government which are available for the class work in each of our high and elementary schools.

I wish to express my appreciation of the cooperation which I have received during the year from the members of the school board, teachers, parents and pupils.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER NORTH WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles D. Dalzell, Superintendent of Schools. Dear Sir:

I am enclosing herewith my report on the work and condition of the North Walpole schools.

REGISTRATION

The number of pupils in the various grades is: Sub-Primary, 17; Grade I, 14; Grade II, 20; Grade III, 16; Grade IV, 15; Grade V, 20; Grade VI, 19; Grade VII, 19; Grade VIII, 20; Grade IX, 18; Grade X, 8; total, 186.

ATTENDANCE

Our grade averages for attendance of pupils during the first 20 weeks of school are high. This shows that the great majority of the children are regular attendants. Absences, in most cases, have been due to unavoidable causes.

The averages are: Sub-Primary, 95.58; Grade I, 96.87; Grade II, 96.84; Grade III, 97.04; Grade IV, 97.00; Grade V, 97.85; Grade VI, 97.39; Grade VII, 98.57; Grade VIII, 96.92; Grades 9 and 10, 98.07.

Tardiness marks for the same period are: Sub-Primary, 3; Grade I, 14; Grade II, 11; Grade III, 2; Grade IV, 11; Grade V, 7; Grade VI, 20; Grade VII, 9; Grade VIII, 20; Grade IX and X, 13; total, 110.

INSTRUCTION AND TESTS

The teaching work in some subjects of Grades 7, 8, 9 and 10 was redistributed this year. The instruction was apportioned among the teachers of these grades and the headmaster. The resignation of Mrs. Claire Kennedy from the high school staff created a vacancy which was not filled by the committee. Instead, it was decided to readjust the work among the remaining teachers.

Tests have been given recently in Grades 3 to 10. They were of standard type and of different kinds. Grade 3 had the Haggerty Reading examination; Grade 4, Spencer test in Arithmetic; Grade 5, Shank test in Reading Comprehension and Spencer test in Arithmetic; Grade 6, Metropolitan Achievement test; Grade 7, Shank test of Reading Comprehension, Spencer Diagnostic test in Arithmetic; Grade 8, Gregory Diagnostic test in Language and Spencer Diagnostic test in Arithmetic; Grade 9, Otis Self Administering test in mental ability, intermediate; Grade 10, Gregory Diagnostic test in Language and Spencer Diagnostic test in Arithmetic.

The results were generally satisfactory. However, as most of these tests were given to note the progress of the pupils and check their weaknesses in the various subjects, the teachers are able to plan their remedial work accordingly.

High School Agent Russell Leavitt visited the High School grades Dec. 17 and inspected the teaching and condition of the school.

Health examinations have been conducted by Miss Edgett, school nurse. Her report will show the results of her work.

One of the pleasing developments of modern school life is the building of an orchestra among the pupils. We have encouraged all worthwhile efforts toward this end. At present, Mr. Henrickson of Keene is working with a beginners group in violin training.

We hope that the idea will grow and that more parents will see their way toward providing their children with a training in some musical instrument.

Four-H club work in Grades 7, 9 and 10 is supervised by Miss Mulcahy and Miss Binkunski. Boy Scout work is in charge of Mr. Dube. Miss Binkunski also has charge of the French club.

Many helpful books have been added to our supplementary list.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles D. Dalzell, Superintendent of Schools. Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my report as Headmaster of Walpole High School.

REGISTRATION

The high school enrollment has remained the same as last year, an increase of approximately ten over former years. The junior high shows a new high mark in the number enrolled. Three withdrawals have been necessary due to change in family residence and two because they were not interested in furthering their education. To date, as was the case last year, we are maintaining a record of attendance and low tardiness well above the state average.

SCHOLARSHIP

Diagnostic tests in fundamentals have been given to pupils in grades 7-12 in an effort to determine weaknesses of individuals. Drill periods are provided for all pupils needing further study.

The results of recent tests given from the office of the State Board of Education place Walpole High above the state average in English Forms, Fundamental Arithmetic and Mental Ability.

Several changes were made in the Program of Studies this year to enable our students to receive a well balanced education in the various courses. Latin was made an elective in grades 11 and 12 in the college preparatory course rather than required as heretofore. This enables the students to broaden their field of study by electing sociology and economics if they desire. Realizing the need for fundamental arithmetic in everyday life this subject was added for all in the general, home economics and agricultural courses. Biology and business training have also been included to round out an adequate curricula, for those students terminating their education with high school as well as those preparing for college.

By the use of differentiated assignments we are endeavoring to maintain high scholastic standards and provide levels of attainment comparable with individual abilities. Records made by our students in the various colleges have justified our methods. Due to the commendable work of this group Walpole High is again on the approved list of the College Entrance Board which enables our students to enter college by our certificate without taking entrance examinations.

In life and industry the seventy percent individual is neither desired nor accepted. Our standards are improving and with the help and cooperation of the parents we hope to impress upon the boys and girls of Walpole the necessity of good scholarship.

ORGANIZATION

Of last year's graduating class five are continuing their education in institutions of higher learning, two are married and four are at home.

Efforts have been made to provide some sort of extracurricula activity for all pupils of the school. During the fall touch-football, horseshoes and volleyball for the boys; tag ball, volleyball and soft ball for the girls was made available. Basketball and ping pong have been the major athletic interests during the winter months. Were more adequate facilities available much could be done in this important field especially with those students remaining at the school during the noon hour. By including the orchestra in the daily time table more students have been given an opportunity to participate. Our orchestra now numbers twenty which is certainly commendable for a school of this size. Their offerings at our public presentations have received much favorable comment.

The very excellent operetta presented was of a high order and reflects much credit and progress on the choral music available for the students.

Our school socials have been well attended. These have been sponsored by the various classes and are free to all pupils. The Blue and White Club has been prominent in these affairs, planning the fall picnic at Vilas Pool, the freshman reception and the annual Christmas party. Dancing classes for grades 7-12 are provided.

Three one-act plays were presented by the Dramatic Club. The costuming and acting reflected much credit on the participants.

The Warbler staff presented an innovation in their New Years publication of "News Items". This new edition was enthusiastically received.

Our assembly programs have for the most part been staged entirely by the pupils with the supervision of teacher-advisers. Some assemblies have demonstrated to the school work being done in the various classes. The Blue and White Club provides for outside speakers. At their assemblies pupils have an opportunity to practice proper speaking habits, acquire confidence, and politeness and respect toward others. During the year each student will have a chance to appear in at least one assembly program.

AGRICULTURE

The total enrollment in the agricultural department is twenty-six, fourteen in the freshman-sophomore group and twelve in the junior-senior group. Last February Walpole won the silver loving cup presented each year by the New Hampshire Poultry Growers Association to the agricultural department in the state having the highest total score from five dozen eggs exhibited at the Annual Egg and Baby Chick Show.

The Hooper Chapter of Future Farmers of America was represented by five boys at the State Future Farmer Prize Speaking and Judging Contest held at New Boston, N. H.

We were again pleased to have two hundred day old chicks presented by Hubbard Farms to the four boys having the most outstanding poultry projects. Such interest and generosity in our work is fully appreciated.

In a state wide contest, based on the previous year's poultry project records, the first prize of one hundred chicks and two additional prizes of fifty chicks each were won by Walpole boys.

The Future Farmer organization again carried on the school greenhouse project. Plants were supplied to people in the community as well as to individual members of the agriculture classes who desired them for school projects.

The usual spray program in the Hooper orchard and community was carried on. Other phases of orchard management such as fertilizing, pruning, mulching and protecting trees against borers and rodents were carried on in the Hooper orchard. The production of fruit in this orchard is increasing each year.

Spruce and pine seedlings, furnished by the State Forestry Department, were planted by various students on their home farms.

Twelve boys enjoyed a very educational trip to the Eastern States Exposition at Springfield in September.

The president of our local chapter of Future Farmers of America attended the national convention in Kansas City, Missouri. This trip was made possible by the combined effort and generosity of the Walpole Grange and the local Future Farmer organization.

Ten boys attended the regional Future Farmer get-together at Chester, Vermont. Several boys received the future farmer degree in conjunction with boys from three other departments in this section. Following this a very interesting basketball tournament was played.

The agricultural shop work during the year has included woodworking for freshmen and advanced woodworking and forge work for sophomores. The junior-senior group has completed such projects as building a trailer and overhauling farm machines. Cold metal, soldering and rope work is also included in the work of the advanced group.

Class work has been based on the four-year plan as set up for Walpole High School. Study has centered in the following enterprises; dairy, orchard, poultry, sheep, swine, beef cattle, horses, potatoes, vegetable gardening, farm management and farm engineering.

Instruction trips to surrounding farms have been taken by the group when possible. We greatly appreciate the cooperation of the farmers in the community.

HOME ECONOMICS

The courses offered this year are: The Home, Its Care and Management for juniors and seniors, and Clothing and Textiles for freshmen and sophomores.

At the beginning of the school year the girls in the department were making plans for the annual school fair. The class in home management made miniature projects of the different types of dwellings. This material, being of educational value, was later used by the pupils of the lower grades for their sand tables.

The group taking up work in clothing made attractive cotton dresses for their own use and to display at the fair. Four of the girls had planned to demonstrate the use of sewing machine attachments.

Each year an effort is made to improve the department. This year three new sewing machines were added to replace the old ones and have been very helpful.

Aside from the regular class work the freshmen-sophomore group plan and serve a hot dish to thirty children in the lower grades each day. The Walpole Grange has been of great assistance by providing meat and vegetables for this worthy cause.

In Textiles and Clothing the girls have studied the kinds of textiles, their properties and uses. The construction of clothing has offered them an opportunity to use a commercial pattern correctly, to alter the pattern, if necessary and to draft their own patterns. In the study of clothing they have learned something of its expense and worked out a budget which should teach them to spend more wisely.

The Home, Its Care and Management offers an opportunity for the junior and senior girls to study the history of architecture, the different types of houses now in existence and the selection of furniture suitable to each type of home. Each student has selected, planned, and furnished homes of their own, at the same time estimating costs of the materials as they were studied. Several homes in Walpole have been visited to aid this study. Home projects relating to each unit have been carried out.

The teaching staff gratefully acknowledge the co-operation of the School Board, Superintendent and townspeople in making our work successful.

REPORT OF SPECIAL TEACHER OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herewith my third annual report as special teacher of music.

In Walpole we are very pleased to announce that our orchestra has grown to twenty-one members and is increasing continually due to our instrument classes. The three violin classes which meet each week have helped much in building up the orchestra. In addition the class in brass instruments will augment the growth of the organization. One boy, beginning the class this fall has already entered the orchestra and we have another young lady who will very soon begin playing with the orchestra. Others will be added before graduation.

Because of the limited time in the music schedule I meet with this rather large brass group after school and have only time for a few minutes with each individual. A tuba would be a great addition to our orchestra. Our brass section is rather weak and these instruments ought to be the property of the school. A gift of any instrument would be greatly appreciated by this department.

Music afternoon was observed in Walpole during the first of May. All the children from the elementary grades and junior high participated. We were delighted with our audience and look forward to a larger one this coming year.

Music afternoon was observed in North Walpole the first Wednesday in May. Each room from grade one to grade seven put on a fifteen minute concert. There were as many as fifty guests in some rooms.

Music afternoon was observed at No. 14 and Drewsville schools in May with parents and friends attending.

We were extremely proud of our girls sextette in North Walpole last year. We hope to organize another group this year if time can be found to fit it in to our present schedule. A music club has been organized from the seventh grade in North Walpole which meets each week. They are to give several concerts in various places before the end of the year. One boy from this grade is studying trumpet and is doing a splendid piece of work.

A violin class has been organized in North Walpole this year. So far the results seem very complimentary. I feel that it would be fine if an orchestra could eventually be organized in this school.

Our operetta "Bobby," given by the Walpole High School, was a great success. We were pleased with the support which the Walpole people gave us. A great deal of credit should be given to the leads and chorus of this operetta. I should like to take this space to thank the various people for the help given me. Mr. Tucker, staging and light, Mrs. Bragg, stage equipment, Mr. Whittemore and all the teachers who worked with me.

We have begun work on the operetta "The Boston Tea Party" which will be given in the Spring. This operetta is entirely different from any other we have given and is a very interesting little operetta.

A beginners' course in music appreciation has been started in Walpole this year, but it is seriously handicapped in its equipment. We ought to have a good victrola, many records and a music room to back this course. A course which ought to be a great help to any student going out into the musical world.

Again I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Superintendent Dalzell, Mr. Whittemore, Mr. Russell and the teachers for the cooperation that has been accorded this department.

19 pupils were recommended to have throat and nose examination by a physician.

Inspection in North Walpole showed the following defects:

187 pupils were inspected.

- 3 pupils showed defective hearing.
- 8 pupils showed defective vision-uncorrected.
- 8 pupils showed poor posture.
- 19 pupils were underweight.
- 111 pupils were in need of dental care.
 - 9 pupils were unvaccinated without proper excuse.

26 pupils were recommended to have throat and nose examination by a physician.

Dental clinics were held February 2nd, March 30th and 31st, April 2nd, May 10th to May 19th, 1937, with work done as follows:

The bill for this work was one hundred and forty-one dollars (\$141.00) paid for by the parents of the pupils having work done.

54 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

15 pupils had special eye examination and defects corrected.

9 tonsils cases were treated privately.

9 tonsils cases were treated at clinics.

22 pupils were vaccinated successfully.

Much time is spent on home calls, business calls, providing clothing for needy children and transportation of pupils to clinics, dentists and oculists.

I wish to express the appreciation of the district to the local Red Cross chapter, Mrs. C. A. Moore, Mrs. Geo. Rolland and Miss Anna Hartnett for assistance given in carrying on the work.

I also wish to express my appreciation to superintendent, headmasters, teachers, parents and pupils for their help and cooperation.
