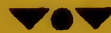

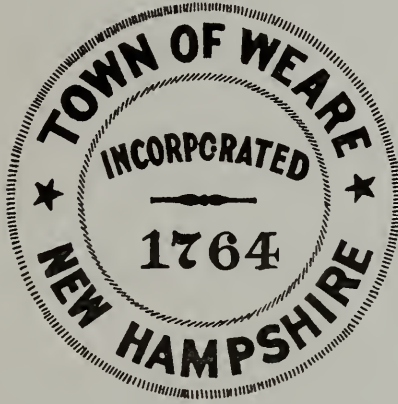

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

Weare, New Hampshire

March 14th, 1950

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of Weare, on the fourteenth day of March 1950, at nine o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Alfred Osborne.

Voted to dispense with the reading of the Warrant.

Polls were open for the election of officers—Voted to keep polls open until 6 o'clock, P. M.

Article 1. Whole number votes cast 370.

For Town Clerk

Minnie T. Peaslee had 340 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Town Treasurer

Henry T. Osborne had 321 and was declared elected by the Moderator.

For Selectmen for Three Years

Albert S. Farmer had 308 and was declared elected by the Moderator. And in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Road Agent

Bryan W. Sargent had 225, Bernard L. Phelps, Jr., had 142. Bryan W. Sargent was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Overseer of Poor

J. Hardy Legge had 313 and was declared elected by the Moderator, in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Auditors

Charles F. Eastman had 318 votes, Theodore W. Flanders 306, William T. Stokes had 293 and were declared severally elected by the Moderator.

Article 2. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,000 to defray town charges.

Article 3. Motion made and voted the Clerk cast one ballot for Scott F. Eastman for Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Scott F. Eastman elected Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

Article 4. Motion made and carried the Clerk cast one ballot for Doris D. Eaton for Trustee of the Library for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Doris D. Eaton elected Trustee of the Library for three years.

Article 5. Motion made and voted that we raise the sum of \$13,000 for the repair of highways and bridges. Motion made and carried that \$6,000.00 be for winter roads.

Article 6. Motion made and voted that \$1,529.12 with the sum of \$6,116.46 to be furnished by the State for the construction of class 5 highways.

Article 7. Motion made and voted the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00. The State to furnish \$1,700.00 to be used for the construction of State Aid Roads. Motion made and voted the Selectmen be authorized to hire the money. Paying \$1,000.00 a year.

Motion made and carried to take up Article 21.

Article 21. At this time Mr. Tilton was introduced. Motion made to dismiss the article. Motion made and carried to reconsider. Mr. Tilton spoke on the "Quota for the Concord Hospital." Motion made and carried to raise \$350.00 towards the support of the Margaret Pillsbury Unit of the Concord Hospital.

Article 8. Motion lost to complete the road between East Weare and Riverdale. Motion made and voted to raise \$3,000.00 for work on Riverdale Road.

Article 9. Voted the collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen.

Article 10. Voted to allow 2% discount on all taxes for 30 days after the presentation of bill.

Article 11. Voted the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for the Weare Volunteer Fire Department.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for water holes.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the Weare Library.

Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the care of neglected cemeteries.

Article 17. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Band Concerts.

Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the maintenance of the Chase Recreational Park.

Article 19. Vernon Wood, Commander, American Legion, explained site for observation post and appropriate cost of building. Harold Flanders offered a building. Motion made to accept this offer "with thanks." Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to move and furnish building.

Article 20. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 21. Already taken up.

Article 22. Motion made to dismiss the article. A rising vote taken: to dismiss Yes, 39; No, 58. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to the Merrimack Valley Regional Association.

Article 23. Voted to dismiss the article.

Article 24. After some discussion Voted this article be dismissed.

Article 25. Finance Committee made a report and wondered if their services were still wanted. Selectman Waterman spoke of how valuable their services were. Motion made and carried the Finance Committee be continued with a rising vote of thanks.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and to cast ballots in regard to licensing Beano in the Town of Weare.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, or act in relation thereto.
 - a. Town Officers' salaries and expenses.
 - b. Election and registration.
 - c. Expense of town hall and other buildings.
 - d. Police department.
 - e. Forest fires.
 - f. Insurance.
 - g. Vital statistics.
 - h. Health department.
 - i. Town dumps.
 - j. Town poor.
 - k. Old age assistance.
 - l. Soldiers' aid.
 - m. Damages and legal expenses.
 - n. Other expenses with no appropriation.
3. To choose by separate ballot one trustee of the trust funds for three years.
4. To choose by separate ballot one trustee of the library for three years.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, and to take any other vote in relation thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,530.53 or \$1,606.41 to be used with the sum of \$6,122.12 or \$10,709.40 to be furnished by the State for the construction of class V highways, depending on Legislative action.

7. To see if the Town will vote to build a highway through land of Alfred Osborne, Henry T. Osborne, and Grover and Flossie Peaslee on a site accepted by the Selectmen beginning at the site of Drewry Shop, so called, passing near the southeasterly side of the Lake Horace dam and continuing near the shore to land of Henry and Gordon Tiffany, a distance of approximately 4,250 feet; also to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same or to take any other vote relating thereto.

8. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

9. To see if the Town will allow a discount on taxes.

10. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$35,000, in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Volunteer Fire Department.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for water holes.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400, for white pine blister rust control.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Weare Library.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of neglected cemeteries, especially soldiers' graves.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to maintain the Chase recreational park.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Air Defense.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350, toward the support of the Concord Hospital Inc.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$124 (1/100th of one percent of the Town's valuation based on the 1950 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the 37 other communities in this region, or act in relation thereto.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The department answered 36 alarms during 1950, as follows: 18 chimney fires, 6 building fires, 1 rubbish fire, 4 brush and grass fires, 1 oil burner fire, 1 car fire, 1 tar kettle fire, 1 high tension wire arcing, 1 false alarm and 2 calls for assistance out of town.

This is an average year in number of fires with an estimated damage of \$7,000. Defective chimneys and flues continue to be the cause of more than half of our fires. Have unsafe defects in chimneys and flues repaired without delay. A small repair job may save you a big loss.

Brush and grass fires were held to small area burned, very little damage and were not expensive to control. Only two brush and rubbish fires resulted from burning without a permit from the forest fire warden. Get a permit when you wish to burn and help prevent forest fires by using extreme caution when burning and make sure all fires are out before leaving them unattended.

The department held 12 monthly meetings and each company held several drills as well as three drills by the departments as a whole.

The ladies' auxiliary continues to function and has assisted by serving dinners to several fire organizations during the year.

The board of fire wards or engineers held two meetings during the year.

An automatic oil burning steam heating system was installed in the Central Fire Station at Weare Center and has proved to be excellent for heating both the station room and the meeting hall. It has resulted in the saving of janitor expense and its blower system makes a very efficient means of drying hose and other equipment.

The East Weare Station has been heated during the past winter and the value of having the booster tank full at all times and the truck warm has been well demonstrated. We now have good facilities for drying hose at this station, which is a great convenience.

During the year the following equipment was added: 200 ft. of 2½ inch hose, 50 ft. of booster hose, 1 length 2 inch

suction hose, 1 dry powder CO² extinguisher 20 pounds, 2 electric lanterns, 3 backpack pumps and 3 pairs of rubber boots.

Fences were erected around two newly dug water holes and repairs were made and fences rebuilt on several other water holes. Our water supplies have held up better this year than for several years previous.

The truck at South Weare is kept in a very dangerous and inaccessible place. The sheds it is housed in are a fire hazard in themselves and are in a poor location to get the truck out of in winter or when gatherings are being held at the hall. The equipment cannot be serviced in any way in the building and no means of heating the station to allow the tank to be kept full of water or to dry the hose is possible. A different building should be provided to protect the equipment and keep it in condition for use especially in the winter season when water supplies are frozen or inaccessible.

The present scarcity of materials, the increased cost of replacing and rebuilding makes it more necessary than ever before to protect our property from loss or damage by fire.

The department appreciates the cooperation and support of the people of Weare and hope to render even better service to the community.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

Weare, New Hampshire

January 13, 1951

During the year 1950, the water situation in all the sections was checked and re-checked and found slightly improved over 1949. The dump situation in the North Division is under excellent control; in the South Division it is a disgrace and it is hoped by the Health Officer that the residents of Weare will appropriate the necessary funds to remedy this condition. A dump in the South Division is most essential. A dump in the South Division, as it was during 1950, is a menace and must be corrected.

The local Health Officer has been recommended to head the Health and Sanitation unit under the local Civil Defense plan for cities, towns and villages. The functions of this unit are:

"To safeguard public health and sanitation and to devise and direct emergency measures and improvisation to that end. It is the responsibility of the unit to inspect and pass on water, food and pharmaceutical supplies and services and to require that safe and sanitary standards are met in the area.

"The unit is likewise responsible for similar inspection and control of sewage and waste disposal. Prevention of epidemic by quarantine, segregation, fumigation and similar standard health procedures is a responsibility of the unit. The closest cooperation is required with the Civil Defense Engineering and Rescue and Evacuation Units as well as with the local Red Cross Chapter.

"The unit is likewise responsible for establishment of temporary morgues, coroner duties and records. In this responsibility, close coordination must be maintained with the Civil Defense Administration Unit to insure that full identification records are kept and bodies properly ticketed."

On this committee with your Health Officer are: Donald Putnam, supervising the South Division, with headquarters at the Grange hall; Gordon Traver, Weare Center, with headquarters at the high school; Charles Reede, North Weare, with headquarters at the North Weare Federated Church; Charles Todd, East Weare, with headquarters at the Baptist Church.

It is anticipated in the near future that all of these headquarters will be supplied with lanterns, candles and other equipment. It is strongly recommended that all wells, where water is used for drinking purposes, have a well-fitting cover to keep out dust particles. All privies must be properly screened.

At Lake Horace in the North Division, no privies or outlets from septic tanks or cesspools will be permitted less than 75 feet from the level of the lake.

It is again recommended that where children, parents or other adults have colds, they refrain from attending school, or other gatherings until the condition is corrected.

That the School Board, through its Chairman, is hereby authorized to file in behalf of the School District of Weare an application in such form as is required by the United States of America and in conformity with said Act of Congress for an advance to be made by the United States of America to the School District of Weare to aid in defraying the planning cost preliminary to the construction of such works which shall consist generally of a consolidated elementary school.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Weare:

The annual report this year will concern itself with (1) the school year 1950-51, (2) the anticipated enrollment and housing problem in the immediate future, and (3) consideration of the budget for 1951-52.

The School Year 1950-51

Teaching Staff

As of September 1, 1950 we had but one change in teaching personnel, — Mrs. Georgianna Gile of Hillsboro replacing John F. O'Brien at the Center School.

With the opening of school in September we were faced with the problem of accommodating some 20 additional pupils in Grades 1-6. Our greatest increase came in the first grade with 40 pupils enrolling in the several elementary schools. The only feasible solution called for the accommodation of some 20 pupils in Grade 6 at the High School building. Miss Elizabeth Purington, who had previously taught in Goffstown, was engaged for that assignment and also to assist with certain junior high school groups.

Early in December Miss Dorothy Reilly, teacher of Home Economics for the past year and a half, asked to be released from her contract, and Miss Beverly Proctor of Goffstown assumed her duties on December 11.

Buildings

As mentioned above, it was necessary to provide space for the Grade 6 unit in the high school building. The Board, with the advice and approval of the Finance Committee, made the following changes at the high school:

(1) Grade 6 was installed in the room previously used by agriculture and other small groups.

(2) The front part of the shop was converted into a classroom to accommodate the classes previously using the room in the high school taken over by Grade 6, and (3) The north wall of the shop was moved some 14 feet to the north in order to provide the shop area given over to the classroom.

It is expected that the expenses necessitated under No. 1 and No. 2 above can be met by unused balance on our current budget. Expenses incurred in moving the shop wall will probably have to be met through a special article in the 1951 warrant.

Future Housing Needs

For several years the school board and townspeople have been attempting to solve the problem of a rapidly increasing school population. Our pre-school census figures indicate the number of entering pupils by districts for the next six years, —

If we project the present enrollments and pre-census figures over the next six years, we find that our total school enrollment increases from the present number of 256 to a high of 330 from 1954 to 1956. The table of "Anticipated Enrollments" indicates the distribution of these pupils by grades. This represents an increase of 14%, coming at a time when all of our buildings are over-crowded, and to provide for some 74 additional pupils in our present facilities is impossible.

Several solutions have been offered to meet our problem. As you know, the district voted in 1947, as amended in 1949, to construct a six-room elementary building, but for financial reasons it did not appear feasible to appropriate the necessary funds at that time.

Another suggestion has been considered to renovate the Clinton Grove School, constructing an addition for adequate stairway and plumbing facilities. This plan has been proposed as a temporary measure, but the question arises as to whether the \$10,000-15,000 estimated expenditure would by necessity make the Clinton Grove School a permanent unit in our system.

Regardless of the plan of action agreed upon by the voters, if we are going to bond the district to finance an expansion program, such a program should be a part of a long-range educational program rather than for temporary construction.

The school board and superintendent fully realize that the town of Weare is not in a position to expend a large amount of money at this time, and with that fact in mind I should like to propose the following plan, —

That the School District of Weare erect a two-room building, such a building to contain service facilities (heating and plumbing) for a four-room building. Such a two-room building would meet our immediate needs, and units of two additional rooms could be added economically as practicable without increasing the service facilities mentioned above. Such a two-room building could be built for approximately \$34,000, and an additional two-room unit added as necessary at a later date for a cost of about \$24,000.

The approximate financial implications of two and four room units are contained in the following table:

Such a plan would have merit for several reasons. In the first place the primary expenditure would be in line with a long-range plan rather than on an expenditure of a temporary nature, and, secondly, we would not be constructing

more than we need at any one time, but rather we could increase the plant if and when enrollment figures so demanded.

The 1951-52 Budget

Several articles other than the customary are included in next year's warrant which warrant your careful consideration.

As mentioned earlier in this report, the expansion provided at the high school necessitated an over-run in our present budget. A deficiency item for this purpose is included in the warrant.

The teachers have respectfully requested that an article be included to raise and appropriate funds for a cost-of-living bonus for the current school year. The increased cost of living, and an increase in federal withholding taxes have seriously reduced their real income.

To meet our classroom needs articles are included to renovate the Clinton Grove School, to construct a new unit, and to provide a one-room unit for the year 51-52. The financial solution of this need is a serious problem and requires sound reasoning and study. Of equal importance is the educational solutions possible under the various plans. Not only are we interested in reducing the number of pupils per classroom, but we should be equally concerned with other aspects of an adequate educational program. The more a system tends to be centralized, the greater the number of pupil activities which can be made available to our children, in addition to the fact that we move toward pure grades per classroom unit. We can not continue to think that the demands made upon education by our present society, can be met by educational methodology of the past century. Should we not want for our growing generation, not an education as good as their forefathers, but rather an education at least equal to that provided for the children of our state and nation at the present time.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

At the beginning of the school year, September, 1949 about 150 pupils in the first through the sixth grades were weighed, measured and examined by the school nurse. Later in the year Dr. Brown examined the seventh grade through High School. Those who wished to play basketball were given special attention. The number of pupils affected and the number of defects corrected is as follows:

Defective vision — 30	Number of defects corrected — 22
Defective teeth — 120	Number of defects corrected — 96
Diseased tonsils — 16	Number of defects corrected — 7

In April, 1950, there was one case of Chicken Pox and one case of German Measles. There was one case of Rheumatic Fever, one fractured hip, one splintered ankle, and two had an appendectomy. One deaf and dumb boy was sent to a school for handicapped children in Vermont. Two girls had a metabolism at the Hillsborough County General Hospital. One girl had a heart X-ray and examination at the tubercular clinic. One boy went to a physician for an X-ray of his hip, one for an ear examination, two to the Pediatric Clinic in Concord for tonsilectomy, and one had a growth removed from his chest. I accompanied three children to the baby clinic for the triple inoculation. 110 had the Patch test.

I would like at this time to say that I think the teachers, and the parents, should be given credit for recognizing communicable diseases and reporting them, thus keeping diseases at a minimum in our schools, and I do appreciate their interest and cooperation so much.

Since September 12, 1950 the State Board of Health mobile chest X-ray unit has been parked on Elm Street in Manchester. This mass X-ray survey is free to all young people 15 years and over and to all adults. When I asked if this mobile unit or trailer could be brought to Weare or to Goffstown thus giving those in Goffstown, New Boston, Dunbarton and Weare an opportunity to have this screening test, I was told that these towns were too near Concord and Manchester, and that if our people were interested they could easily take advantage of this program in either of these two cities. Several of our young people have been into Manchester and had the test.

36 home visits were made during the year.
