THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To elect a delegate to the State Convention.
4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the municipal budget act.
5. To hear the reports of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.
6. To see what sum of money in addition to what is required by law the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
7. To see if the Town will vote to apply Calcium Chloride or any other dust laying material to any of the gravel section of the Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.
8. To see if the Town will vote to apply for State Aid for State Road Construction and raise and appropriate the sum of \$846.00. (State Contribution \$1,692.00) or vote for Class V

assistance for Class V Roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$523.64. (State Contribution \$2,094.57) If S.R.A. is voted it must be expended on the East Westmoreland Road.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or borrow a sum of money to rebuild and enlarge the two present culverts south of the residence of Frank Dragoon on the Spofford Road so-called and also lower the present cement culvert now in the brook near the Johnson Farm, so-called on the Spofford Road.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to gravel road, and blast ledges to clean ditches on the so-called New London Road.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$400.00 to be used as maintenance on part of the black roads in Town, formerly taken care of by the State but now is to be cared for by Town.

12. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to rebuild or repair the so-called Starkey bridge, near the School House.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the estimated figures of the New Hampshire Highway Department for type B and Class C and D roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.

14. To see what sum of money if any the Town will raise and appropriate for upkeep for cemeteries, etc.

15. To see if the Town will vote to rescind or amend the vote taken on Article 12 of 1937 Town Warrant or take any other action relating thereto.

16. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to borrow and use in order to obtain State or Federal funds.

17. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jothan Lord fund.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$100.00 for the support of Library.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control in co-operation with State Forestry and Recreation Department.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

22. To see if the Town will vote to exempt from taxation for a period of ten years, the land, and building to be erected by the East Westmoreland Mens' Club, provided it is used as a community building.

23. To see if the Town will vote to print the ratable inventory of all property in the town in the Annual Town Report.

24. To see if the Town will vote for rent of Town Hall as follows: \$10.00 for dances, \$1.00 for the lower hall, \$3.00 for entire hall.

25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot system of voting at the Annual Town Meetings.

26. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the town for non-payment of taxes.

27. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old road leading from the Spofford Road past the former Cady place, so-called, to the former Bartlett place so-called.

28. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the black road near the Witham place so-called to the Hartwell Mill, so-called.

29. To transact any other business to come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

The following changes were made in the teaching positions:— Miss Arline Lund, Keene Normal School 1937, was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Lois Morrison. Miss Evelyn Pedersen, a graduate of Keene Normal School, was elected to succeed Miss Emily Atherton as teacher at East Westmoreland. Miss Pedersen's education and training included work in both the primary and upper grades.

After seven years of very efficient service as a teacher in the primary division at East Westmoreland, Miss Marion Bassett asked to be released from her teaching duties. This release was granted on November 1 and the two divisions of the school with total enrollment of twenty pupils, were united with Miss Pedersen as teacher.

The program of standard and diagnostic tests, as outlined in previous reports, will be continued. These tests together with the remedial instruction designed to correct deficiencies in the fundamental processes have become established as an important part of our instructional procedure.

Reading is the most important single subject of the elementary school and it is the basis for the successful development of the other fundamentals. Investigation has revealed that many children fail in new subjects principally because of their inability to read with understanding in these subjects.

It is now recognized that intelligent reading in such specialized subjects as mathematics, science, history and geography may be developed by gradually building up a vocabulary and establishing simple fundamental concepts. This is the aim in much of the newer reading material which is supplied in the elementary grades.

The school alone cannot carry the full responsibility for the education of children. Education consists principally of mental growth and social adjustment. The mere accumulation of knowledge is only one phase of education. Much more important is the modification in behavior tendencies and the proper adaptation of the individual to social and civic situations. There are many factors, agencies, and influences, affecting the life of the child and these combined influences over a comparatively brief period of time determine the character and stamina of the individual. It is our responsibility as teachers and parents to encourage those influences which are desirable and to discourage any factors or agencies which may be detrimental to the interests of our children.

The two institutions of outstanding importance in the education of the child are the home and the school. Each must have an understanding and a sympathy with the work of the other. The basis of this cooperation is an understanding of each other's problems. Misunderstandings frequently occur because of a difference in point of view. The parent very naturally regards his child as an individual and singles him out for preferred treatment. The teacher, however, must regard each child as a member of the school who must learn to adjust himself socially and to subordinate his interests to those of the group.

The quality of instruction in the schools of the district is of a high standard. The teachers are well qualified by education and professional training and they are interested in the welfare of the pupils as well as in the work of the school.

A new flag pole was provided at the Depot school and repairs were made on the roof at East Westmoreland.

There has been a decrease in the total registration for the year. The number of cases of tardiness has increased. A study of the school registers indicates that many of these cases may have been avoided. We earnestly solicit the cooperation of parents in our efforts to improve the tardiness record. It is very desirable that children be impressed with the importance of forming habits of punctuality while they are young.

Westmoreland is especially fortunate in having unusual community interests in the welfare of the schools. This interest has been manifested by the frequent contributions by the various Parent-Teacher groups and by individuals. These contributions which are much appreciated include candy and gifts at Christmas and special occasions, provision for music instruction, financial assistance for the conduct of dental clinics, instructional material, and playground apparatus.

4 pupils were recommended to have throat and nose examination by a physician.

7 pupils had enlarged neck glands.

4 pupils were unvaccinated without proper excuse.

Dental clinics were held South Village Mar. 17th, 18th, Dec. 10th, 1937. East Westmoreland February 10th, 11th, 12th, 15th, 1937, and Westmoreland Point November 21st, 1937. Work done by Dr. J. H. Grimes, Keene, N. H.

Dental work at the Depot school was in charge of the Parent-Teachers Association.

3 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

2 pupils were treated at tonsil clinics June 24th and July 2nd, 1937.

1 pupil had special eye examination and defect corrected.

3 pupils were vaccinated.
