SCHOOL REPORT.

In making the annual statement of the condition of the schools of Bedford, I take great pleasure in stating that the progress made in most of them has been very satisfactory, and that the efforts made by the several teachers have been rewarded by more than ordinary success.

There have been instances in which the teachers have failed to create that interest which it is so pleasant to see in the school-room, but I think that they should not be blamed with the failure while the primary cause exists so plainly around the hearth-stones of their pupils.

One case of discipline occurred, for the settlement of which the superintendent was called in. It is enough to say that it was settled on its merits. Right here, I wish to state, that, as a general rule, the male teachers have not been as successful as the female teachers. In one instance where a male teacher was employed, he resigned at the end of the first week for a more lucrative field; while in another instance, the teacher left for the same reason during the ninth week of the term.

I do not say that any blame attaches to either of these teachers; but it does seem to me that such changes are against the best interests of our schools. I have been informed that there has been more or less disturbance in the school in district No. 2, for the last twenty years. I am pleased to record, that during this year everything has resulted to the best interests of the school. I can but think that the prudential committee has been very fortunate in his selection of teachers.

Some change in the text-books has been made this year, which, I think, has been an advantage to the schools. The teachers without an exception have favored the change.

Each school in the town has been supplied during the year with a new map of the State of New Hampshire. This is one of the best, if not the very best, which has ever been introduced into our schools.

I am sorry to say that the school in district No. 1, where we have the greatest number of weeks of school, and the most school-money, is by far the most backward school in town. It seems almost impossible to create that interest among the scholars which ought to be seen in a school with so many apparent advantages as this one has.

The school in district No. 6 being in progress, I am unable to make any report of it.
