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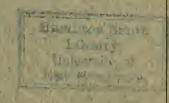

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my annual report and summary of work.

Bethlehem High School ended the fiscal year of 1930-31 June fifteenth with a total enrollment of forty-seven pupils. Eight pupils completed the prescribed amount of work on that date and were granted diplomas.

The standards set by the State Board of Education were attained in all subjects.

During the spring term a play was given by the Seniors, the Bethlehem Star was published, and the boys organized a baseball team. The Twentieth Century Club sponsored a prize-speaking contest in which ten pupils competed with well-chosen subjects.

School opened for the year 1931-32 on September fourteen in the Town Building under abnormal yet comfortable conditions. The total enrollment to date is fifty-four, fifty per cent of whom are boys. There are three special pupils, seven seniors, eleven juniors, ten sophomores and fifteen freshmen, the remaining seven having dropped or moved from town. There are twenty-five pupils enrolled in the Commercial curriculum, the remainder in the General or Academic Curriculum. There are twenty-four pupils studying either foreign or ancient languages.

As a result of housing conditions very little time has been spent on extra-curricula activities. One play has been given, Assembly periods have been held at regular intervals, the school orchestra, slightly enlarged, has been carrying on its work and at the present time a committee from the recently formed Outing Club is preparing a float for the Carnival parade in Littleton.

Since several classes have been conducted in one room a smaller amount of lesson hearing and more supervised study has been carried on. Our conditions have demanded more recent teaching procedures which I am sure have benefited both pupils and teachers.

It is my plan to conduct a study group with the teachers so that better methods may be discussed and put into practice immediately.

I have been informed that the school will enter its new building in several weeks and I wish to make several recommendations regarding the program. I recommend that the afternoon periods which are forty-five minutes in length be reduced to forty minutes and that one period be added to the school day to be used as an activities period. This period shall be used for Assemblies, remedial work, guidance, orchestra, clubs, gymnasium work, play rehearsals and whatever other extra curricula work might seem necessary or worthwhile.

The majority of pupils have cooperated very well with the teachers to make the first half of the year most agreeable. Good work is in evidence in all classes and average progress has been made in spite of our lack of facilities. The Town Building has been used but not abused and I feel very much pleased that we are able to leave it in as good condition as it was when we entered.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the School Board, the Superintendent, the teachers and all others who have cooperated so willingly to make the year both successful and happy.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bethlehem:

I am pleased to submit my first report relative to your schools.

I. ATTENDANCE:

The enrollment in your schools last year was 209. The average membership was 170 and the average attendance was 160. The percentage of attendance was approximately 95. This is an indication of excellent attendance throughout the year.

This year you have 222 pupils enrolled, 54 of whom are in the senior high school, and 178 of whom are in your elementary grades. The attendance to date has been good.

II. HEALTH:

A summary of the medical inspection of last year, of the pupils treated for the different ailments, of the number of defects corrected, and of the medical inspection for this year follows.

This summary indicates that Miss Bryant and Dr. Page have been alert in trying to correct the physical defects of your pupils and that their efforts have met with marked success. Some of your pupils have profited from the funds raised by the efforts of Miss Bryant for dental and throat clinics. Vaccination has been required of all pupils.

This year we hope to continue the work in all cases where parents cannot afford to provide the necessary treatment.

Health is one of the objectives of education in all grades. Parents should note carefully the reports of the medical needs sent them as a result of the medical inspection. The community should subscribe liberally to the agencies seeking better health among the school pupils.

Physical training is as important as mental training in the complete development of the child. In your new school gymnasium you have provided the place for definite physical training. As soon as teacher time is available an elementary program for physical development should become a part of your curricula. Some equipment is necessary and some teachers' time to make a study of individual needs and to carry on the work is necessary. This plan should be considered in the near future.

III. INSTRUCTION:

In the rural schools the instruction has been good.

The instruction in the village school this year has been good in consideration of the unfavorable conditions under which teachers and pupils have worked. In the new building excellent facilities offer the opportunity for more efficient work on the part of all.

Your teachers are well trained, capable, earnest and conscientious in their endeavors. Certain phases of the work have necessarily been omitted during the first half of the year. At this writing, February 1, we expect to be in the new building soon and shall endeavor to do the work we have had to postpone. In nearly all of the grades we have been able to do the normal amount of work in content.

As soon as we are well established in the new building I shall give standard mental tests to all pupils. Copies of the results will be on file in the school office and will be available for teachers' use. They will be an aid in determining individual needs. Before the close of the year standard achievement tests will be given in the elementary grades and in the different departments in the high school. These will help determine pupil progress in comparison with other schools. Test results are recognized as one form of

school measurement. They do not tell the whole story but are a help in administration and in teaching.

An extension course under the direction of the Department of Education of the University of New Hampshire has been organized in Littleton during the year. Thirty-five teachers from Littleton, Bethlehem, Lisbon, Whitefield, and other towns have been enrolled in this course in the study of Diagnostic and Remedial Teaching. Four of your teachers have been students in this course.

Headmaster Cummings has conducted regular meetings on teaching technique with the high school teachers throughout the year. To make every teacher a student of her pupils and of her particular job as well as of the subject matter she is teaching is our goal.

THE NEW BUILDING

Your new building is located on the site of the old one. The Turner family has given additional land on the same terms as the old lot was originally given to provide ample room for an excellent playground. When the building is completed and fully equipped and the land graded you will have provided luxuriously for the needs of your school pupils. The location is excellent, the building is modern, convenient, and large enough to meet your school needs for many years.

The building is a combination of steel, brick, concrete and wood. It is classified as slow-burning, with fireproof corridors, stairways, and boiler room. The exterior is sand struck faced brick with inner walls of terra cotta hollow tile. The tile in the corridors is glazed surface known as vitribrik. The foundation of the building is a minimum of five feet below the grade. The base wall is 16 inches thick with a footing of 2 feet, 4 inches. The roof is called the Bonded Barrett roof. It is a combination four ply tar and gravel flat roof, slightly pitched to the drains.

The interior of the building is beautiful throughout. The main corridor from the central front door to the auditorium is a barrel vaulted lobby of sand-finished plaster, 10 feet wide. All other corridors are 9 feet wide and are of the glazed surface hollow tile. The ceilings in the corridors and in the auditorium are

Acoustic-Celotex. The floors throughout the corridors are asphalt tile with sanitary cove bases. The stairways are steel with cement and with asphalt tread. The door frames throughout the building are steel. The classroom doors are the wide paneled Roddis doors, three ply birch on pine core.

There are four classrooms on the first floor, five on the second, and three possible ones in the basement. The most of these rooms are 22 feet wide and 35 feet long. The high school study room is 26 feet wide and 42 feet long. These rooms have four large windows 4 feet, 9 inches x 8 feet, 6 inches, equipped with Forse doubleroll canvas window shades. The artificial light will be furnished with four 100 watt bulbs enclosed in 16 inch semi-indirect shades. The floors are oak treated with Minwax, a mineral gum. The wardrobes are in the rear of the rooms. They have a wall radiator for drying the clothes and open directly into the ventilating system. The blackboards are slate with cork top. All of the classrooms have electric clocks and bells, operated from a master clock in the office. All of the rooms used are equipped with modern furniture.

The auditorium is an especially beautiful room. The walls are plastered on arborite, a sound deadener. The ceiling is Acoustic-Celotex. The floor is maple. The stage is 16 feet deep with a front of 21 feet, 5 inches in width. It has three dressing rooms and lavatory. There is a modern booth for motion picture or stereopticon. The auditorium is equipped with 300 portable chairs of latest design and with 64 fixed opera chairs in the balcony. The wall decorations are of molded plaster.

The gymnasium is 66 feet x 42 feet. The floor is Leatherok, a leather composition floor material, especially suitable for athletic work. Stairs lead from the gymnasium to the auditorium stage and to the basement of the main building. The room is well lighted, well heated, and well ventilated. A bench extends around the room to furnish seating capacity for athletic contests. The gymnasium has ample storage closets for athletic equipment for all time. In the basement of the main building are locker rooms for boys and for girls connected with shower baths and toilets. Each locker room has 15 steel lockers for clothes. The gymnasium is

one of the best in this part of the state for basketball and all indoor physicial training.

The building has a principal's office, a room for school board or superintendent, a teachers' room, and two storage rooms for books and supplies. These rooms are simply furnished for all immediate administrative needs.

The building requires 6,000 square feet of radiation. It is equipped with two Smith sectional boilers with rated capacity of 10,000 square feet. Ample radiation seems to be furnished in all rooms. The boiler room also contains a large copper tank for hot water and a small furnace to heat this tank. This will furnish hot water for the shower rooms, kitchen, science laboratory, and the lavatories. Lavatories are placed on all floors.

The ventilating system is a semi-gravity system with eight ventilators in the roof.

You provided your building committee with a \$100,000.00 bond issue to construct and equip this building. You have built at an opportune time when building costs have been low, thereby saving several thousand dollars. While I have no technical knowledge of building costs I have a strong impression that your committee has discharged its duty with the highest efficiency and faithfulness. So much value has been put into the building that your committee has been unable to completely equip every room. Some slight changes have been made in the construction and completion of some of the rooms at the request of the school board and superintendent since the plans were accepted and the contracts let. These changes have entailed additional expense. Whatever equipment can not be purchased by the building committee with their available money should be cheerfully assumed by the school district at such time in the future as the finances permit. Not all of the things desired need to be purchased this year or next. A small amount in the budget each year will provide all of the needs for all of the departments.

These needs include additional equipment in the kitchen and lunch room, stage scenery in the auditorium, equipment for elemen-

tary woodworking courses in the manual training room, and some equipment for physical training courses in the gymnasium.

V. FINANCES:

On page 66 you have in parallel columns the payments for the last school year, the budget for the present year and payments to date. February 1, and budget for the year beginning July 1. On the following page you have an estimate of receipts available for the present year and the estimated amount needed to complete this year. The difference shows a probable balance on June 30 next of \$100.00. Following that you have an estimate of receipts other than taxation during the next school year, beginning July 1. The difference between the budget for next year and the total estimated receipts is \$31,323.00. I recommend that you raise at your school meeting the sum of \$31,000.00. The school board supports this recommendation. Last year you raised \$24,500.00 of which \$2,000,00 was for the payment of interest. The previous year you raised \$21,500.00. Of the amount recommended this year \$9,000.00 must be used for payment of bonds and interest. Thus, the amount of \$22,000.00 requested for current school needs is about the same as raised during the past few years.

While the \$31,000.00 is slightly less than the estimated needs we believe that it is better to take the chance of closing the year in June 1933 with a slight deficit than to ask the district for an amount greater than \$31,000.00 this year. Every effort will be made to have no deficit if this amount is voted.

In your new building you will have room to accommodate all of the pupils in town. This year there are only eleven pupils at Gilmanton Hill, with a prospect of a smaller number for next year. At Bethlehem Junction the present membership is nineteen. The roads from both of these schools to the village are excellent. You can give much better instruction to the pupils in the new building than you can possibly give in the rural schools. If safe and comfortable transportation is provided, the parents in these districts should welcome the increased advantages that their children would have in the new building. The present number of teachers in the new building can care for these additional pupils until such time

as the school board wishes to introduce complete courses in practical arts into the curricula. The cost of the salaries of two teachers, repairs, fuel, and janitor service at the Junction and Gilmanton Hill would be reduced to the cost of transportation alone. The money saving would be considerable.

An additional sum would be saved if the district transported to the Bethlehem High School the pupils at Gilmanton Hill now attending high school in Littleton. With a large investment in your new building reasonable economy and the greatest efficiency should be sought for the benefit of all the pupils in town.
