TOWN WARRANT

(L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the town of Croydon qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To see if it is expedient to revise the Constitution.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget act.

Art. 4. To see if the town will accept State aid for construction of the class II road known as the Turnpike, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$616.50; the State to give \$1,232.00; or will accept State aid for construction of class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$323.22, the State to give \$1,292.89.

Art. 5. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of highways and bridges.

Art. 6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for keeping the roads open during the winter.

Art. 7. To raise all necessary sums of money for defraying other town charges.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for its use during the year in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 9. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for White Pine Blister Rust control, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to buy a snow plow, and raise money for the same.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to apply the unexpended amount raised for Town Hall, on the purchase of a snow plow.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to buy a road machine and raise money for the same.

Art. 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying fire fighting apparatus, and raise money for the same.

Art. 14. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise toward repairs on the East Village Church.

Art. 15. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Croydon:

The eighteenth annual report of the public schools of Croydon is herewith presented. It is the fourth such document by the present writer.

SURVEY

There are no marked changes in the educational affairs of the District during the past year. The interest in the work on the part of both pupils and teachers continues on a high plane. There are rather more pupils in the Flat School than have been in attendance for some years past. The school fundamentals are adequately taught. It is believed that improved surroundings have added both to the comfort and interest of all concerned.

The Ryder Corner School continues to enroll a small number of pupils. It is almost questionable whether or not a school with ten pupils or less can be operated economically and efficiently. The transportation problem in this area would be so great it hardly seems advisable to attempt to close this building for the present.

REPAIRS

The repairs which were recommended last year for the Flat School have been completed at a reasonable cost. The ceiling of the building has been replaced and the entire interior received a new coat of paint. There was also provided additional light by the installation of two windows in wall spaces which were adequate. The front steps and platform were entirely re-built so that the building presents on the whole a satisfactory appearance. It is probable that the next step will be that of painting the outside of this building. It now needs such attention. One other improvement has been the installation of a circulating heater in this room to replace the awkward stove already in operation. This has made possible a clearing of the front of the room so that there is more workable space for both pupils and teacher.

BUDGET

The repairs which have been carried on for the past two years have been made possible without greatly adding to the requests made in the annual budget. This has been brought about partly by the increased allotment made by the State Department and partly by the economical operation of the schools. The budget prepared for the year 1937-1938 will require an assessment of practically the same as that of the cur-

rent year. It is believed that this budget will make possible a satisfactory working basis for the operation of the schools. Some of the items are difficult to adjust in that it becomes necessary to anticipate expenditures which can not easily be known in advance. This is especially true in the case of tuition. The School Board has attempted to base its request upon what seemed to be a reasonable expectation of such costs.

Your Superintendent has made about the usual number of visits to your schools. The school nurse has carried on the routine health inspection and assisted the teachers in following up doubtful and suspicious cases. It sometimes happens that visits to the homes on the part of the nurse assist the parents in remedying a mild difficulty on the part of a pupil. In this way the attendance of the pupils at the school becomes more and more regular. It is particularly gratifying to know that this community continues to take an interest in its schools. It is by the united effort of all members of a community that it is possible to improve school conditions and provide in a larger way for the welfare of the boys and girls.
