TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the several highways and bridges.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to obtain State aid for building State road and to decide where to build the same.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the State road.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow paths.

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7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in improving the cemeteries.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, to be expended under the direction of the State Forestry Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town.

12. To see how much of the Parsonage funds the Town will vote to spend for preaching for the year ensuing.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

February 8, 1927.

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

Herewith I submit to you my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

MORE RELIABLE REPORT CARD MARKS.

Short weekly standardized tests in reading and arithmetic, grades 3 to 8, are now supplied to the teachers. These same tests have been given to very many pupils of the corresponding grades in many other towns and cities, and there is a record of the scores made by the pupils of each grade. By comparing our pupils' marks with those made in the other towns and cities, our teachers have a reliable guide for judging just what quality of work our pupils are doing.

Ask to See the New Arithmetic Practice Exercises.

This year the schools have been supplied with some new practice exercises in arithmetic. They are bound into pamphlets and are called "The Arithmetic Word Book." We are expecting them to assist in raising our arithmetic work to a higher standard. They are for grades 3 to 8.

MORAL INSTRUCTION IN THE SCHOOLS.

The religion of behavior and conduct includes the principles of honesty, reverence, kindness, courage, temperance, fair-play, justice, thrift, industry, etc., including many other such characteristics. In our efforts to build those principles into the characters of our boys and girls the following measures are taken:

- 1. No teacher is given a license to teach in this state whose moral character has not been certified to by three persons, and her license is permanently taken away if immorality is proved.
- 2. The Bible or Bible stories may be read in the morning exercises.
- 3. The morning session is opened with prayer.
- 4. Inspirational poems or psalms are memorized.
- 5. Reading books are chosen that have some character-building material.
- 6. Books describing the lives or accomplishments are added to the school library.
- 7. The teacher in her class-room discipline and playground supervision attempts to require the pupils to follow those principles of behavior in their school life.
- 8. Various other ways, as stories told, discussions, dramatizations, etc.

The above principles in the **religion of behavior** are common to all creeds, hence should be taught in the public schools.

The religion of belief is sectarian; its principles vary according to the denomination of the church. Hence, these should not be taught in the public schools, but reserved for the Sunday School and home. They include such items as the following:

- 1. Must a person be baptized in order to be acceptable to God?
- 2. Was Jesus a divine being, or was he a perfect man?
- 3. Is it true that Jonah was in a whale three days?
- 4. Will Christ return in person to rule on earth 1000 years?
- 5. Did Peter really found the church of Rome-
- 6. Did the crucifixion of Christ relieve us from the consequences of our own sins?

SCHOOL OBSERVANCE OF HOLIDAYS.

Labor Day, Columbus Day, Armistice Day, Thanksgiving Day, New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Fast Day, Flag Day, Memorial Day and Arbor Day are the ten holidays that occur while school is in session.

In New Hampshire seven of these are so-called "legal holidays." The term "legal holiday" does not mean that schools must not keep, or that banks, factories and stores must be closed. It merely means that if a check or note is so dated that it falls on that holiday, payment cannot be demanded until the next succeeding business day.

To close the schools on each of the ten holidays would shorten each pupil's school year by two weeks.

Columbus was a student of geography and mathematics. It is quite certain that he would prefer our children to celebrate his discovery of America by regular attendance at school where special attention would be given to his courage, perseverance and life, and their knowledge of geography and mathematics increased by loyal work in their regular lessons.

He would not prefer that the schools be closed and that the pupils spend the day in idleness.

A similar argument applies to nearly all the other holidays.

THE IMPROVEMENT IN WRITTEN ENGLISH SINCE 1921...

The following table shows the number of errors per 100 words made in the mid-year written composition tests in 1921 and 1927.

The center column of figures gives the number of errors per 100 words.

Each figure at the right or left represents a pupil of that grade.

For example, the 7, 7, 5 at the right of 1 error means that two 7th grade pupils and one 5th grade pupil each made 1 error per 100 words.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT.

The various reports as submitted cover the work and expense for the school year ending June 30, 1926.

Without comment thereon the board desires, rather, to call attention to some of the present problems; to this end Article IX, relative to the old primary building, was inserted in the warrant. This building has not been occupied for regular school work for about ten years, and its future use for this purpose seems most improbable.

To better safeguard the health of the pupils of the Eaton school, Article X was entered. The old-style toilets attached to this building, at the best, are unsanitary and unsatisfactory; and when directly connected with the class rooms as they are, the odor therefrom at times is most obnoxious. Under this system it cannot by any means of control be entirely avoided.

Passing to work of the present year: the extension of the electric line made possible the lighting of the North school. The cost of installation (\$28) was taken by the board from the surplus of last year.
