## Town Warrant

---

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the inhabitants of the Town of East Kingston in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said East Kingston on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to permit use of Town Hall for recreational purposes.

4. To see if the town will vote that it is expedient to revise the Constitution (State).

5. To see what action the town will take in regard to continuing insurance on town help.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to give certain discounts for early payment of taxes.

8. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the portion of old dirt road now on westerly side of Route No. 108 and connected at both ends to Route 108 and lying south of residence of E. G. W. Currier.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Memorial Day purposes.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for library.

11. To see if the town will vote to build a fire well at foot of Lombard Hill at estimated cost of \$75.00, and raise and appropriate money for same.

12. To see if the town will vote to build a fire well near residence of W. A. Yeaton at estimated cost of \$250.00, and raise and appropriate money for same.

13. To see if the town will vote to paint exterior of Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for same.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for cutting bushes on town roads.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$490.50 against the State's appropriation of \$1,000.00 for state aid construction; this sum to be expended on South Road.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$151.39 against the State's appropriation of \$605.55 for Class V Road Assistance. No town may receive both Class V and State Aid in same year.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be expended on the South Road.

18. To see if the town will vote to accept W. P. A. project for cutting banks on East and Giles' Roads, if avail-

able, and raise and appropriate money for same.

19. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

You will notice from this tabulation in the net figure column, the effect of State Aid upon your costs. Your costs are next to the highest in this Union but indicate a substantial reduction from the figure of three years ago. The increase in State Aid represents a large share of this saving to the local district.

If you compare your total current cost per \$1000 with the other districts of this union, you will notice three other districts in less favorable situations than your own. Although still not what we would desire it, if State Aid was not forthcoming, local taxation would have to stand the whole of the \$14.90. Subtracting from this latter figure the

\$3.75 in State Aid, we get \$11.15 as the net result to the district—a computation which reflects favorably with the median districts of the State not aided.

### MUSIC

An innovation has been started this year in the field of music teaching in the schools. Prior to this year, three districts of this Union had supported a music teacher and supervisor. The other five districts relied upon the varying talents of their teachers to carry on the program in this important phase of cultural and leisure-time attainments. So, with a desire to see the development and coordination of these efforts, the State Department of Education offered to finance the salary of a music teacher in all state-aided districts provided a whole Union would finance the necessary travelling expense. This offer was placed before every board in this Union and accepted this Fall. The organization was completed and became effective November 30, 1936.

In the short time that the plan has been in operation, we find a hearty response to its effectiveness and value. The schools in which the plan is not new are pleased for its continuance and those in which no supervisor formerly taught are enthusiastic for the innovation. I am happy to say that I believe this plan for music instruction of this type is the most important development we have accomplished during my tenure in this office. A warning to all concerned was given that the expectation of results need not be great for the remainder of the year, but our fondest hopes have been exceeded by the accomplishments to date.

Financially, this arrangement has proved a help to those districts in which a supervisor had been employed. The salary proportion for which they are responsible now becomes a part of State Aid whereas they formerly bore the whole cost. The five new districts have added but a small charge for travelling expense, the salary being no charge whatsoever.

## CONCLUSION

I am again pleased to report the genuine cooperation of a conscientious teaching staff and the sympathetic guidance of an interested School Board. The work of the year has been both pleasant and profitable for pupils and school officials.
