To the inhabitants of the Town of Errol in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Errol on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repair of highways and bridges.
- 4. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the public library.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the cemetery.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the fire department.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to construct a road to the camps in back of Akers Pond and raise money for the same.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to keep a separate account of the electric lighting plant, keeping separate bank account of the receipts holding the balance, if any, as a sinking fund to purchase new equipment when necessary.
- 10. To see if the town will vote for a Supervisor of the lighting system said supervisor to have complete charge of the plant until replaced by vote of the town.
- 11. To transact any other business that may be legally brought before the meeting.

If owners of windthrown timber have not yet acted, they should communicate with those who can help. Town Chairmen are fully informed; State Advisory Agents can help to start logging by suggesting names of operators and giving other useful advice; Federal Agencies are increasing the number of log storage places as rapidly as possible. Individuals must now cooperate!

Forest fire danger for several years will be greater than usual. So much work must be done by public agencies to reduce hazard along roadsides, near improved and other exposed areas that many places will remain hazardous for some time to come. Individual Landowners must take a personal interest! Aid in clean-up work through the Agricultural Conservation Program is available to any woodland owner at \$4.00 per acre on areas up to 15 acres. The County Agent should be consulted.

Support your local Forest Fire Wardens and Deputies. They are planning, with State and Federal agencies, an intensive campaign to control fires. Help them by strict observance of the fire laws. Kindle no open fires without a permit from the Warden except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooperate by reporting fires you may see and in other ways. Fire fighting tool supplies are inadequate and should be reasonably increased by many towns. You can help, and it will pay, to prevent Forest Fires!

Superintendent's Report

To the Errol School Board:

I hereby submit for your consideration my fifth annual report of the Errol School:

Teachers

There was but one change in the teaching force at the close of the year in June 1938; viz., Donovan H. Stevens was replaced by Stewart D. Thompson as Headmaster. Mr. Thompson is a Keene graduate and a teacher of considerable successful experience. The other teachers are the same as the previous year,—Mary G. Foster, home economics and high school assistant; Irma H. Willard, a Plymouth graduate, for the intermediate graders; and Margaret Tracy, a Plymouth graduate, for the primary grades.

Enrollment

In September 1938, the enrollment was as follows: Grade 1—7; Grade II—5; Grade III—4; Grade IV—5; Grade V—13; Grade VI—6; Grade VII—8; Grade VIII—6; GRADE IX—2; Grade X—7. The total registration is 64. There are seven tuition pupils from Millsfield and twelve from Wentworth's Location.

There is one pupil, Leslie C. Stewart, attending Austin-Cate Academy; two at Colebrook Academy, Hartley Sweatt and George Gray, and two, Merit Bean and Curtis Ferren, at Berlin High School.

Transportation

The transportation routes this year are as follows: James Jordan has the Millsfield route, the same as last year, with 20 pupils, and William Forbush has the river route with four pupils. The 12 coming from

Wentworth's Location are transported by Clayton Turner.

Equipment

Some new books have been purchased and supplies as needed for the different schools. A power tool grinder, and a power saw, and some small hand tools have been purchased for the manual training shop. Some very satisfactory articles have been made by the boys. One or two more pieces of machinery would be very useful for the shop. An electric range has been supplied for the Home Economics Department. This is much appreciated by the teacher and pupils in this department.

Noon Lunches

Something, in the way of a warm dish, is prepared by the Home Economics Department for those pupils who take their lunches. The cost is very small and any deficit is made up by the Parent-Teacher Association. The warm dish is very much appreciated by the pupils during the colder months of the school year.

Building

The school building is kept in very good condition and is always comfortable when I have been there.

Health

The change in the health organization did not work out as well as was expected last year. This year a change has been made to agree with our former schedule.

School Census

The school census taken last September showed 27 boys and 23 girls or a total of 50 pupils in town between the ages 5—16. Three between 5—8 were not in school. The total number accounted for in school is 47.

The number of pupils registered in the schools September 30, 1938 was 66 between 5—16 and two over 16. The number attending high school outside of the district, without respect to age, is five.

Statistics

From the registers returned by the teachers last June was gleaned the following information: The schools were in session 36 weeks net, there were registered 63 different pupils, the precent of attendance was 95.4, three pupils were not absent or tardy during the school year, 111 tardy marks were recorded, 12 non-resident pupils in the elementary school and two in the high school. School board members made five visit to the schools, citizens made eight visits and the superintendent was credited with 114 visits. The school board held five meetings during the year.

Perfect Attendance

The following children were not absent or tardy during the year—Jacqueline Bean, Amos McLeod and Howard Raymond.

Graduates

The following pupils completed the work of the tenth grade on June 10, 1938; viz., Lora Jean Sweeney, Merit Walter Bean, Curtis Gordon Ferren and Roy Ray McLeod. Some of these have gone to other schools to complete their high school education.

Conclusion

In conclusion, I may state that one general teachers' meeting was held at the opening of the schools in September and the problems that have arisen since have been discussed with the individual teacher who was personally interested. My suggestions, for the most part, have been made to the teacher personally. Good and successful results are being accomplished in the different schools.
