## TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, a Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, a Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, by separate ballot, a member of the Library Trustee for three years by separate ballot, a Sexton, two auditors, a Constable, a Chief of Police, a Memorial Day Committee, a Trustee of Cemeteries for three years, and any other necessary Town Officers.

2. To choose two for three years for the Budget Committee, whose duty is co-operating with the Selectmen to prepare, as prescribed by law, the annual Town Budget, and acting in an advisory capacity to make recommendations on the articles of the Town Warrant.

3. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges including Town Officers' salaries, expenses for Town Officers, Election and Registration, care and supplies for Town Hall, Police Department, Fire Department, Damages by Dogs, Health Department, Vital Statistics, Snow Pathing, Street Lights, General Expenses of Highway Department, Town Poor, Fence between property of the Town and Forrest Bailey, Interest on Temporary Loans and on Long Term Notes and on principal of Trust Funds used by Town.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate amounts as recommended by N. H. Highway Department for State Aid Maintenance.

5. To see if the Town will vote to elect a Patrol for the Town roads and raise or appropriate money for the same.

6. To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise or appropriate for the improvement of Butnam's Hill, so called.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate to keep the unimproved roads and bridges in repair, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate to meet the expense of the Public Library the ensuing year.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate for the care of cemeteries the ensuing year.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate amounts as recommended by N. H. Highway Department for State Aid Construction.

12. To see if the Town will vote to pay Long Term notes amounting to \$2000.00.

13. To see what action the Town will take, if any, in regard to Town forests.

14. To see what action the Town will take, if any for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.

15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to take necessary steps to reduce the present number of street lights.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town.

17. To hear the reports of auditors and committees and act thereon.

18. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, the cross road leading from Leighton's Corner, East Hampstead, to the road leading to Danville.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate to be used in the further improvement of the Wash Pond or Page Road (so called), and what method they will adopt to expend the same. (By request.)

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars for repairing the road on Central Street, East Hampstead. (By request.)

21. To raise or appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, (\$500.00) for the development of the athletic field and for the purchase of additional land adjacent to the present tract for the athletic uses of schools and town. (By request.)

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# HELEN W. THOMAS, R. N.,

School Nurse, Salem Union, No. 53.

To the Superintendent and School Board of Hampstead:—

I herewith present my annual report as supervisor of music in the Hampstead Schools.

The work in this department seems to grow from year to year. Today the teaching of music does not mean simply the development of the voice, and the reading of notes. While these subjects are being carried on as successfully as ever much stress is laid upon the appreciation of music.

The work in this line usually proves very interesting to the few who cannot sing, and the boys with changing voices. The pupils are given a list of the instruments in the orchestra, divided into four groups as follows: Strings, wood-winds, brasses and percussion. With the aid of the victrola the tone of each instrument is listened to separately and then in combination. Pictures are used to show the shape of each one, and method of producing tone. The records for this purpose have been carefully chosen from some of the world's best known classics.

Even a very young child is susceptible to the sounds of beautiful music. His ear is alert and registers conceptions very early, so the little people too have their listening lessons in music.

Sometimes the story of the music is told before the record is displayed and the children are allowed to raise their hands when they hear something the teacher has told them to listen for. Very often nothing is told about the music played, but the children show the teacher just what it tells then to do. In this way better than any other the study of rhythm is developed.

At the High School there are two classes in music. The time in the senior department is devoted to four-part chorus work, in the junior department to three-part chorus work and music memory testing. The list of selections with the name of the composer included in this test, follows:

## THE HIGH SCHOOL.

To the Superintendent and School Board:

The enrollment of the Senior High School for the school year of 1925-26 totalled forty-two (42).

The class distribution is as follows: Eight (8) Seniors, six (6) Juniors, sixteen (16) Sophomores, twelve (12) Freshmen. This is noticeably an unusually large number of pupils for our High School. It is a matter of congratulation for the town tax payers that so many pupils are enrolled from whom the town receives tuition dues. The unprecedented number in attendance has necessitated an appreciable increase in the seating facilities of the main room. The capacity of the building is now very nicely adjusted to the body of pupils that attend.

The enrollment of the Junior High School totalled twenty-nine (29). Of this number twenty (20) pupils constituted the Eighth Grade and nine (9) constituted the Seventh Grade.

At the High School Commencement in June of 1926 two pupils were graduated. These were Marion Pettingill and Dexter Witherell.

The staff of teachers during the period from the month of January to the month of June included Bruce Russell, Headmaster; Arthur Robert Davies, First Assistant; Merta Alice Davies, Special teacher, for the French Language; Lila Perry, Miss Irene Brickett, Principal of the Junior High School. The Staff during this period was unusually strong in its inclusion of a body of teachers of training and experience.

The staff of teachers during the period of September to January 1927 includes the following: Arthur Robert Davies, Headmaster; E.H. Parkinson, First Assistant; Martha A. Weed, Elizabeth Bylow, Principal of the Junior High School.

During both terms efficient work has been done. In many departments the pupils exceeded the state requirements. State tests offered from time to time found the pupils well prepared. Several new features were introduced. Clubs were formed and several excursions to outside points of historic and literary interest were visited by the entire school.

Teachers and students feel sincerely appreciative of the efforts of Superintendent and members of the School Board to meet the demands of the High School for a progressive program within the limits of the moneys appropriated by the town. May the Headmaster also express for pupils and teachers alike our gratitude to the generous hearted taxpayers who stand ready at all times to make liberal appropriations for the education of as fine a body of students as assemble in any High School of New Hampshire.
