TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsboro, County of Hillsboro in said State qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet in Childs Opera House in said town on Tuesday the Tenth day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk, a Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years. Trustee of Trust funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, Community Building, appropriations for street lights and all current expenses of the town and such amounts as may be necessary to apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

- Article 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges, culverts and sidewalks.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for Memorial Day purposes.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of band concerts for the coming season.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for a new town truck or take any action in relation thereto.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to apply as a sponsors contribution in connection with the W.P.A. Work Project being carried on at the Grimes Field, said sum to be expended in the purchase of material for a grandstand and fence, at said Grimes Field, or take any action in relation thereto.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to install and maintain a street light at some point between the Bartemus Grain store and the Davison Garage on that way

leading southerly from Henniker Street to the Boston and Maine freight house; or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower its Board of Selectmen and Town Treasurer to issue bonds of the town in such an amount necessary, and at such rate of interest as they may deem satisfactory, for the purpose of refunding all outstanding demand notes of the town, including what may be due from the town on account of expended trust funds; all in accordance with the provisions of Chap. 48 of the 1935 Session Laws of the State of New Hampshire; or take any action in relation thereto.

During the year 1935, the following improvements were made to the water system.

Myrtle Street, renewing the old cement line with 1,059 feet of cast iron main, at a cost of \$2,193.22. Of this amount the Precinct paid \$1,329.01. The balance of \$864.21 being contributed by the State and Federal Government.

On Central Street, 526 feet of six inch cast iron main was laid at a cost of \$991.14. Cost divided as follows: Precinct \$562.45, Federal and State grants \$428.69.

Butler Street, 920 feet of six inch cast iron main at a total cost of \$1,790.20, divided as follows: Precinct cost \$1,040.40, State and Federal grants \$749.80.

Preston Street, 380 feet of one inch copper main. Total cost of \$342.74 was divided as follows: Precinct \$140.00, State and Federal grants \$202.74.

On Wall Street, a new line of 235 feet of one inch copper main was laid at a cost of \$235.50. This cost was divided as follows: Precinct \$95.70, and State and Federal grants \$137.80.

The last of the old, original cement pipe was replaced this year.

General Discussion

During the summer vacation the school board and the superintendent of schools tended to the necessary repairs of the school houses, the purchase of books and scholars' supplies, and the replacement of the old desks and seats in all the schools, excepting at the Center School, which will be similarly provided for next fall. The Merrill school received extensive repairs and improvements.

We commend the teachers for their good teaching, the efficient handling of their schools, and the fine programs which they have presented in their schools for the benefit of the public. Special programs were presented by the various schools during Education week. The public responded in large numbers thus bringing together homes and schools in the interest of the children.

Frequent teachers' meetings are held for the discussion of educational matters and problems pertaining to the schools of the district.

This winter a little time has been lost because of the weather conditions. This emphasizes the importance of maintaining good attendance during the fine weather in order to make up for the lost time. We hope that both parents and their children will help in this respect.

Parents whose children attend rural schools should not be too anxious to have their children skip grades.

The ability to do the work of the next grade is not the only factor to consider. The child who skips a grade misses the work, the information, and the social contacts and development which is afforded by the year's time spent in the grade. Besides, children who skip grades reach high school too immature to get the full benefit from a high school education. Then too, such children leave school so young that they run the risk of having to remain at home with nothing to do.

It takes all of the first year at least for a new superintendent to gain a full knowledge and appreciation of the work which the school district needs. He is trying to learn as fast as he can.

The superintendent appreciates his opportunity to make a contribution to the educational institutions of Hillsborough.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

We present herewith our financial report for the year ending June 30, 1935 together with that of the Treasurer. Likewise we submit the report of our Superintendent which this year covers the last period to the date of writing rather than the strict calendar dates of the school year.

Expenses for the year ending June 30, 1935 totaled \$31,379.83 including premiums of \$423.75 for additional fire insurance provided by special appropriation made at the last annual meeting. The original budget for 1935 made in March, 1934 was \$31,667.38* which we revised in March, 1935 to \$31,122.85.* Deducting the additional fire insurance covered by special appropriation during the current year, the saving over the original budget was \$711.30.

Following the practice established in our last report to present more current financial information than the report for the period ended nine months previously, we show below our present estimate of expenses for the current year.

As shown in the above table we expect to make savings in the current year in comparison with our budget of about \$722.93. This arises partly from savings in staff salary expense which could not have been predicted in advance and partly from improved executive control by the superintendent and principals.

We are particularly gratified by the progress made by all members of our teaching staff and their full and hearty cooperation to the many changes made this year in school curriculum and methods of teaching. These changes are dealt with fully in the report of our superintendent and will not be repeated here. Exceptional credit is due to Mr. Gatto for the manner in which he has undertaken his new duties, and to Miss Belcher for her leadership and initiative as principal of the Grammar School.

We have made efforts to reduce the cost of our debt which amounts to one-fifth of the entire sum to be raised by school taxes. The subject is treated fully in the letter quoted below, written to the holders of the bonds. No final reply has been received to the date of writing and a special article is included in the warrant should it be necessary to take any action relating to the debt.

Copy of Letter Relating to the School Debt

Hillsboro, N. H. Feb. 19, 1936

Board of Trustees Hillsborough Guaranty Savings Bank Hillsboro, N. H.

Gentlemen: -

The Hillsboro Special School District has outstanding as of the present date, \$37,000 of bonds, all of which we believe are owned by you. The bonds are what remain of an issue of slightly more than twice this amount, sold a decade or more ago to finance the building of the present Hillsboro High School. The bonds carry an interest rate of $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ and are due in serial form at the rate of \$4,000 per year, and have, therefore, approximately nine years to run. We believe the contract makes no reference to their being either callable or non-callable.

During most of the period since these bonds were issued, prevailing market rates of interest for this type of

bond have been somewhat less than $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ and during the past several years and at the present time, very materially less.

Likewise at the present time, an unusual need exists for the town to economize in every way possible to reduce mounting taxes. The amount to be raised to pay principal and interest on these bonds next year is \$5,665.00 or more than one-fifth of the entire amount of money to be raised by school taxation next year.

In view of the need to reduce taxes, and in view of the fact that these bonds could be refunded today at a great saving in interest to the community, we would like to ask if you would agree to one of the following plans.

- 1. By contractual agreement between the Hillsboro Special School District and you as bondholders, and by stamping the outstanding bonds appropriately, reduce the interest rate to 3%.
- 2. Or would you accept payment at par of the \$37,000 of bonds now outstanding to permit the District to refund them at a lower rate of interest in order to reduce taxation?

You understand, of course, that state law relating to municipal finances dose not permit of extending the due date of the debt without special act of the legislature so that any plan of reducing taxation involving this feature is not practical.

We understand that the Board of Trustees of the bank will meet on Feb. 26. We have included a special article in the school warrant so that appropriate action could be taken at the annual school meeting without the necessity of calling a special school meeting.

We would appreciate an early reply after your meeting.

General Discussion

During the summer vacation were purchased the necessary books and scholars' supplies. Extensive repairs were made to the roof of the Grammar school building. The basements of said building were painted and made more sanitary. The lighting of the rooms in the Grammar school has been partly improved. Plans are being considered to complete the job probably during the current year. At this writing a painter has been engaged to paint the ceilings and walls of two class rooms in the building in question. In order not to make the job of painting the school rooms too expensive for any one year, it is planned to paint two rooms a year.

At the high school the creaky stairs were silenced. The exposed steam pipes were covered with asbestos, which resulted in better heating, and the saving of fuel. Paper towels and liquid soap are furnished for the children of both schools, and other fixtures to help in the way of personal hygiene. The equipment of the Home Economics department has been considerably enlarged. The room which was previously used to store supplies on the first floor at the high school, is now used for a superintendent's office.

Extensive provisions have been made in both schools in the way of health activities for boys and girls. The aim has been to give every child attending the public schools an opportunity to engage in some form of outdoor physical exercises. This has been accomplished without

diminishing the opportunities of the athletic teams to win honors in athletic contests with the other high schools of the state, in which respect the high school

teams enjoy a place of distinction.

In the month of November the elementary schools observed National Education Week before a capacity audience in the eighth grade room. Each grade presented some phase of school work. Talks were given by several teachers explaining some of the new work which is done this year in the way of cooking and sewing by the girls of the two upper grades, and manual training by the boys of the same grades. The superintendent of schools spoke on the history and significance of American Education Week, and the aims of the schools of Hillsboro. The program was followed by an inspection of the children's work in the various parts of the building, and delicious refreshments were served by the girls of the seventh and the eighth grades. That was a beginning in the series of programs planned to be presented before the public during the course of the year.

The program of studies in the Grammar school has been enriched in several ways. A modern course in Mathematics has been introduced all through the grades resulting in a stronger foundation for the study of high school mathematcis. The same has been done with Geography, the study of English, Spelling, Reading, and Hygiene. Vocational Civics, Manual Training, and Domestic Science have been introduced in the seventh and the grades. These improvements in the program of studies have obviously required the purchase of new equipment, and new sets of books. The use of the Home Economics Laboratory at the high school has been extended to the girls of the two upper grades of the Grammar school. The pupils go to the high school accompanied by the seventh grade teacher to receive instruction in the fine art of Home Making. This arrangement has doubled the value of the Home Economics department to the girls of Hillsboro. The additional opportunities in question have been made available at no greater expense to the school district than the usual cost for the support of the elementary schools. In the main it has been a question of "getting more for our money."

The high school offers the customary courses which have been enjoyed for a period of years. A course in Psychology has been added. The course emphasizes personal

and social relationships. It is not intended to be a technical course.

About twenty magazines and periodicals have been made available for the pupils of the high school to supplement the work of the Social Sciences. This is done with the belief that an understanding of present day world wide conditions and movements is necessary for intelligent citizenship.

The daily program of the high school is so organized as to leave the last period of the day for assemblies, and club and health activities. This arrangement gives the tuition pupils as much opportunity to engage in the activities named as the town children. Such activities should be no longer regarded as being extra currcular but, as a legitimate part of the life of the school. It is with this belief that time is provided for them.

Two sessions at the high school would make possible a longer school day which is in accordance with present day tendency in school administration. This arrangement would enable everyone concerned to work more effectively. Noon lunches at cost have been made available for the high school pupils. The response has been so small that the wisdom of continuing the service is questioned. Important questions are: Can children of high school age be safely rushed through six hours of serious and hard high school work with only a twenty minute rest period for lunch? And are the great majority of these hustling, energetic, active, growing children adequately provided with food and rest from breakfast time until three o'clock in the afternoon, which is the earliest time that they may be expected back at home? Two hundredforty elementary school children including the first grade attend school two sessions a day, and find it perfectly possible to go home for dinner and come back to school. Yet it is rumored that such a practice would be a hardship for the young men and women of the high school.

Social and economic conditions today force boys and girls to remain in school several years longer than they used to. Unlike former years when only brilliant children survived the school curriculum, the school is called upon today, and rightly so, to furnish a program of studies within the mental grasp of the subnormal, the normal, and the bright children. The high school does not make adequate provision to educate those who either have no

ability in academic subjects, or prefer an education in the practical arts. An effort is being made to cater to the seventh and the eighth grade boys in this respect. Further opportunity should be provided for training in the manual arts in the high school. If these advantages remain unprovided for, the high school will be obliged to carry numerous individuals with no profit to themselves, and to the detriment of those children who can profit by the present offering. The basement room at the high school, which was originally intended for the teaching of Manual Arts, should sooner or later be properly equipped in order that equal educational advantages may be provided for all types of children. The high school at the present time caters to the girls better than it does to the boys. This is so because the Home Economics department caters exclusively to girls, and on general principle, the Commerce curriculum attracts more girls than boys.

The following suggestion is made for that type of pupils who in spite of the fact that they find an academic type of education difficult, still want it. Such individuals should plan on doing the work in five years instead of four. The important factor is not the number of years it takes to graduate but, to acquire the greatest benefit, and a solid foundation which will enable the individuals to do the work of post secondary schools which they may plan to attend after they graduate from high school. Parents and children should cooperate in the adoption of this plan. It is better to succeed in five years than to fail in four.

Parents should not be too anxious to have their children skip grades. The ability to do the work of the higher grade is not the only factor to consider. The child who skips a grade misses the work, the information, and the social contacts and development afforded by the year's time spent in the grade. Children who skip grades often times reach high school too immature to get the full benefit of a high school education. Then, too, such children leave school so young that they run the risk of having to remain at home with nothing to do.

Intelligence and achievement tests have been given both in the elementary and the high schools in order to discover weaknesses in the children's attainments, and to provide remedies for unsatisfactory results; furthermore to help teachers secure the utmost cooperation from the pupils for the purpose of attaining one hundred per cent promotions at the end of the year.

A democratic theory of education has been emphasized with the aim to fit the schools to the interests, needs, and capacities of the children.

Provision is made in the high school to help the children retain the fundamentals acquired in the elementary schools. This is done by a systematic review of Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Grammar, Geography, and so forth. The high school pupils as well as the elementary are given a certain amount of vocational guidance by means of excursions, visits to business and industrial establishments, and a study of what is involved in the life occupations in which they show an interest.

Before closing mention must be made of the work which is done in the Grammar school in the way of character education. Kindness, courtesy, fairness, and many other desirable qualities are stressed in the ordinary life of the school, and all social relationships, without any attempt to preach to the children. This is done in the belief that on general principle children will become that which they are taught to be.

The community in general, the school children, the teachers, the principals, and those directly responsible to the school district for the success of the schools namely, the Board of Education, have cooperated to bring about that which has been discussed in this report.

The superintendent of schools appreciates deeply his opportunity to make a contribution to the educational welfare of the children of the Hillsboro Special School District.
