

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hollis, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hollis on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the reports of the Selectmen and the Town Officers and committees.

4. To appropriate money for the Hollis School Library.

5. To appropriate money for Memorial Day.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time of appraisal.

7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Treasurer under order of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will accept state aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$657.82.

9. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2 per-cent discount on taxes paid before August 1, 1938 and to assess fines of twenty cents on all poll taxes not paid by September 1, 1938.

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a zoning law or act anything in relation thereto.

11. To transact any other necessary or proper business.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of Hollis:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report for your consideration.

Supervisory School Union No. 40

The School Districts in the Union are Amherst, Brookline, Hollis, Milford, and Mont Vernon. Hollis came into the Union July 1, 1933.

The several School Boards of a Supervisory Union together constitute a joint committee which meets annually between April 1st and June 1st at a time and place fixed by the Chairman of this joint committee. The committee organizes and chooses a Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer. At the present time Mr. Francis C. Reagan of Mont Vernon is Chairman, Mrs. Jennie S. Fessenden of Brookline is Secretary, and Mr. Raymond A. Dyer of Milford is Treasurer.

This joint Board nominates a Superintendent of Schools, fixes his salary and apportions the salary among the several districts. A Union may add such amount as they determineto the minimum amount paid by the state which at present is \$2,000.00. The additional amount voted b¹¹ the Union for the current year ending June 30, 1938 is \$1,600.00. This is divided among the several districts as follows: Amherst 17 per-cent, Brookline 8 per-cent, Hollis 14 per-cent, Milford 56 per-cent, and Mont Vernon 5 per-cent.

This joint committee also has authorized the employment of a clerk in the Superintendent's office. For salary of clerk and other office expenses the Union has appropriated \$890.00 distributed as follows: Amherst \$151.30, Brookline \$71.20, Hollis \$124.60, Milford 498.40, and Mont Vernon \$44.50.

In nominating a Superintendent of Schools each district is entitled to three representatives having one vote each on the joint Board. Each district employing more than eight fulltime teachers is entitled to one additional vote for each five teachers or major part in excess of eight, hence, in this Union each district had three votes and Milford four additional.

TEACHERS

One change only has occured since last year. Mr. J. Philip Chase of Henniker replaces Mr. Frye as Headmaster. Mr. Chase is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, 1934, and has had three years teaching experience in Bloomfield, Conn. He is also studying for an advanced degree. The subjects he teaches are Mathematics and Science. Other teachers are the same as last year and assignments are as follows: Miss Pea 1 Rideout, assistant in High School, teaching subjects are Histoly, French, Economics, and Latin; Mr. Parker Blodgett, assistant in High School, teaching subjects are Agriculture, Biology and Arithmetic; Miss Dorothy Smith, grades VII and VIII and High School English; Mrs. Madeline Denault, grades V-VI; Miss Lucinda Read, grades III-IV; Miss Emma Pitman, grades I-II.

ADULT EDUCATION

The State Board of Education has approved and authorized the establishment of several correspondence centers, socalled, throughout the state. Such a center for this region has been in operation in Milford for over a year with Mr. Albert N. Fren h of Durham directly in charge. The state supervisor is Mr. Francis C. Reagan of Mont Vernon. The offerings include unit correspondence courses in a wide variety of subjects to be taken by individuals with home preparation, and series of group meetings or lectures to meet the desires and convenience of the various localities. In Hollis a sub-center has been established with sixty-four enrollees in individual courses and two series of lectures. The first series of six lectures was concerned with Sociology and was given by Mr. French himself. At the present time Mr. Herlihy of Pepperell High School is meeting a group every Wednesday evening to discuss World Literatu e. The attendance has averaged about thirty at these meetings. Each week Mr. French visits Hollis to confer with those taking courses and to register any new members. Courses and textbooks have been provided without cost to those who register and will probably continue to be so provided and registration is still open. Further information may be secured by contacting Mrs. Robert Baker, Mr. French, or the Superintendent of Schools.

HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment in High School seems to be increasing as the table of enrollment shows. In any school of this size it is always difficult to offer a great variety of subjects because of the lack of teaching time. The offerings in Hollis are rather better in scope than in most small schools but there is still no curriculum for girls to balance the agriculture curriculum offered for boys. The offering of Biology, and Nursing and Physiology, new subjects in Hollis, has improved conditions somewhat but a full Domestic Arts curriculum for girls would be very desirable. This work would involve cooking, sewing, study of thehome, etc., and would necessitate another teacher and adequatelaboratory facilities. Such a curriculum could be worked out for Federal aid as agriculture now is.

The Hollis High School A. C. E. Association, so-called, has proved to be a valuable organization in that it brings together the various activities of the school both from the point of view of management and of finances. It tends to create among the pupils a greater interest in High School by all working together for various objectives such as athletics, dramatics, educational trips, etc. The work of financing such projects is more evenly distributed and more easily accomplished than it was before the organization was formed. By proper planning and supervision of the various activities, including athletics, the organization should be self-supporting to the extent that parents and the public in general need not be called upon for contributions.

SCHOOL SHOP

Much progress has been made since a year ago in construction of a school shop at the village plant. The \$250 which was voted last March has been put to good use in the purchase of needed materials in addition to that obtained by tearing down the No. schoolhouse. During the summer of 1937 Mr. Blodgett worked constantly and almost single-handed in putting up the frame of the shop. When school started completion of the building was carried through as a school project so that it is now practically ready, a separate building about 100 feet away from the main school house. This is built on land purchased July 1937 from Frances Goodwin. The purchase of this land also squares with the school property back of it and west of the main building The new shop is 40' x 22' and will be a very welcome change from the cramped and dark basement quarters formerly used by the boys. Mr. Blodgett is to be commended for futting through the construction of this building. Later it should be wired for electricity including a power line entrance for operation of machiner .

INSTRUCTIONAL EQUIPMENT

When the subject of Biology was introduced in 1935-1936 apparatus for that was rented from Amherst as no provision had been made in the budget to buy equipment. Now, however, complete equipment has been purchased and installed for Biology classes. This subject is being taught again this year. 1937-1938. During last summer a demand arose for a s class in Physics. To provide adequate instruction in this subject considerable apparatus had to be purchased. This was done at a cost of about \$100. Instead of buying special projection appratus for science, it was decided to buy a motion picture machine for general school work including science classes. This has proved quite successful and is being used much more widely than a special apparatus for science would have been. The loan of films on educational subjects would be welcomed at any time.

As time goes on it would probably be advisable year by year to increase the equipment in the agricultural shop. It a small appropriation is made every March complete equipment will eventually be installed.

REPAIRS AND NEEDS

Storm windows have been provided for the north side of the seventh and eighth grade rooms, and additional electric light globes have been purchased.

Storage space for books and supplies is becoming quite crowed. At present scholars' supplies such as paper, etc., have to be taken to the second floor and stored in a room at the far western end. Much of this material is then issued to teachers on the first floor and hence carried back down stairs. And the storage room is quite crowded for good accounting. If this could be used entirely for books and a new stock room built on the ground floor near the back south entrance, storing and issuing of supplies would be very much easier and much simpler. It would seem quite feasible to do this and the cost would be small

THE CLASSROOM TEACHER

Headmaster Daniel W. MacLean of Berlin, President of the New Hampshire State Teachers' Association has recently written:

duced great teachers whose influence has brought about great changes in our political, social, and economic life. In this great rush of the machine age in which we now live, the importance of the classroom teacher, in a great many cases, is lost sight of......The classroom teacher, with all the added duties as a result of the constant change in the homelife of the children under her direction, new courses of study, has met the challenge this age presents to her and is still the paramount factor in whatever situation the school finds itself. Through he wisdom and good judgment, she has chosen wisely the means best adapted to give the young people placed under her direction the culture and subject matter required to fit them for the problems of life that they must inevitably face."

Report of Headmaster of High School

Harold C. Bales, Superintendent

Milford, N. H.

I herewith submit my first report as Headmaster of Hollis High School.

A good school is an environment. It is an environment for children created and directed by teachers. It recognizes that the child is an individual living in the present. It believes that contributions of the past have brought about this present just as the present will contribute to the future.

To the pupils attending the high school a broad field of subjects is open, and if at any time there seems to be a demand for any course not being offered, an effort is made to include that course in the school curriculum, provided the facilities of the school warrant it. This year there seems to be a demand for both biology and physics. In order to offer these courses it was necessary to spend approximately \$115.00 in laboratory equipment for biology and \$100.00 for physics apparatus. Some of the more expensive pieces of physics apparatus will be borrowed from other schools when needed.

The following courses with their September enrollment are being offered in high and junior high schools this year:

Education is growth - growth in knowledges, skills, habits and attitudes. Because of difference in personalities and individualities there is no fixed formula by means of which all children can be developed to the fullest extent of their capacities. Likewise, there is no truly absolute means of grading and marking the degree to which the capacities of pupils have been developed. Therefore, this year a new type of report card is being sent to the parents. On these report cards pupils are given grades of E (excellent), G (good), P (poor), or F (failure), according to the success of each individual pupil, in the estimation of the teacher in attaining certain class standards in so far as the particular pupil is himself able to attain these standards. Besides these marks, supplementary marks are also given explaining the grades. The numerical marks of the pupils are kept on record. These are necessary when the pupils wish to enter a higher institution of learning.

Education in a modern democratic society is a social process. Children should be developed to their fullest in order that they may best contribute to the society of which they are a part. This not only means development scholastically, but in the ability to work together as good school citizens. Your headmaster has upon several occasions been very proud of the personal conduct of the individual pupils while participating in athletic contests at other schools.

Some of the extra-curricular activities entered into this year have been the editing of a school newspaper entitled the "Static of H. H. S." This was started as a weekly but was changed to a bi-weekly project because of the work involved. On November 19, the A. C. E. Association under the direction of Miss Rideout, successfully presented a three-act comedy entitled "Billie Behave". The association has held two school parties and two public motion picture shows in addition to the instructional movies put on weekly at the school. The Future Farmers Organizations conducted two card parties which were well attended. During the winter months, basketball has held the focus of attention. The teams this year are playing an eighteen game schedule. In addition to these scheduled games the boys plan to attend the tournaments at Fitchburg and Townsend. A school orchestra to which about one third of the pupils of the school belong has been organized by Mr. Blodgett.

The school has needed such an opportunity for those interested in instrumental music to receive further training. At the present time the high school A. C. E. Association under the direction of Mr. Priske is working on an operetta to be presented some time during the month of April. It has been the plan to provide some extra-curricular activity for every pupil of the school. This not only provides a means of securing funds necessary for graduation and to carry on other school activities, but also provides valuable training for the pupils.

Teachers meetings are being held twice a month in order that new ideas may be exchanged. There is a regular program for each meeting with topics assigned several months in advance. It is believed that by the aid of these meetings all may share the benefit of the experience of each, and that a closer correlation of work between all grades will be brought about.

Of this number, three are attending higher institutions of learning. It is interesting also to know that during the past five years sixty three pupils have been graduated from our high school. Of this number, thirteen have gone on to college or some other school.

The regular dental clinic was held in the Spring. A great many children took advantage of its convenience.

In June a pre-school clinic was held for the children entering Grade I in September. Where defects were found, it gave the parents time to have corrections made. Practically all of the children were vaccinated at this time.

In addition to the School Physician's thorough examination of the children, Doctor Robert Kerr, assisted by Mrs. Irene Bi chall, T. B. Nurse gave an afternoon examining recommended by Dr. Winograd. Of those examined, four were skin tested and a frequent check-up is made on their progress.

We have recently had the use of the Audiometer, loaned to us by the State Board of Education. With this we tested the hearing of all children from third grade through the High School.

I wish to thank the teachers and parents for their fine coope ation in helping to carry out the school health program.

REPORT OF SCHOOL DOCTOR

Members of the School Board of Hollis:

As the first school physician in Hollis for several years,

it was of interest to observe the general good physical condition we found amongst the school children of Hollis. Our aim in examination was to make certain that all our children were (1) capable of withstanding the rigors of school life and to suggest further medical study in those cases wherin defects were found. (2) To direct attention to those conditions which while in themselves not pathological, would lead to a more positive physical excellence, such as, slight malnutrition, poor posture, flat feet, or mismanagement of the daily program of personal hygiene. (3) We feel our function is incomplete unless we may be of some help in developing in each child through education a positive program of personal health ideals.

It would be of great value if the parents would feel free to bring to the notice of those in charge of the health of the children of Hollis, any clinical history pertinent to the physical condition of any particular child.

It has been a pleasure to work with such a cooperativegroup.
