

#### WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### The State of New Hampshire

(L. S.) To the inhabitants of the Town of Lebanon qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the Second Tuesday of March next at 8:30 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

**First**—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

**Second**—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the construction and repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

**Third**—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the construction and repairs of sewers and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

**Fourth**—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the improvement of the cemeteries of the town.

**Fifth**—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

**Sixth**—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to provide free Hospital Service for needy people, or act thereon.

Seventh—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to assist in the work of the Visiting Nurse Association.

**Eighth**—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the West Lebanon Library.

Ninth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the Lebanon Public Library. **Tenth**—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars to hire Rogers and Whitney Park for a playground, or act thereon.

**Eleventh**—To see if the town will raise the sum of fifty dollars for the benefit of a playground at West Lebanon, or act thereon.

**Twelfth**—To see if the town will continue the inspection of milk and raise money therefor.

**Thirteenth**—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,790.00 for State Aid Construction and to receive \$2,842.25 from the state, or act thereon.

**Fourteenth**—To see if the town will vote to Authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

**Fifteenth**—To see if the town will take any action in regard to control the White Pine Blister Rust, and appropriate any money for same.

Sixteenth—To see if the town will vote to give prescription permits from May first 1934, to May first 1935, according to Section 99, Laws of 1919, to druggists who are registered Pharmacists doing business in Lebanon, to sell liquors for medicinal, sacramental, scientific or mechanical purposes.

**Seventeenth**—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Budget Committee and vote to accept their recommendations as printed.

**Eighteenth**—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Zoning Commission appointed by the Selectmen as provided in Section 53 Chapter 42 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire, and act thereon.

Nineteenth—To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes, if paid before specified dates.

**Twentieth**—To see if the town will vote to elect an Advisory Committee, whose duties shall be to advise the Selectmen in regard to town affairs and that said committee shall in cooperation with the Selectmen act as the Budget Committee at the close of the fiscal year, or act thereon.

**Twenty-first**—To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to investigate the costs of an incinerator and to raise money to purchase the same if the cost does not exceed \$7,500.00.

**Twenty-second**—To see if the town will vote to see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Chapter 99 Section 22, Session Law of 1932.

**Twenty-third**—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to complete and build a sidewalk in West Lebanon. The above petition was presented by Daniel Houlihan and thirty others.

**Twenty-fourth**—To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to pay a minimum wage of three dollars per day to all town employees. The above petition requested by Edward Chagnon and sixteen others.

**Twenty-fifth**—On petition of Joseph Considine and fourteen others.

"To see if the town will vote to extend the town sewer system from the old Scytheville School house along Mascoma Street to the Precinct line and raise money therefor.

**Twenty-sixth**—To see if the town will vote to accept and improve a street in Scytheville known as Avon Avenue, and raise money for the same.

**Twenty-seventh**—On petition of Leon D. Guyer and fifteen others.

"To see if the town will vote to construct a concrete sidewalk on the north side of Fairview Avenue, beginning at High Street, and to raise money therefor.

**Twenty-eighth**—To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the old Downer road, so-

called, extending from the Newport Road to the farm now owned by Stanley Jackson on Bass Hill.

**Twenty-ninth**—To see if the town will vote to request the Lebanon Village Improvement Society to assist in the support of the Carter Community Building to the extent of \$1,800.00.

**Thirty**—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 for snow removal.

Thirty-one—To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

**Thirty-two**—To choose one Selectman for the ensuing three years.

Thirty-three—To choose one Tax Collector for the ensuing year, and one highway agent for the ensuing year, two library trustees for the ensuing three years, and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Thirty-fourth—To choose a Trustee to administer a Trust of the Trust Fund for the ensuing three years.

Thirty-fifth—To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

#### **Comments**

Wherever possible we first determined the amount of money that should have been received by the different departments, officers and agents of the Town and then compared our findings with the records kept by the Town Treasurer and Selectmen. For example, in verifying the amount of money that should have been received from tax collections, we made a detailed analysis of the tax blotter, thereby determining the amount turned over to the Collector for collection. Discounts given were investigated with respect to the dates on which payments were received.

The funds that should have been received from the State and County were verified by direct correspondence with the State Treasurer and County Commissioner. The receipts of other departments such as the Municipal Court and Town Clerk were verified through an audit of the records of the departments in each case.

We found satisfactory vouchers to support all disbursements.

#### HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

During the year the Doctors and Nurses have reported contagious diseases as follows: 2 cases of Mumps, 5 cases of Measles, 1 case of German Measles, 3 cases of Whooping Cough, 1 case Meningitis, 1 case Erysipelas, 4 Venereal Diseases, 8 cases Chicken Pox, and 30 cases of Scarlet Fever, while there have been quite a number of cases of this disease, most of them have been very mild, with no deaths. All of the cases of Scarlet Fever have been put in strict quarantine and held the full period, at some expense to the Town. There have been a great many complaints of various things, but the most serious of them all, has been reports of Rubbish of all kinds, being dumped into the Mascoma River, above the Pumping Station, of the Lebanon Water Works. We have followed up every complaint, and in some cases, been able to find the offenders. Notices have been posted along the River, but still the practice goes on, Pollution of Drinking Water, is a serious matter, and in the future will be dealt with as such. In this, I feel that I have the backing of our Water Commissioners.

I wish at this time to thank all who have in any way co-operated with me in the discharge of my many un-pleasant duties.

## **REPORT OF MILK INSPECTOR**

We have had no outbreak of disease the past year due to our milk supply. This is very gratifying as there are so many diseases, other than Tuberculosis caused by using raw milk. One good example is Septic Sore Throat. Over one hundred deaths were caused a few years ago by this disease in the small town of Lee, Mass.

The general routine of past years has been carried out, such as visiting the producers and going over the proper technique of cooling, method of washing, and sterilizing bottles and utensils used in the milk room. Samples were taken from the milk trucks while in the process of delivery and same were shipped in iced cases to the State Laboratory of Hygiene for analysis. Different numbers of samples are required from each producer as some that are always low in Bacteria count and B. coli do not require the attention as others. I have done considerable testing of milk for pus organisms in the past year, using the Thybromol method. This method is used when we find a high bacteria count, and the technique of the producer is satisfactory. In this way we eliminate the individual animal causing the trouble.
