Town Meeting Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 11th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Highway Agents.

Article 2. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large, Alternate Delegates-at-Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates, to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, for the public library, for the recreation commission, for free hospital beds, for observance of Memorial Day, for band concerts and for all other town charges.

Article 4. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance with Chap. 155, Laws of 1909, of Chaps. 158, 162, or 168, Laws of 1913, of Chaps. 51 or 93, Laws of 1915.

Article 5. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for Trunk line maintenance of highways in this town in accordance with Chap. 133, Laws of 1911, Sec. 27.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in co-operation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 7. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money, from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the purchase of a tractor for use on the highways of the town.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money towards the maintenance of a District Nurse.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars for the construction of cement bridges to take the place of the two wooden bridges on the Patridge Lake road, near the Pattenville saw-mill.

Article 11. To see if the town will appoint an inspector of buildings, prescribe his duties and fix his

compensation, and make regulations for the construction and maintenance of all buildings in the town.

Article 12. To see what action the town will take with respect to improving the lighting conditions on Main Street.

Article 13. To see what action the town will take relative to disposing of its interests in the real estate known as the Northern Hotel and Premier Theatre lots on Main Street.

Article 14. To see if the town will appoint a committee to investigate the feasibility of establishing a town forest and make recommendations regarding the same.

Article 15. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give any druggist, doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquors for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chapter 147 of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 16. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 17. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

It will be noted that the current report shows an increase in the net debt of \$27,615.92. In explanation of this, your attention is called to the fact that, whereas the previous year listed an asset of \$10,900. as due from Union School District, the current report shows a Union School District liability of \$33,900., being a portion of the new \$130,000 bond issue, made necessary to provide \$23,000 for the maintenance of the schools for a period six months beyond the town fiscal year, and for a floating debt of \$10,900, representing the amount over-drawn in 1919.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the Citizens of Littleton:

We respectfully submit a report of the schools of the town of Littleton which have been under our care from April 1, 1923 to the present time. You will note that the financial statement is for the year 1922 and 1923 and while it enters with our report, is really not a part of the present administration.

Your school board would like to have made big improvement in school equipment, but hampered by lack of funds, especially by the loss of state aid, we have been obliged to limit ourselves to only such repairs as have been absolutely necessary to carry on school work. As the State Department of Education requested the return of the portable building used by the Commercial Department of our High School, it became necessary to seek other quarters for this department and it has been housed in a small room in the Kilburn building which with some additions and repairs has been fairly comfortable, but crowded and very inadequate to the needs of this growing department. Repairs for this year must include the shingling of the High School Building.

Coupled with the fact that there was a balance of \$6,000.00 which we have had to use this year, and the loss of the state aid money of \$6,000.00 which will not be available for this present year, it becomes necessary to raise a larger amount of money for school main-

tenance than heretofore. We realize that it takes a lot of money to run schools but are somewhat consoled by the fact that while the average cost per pupil in the state of New Hampshire is \$75.00, Littleton is maintaining its schools at an average of \$68.00 per pupil.

We thank you for your interest and cooperation in our efforts to maintain a high standard of efficiency in our school system.

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HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To Mr. Orin Holman, Superintendent of Schools, Littleton, N. H.

I hereby submit my second annual report as headmaster of Littleton High School. While I know that the Financial Report of the school will cover the period from July 1, 1922 to July 1, 1923, I assume that people will be more interested in this year's work of the high school and consequently this report will cover in detail the period from September 10, 1923, to February 1, 1924 inclusive and in general the period from January 1, 1923 to June 15, 1923 inclusive.

Realizing the inadequateness of a report of this kind I hope that I have included such things as may be of general interest and such things as should be recorded.

TEACHERS

There have been several changes in our teaching staff, which have allowed a re-grouping and assignment of courses to teachers, so that at present, all of the Foreign Languages are handled by one teacher and all of the History by another. I believe such an arrangement will produce better results for a teacher may be employed who has made a specialty of the subject to be taught.

The Misses Osgood, Magoon, Sullivan, Manchester and Mr. Roberts all resigned and their places were filled by the Misses Ryder, Davis and Perry and by the Messrs. Cooney and Welch. We feel as the year goes on that the selection of these teachers although most of them have had little experience was an excellent one. The discipline of the school has improved quite remarkably since September. We feel that what may have been lost through inexperience has been off set by the spirit of enthusiasm and cooperation shown by all. At the beginning of the year each

teacher was assigned charge of a certain amount of extra curriculum activities which they have all handled in an excellent manner as follows.

Mr. Cooney—Athletics; Miss Ryder—School Paper; Miss Bilodeau—General Assembly, Auditor; Mr. Welch—Repair Work; Miss Davis—School Plays, etc.; Miss Dore—Entertainments; Miss Perry—Home Room Work.

ADMINISTRATION OF THE SCHOOL

While the policies and aims of the school have not been radically changed this year, there has been a number of slight changes. The time table has remained as heretofore. The Program of Study has been entirely revised to provide for five distinct curricula, as opposed to three formerly offered. The present program is given below

OUTING CLUB

This club is the live club of the school, numbers more than one half of the student body among its members, all active. Two very enthusiastic and well attended parties have been held. One early in the fall, an evening trip to Skyline by auto truck, where games were played and a lunch served. The second held on February 2, at the Community House.

DEBATING

Last spring Littleton High School was represented by two debating teams on the subject of the proposed "48 hour law." Each team, one a negative and one an affirmative team took part in two debates. While we lost both to Whitefield and split even with Lancaster, we feel that those pupils who took part received a great deal of training and benefit.

MUSIC

The work in music has been ably carried on by Miss Aldrich. An operetta was produced last spring which was well done and should have been better supported.

ATHLETICS

Reviewing the work of the year in athletics we find that from the point of view of games won and lost it has been very successful. In basketball last winter the boys won the county championship and failed to win the state championship by a narrow margin only. In baseball we were not so fortunate. The season started with cancellation of games due to repairing of roads and this was followed by cancellations due to rain. We lost five games and won four. Football this fall, coached by Mr. Cooney was a decided success. Eight games were played, five won and three lost.

The control as formerly of all these athletic affairs is in the hands of the students subject to the approval of an advisory board composed of two student members, a faculty member, the headmaster and one member from the school board. For this year Mr. Cooney is the faculty member and Mr. Holly the school board member. With the exception of gifts from the Senior Class and townspeople to finance the basketball trip to Durham, the proceeds of games have met all bills. Nearly \$1,000.00 has passed through the hands of the treasurer, a Senior, since last February. Her accounts have been examined and a copy of the same transmitted to the school board.

NEW EQUIPMENT

Since our last report our equipment has been added to very materially. In the commercial department we have a new Underwood and Remington typewrit-

er, a new adding machine, largely for office use and a new mimeograph. A new filing cabinet has been added to the headmaster's equipment. We are now very well equipped in the commercial department and in the office. If the numbers taking typewriting increase it may be necessary to add one more typewriter during the coming year. In the Manual Training Department Mr. Welch found an exceedingly poor equipment. This has been remedied so that now each bench has a good number of hand tools. The department should now be equipped with a power saw and planer similar to those manufactured by the Union or Wallace Tool Company. The amount of repair work done for the school by this department will go a good way towards paying for its equipment. In the Domestic Science Department, additional facilities for heating water are needed.

COLLEGE ENTRANCE

Littleton High School has for the past year, been able to retain her membership on the College Entrance Certification Board. A list of those colleges admitting our pupils on certificate, was given last year, and need not be repeated.

I would like you to note some of the more radical changes in this program, particularly in the Classical, Liberal College Preparatory and Commercial Curricula. You will note that in the first two of these Mathematics is required in each of the four years as opposed to the previous plan of not giving any in the first two years and offering it in the last two years only.

Again note the change in French, this being required for two years in the classical and offered for another and required for three years in the Liberal College Preparatory as opposed to the plan of giving French in the seventh and eighth grades and the first two years of high and omitting it altogether from the last two. A plan which has resulted in serious difficulties for graduates entering college and continuing the study of the language there.

In the Commercial Curriculum please note the requirement of Typewriting in the second year. This we hope will work to the advantage of both Typewriting and Shorthand. Heretofore both Shorthand and Typewriting started at the same time with the result that a month or more each year was lost in the work in shorthand. It will also give more practice in typewriting, extending over a longer period of time. This should result in increased speed and accuracy. In the Junior year of the course notice the introduction of a new required course, namely Salesmanship and Advertising.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Littleton:

I have the honor of submitting my first annual report of the schools of Littleton. In reality it is not my report of the past year's work, since that work was completed while I was yet a stranger to this town. It is my report so far as it relates to the present year and estimates for the coming year.

Each report in March has to cover three years. It has to give in detail data regarding the entire year last completed. In this report it is the year that closed June 30, 1923. We assume that people are interested in the present year for which they last raised money. The present year closes June 30, 1924. And it is absolutely necessary to make recommendations and raise money for the year ahead, which begins July 1, 1924 and closes June 30, 1925.

I shall not give data regarding the careful work in testing and measurements carried on by my predecessor. I have found many evidences to indicate a careful planning and building of the work by Superintendent Brackett.

HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

The one outstanding fact of the schools of Littleton is the enormous handicap of proper housing and teaching conditions for the grammar grades and high school. A quiet, accumulating loss is daily taken from the efficiency of the schools and the lives of 300 children. Class-rooms are inadequate and in certain cases wretchedly and dangerously ventilated. School seats and desks, bearing the scars of successive generations, constantly appeal to the destructiveness of the child, and the appeal is not made in vain. A recent visit to the school plant at Woodsville showed a high school assembly room, in constant use for ten years without a scratch on the beautiful, modern fur-

niture there installed. The future citizenship of Littleton is silently, daily, urged to destroy and not preserve public property.

Our commercial work in the Kilburn Building crowded to an unendurable point, takes at least 30 minutes a day from the program in going and coming. This means a yearly loss of at least 16 days, more than 3 solid weeks lost every year.

Manual Training and Domestic work are housed in a separate building, requiring additional expense in running separate heating plants which are satisfactory——in warm weather.

There is not a single department in this school that is not handicapped by light, poor blackboards, an unusual resounding clatter of creaky stairs and floors, and a powerful lack of respect for surroundings, which constantly militates against discipline and robs classes of their vitality.

The money that is annually spent in repairs, the money that supports separate heating plants, the money that is quietly lost in paying for time lost in going and coming, would pay the interest on a healthy investment for a real school in a real community.

RESULTS

The results of our present year's work, so far as measured are commendable. They are in a majority of cases, above the average. They reveal, in other instances, weaknesses which we are trying to overcome. As compared to the entire state in recent testing, our record in arithmetic was very good and our record in spelling was average. We have no reason to be dismayed and we have plenty of work to do.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I earnestly recommend the addition of a small amount of machinery in the Manual Training, to fa-

cilitate the work of repairs carried on by this Department, and to greatly economize the use of lumber.

I also urgently recommend an annual appropriation to gradually supplant old and unsuitable seats and desks, with modern comfortable equipment.

I recommend increasing the salaries of good teachers who demonstrate their teaching efficiency by measurable results.

I recommend the adoption of the Budget presented by the School Board which is an attempt to accomplish the above results, with the greatest possible degree of economy.

In conclusion I wish to add a few words of deep appreciation to the community for its kind reception and its evidences of kindly interest in its public schools, to the American Legion and Auxiliary, to the Red Cross and other organizations for specific and generous acts of cooperation and helpfulness, to an unusually thoughtful and cooperative School Board for time and energy freely given to the building up of the schools. And finally I would say a word of commendation for the janitors who give faithful, intelligent care to our school property, and to the teaching staff who carry the burden of the work. It was a new experience to have nine inexperienced teachers in a total of twenty-five. It is a real pleasure to state that a more intelligent, willingly cooperative group of teachers I have never known, or enjoyed, and to these who are new and to others who are not new in faithfulness and ability I am recording my deepest sense of personal praise and appreciation.

Combining all the agencies mentioned above, I feel that we can view the school problems of the future with a reasonable degree of optimism.

LIBRARY NOTES

Viewing the philosophy of the library and its work.

It is a necessity that all who are responsible for the library and its administration, must be sincere believers in the mission of the library as an educational benefit to the community.

No librarian or group of library workers, can for long make a pretense, if sincerity is lacking, and all should work for the advancement of the library in its mission of benefit to the community, and thus maintain the confidence of the people.

The first essential in making a community conscious of its library, is to have the people feel that the library is their library. A real sense of ownership compels interest, and it helps the sense of ownership when the name of the library belongs in part to the community. In this particular, this library is fortunate, for the name of the library shows at once that it is a community library. "The Littleton Public Library"—a library belonging to the town, and to no special benefactors.

As Littleton has a library of its own, with no rights invested in outside ownership, it means that Littleton is responsible for whatever library work is accomplished, and the slogan "HOW CAN THE LIBRARY HELP IN THE WORLD WIDE MOVEMENT FOR BETTER CITIZENSHIP?" this being the highest ideal of any library to acquire.

All libraries unless special libraries are confronted by two diverging duties: To furnish books to those interested in improving and extending their knowledge on various subjects, and those reading for pleasure, or to "kill time" as is one of the ways of expressing this way of reading, but erroneously used, as there is no time to kill, but rather time to improve. This does not mean that the time spent for improvement may not be at the same time a pleasure; and few of us are inclined to dispute Bacon's saying that "READING MAKETH A FULL MAN," and reports circulated from libraries in general indicate that people are reading, but what the fullness consists of remains obscure. However upon the library and its administration rests the responsibility of developing the literary taste of the public to some extent. But without assuming to censor, it is possible by bringing prominently to the attention of patrons of the library, works of first class quality, to guide and in some measure shape the reading taste of the community.

An article published in the Library Journal by Wil-

liam Allen White is quoted as being timely. Mr. White in his article on "Educational Service of the Library" says "Ignorance is the menace of civilization, and if America continues to grow, the minds of the people must grow, and the schools alone cannot satisfy this need for continuing the intellectual growth of the American citizen. There must be some way out, some way to continue this educational growth of the American citizen. And there is a way, and that way is the Public Library. It is America's continuation school. It is free to every person—color or race, nationality or creed makes no difference. It is free to every person who wishes to read, and who is willing to read. The Public Library is free from party politics, religious intolerance, and prejudice. It provides information on all sides of every important subject, so far as its funds will allow. Democratic as the library is, its services should be greatly extended, for too many people are not finding books to cover all the requirements, and the educational facilities of the library have not been recognized as they should be, but with that recognition will come greater service. While the library is useful and helpful it has not reached its maximum of usefulness, and it cannot do so until the people themselves realize what the library has to give."

Reviewing the work of the library for the past year, the statistics show a decrease in the circulation. This is easily accounted for by the smaller number of books purchased, both for adults and children; another cause, and one to be considered by librarians all over the country, and commented upon by many librarians in their reports, are the many diversions now taking up much of the time once used for reading. A large circulation is certainly commendable for any library, as it shows that the library is much used, but it is not the full measure of usefulness.

There have been improvements in the comfort of

the library, the most important and necessary being the new heating plant, which was installed late in the fall, and which has been so much of an improvement, that it has been possible for the work to be carried along during all hours of the day.

New book-cases were placed in the main reading room during the summer months, thus adding to the convenience of the work, with the patrons, especially the summer guests. The larger case was made possible by the gift of money from Rev. J. E. Johnson, and a plate with his name inscribed will soon be placed on the case, as a memorial to Mr. Johnson for his generosity.

Books in goodly number have been given by many interested, the largest gift being the set of War Books given by the American Legion, and Woman's Auxiliary. A set of Historical Literature books was given by Mrs. F. H. English, also the Life of Kate Douglas Wiggin. Mrs. Beattie, Mrs. William Collins, Mrs. Clay, Mrs. Roland Brooks and Miss Katharine Peckett, have given books much needed. Mr. Johnson again sent a list recently purchased with the library in mind, and books for boys were given by Roger Everest, Walter Woods, and Leslie Bean, all being most acceptable in meeting the ever increasing demand. The Carnegie Peace Foundation have sent several collections during the year, the books being chosen for the enlightenment of the conditions of the countries now forming new governments. Single books have been given, also the usual number of magazines. A sincere appreciation is extended to all for the favors.

During the months of September and October it was thought advisable by the trustees to engage the services of Miss Susan Jewett, a cataloger, to make a beginning on the new method of cataloging. Miss Jewett recataloged the history and many of the travel books, and the cards are filed according to the Diction-

ary Catalog method, and the work can now be carried along, with hopes of a completion in the future.

It may be well to close this report with these questions for the public to consider:

How necessary is the Littleton Public Library to you?

Are you getting what you want and need from the Library?

How can the Library habit in Littleton be made more general, to reach a wider number of people?
