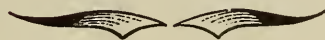

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Merrimack in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Merrimack on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at twelve of the clock on the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
 - a. Town Officers' Salaries
 - b. Town Officers' Expenses
 - c. Election and Registration
 - d. Town Hall and Building Maintenance
 - e. Police Department
 - f. Fire Department
 - g. Health Department
 - h. Town Dump Maintenance
 - i. Town Road Aid
 - j. Town Highway Maintenance, summer, winter
 - k. Street lighting
 - l. Library
 - m. Old Age Assistance
 - n. Town Poor
 - o. Memorial Day
 - p. Cemeteries
 - q. Payments on Debt, Principal and Interest
 - r. County Tax
 - s. School Tax
 - t. Insurance

3. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the action of the Board of Selectmen in purchasing the Iverson property for the Town or take any action in connection therewith.

4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the gift of a sum of money offered by Mrs. Bertha L. Gordon for the purpose of constructing a new Fire Station in Merrimack Village or take any action pertaining thereto.

5. To see what action the Town will take in connection with the bequest contained in the will of the late James A. Masticola.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following streets: Oak Ridge Avenue, Wright Avenue, Rainbow Avenue, Sunny Dale Street, Hoyt Street, Caron Street, King Street and Priscilla Lane.

7. To see what action the Town will take concerning the employment of a full-time office attendant.

8. To see what action the Town will take concerning the purchase of a new Grader.

9. To see what action the Town will take regarding the requirements for acceptance of streets in new developments.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the development of the Twin Bridge Area.

12. To see what action will be taken regarding the installation of new street lights.

13. To see if the Town will vote to restrict the use of the public way entering Naticook Lake to residents of the Town, only.

14. To see what action the Town will take relative to supporting the Merrimack Valley Regional Association.

15. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount for the early payment of taxes.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting and take any action relating thereto including the making of appropriations to cover same.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Town Road Aid money received from the State was expended in 1958 on surfacing roads prepared previously with gravel foundation. The roads completed are, Bean Road, Chapel Street, Wheeler Street and Oak Ridge Avenue. Widening and foundation work was also accomplished on Naticook road to eliminate a bad curve near the Geo. May property in South Merrimack.

In the summer of 1958 the property adjoining the Twin Bridges property now owned by the Town came onto the market for sale. Your Selectmen, knowing that considerable interest had been evidenced by many of the Townspeople in purchasing some of this property in order to obtain a right of way to the Twin Bridge area from the main road, assumed authority to act and purchased the Iverson property for the sum of four thousand dollars. The Selectmen are asking in a special article in this year's warrant for approval of their action in purchasing this property. In the event that the Selectmen's action is not ratified the property can be disposed of without cost or loss to the Town.

Two new industries have located in Merrimack during the past year and are to be welcomed as other steps in the progress of Merrimack. The Waghorne-Brown Company have constructed a new Aluminum distributing warehouse on Route 3 in Thornton's Ferry. Gregg and Son of Nashua have taken over the old Kendall Hadley plant in Merrimack and are operating a division of their Nashua millwork operation, employing approximately twenty-five.

The last and final payment was made on the Town Grader on November 1st, 1958. With this payment the Town cleared the last of its indebtedness. Consideration should be given to replacement of our present grader with a new one at an early date.

Mrs. Bertha L. Gordon, in a letter to the Selectmen and the Fire Chief, has offered as a gift to the Town the sum of thirty thousand dollars, for the purpose of constructing a new building to house the Fire Equipment, to be known as the Arthur G. Gordon Memorial Building, as a memorial to her late husband, Arthur Gilbert Gordon who was one of the original founders of the Merrimack Volunteer Fire Department. Her letter follows;

To the Selectmen of Merrimack and the Chief of the Fire Department:

Having just recently lost my husband I would like to do something worthwhile for the Town as a Memorial to him because of his great interest in the Town.

I can think of nothing more appropriate to him than to give the Town \$30,000.00 to erect a suitable building in Merrimack Village in which to accomodate the Fire Department and its equipment.

Mr. Gordon was the instigator and with cojoining with some other interested citizens a Volunteer Fire Department was formed in the early 1920's. He served as Deputy Chief for many years and also in many other offices of the Town.

He was the last of a four generation family to live continuously in the Town and each generation has been very active and helped to participate in the growth and up building of the Town. His ancestors were of Scotch decent on both sides. Jacob McGaw, the first generation, together with his cousin, Robert Means emigrated from Lineygloss near Londonderry, Ireland to this country in the early 1760's and started in as park peddlers. They finally settled in Alexander, Merrimack. In 1773 they bought a homestead farm in Bedford, N. H. now called Reeds Ferry Village, and now known as Lane Manor. They built a store here which is still standing but has been added onto. In 1774 Robert Means moved to Amherst, N. H. where he built a store as they felt the Towns could be better served. He also built a large colonial house there facing the common which is very attractive both inside and out.

I would like to have this proposed gift voted upon at the annual Town Meeting in March and if the Voters do not care to accept it then it will become void. Also that the building be erected within the year and named the Arthur G. Gordon Memorial Building and a suitable inscription be placed thereon to designate the building as such.

The Merrimack Fire Department has purchased an E. & J. Resuscitator-Inhalator-Aspirator. The purpose of this Resuscitator is to provide mechanical artificial respiration during complete respiratory failure, to deliver a flow of oxygen to a breathing patient who needs a higher concentration than is available in atmospheric air. The inhalator may also be used to provide oxygen or carbon dioxide and oxygen in conjunction with manual artificial respiration, and to remove fluid obstructions from the upper air passages and allow oxygen to enter the patient's lungs. We would like to thank the Merrimack Lion's Club, The American Legion, Mr. William Cain, Jr., and the campers from Sheila's Grove for contributions received towards the purchase of this Resuscitator.

We would also like to express our thanks to Mr. Andrew J. Woronka, president of the New England Chemical Supply Corporation for contributing to the Merrimack Fire Department a Scott Air-Pak, to which we have added another one to make a complete set. These Scott Air-Pak's will enable firefighters to enter smoke and gas filled dwellings without breathing difficulties.

In case of fire dial 4-5571. State location of fire. Do everything you can to keep the fire from spreading. Keep buildings closed as much as possible, and upon arrival of fire department, give them any information which may be of help to them.

Please keep all roads open so trucks can go and come at will, without being hindered by cars parked in the road.

Now is a good time for us to consider what fire prevention plan we have as one parent and taxpayer. Inspection at home is the beginning. Education of our own children about fire hazards and fire precautions is next (but must be on a continuing basis). The next step in this individual plan for fire prevention is to be always alert for opportunities to be a "preventer." As a means of fire prevention, please take advantage of your town dump, which is open all day Wednesdays, all day Saturdays, and until noon on Sunday.

We are all proud to be called volunteer firemen and are faithful to our duty at every alarm. Let's be just as proud to be called volunteer fire preventers—and just as faithful to this duty.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your town dump.

To the people of the Merrimack School District:

The American Legion Auxiliary sponsored a series of Immunization Clinics in Merrimack, at the Hall of Our Lady of Mercy Church in June, July and August of 1958.

Salk Vaccine was administered for the prevention of Polio; triple toxoid for the prevention of whooping cough, diphtheria, and tetanus; and Small Pox Vaccine for the prevention of small pox, to all pre-schools in need of the shots.

Mrs. Betty Getz, R.N. was chairman of the project and with Mrs. Dolly Footer, R.N., Mrs. Rhoda Cross, R.N., assisted Doctors Luther March and Oscar Burns at the clinic table.

Mrs. Ida Allard, Mrs. George Brown, Mrs. Lee Spaulding, Mrs. Raymond Hall, Mrs. Gerald Perry and Mrs. Helen Pynenburg assisted with the clerical work and caring for the children.

The third inoculation to complete the series of Salk Immunization will be given in March, 1959, at a date which will be announced later.

The cooperation of the townspeople, both in helping at the clinic, and bringing their pre-schools for the immunizations was commendable.

HEALTH REPORT FOR THE TOWN OF MERRIMACK 1958

Only one reportable disease was brought to the attention of your health officer for 1958. This was a case of scarlet fever and it was not reported by the attending physician but came to the attention of the health officer through contact with the family. The house was duly placarded and the case reported to the State Board of Health.

There must have been cases of infectious diseases such as measles but none were reported through the proper channels and your health officer must depend upon family physicians properly reporting these cases.

Nine homes were inspected and approved for licenses as boarding homes for children.

Two cases of public nuisance were reported and these nuisances were inspected by the health officer and the chief of police and the conditions were remedied.

The town water was analyzed and reported satisfactory.

Immunization Clinics were held June 10, July 22, August 19 and the following immunization done by Dr. Oscar Burns of Milford and your health officer.

No case of poliomyelitis came to the attention of your health officer for the year.

It is hoped that all parents of the town will avail themselves of the opportunity of having their children immunized against polio. There is no doubt that the vaccine has lessened the incidence of this much dreaded disease.

This report would make it appear that the town of Merrimack is unusually healthy but I must warn you that I feel the report is incomplete for reasons above stated. An attempt will be made to obtain a more adequate report from family physicians and school nurses.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Merrimack qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 3rd day of March 1959, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board and Trustees for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 for the completion of construction, equipment and furnishing of the addition to the Merrimack High School as approved at the special Merrimack School District meeting of the 22nd day of April 1958; whether the District will vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes and bonds upon the credit of the District; and to authorize the School Board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued, including their sale and the time and place of payment of interest and principal, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute N. H. Revised Laws Chapter 72 and any amendments thereto.

10. (If article 9 does not pass in the affirmative) To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,911.22 to pay the architects fee for the 1958-1959 addition to the High School; and whether the District will vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes and bonds upon the credit of the District; and to authorize the School Board to determine the conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued, including their sale and the time and place of payment of interest and principal, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute N. H. Revised Laws, Chapter 72 and any amendments thereto.

11. To see if the District will accept any moneys and/or property made available to the Merrimack School District by the will of the late James Mastricola.

12. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 for the construction of an Industrial Arts Shop as an addition to the Merrimack High School; and whether the District will vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes and bonds upon the credit of the District; and to authorize the School Board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued; including their sale and the time and place of payment of interest and principal, in accordance with the provision of the Municipal Bonds Statute N. H., Revised Laws, Chapter 72 and any amendments thereto.

13. To transact any business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Merrimack School District; I submit with pleasure my fourth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

I can well imagine the interest with which Merrimack has watched your school grow in the last year. Since June we have been able to watch the new addition to the elementary annex become a reality and it must give one a great sense of pride to be able to say we now have a building that will encourage community activities. Merrimack high school with its many additions is a living monument to the interests and foresight of you the people of Merrimack. It has been a great satisfaction to your Superintendent to not only be a part of the physical growth of your schools but to feel as well that he has had a share in developing the increased educational stature of all Merrimack Schools. Congratulations, citizens of Merrimack.

It is interesting to note that in last year's report the estimated enrollment for your schools was listed as 661 pupils. In this report you will note that for the year 59-60 we show a total of 711 pupils. Another indication of Merrimack's growth and a pretty good indication that people think it is a good town in which to live. This is also a very good reason for Merrimack to think in terms of needs in the next five years and plan accordingly. As larger classes come along the small two room schools will become inadequate and a need for consolidation of the four small buildings will be a logical solution to the problems. It's a good time to start thinking in terms of "how, when, and where?"

NEW TEACHERS

Merrimack was extremely fortunate in maintaining stability in the teaching staff for 1958-59. I should imagine it has been many years since Merrimack lost but one teacher to surrounding towns. Mrs. Evelyn Barrett, B.S., Miss. Southern College with her Masters in Business Education from La. State College was elected to replace Mrs. Marie Hevey, who resigned to accept a teaching position in Nashua high school.

Mr. Richard Moore, B.S., U. N. H. as an additional high school teacher in Social Studies and General Science.

Because of the large classes coming into the high school it is necessary to add one more teacher to the high school staff for 1959-60. You will find this reflected in your budget under teachers salaries.

REPAIRS AND REPLACEMENTS

Your school board's policy of taking care of minor repairs before they become big ones has proven to be good economics. Merrimack is fortunate in having two men on its custodial staff who can and do save the district many dollars by doing numerous repair jobs

on their own. Also local jobbers have been willing to give the district that extra that makes the difference between an expensive item and one of normal cost. All this keeps Merrimack schools in good repair at low cost.

INSTRUCTION

The growth of the instructional program under the direction of Mr. Paul L. O'Neil, Helping Teacher, has been most gratifying. The response to in-service programs for the teachers has been excellent and is a good indication of the rapport between Helping Teacher and teachers. As his report on the instructional program follows I shall only say that every indication is for a continually improving and growing program.

CUSTODIANS

The hiring of "Dinty" Moore on a half time basis to help George Clingham has proven to be a very wise action on the part of your school board. We can proudly say "Our schools never had it so good." In my nearly four years as your Superintendent I have never seen the schools look as fresh and clean as they did last Fall. The best part of it is both men have taken pride in keeping all the schools in tip-top condition throughout the school year.

LOOKING AHEAD

The establishment of a Salary Schedule through the cooperative efforts of the teachers and school board is a definite step forward. That the two groups could sit down and in a friendly manner work out a schedule agreeable to all speaks well for the morale of Merrimack's educational system. I sincerely hope you as voters will see the value of the proposed plan and will do your part in making the necessary funds available for its implementation.

A new school gymnasium-auditorium is often a source of misunderstanding in the early stages of its use by organizations outside the school. Too often townspeople fail to appreciate the value of fair and well defined rules concerning the use of the building. It is my sincere hope that this will not be true of Merrimack. In my many experiences with such "firsts" I have found that when the school board's regulations have been fair, explicit, and well defined the public has had greatest reason to maintain a continued pride in their building and its community use. In establishing regulatory rules your school board is only assuming its stated guardianship of your property.

In closing I wish to extend my appreciation to the Principals—Mr. Taylor and Mr. Garrahan; to all teachers, pupils and citizens for their fine cooperation. It has been a pleasure working with you.

HELPING TEACHER REPORT

Mr. Louis L. Ramsay

Dear Mr. Ramsay:

The following remarks constitute my second annual report as Helping Teacher in the schools of Merrimack, N. H.

Our annual achievement testing program indicates to teachers and administrators how well we have taught and how well the pupils have grasped certain learnings. The results of these tests are carefully studied and analyzed so that we can improve our instructional program continually. The boys and girls of Merrimack schools are making very satisfactory progress.

Since parents and citizens want to know more than the catch phrase "making very satisfactory progress" tells, I have several interesting indications of success in achievement which I want to share with you. You should realize however that these are last year's figures.

Last April and May, when we tested the children's achievement, we found that out of 48 first graders at Merrimack Grammar School, there were only 7 who were not reading up to their grade level. Some 35 first graders proved that they could read second grade material with considerable skill. Very encouraging also is the fact that 6 of these little first graders indicated that they could read as well as third graders! Is Johnny learning to read in Merrimack? I think you will agree that he is, and so is Sally!

In looking at last year's results of grade III at McGaw School, I present the following findings in the area of reading: Number tested 60; number below grade level 10; number reading on grade level and above 50.

There are many variables to consider when we study the results of a standardized test and we therefore should not regard these scores as ends in themselves, rather as indices of strength and weakness in given areas, and as only *one* of many ways of diagnosis and prognosis.

Merrimack can boast of an ambitious group of teachers who are sincerely interested in their young charges. I am proud of my close association with the Merrimack Schools, School Board, Administrators, and students.

Dear Mr. Ramsay:

I am pleased to report on the progress of our handwriting program in your schools. Our major objectives are:

1. To have each pupil achieve or surpass the norm for his grade in speed and quality in formal handwriting.
2. To make good handwriting function in all related informal handwriting activities such as spelling, arithmetic, English composition, etc.

3. To develop concomitant virtues such as neatness, accuracy, attention to details and an understanding and appreciation of what is inherent in good handwriting.

4. To achieve these objectives with a minimum expenditure in time, effort, and materials.

5. To develop a writing consciousness on the part of teachers as well as children; to provide the necessary instructional and motivational materials and inform the teachers of the methods and techniques to be used in order to make the handwriting program effective. A study of the handwriting scores made by your students indicate the measure of success that has been attained.

During the school year ending June, 1958, we graded 3,420 formal test papers for your students. In the final grading period we found 84.2% excellent, 11.8% good, and 4% fair. This excellent record testifies to the interest and cooperation of your teachers.

During the course of the year, we graded approximately 10,260 informal papers for your students. Our purpose in grading these informal papers was to motivate good handwriting in related handwriting activities. In addition to our consultant services we furnished the pupils and teachers with the following handwriting materials: teacher outlines and folders, pupil folders, motivation graphs, individual certificates to pupils who qualified, diagnostic charts, handedness tests, envelopes, seals, etc.

In conclusion, I wish to thank you and the teachers and pupils for the splendid cooperation we have received at all times and for the excellent results that have been forthcoming.

Due to the rapid growth in our school enrollment, there is a growing need for adequate school health facilities.

SALARY SCHEDULE PROVISIONS

1. Thirty credits of course beyond the Bachelors, approved by the superintendent shall be considered equivalent to a Masters for payroll purposes.

2. A teacher intending to complete requirements for a Bachelors or a Masters degree during a given calendar year shall notify the superintendent in writing not later than January first of that year. Failure to furnish written notification on or before the above date shall disqualify a teacher from salary adjustment for the following school year.

3. Teachers entering the Merrimack School System will be granted credit for experience at the rate of 50% but not to exceed more than 5 years. Any major fraction of a year will be considered as a whole year.

4. After five creditable years of teaching six credits must be earned in order to be entitled to the next annual increment. A teacher must obtain six credits every five years even after reaching the maximum. Failure to obtain these credits will result in no future increase in salary which may be brought about by a salary schedule revision which raises salaries. Credits to be considered in going on salary schedule must have been acquired in the past ten years.

5. On recommendation of the superintendent to the school board, the whole or any part of a teacher's increment for the coming year may be withheld upon written notification to teacher before February 15.

6. Bonuses in salary may be granted in cases of individual merit. Factors to be considered in determining the eligibility of an amount for bonus consideration will be classroom work, professional growth and community service and should be recommended by principal and superintendent and to be approved by school committee. Bonuses will be carried with each step in scale so long as they are merited. If not merited, bonus may be dropped. Recommendations for bonuses will be made prior to January School Board meeting. Bonuses will be included in ensuing contract.

7. Sick leave is allowed with no deductions from salary for ten days during each school year. The School Board reserves the right to require a doctor's report on absences of over five consecutive days. The items included under sick leave benefits are as follows: personal illness, illness of close relatives, death of close relatives and attendance at funerals of close relatives, and jury duty. A person absent for reasons other than the above will have 1/180th of his salary deducted from his pay for each day's absence.

For ten days of absence after the normal or allotted ten days of sick leave benefits have been used, the teacher will have the amount paid the substitute deducted from his salary, providing the reasons for absence come under the items listed as constituting sick leave.

8. This schedule will be subject to review every two years.

9. If at any time the school board finds it impossible to hire a teacher of no experience for the minimum on the salary schedule the minimum must be listed as such on the contract and will state that the increase above the minimum is a special increment. This increment will be reviewed prior to renewal of contracts for the purpose of making the necessary adjustment for the equalization of all teachers salaries.

10. A non degree teacher shall be given credit for one year of college for each 30 credits obtained after coming into the Merrimack School District. When credits thus acquired are equivalent to four (4) years of college along with their normal school training the teacher will move into the salary schedule for a teacher with a Bachelors degree.

11. The adoption of above salary schedule subject to adequate funds being made available at School District meeting.

12. Extra curricular activities which a teacher is compensated for shall be a separate item of their contract and the compensation listed separate from salary.
