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

The State of New Hampshire

- To the inhabitants of the town of Milton in the County of Strafford in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine-thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:
 - 1. To bring in your ballots for Town Officers.
- 2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) for repairing highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for Sidewalk construction and repair and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to pay for breaking roads and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be expended on Charles street so-called and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be expended on the highway leading from Milton Mills Village to Wakefield town line, known as Jug Hill Road, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen hundred twenty-five dollars (\$1,425) to pay note and interest.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750) for maintenance of the Fire Department for the ensuing year and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 9. To see what salary the town will vote to pay the First and Second Engineers and Firemen in addition to the amount allowed by law; to see how much per hour the town will vote to pay the Engineers and Firemen while fighting fires and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed nineteen hundred eighty dollars (\$1,980) for the maintenance of street lights for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding three hundred dollars (\$300) for the benefit of the Free Public Library at Milton Mills and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) for Memorial Day expenses.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for the construction of the Farmington road, the State having appropriated the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the same purpose.
- 14. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of four hundred thirty-three dollars and fifty-three cents (\$433.53).

- 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay town charges and expenses and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100) for improvements and maintenance of the lots in front of the station and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

By petition of the Milton Woman's Club:

- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to hire a truck or trucks twice a year to carry rubbish from Milton Village to the Town Dump.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire on notes of the town a sum of money necessary for the current expenses in anticipation of the taxes of 1936 and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 19. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200) to assist the Teneriffe Outing Club to promote sports.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to obtain E. R. A. Projects and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) for maintenance of hydrants in the Milton Fire Precinct.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to exchange a Snow Plow outfit for a Caterpillar Diesel Tractor and

plow and raise the necessary money and pass any vote or votes relative thereto.

By petition of Fred McGregor and twelve others the following three articles:

- 24. To see if the town will vote to approve the dissolution of the corporation designated as "Trustees of the Nute High School and Library" as created by an act of the General Court and approved by the Governor on August 14th, 1889, and as cited in chapter 250 of the Laws of 1889.
- 25. To determine the salaries, wages, other compensation and allowances for all persons serving the town.
- 26. To see if the town will vote to designate Nute Chapel, West Milton, as a place for the posting of all notices required by law to be posted by officials or other agents of the town.
- 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be expended on the highway leading from the Town House toward "New Bridge" (so called), and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

By petition of Leroy Whetnall and nine others:

28. To see if the town will vote that there be two (2) shifts on all "Town Tractors," of twelve (12) hours each shift—shall consist of one (1) driver and one (1) helper.

No driver or helper shall work over fourteen (14) hours on any one shift, and shall not return to work until he has been off ten (10) hours after the time of relief. That the last crew off shall be the second crew called. That the driver shall receive 25 per cent. more pay than the helper.

29. To see if the town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate a sum of money necessary to buy a road machine and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

- 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be expended in grading and oiling on Western Avenue and Church Street in Milton Mills Village.
- 31. To see if the town will vote to exempt from taxation with the exception of State and County taxes for a period of five years the machinery and stock in trade of the Salem Shoe Company.
- 32. By petition of George Tanner and nine others, that all deeds of property bordering on the E. R. A. project on Charles Street be signed and recorded promptly.

By petition of Allie J. Laskey and eleven others:

- 33. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from the East Side Highway from a point near the Town Farm hill to a point opposite the southeasterly side line of land of James G. Hunt.
- 34. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To the School Board and Citizens of Milton:

I take pleasure in presenting my second annual report. The table of statistics is for the year ending June 30, 1935 as reported to the State Department of Education.

In my last report I made the suggestion that assistance would have to be provided for the teacher in grades three and four because of the large enrollment. The State Department of Education consented to bear the expense of another teacher for the remainder of the year could one be provided and the plan was developed whereby seats and desks were placed in the assembly room and Mrs. Bernice Parshley hired to complete the year. In September 1935, Miss Dorothy

Whiting of Dover replaced Mrs. Parshley who resigned. At Milton Mills Mrs. Walsh resigned to accept a position in the Wolfeboro Union and Mrs. Etta M. Thurston, who had formerly taught in the same school, was elected.

An attempt was made to receive Federal Funds to add to the amount raised by the District to put in new toilets at Milton Mills, when it was found to be evident that the sum appropriated would not be sufficient. Our efforts failed but it was decided to use the major part of the repair funds at this building and thus enable the job to be completed satisfactorily. This building has been repainted inside and modern plumbing installed. Fortunately the water in the well, which was reopened and deepened, proved to be good drinking water and a bubbler was installed. This village now has as good school facilities as can be found anywhere in New Hampshire in a village of its size.

No Federal Funds were available for milk distribution this year. Some plan ought to be devised whereby about fifty dollars per year could be secured for the distribution of milk to the undernourished. In some communities this is being done through the Red Cross, in others, through Women's Clubs, Parent Teacher Organizations, or Service Clubs.

Last June the Standard Graduation Examinations were given to the pupils in the eighth grade throughout the Supervisory Union. These were not allowed to determine our standards for high school entrance but served as a check on subjective teacher judgment. Three pupils failed to pass the examinations in Milton. The percentage of failure in the Union was about seven. The same type of examination will be used again this year.

The Oscar Moorhouse Post of the American Legion presented medals to Doris Wheeler at Milton.

and Harold Roberts at Milton Mills. These pupils led their classes in scholarship.

The building at Milton is badly needing refinishing in the entire interior. Nothing in the painting line has been done for years and the walls are dingy. By the Nute Will a school will always be maintained at Nute Ridge and I recommend that just as soon as funds can be secured that modern toilet facilities be provided. This could be done by the installation of modern chemical devices, such as are in use in my Union at Packer's Falls in Durham and the Sullivan School in Rollinsford. If the few pupils in the eighth grade in this school could be transported to the Milton Grammar School they would be benefitted by being with a larger group preparing for high school and the Nute Ridge teacher would have more time to devote to the younger pupils. Such a school is always benefitted by the removal of the adolescent pupils. recommendation is no reflection on the present teaching, since one of the three graduates from that school last June was on the Honor List of Nute High School for the Fall Term. The problems presented to your school board by transportation are many. Careful study should be made to see if by consolidation and elimination the cost of transportation might be re-The Law obliges the transportation of all elementary pupils living two or more miles from the school.

I again call attention to the fine record of attendance maintained in Milton. It was the best record reported in my Union and the attendance for the fall term of this year was also very high. Ninety-eight per cent. and the number of tardy marks 9 for all the elementary schools. The following schools reported no tardy marks during the first twelve weeks: Grade 3 and Grade 4 at Milton, all schools at Milton Mills and Nute Ridge. The per cent. of attendance for Grades

7 and 8 at Milton Grammar school during the same period was 99.69 per cent.

Both teachers and Superintendent are appreciative of the support given to them by the School Board. We are all cooperating to maintain good schools.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF NUTE HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools and the Members of the Board of Trustees:

I hereby submit my fifth annual report of the Nute High School which opened its forty-fifth year on September 3rd, with an enrollment of seventy-three pupils. Transfers to other schools and withdrawals reduced the registration until at present there are 67 pupils divided as follows: Seniors, 24; Juniors, 13; Sophomores, 16; Freshmen, 14.

Should all members of the Senior Class pass it will be the largest group ever to graduate from our institution.

New bookkeeping desks have been installed in the Commercial room thus modernizing this department's equipment as suggested by the State Board of Education.

Each member of the school has been weighed and a thorough examination of the ears, eyes, throat and nose made by our school nurse, Miss Marion Northway, R. N. By the use of the Audiometer furnished by the State Department of Health a complete checkup on hearing was possible with many surprising results obtained.

Aaron J. Cate was elected to fill the position of caretaker made vacant by the resignation of Willis Tetherly.

Athletics have been self-supporting and have furnished a surplus for the purchase of a two volume set of Funk and Wagnalls New Standard Dictionary.

Again realizing the value of visual education, field trips for the various classes are being held. The physics class made Archimedes principle more meaningful by attending the launching of the submarine "Porpoise" at Portsmouth. They will spend a day, as in previous years, at the University of New Hampshire laboratory where under the guiding hand of Professor Clement Moran and their headmaster they witness and conduct experiments with apparatus beyond the financial means of most high schools. The Senior Government Class goes to Concord visiting the Legislature, State Prison, State Library, Federal Court and historical buildings. Other classes make field trips pertinent to their respective interests.

The School Annual, The Purple and Gold, as in the past three years won National recognition in the Columbia Scholastic Press Contest.

Reports from the State Department of Education show the school to be above State Median and Standard in English forms and reading. Commissioner Pringle complimented the work of the Senior American Government group. Several outstanding booklets and papers have been prepared.

The attendance for the year has been remarkable regardless of inclement weather and sickness, the average showing better than 97 per cent. attendance.

The Commercial department has done a lot of mimeographing for outside parties including the Church Circle, Woman's Club, Milton Board of Trade, Milton Mills Church, The Grange, Daughters of Pocahontas and other local orders.

The public playground and athletic field planned under W. P. A. funds was sidetracked for other projects but it is hoped it will materialize in the spring.

Your headmaster has been endeavoring for the past five years to have a "No School Signal" given on the Fire Siren. This could be accomplished at a stated time on stormy mornings without inconvenience to the firemen and thus inform all parents that there was no session thus covering all territory which "word of

mouth" fails to do. It is hoped that in the near future this will be possible.

In order to meet the demands of all types of students schools are installing Domestic Arts for girls and Practical Arts for boys. The tuition of those who attend Rochester High because Nute High does not offer these courses would more than pay the salary of the instructor and would bring the school to a high curriculum level of the other schools which do offer these courses.

The many helpful suggestions of our Superintendent at Teachers' meetings have been beneficial to the school and staff.

A dental clinic was held in June. I consider it a very successful project because of the fact that the greater number of the children who had work done had never been to a dentist before and were badly in need of it.

A toxoid clinic was also held in June, through the State Board of Health and 86 children were immunized, 17 of whom are now school children. This is a most important work and parents are realizing it. In this state there have been only 16 cases of diphtheria during this year. Immunization through toxoid is wiping out rapidly, this dreadful disease.

In August, the annual Health Examination Conference was held and although it is for infants and preschool children, 8 school children were examined and 8 who started school in September. Annual health examinations for all, is the goal.

This year I was able to have the Audiometer machine from the State Board of Education, Concord. This is the most scientific and accurate way for testing hearing we have. Only 3 serious cases of hearing deficiency were found.

First aid kits in the schools have also been replenished.

The figures for the annual inspection do not include the pupils of the High school, although at this writing those pupils have all been inspected and eye testing done.
