ANNUAL REPORT RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL

January 1, 1970 — December 31, 1970

During the past year the Rural District Health Council has been providing visiting nurse service to the following seven towns: Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield, Barrington, Strafford, Middleton, and New Durham. The nurses are building up a comprehensive health program including postpartum and newborn visits, immunization checks, family planning services and direct nursing services ordered by the physicians. We are hoping to expand our family planning services, to establish Child Health conferences and immunization clinics.

At present we have two part time nurses and a part time supervisor. Because of the geographical area and the travel involved covering the area, it is more feasible to employ the two part time nurses rather than a full time one. The administration and supervision of this program is contracted to the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center in Portsmouth, N. H.

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SUMMER RECREATION PROGRAM

Northwood, New Hampshire Summer 1970

Description of Site: Northwood Elementary School I. was the site of the 1970 program and proved exemplary as an ideal facility for summer recreation. The auditorium and two classrooms with tables and chairs, etc., as well as toilet facilities were available for playground use. The outside area behind the school was equipped with swings, sandbox, and blacktop area. Further behind the school was located a large two-acre open field. The primary disadvantage of the site was its location on a major heavily travelled highway. However, because the citizens were accustomed to the location, it did not prove a discouraging factor in playground participation. A secondary site used one day per week was the Northwood Town Beach (and/or a similar nearby bathing area offered by the Town), to which transportation was provided by parents one day per week.

- II. Playground Policies
 - A. Ages: 1st through 8th grade
 - B. Hours: Nine-week program, Monday through Friday, 9 a. m. to 3 p. m.
 - C. Average attendance: 65 Total registration: 120
 - D. Fees: Optional donation of \$1.00 upon registration, Charges for field trip admission fees, etc.
 - E. Rainy-Day Policy: Temporary use of the school building, followed by dismissal.

VI. General Comment: The Northwood Summer Program was the best attended and best publicized of all the five programs sponsored by the Office of Economic Opportunity during the summer of 1970. Furthermore, the personal assistance lent by town citizens enabled the Playground Director to fulfill his role as organizer and leader. And because of the excellent cooperation between the school department and summer recreation committee, the situation was ideal. The program should definitely continue in the future; due to the success of the past summer, the town's citizens will undoubtedly demand its return. The primary method by which the program could be improved would be more advanced planning. Now that a number of participants has been established, advance inventories should be made for supplies and equipment, for example. Furthermore, the volunteer helpers should be scheduled for the summer during the spring, and then advised to attend the Summer Playground Leaders' Workshop sponsored by the Office of Community Recreation Service in Concord.

The program in 1970 was fortunate to have the Town of Northwood's cooperation; next summer the Director will be able to use 1970's experience upon which to plan and improve. Northwood was a good example of a program in whose favor were several factors such as site, budget, and volunteer help, but whose real success depended upon the Playground Director. In this case it is necessary for the town to evaluate the performance of the Director itself, and subsequently act upon that evaluation for the future.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture — to bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 a. m. and after 5:00 p. m. with the following exceptions: Commerical or industrial burning is permissible at

Commerical or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

- 2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?
- 3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help," and invites

you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

In September of 1970, with the re-opening of school, a considerable re-organization of the staff had taken place. The first three grades had been organized as an ungraded program with five levels of instruction to enable the pupils to progress at a rate befitting their abilities and inclinations. A further benefit to the pupil should result in enabling him to receive more individual attention and thus prevent the development of situations requiring remedial measures which are costly both in terms of money and in terms of personal hardship to the youngster. Grade four, because of its size, was left as a traditionally organized class. In order to take advantage of the individual talents of the members of the teaching staff, the upper four grades have been organized as a departmentalized elementary school. This, again, should be of benefit to the child in a number of ways, including that of an early orientation to the greater responsibility placed upon one as one grows older, the benefit of the learning under an expert instructor in a particular field, as well as enabling the instructor to better organize the area for which he is responsible.

The addition of movable classrooms has been most helpful, and though the space problem has not been completely solved, this addition to the building has enabled the program briefly outlined above to function. It is understood that the report of the building committee will be published elsewhere in this District Report, and all patrons of the district are urged to read it and consider its implications. The committee has worked hard and spent many hours considering the space problem and deserves a great deal of credit for its effort.

Perhaps the most important problem to be considered by the District and the Board in the immediate future is the effect that the new minimum standards will have on the district's educational program. These minimum standards are expected to be well on the way toward complete implementation by the start of the 1972-1973 School Year. For purposes of explanation, there follows a resume of the standards and the progress the District has made toward implementing some of them.

EXPENDITURES

For maintaining library resources, printed and non-print materials, a minimum of \$5.00 to \$10.00 per child shall be budgeted and expended annually.

SCHOOL BUILDING FACILITIES

There must be five acres for the school, one additional acre for each 100 pupils.

A regular classroom must be at least 900 square feet to accommodate 25-30 children.

New elementary school buildings shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with present New Hampshire State Department of Education School Building Standards. Partially

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The health program for the year 1969-1970 was carried out in the usual manner with an annual physical inspection of each student by the nurse. When defects were noted, the appropriate referral and follow-up were made.

The students again received the benefit of preventive dental care. A hygenist, sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Public Health, visited the classrooms and presented interesting and informative programs. One hundred and eighty-two children responded to the cleaning and flouride clinic in November. The Harvey Lake Women's Club and the P.T.A. generously donated to the Matching Funds Program enabling several students to receive corrective dental treatment. For the past several years Mrs. Ruth Gallant has been coordinator for our school dental program. She has spent many hours on this and all her efforts are greatly appreciated.

The Heaf Test for Tuberculosis was offered in school to the first and seventh grade students. A total of fiftythree children and six teachers were tested.

Thirty-six children were registered for school entry at a pre-school clinic in May.

Rubella (German Measles) immunizations were especially encouraged this year and one hundred and sixtythree students received this vaccine. We are grateful to Dr. Alfred Mihachik who generously donated his time for the clinics.

First-aid was administered to approximately 90 students. Twenty-one ill children were transported home and twenty-nine home visits were made by the school nurse.
