3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1000.00 for the improvement of the Beach Road along Back Lake.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the Lake Shore road on First Lake.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise money to meet the State to build Indian Stream and Perry Stream bridges.
7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to fire equipment.
8. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

9. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Pittsburg School District:

General

In this hour of great world crisis when the rights of free men everywhere are threatened with destruction, it is mandatory that we pronounce in a positive and unmistakable manner our belief in the American Way of Life. We must not let anyone forget that liberty involves and requires the highest degree of individual and group responsibility and sacrifice. We must bend our every effort to wipe out greed, bigotry, biased opinion, ignorance, intolerance and all the other evils that beset our democracy.

We have faith in the youth of America. With the proper training in the home, the church and the school the vast majority of our youth will not become cynical and indifferent.

It is time for criticism to be changed to commendation, for distrust to give way to confidence and for doubt to yield to understanding to the end that all generations of Americans may dedicate their united efforts to the preservation of our liberty and freedom.

Buildings and Equipment

The buildings are for the most part in very good condition. The most extensive improvement which was made during the summer was the construction of a larger woodshed at the village. New pupil desks were purchased for the Home Economics and Commercial rooms, folding chairs for the orchestra, a built-in cupboard for the dinner boxes, and the painting of the boys' and girls' toilet rooms at the village school.

At the Danforth School the front steps were rebuilt, the old toilets were torn off and an inside emergency exits were constructed at the rear of the building. Numerous other minor repairs and improvements were made to the school buildings.

It would be nice if sometime in the near future more adequate lighting could be installed in the village building.

Teachers

The following changes occurred in the teaching personnel of the district. Arlene McMaster, U. of N. H., was selected to fill the vacancy as teacher of French and English. Verna Palmer, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, was elected to fill the Commercial department vacancy. Mrs. Palmer resigned effective as of October and she was replaced by Samuel Finkle, who is a graduate of the Salem Teachers' College. Marjorie Fitts, a graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory filled the music vacancy. Isabel Shaw, Keene Normal School, was selected for the village intermediate room.

Enrollment and Attendance

The total enrollment is slightly larger than last year. There are at present 177 in the school as compared with 168 a year ago. There are 5 tuition pupils from Clarkville and Stewartstown attending Pittsburg High School and there are 3 from Pittsburg attending school at Canaan and West Stewartstown.

The percentages of attendance on the whole were somewhat improved over a year ago. The high school and intermediate room in the village and the primary room at the Danforth had a very commendable record of better than 97 per cent. None of the schools fell below 95 per cent and the average for the town as a whole was just 97. The tardiness records were on the whole very good, there being but 136 cases of tardiness in all the schools for the whole school year. The best record was made by the Pittsburg Intermediate Room with only 7.

Health

The health records reveal that a great improvement has been made in the care of the physical defects. There are still some that need special attention and should not be neglected.

Each year the State Department of Child Welfare sponsors a free clinic in Pittsburg for the purpose of examination and giving advice in nutrition and physical defects of babies. It is urged that the parents attend these clinics and give their children the benefit of a thorough examination and receive helpful advice if needed. The discovery and treatment of defects in pre-school children may prevent serious complications later.

The statistical report given below summarizes the work of Ethel Sturgis, the school nurse, for the past year.

As part of the year's work 5 dental clinics were held, 10 pupils were taken to a doctor, 31 to the dentist and 9 to the hospital. Six cases of malnutrition, 1 Osteomyelitis, 3 Colitis, and 64 Influenza, have improved.

Music

The work in music, for the Pittsburg and Clarksville Schools, is being carried on this year by Marjorie Fitts.

The two unit courses, Music Appreciation and Music Theory, are being given in the high school again this year. The course in Music Appreciation includes a study of orchestral instruments, musical forms and through the courtesy of the State Library the class has been able to listen to records of the composers studied.

A study of the fundamentals of music reading and notation, rythmn, melody writing and analyzation, and formation of chord structure, is included in the work of the Music Theory class.

The Glee Club assisted in putting on a Christmas Concert and an operetta will be given in the spring. The orchestra of 14 members have been practicing regularly.

In the grade schools the music periods consist of singing, music appreciation, rythmn band, syllable reading, ear training and rythmn clapping.

Notes on the Budget

The school board's budget for 1941-42 is \$19,627.50 as compared with \$19,794.50 for last year. The budget last year was increased by special appropriation to \$20,794.50 and reduced by an estimated income of \$320.00 so that \$20,474.50 was raised by taxation.

This year's budget of \$19,627.50 is reduced by an estimated income of \$500.00 so that it would require \$19,127.50 to balance the budget as submitted by the school board. This is \$1,347.00 less than was raised for the school year 1940-41.

The decrease in the request this year is almost entirely accounted for by two items; one special appropriation of \$1000.00 and the other insurance premiums falling due. While it is expected that the cost of many items will increase within the year it is likewise expected that we shall have a larger income from tuition.

Conclusion

It is the purpose of the school to do everything possible to help train our boys and girls to become active reliable self-supporting citizens in a democracy.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the members of the school board, parents, teachers and friends for the interest they have shown in the schools and for their loyal cooperation during the past year.
