



TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sandown qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House on the second Tuesday of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk.
- 2. To choose one selectman for three years and one selectman for one year.
 - 3. To choose a Town Treasurer.
 - 4. To choose one or more road agents.
- 5. To choose a library trustee for a term of three years.
- 6. To choose a Town trustee for a term of three years.
 - 7. To choose all other necessary Town officers.
- 8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town charges.
- 9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for highways.
- 10. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town poor.
- 11. To see how much money the Town will vote for Memorial Day.
- 12. To see how much money the Town will vote for Old Home Week.
- 13. To see if the Town will appoint a committee to investigate the merits of the Town forest proposition and report at the March meeting next year.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to build and reconstruct the State road from the East Hampstead Town line to Carr's Corner (so called) and authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the same not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) provided that the State will pay (50. per) centum of the total cost, and that the Selectmen be authorized to employ local labor when available on said reconstruction.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 dollars for the control of White pine blister.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to divide the interest of the \$1,000.00 dollars deposited in the Manchester Savings Bank among the several denominations in proportion to their taxes.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to use the appropriation raised for Old Home Week the sum of \$50.00 to pay for the Memorial Tablet erected at "The Meeting House Green Memorial Park" at Hampton, N. H. to represent the Town of Sandown.
- 19. To act upon any business that may come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 8, 1926

To the School Board and Citizens of Sandown:

Herewith I submit to you my sixth annual report as superintendent of schools.

HOW MUCH EXPERIENCE HAVE SANDOWN TEACHERS HAD?

Since the summer of 1919 FIFTMEN new teachers have been elected in Sandown. The average experience that these teachers had before beginning their work in Sandown is 1 YEAR AND 8 MONTHS of teaching.

This lack of experience is a big handicap to these teachers in their effort to accomplish as much in their schools as do the city school teachers in this state whose average experience is 6 years. Experience increases a teacher's value as long as she does not get into a rut and does keep up with the times.

Sandown teachers—1 2-3 yrs.

N. H. City teachers—6 years exp.

Experienced teachers cost more, are worth more and they increase your amount of State aid almost as much as they increase the total expense.

HOW LONG DO SANDOWN TEACHERS REMAIN IN THEIR POSITIONS?

The fifteen teachers that have given up their schools in Sandown since 1919 averaged to have taught for Sandown 111 years. This idea is expressed by saying that their average TENURE was two years.

Tenure in Sandown—11, yrs.

Tenure in N. H. cities-415 years.

Desirable boarding places, and pleasant social life help in increasing the tenure, but of even more importance is a good salary schedule. Neither the best beginners nor even the average experienced teachers can be attracted or kept by low salary schedules.

Asking for low salary schedules is really asking for low grade teachers and low grade schools. That is a thing that should be understood by all citizens, for it is the teachers, more than all other things put together, that make the schools.

THE SCHOOL NURSE QUICKLY PROVED HER WORTH TO THE COMMUNITY

Previous to the coming of the school nurse, Miss Lillian I. Mackintosh of Chester, last September, only 13% of the physical defects of the pupils were given treatment, and head lice was an oft appearing nuisance, Miss Mackintosh has already:-

- 1, Encouraged many parents to secure treatment of their child's defects.
- 2. Accompanied several children to the hospital or doctor.
- 3. Secured payment of the charges of the hospital, oculist or doctor from some special funds in cases where it would be a financial burden to the family.

Every month the nurse examines the pupils, especially their heads, and weighs them. Weight reports are occasionally sent to parents of under-weight pupils.

WHO PAYS FOR THE SCHOOL NURSE?

The school nurse is employed by a union of eight towns. To all of these towns except Epping the State gives \$1.50 per pupil for the support of a school nurse and this pays the major part of her salary and expenses.

ARE OUR SCHOOLS COSTING MORE THAN ELSEWHERE?

Comparative costs per pupil for elementary schools are as follows:

This supervisory union—\$64. New Hampshire—\$69. Some states—\$81.

WHAT TO TEACH A CHILD BEFORE HE ENTERS

THE FIRST GRADE

It will help the progress of youur child in school if he can be taught as many of the following things as possible before he enters:

- 1. Be able to tell colors.
- 2. Be able to say the alphabet.
- 3. Be able to count up to ten, or higher.
- 4. Be able to say the days of the week.
- 5. Be able to tell time by the clock.
- 6. Be able to tell a penny, nickel and dime.
- 7. Be able to say the months of the year.
- 8. Know how to hold a pencil. It is natural for them to hold a pencil the way an adult holds chalk. They must be taught the right way.
- 9. Be able to draw crudely a pig, man, cat, etc., and also be able to color the drawing with a crayon, not coloring too much outside of the lines.
- 10. Know a few little tunes, and be able to followatune with others.
- 11. Be able to keep step to music or keep time by clapping.
 - 12. Know several nursery rhymes by heart.

All beginning pupils are required by law to be vaccinated. The best time is the summer before they enter.

School board regulations require that they be 5 years 9 months old by September 1.
