

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are herby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at eight of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred seventeen dollars (\$817) for foundation drains and pointing, and for renewing the basement ceiling of Wiggin Memorial Library.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand one hundred fifty nine dollars (\$1,159) for the construction and finishing of a proper stairway to the basement for use by the public at Wiggin Memorial Library.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred eighty dollars (\$180) for painting and repairing the walls on the main floor of Wiggin Memorial Library.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into a compact with neighboring towns to share the cost of constructing and equipping an airport to be located in the Town of Stratham. The total cost to be Two Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars

(\$280,000.00) one half of which is to be procured from the federal government, one quarter from the State of New Hampshire, and one quarter or Seventy Thousand Dollars (70,000.00) to be raised by the cooperating towns. To authorize the Selectmen to issue all necessary notes and bonds in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, of the laws of New Hampshire; said notes and bonds to be issued for a period of five years, and to authorize the Selectmen to make such agreements and take such action as may be necessary to carry out the purpose of this vote. The authority of the Selectmen to act under this article shall be effective only providing the towns involved shall appropriate sufficient funds for the construction of said airport.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) as its share of the cost of constructing a Seacoast Airport. Said sum to raised at the rate of (\$2,000.00) Two Thousand Dollars per year for five years.
- 8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen in conjunction with the Community Church to set and record a boundary between the town cemetery and church property. The westerly boundary to be not more than Twenty-Five (25) feet beyond the present fence.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for an Old Home Day observance.
- 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,-500.00) to put an addition on the Town Highway Shed.
- 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to construct Guinea Road to a Class V Road.
 - 12. On petition of Richard C. Keith and thirteen

others to see if the town will install two street lights at Crestview Terrace, one at the corner of Portsmouth Avenue and the other at the rotary on Crestview Terrace. Raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$120.00) for the same.

- 13. On petition of Robert E. Corbin and twelve others to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for Civil Defense.
- 14. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to allow 1% discount on such property taxes as are paid by August 15, or within 30 days from the day upon which the Tax Warrant is committed to the collector, which-ever is later, the date to be printed on the Tax Bill.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the lower Town Hall to elect Town Officers. The discussion and action on the articles in the warrant at 8:00 p.m. in the upper Town Hall.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Planning Board met with the School Board early in the year to discuss future school needs of the town. At that meeting it was felt that in the next five or six years there could possibly be 100 new houses built in the town which would result in between 150 to 200 children. The school board felt that by using the auditorium as a temporary classroom and by sending the 7th grade to Exeter, we might manage for five or six years without an addition to the school.

Plans for sanitary facilities at Stratham Hill Park have been discussed and it was felt that two such units should be constructed as soon as possible in the spring.

Several meetings have been held to discuss the Greater Seacoast Area Airport. Location, financing, and yearly maintenance have been discussed. The board and the Selectmen have met with other groups from adjoining towns to investigate the matter further. Information has also been gathered in Concord and from the airport personnel. In summing up the meetings it would appear that Stratham should definitely be interested in the development of such an airport, but it was pointed out that any specific benefits to the town in terms of industrial or commercial growth within the town itself would probably not be realized in the immediate future. Stratham would, however, benefit indirectly from the general growth in the Seacoast area occasioned by the construction of the airport. It was also felt that Stratham should try to retain control of any airport facility located in the town.

The revised Building Ordinance, Zoning Regulations and Zoning Map of the town have been reprinted by the state and are available from the Secretary of the Planning Board, James Peirce or from the Town Clerk.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

The Civil Defense staff has been active in establishing an organization and in planning for emergencies. A large part of these plans have been concentrated on the possible occurrence of natural disaster as well as the effects from nuclear war and the danger of radioactive fallout.

To prepare adequate plans, many hours of volunteer time have been spent in bringing maps of the town up to date with regard to new streets, houses, location of equipment etc. Also, several meetings with State CD officials has been necessary to plan an evacuation system coordinated with other area towns. This information will be distributed to every home in Stratham as soon as state plans are finalized.

A complete test evacuation of the Memorial School was planned and carried out last spring. 197 school children and teachers were evacuated in less than four minutes with the cooperation of residents in the school area who used their vehicles for the test. Their help, the assistance of school officials and children, and the use of 2-way radios made this one of the most successful tests ever observed by state CD Officials.

The ultimate goal of CD planning is to see that the town has adequate supplies, equipment, and most important, trained people to meet the emergencies of disasters so that the town of Stratham will survive to continue to progress and grow. Your cooperation and encouragement will make this possible.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Stratham qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Memorial School in said district on the 11th day of March 1963, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
- 9. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for

the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriations, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 10. On Petition of Charles B. Nelson and 10 other legal voters of the district. To see if the school district will vote to adopt the provisions of R. S. A. 197:1-a as inserted by Laws 1961, 134:2 providing for the election of school district officers at the town meeting.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to apply the Capital Reserve Fund of \$1000.00 plus accumulated interest against retirement of School Bonds maturing the school year 1963-1964.
- 12. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

These are Government surplus foods such as meats, butter and cheese that are being stored. The cost of storage running close to \$50.00 for the year.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

A comparison of next year's budget as printed in this book with budgets of previous years reveals a rather complete rearrangement of the line items and the addition of several new items. This has been a State requirement. In order to allow a comparison of the proposed 1963-64 budget with that of 1962-63, the 1962-63 budget has been revised in this book to fit the new format.

There are two large budget increases. There is a \$5,225 anticipated increase in High School tuition because we expect eleven more pupils in High School next year. The rate per pupil is unchanged. We expect seven less pupils in Junior High. The second large increase is in teachers' salaries. The Board expects to hire an additional teacher for next year because we shall need help in the lower three grades, each of which will have between 32 and 35 pupils. The grades will have to be split in the most advantageous fashion when the actual pupil load is known next fall.

Because of the continued growth in our school population, the District must plan to enlarge the school in the near future. We are educating 11% more pupils this year than we did last year. We shall be using the auditorium as a classroom again next year as we add the eighth teacher to our staff. The school will be very seriously overcrowded if the present rate of growth continues for two more years.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Stratham.

It is with pleasure that I submit my fifteenth annual report.

One addition was made to the teaching staff this year. Mrs. Virginia Holder was elected as the additional school nurse for the Supervisory Union.

We are indeed fortunate to have this conscientious and hardworking staff again this year.

The enrollment by grades as of January 3 is as follows:

This is a total enrollment of 188 which represents an increase of 11% during the last year. There are also five students from Stratham who are attending the special class held at the Exeter Elementary School. If the numbers in the lower grades continue to increase, Stratham may be faced with another school space problem in the near future.

The tuition rates for 1963-1964 as announced by the Exeter School Board after approval by the State Board of Education are as follows:

\$475 for senior high students which is the same rate as for this year.

\$405 for junior high students which is an increase of \$30.

These rates are based on the estimated per pupil costs for 1962-1963 plus the 2% rental charge of \$22.17.

The additional school nurse has made it possible to give the usual health examinations and also to provide a health education program as well. One of the nurses spends a certain amount of time per week in each school in addition to being on call always in case of emergency. A Health Committee consisting of a representative from each school district in the Supervisory Union was formed last spring and it meets regularly with the nurses to advise them and to determine need policies for the school health program. We now have one of the better programs in the state.

A part of this report is devoted to a statement by Mr. Frederick King, Teacher Consultant for Supervisory Union 16, who replaced Mr. Donald Elsemore last August. He outlines some of the work which he is doing in his role as supervisor of elementary education. He reports as follows:

"It has been my pleasure to begin work this school year in the area as teacher consultant. I have found the first few months very interesting, and I feel also a sense of belonging in the way teachers have accepted me as one of the 'educational family.'

"Probably the chief concern of the teacher consultant is instructional improvement. Education has many demands placed upon it. The modern space age and educational research have constantly produced proposed changes on what we teach and how we teach it. There must always be a continued evaluation of what we can use of the new, and what is worth keeping of the old. We never can stand still. Education, like any other profession, is constantly looking for better ways to achieve more as we work with the girls and boys of this area.

"A program of instructional improvement is only as good as those involved. Any program's worth can be measured by the desire of each worker to bring to the job the best he has to offer. I have found excellent cooperation from all the teachers as we examine what we are doing, and look ahead to what we need to change.

"My role this first semester has been chiefly one of getting acquainted with the schools and their staffs. I have tried to make frequent visits to the classrooms in order to view the teaching process, and to familiarize myself with teachers and pupils. By careful analysis of what is happening in the classroom, ideas for working with teachers can be gathered.

"Other techniques that I have use include the individual conference. The conference is an exchange of thinking regarding the many phases of teaching children. I would hope these conferences would help in encouraging the teacher toward future professional growth and in reaching for continued improvement of teaching skills.

"Group meetings have been held. I feel teachers should have a share in the responsibility for building philosophy and establishing the instructional program of the school. In these meetings we talk over local school problems and exchange ideas toward their solutions.

"Each month I have released a bulletin. It is usually two pages long and gives concrete ideas that the teacher may use in her classroom. I also try to include suggestions on free and inexpensive materials that are available for classroom use.

"The teaching demonstration by the consultant of new methods and materials has also been utilized. This method focuses attention upon one special skill in an actual classroom situation. The teacher observes this, and later we can exchange views on its value.

"These, then, are some of the ways I have used as consultant and teacher work together in the important task of helping children learn. Throughout this report three words stand out: growth, improvement, and achievement. These are verbal symbols used to express what I am trying to do as I seek to do service for and with the teachers of this area."

The Book Fair which has been arranged for and very successfully conducted by Mrs. Allen and the teachers deserves a word of commendation. This has aroused interest in reading and in good books on the part of not only the young people but parents as well. It has made a worthwhile contribution to the community.

The Parent-Teacher Association remains active and in many ways contributes to the welfare of the school.

Mrs. Naomi Beairsto and Mrs. Eleanor Senechal continue to provide good meals for the Hot Lunch

Program. The number of pupils participating in the program has increased which is the best evidence of this.

I call your attention to the reports and tables which follow.

I express my sincere appreciation to the citizens, the members of the School Board and the teachers for their continued support and cooperation.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Although there is much to be done in school health services, some accomplishments can be reported.

With the coming of the third nurse on a school union basis, we have been able to set a day and time to visit each school. More time has been made available to set up procedures for remedial handicaps, such as vision and hearing problems, more home visits made, more time available for teacher conferences.

Another accomplishment has been in the field of health education. Wherever routine work has been completed, such as in hearing and vision tests, we were able to follow on with a program of talks, film strips, movies, demonstration of health and safety topics. This has been met with approval of teachers, pupils and parents. There is much to be done in this field but at least a start has been made.

The needs still unmet in health services are:

- 1. Dental programs for low income groups.
- 2. Child Guidance Clinics.

Although the above services are needed the one that affects the school as well as the individual child and his family the most is the emotionally disturbed child. The numbers that fall into this group are increasing at an alarming rate. Some areas have found it necessary to start their own services for these children either in the schools or in their communities. We in Union 16 are in as great a need as any other area. The help we can get is scattered and wholly inadequate. Yet the child with an emotional problem can be quite

distracting to the whole school as well as his or her own classroom.

There is a glimmer of hope, at present still far over the horizon, that some day we in Union 16 can obtain such services through a contemplated family service agency or by buying services from neighboring areas where such services are in the process of being formed.

We feel convinced that a full school year of nursing services with a staff of three will bring increased benefits to the individual school as well as the Union as a whole.

We extend our thanks to all—the parents, teachers, organizations, that have helped us in carrying out school health services during the past year.
