Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L.S.]

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Sclectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of one year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for term of three years, and two Auditors for the ensuing year.

2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day expense.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the care of Cemeteries.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise \$200 and appropriate the same for the use of the Laconia Hospital.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for White Pine Blister Rust control to be spent in co-operation with the State Forestry department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$174.64 to obtain Town Road Aid from the State. 7. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of Municipal Accounting and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and approprithe sum of \$234.00 which is 1/100 of 1 per cent of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in co-operation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift from Arthur S. Brown, in memory of his wife Belle Peabody Brown, the Band Stand lot (so called) meaning the land beginning at a line west of the Soldiers' Monument and bounded on the North by Winter Street, on the South by West Main Street and on the West by Edward Gibson property and enclosed by an iron fence. The Band Stand to be removed by Arthur S. Brown. This land to be given upon the expressed condition that no building or structure shall ever be erected or placed on said premises; that said premises shall never be used for any business or commercial purposes, the fence to be maintained in good condition, the trees cared for and the grass kept cut and said premises shall always be kept as an open lot.

10. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen as agents of the Town to administer or dispose of any property acquired by tax deed.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise

for all purposes for the year ensuing.

13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.

14. To choose any other officers or agents for the year ensuing.

15. To see if the Town will vote to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

12. To see what action the precinct will take towards buying a rescue car and equipment, and raise money for same.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### TILTON AND NORTHFIELD FIRE PRECINCT

To the Inhabitants of Tilton and Northfield:

In closing the records for another year, may we take this opportunity of expressing our appreciation for your fine cooperation and assistance during the past year. Also, may we express our gratitude to the members of Engine Company No. 1 and Engine Company No. 2 for their excellent and efficient workmanship in combating the various fires that they have attended.

The precinct should be justly proud of these firemen who willingly and without hesitation risk their lives in order to save your homes and business places.

Since our last precinct meeting the fire station has been completed and equipped much to the satisfaction of the wardens and the members of both engine companies. You citizens should take a great deal of pride in showing your friends this modern station. As soon as funds and material are available, the apartment in the station will be completed with quarters for a full time man.

The inspection of houses and business places, in order to eliminate all fire hazards, has been completed; thanks to the assistance of the firemen. We consider this one of the most important items on our list of duties, and frequent inspections will be maintained in the future.

The greatest conflagration that we were faced with during the year was the loss of the Carter Mill on Park Street owned by the Gibson Woolen Mills, Inc., when assistance was called from Franklin, Laconia, and Winnisquam. The firemen are to be commended on their excellent work in combating this fire, as they were only able to reach the building from one side, on account of the river on the westerly side, and a very strong wind made their task all the greater. Chief Jordan deserves a great deal of credit for the very efficient manner in which he handled this emergency.

Lights have been installed on both bridges leading into Northfield, and the same are greatly appreciated by all.

A new hydrant has been installed on Coffran Avenue; this fulfills a long felt want and should be of assistance in reduction of insurance rates in that section.

Under the supervision of J. M. Sleeper, the numerous fire alarm wires throughout the precinct have been gone over, and all obstructions that might interfere with same have been removed, wires tightened, and new parts installed. This inspection will greatly increase the efficiency of the system.

The Gamewell Company completed the erection of the new tower and placed thereon the new siren that operates by compressed air from a large pressure tank; they also installed within the station a recording system which shows upon a revolving tape the exact location of the box rung in, thereby eliminating any errors.

The heating system has been completely renovated in order to take care of the new addition, and so arranged that the apartment over the station, when completed, can be heated from this same system. In one section of the station, an office has been partitioned off for use of the fire wardens; same has been equipped with desk, chairs and a new filing system for all records, such as paid bills, insurance papers, contracts, and fire records.

In order to do away with the erection of a tower for dry-

ing out the hose after each fire the wardens are negotiating for an electrical arrangement that will dry out the hose very quickly and more efficiently than the old hose tower method, and also will save many dollars worth of hose owing to the rapid drying and constant strain on hanging hose from couplings.

We wish at this time to call your attention to fire alarms outside the precinct. During 1944, we had 20 calls for fires beyond the precinct limits and in 1945, we only had 6 calls of a like nature. This proves beyond any doubts that these people have become fire conscious, and they should be commended for this excellent record.

The Dodge Forest Fire Truck has been completely remodeled, thanks to the generosity of the selectmen of Tilton and Northfield. This truck is equipped with fire hose, Indian pumps, a portable pump, all tools such as shovels, rakes, mattocks for forest fire use. If a booster pump was installed on this truck, it could be used for chimney and small fires; also for out of town calls, thereby save using the large fire truck.

The members of Company 1 and Company 2 deserve a great deal of credit for the interest they have shown in building up a fund to be used in renovating the hall over the old station. With raffles, and burning grass around various homes, they have accumulated the sum of \$225.00 towards this fund.

Transportation was furnished for 17 patients to Laconia, 2 to Boscawen, 1 to Meredith and 3 to Franklin.

A toxoid clinic was held in cooperation with the State Board of Health and 19 pre-school children were immunized against diphtheria.

The N. H. Tuberculosis Association was assisted in conducting a chest and X-ray clinic at which 41 patients were examined. One child and 3 adults showed an arrested hilus condition and 8 children and 8 adults were found to have a hilus gland enlargement which necessitates watchfulness. 69 of the employees of Elm Mills were patch tested for tuberculosis. Forty-one were positive reactors and 38 received chest X-rays. Only 3 of this number showed incipient, arrested pulmonary tuberculosis. These clinics were under the auspices of the N. H. Tuberculosis Association.

Mrs. Alice M. French substituted for the nurse while she was vacationing and assisted on the district an aggregate of  $44\frac{1}{2}$  days.

An important part of present day public health nursing is concerned with the prevention of illness. The public schools are a fertile field for this kind of work because when working with children, we are building for the future. Besides the children's enthusiasm brings home to the parents lessons which might otherwise escape their interest in these busy days and again in the schools a large group can benefit by the minimum expenditure of time. For these reasons more and more time is being devoted to health work with the school children. For more detailed account of the school nursing see the report of the Superintendent of Schools.

Recently our community has had far too many contagious diseases. In an effort to curb such tendencies may I point out that when no physician is in attendance it is the responsibility of the family to report any and all cases of communicable diseases to the local health officer?

Once more I should like to pay tribute to all who have helped to further the advancement of district nursing in our community. Without their cooperation this program would not have been possible.

#### **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

#### To the Members of the School Board, Parents, and Voters of the Tilton-Northfield Union School District:

It is a pleasure to state conditions under which the schools have been maintained since the last annual report. The war-time hardships experienced in Tilton-Northfield were, in general, less burdensome than in many places in New England. The post-war period, into which we have been thrust suddenly, may present more hindrances to good educational progress than the war years brought.

#### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Maintenance, Operation, and Repair

The School Board granted the use of the Union School grounds and toilet facilities to the Recreation Committee of the Chamber of Commerce for summer playground work. An entrance was made through a window in the girls' room and a door installed, the basement corridor was barred by temporary doors, and the facilities made available to the boys and girls in the summer program.

The Recreation Committee was successful in selecting an efficient playground director, Mrs. Helen H. Rego, who had full charge of the games, equipment, and facilities. Playground equipment, sand and sandbox, and articles for games were provided by the district. The report on all phases of this summer project is excellent.

A skating rink is now in process of development by the

Recreation Committee. It is planned to give free use of this to young people and adults when the ice surface is ready.

The lighting in the Union School has been poor in most classrooms during the short winter days. The building has been completely rewired to accommodate an increased circuit load and new lighting fixtures will be obtained when they are on the market. When installed, the electric lighting should be adequate to prevent further visual strains among the children.

The slate urinals in the boys' room of the Union School are to be replaced by white porcelain units soon. This should remove a source of foul odors from the basements.

The district has been fortunate to have had a supply of good fuel on hand during the war years to adequately heat its buildings. The delivery of it from the railroad siding to the bins at the two schools has been our main concern. The contract for delivering and storing the coal for this year was awarded to D. Weldon Thompson of the A. A. Thompson Coal Company.

One thousand dollars has been ear-marked in the school district accounts to purchase typewriters and war-time equipment when these are offered for sale by the federal government.

The most recent accession of equipment has been a 16-mm. sound motion picture machine. This makes possible the inauguration of a well-rounded visual education program in the local schools.

At the Tilton-Northfield High School, weatherstripping of the large classroom windows has been completed. There was a material saving of fuel last winter after the windows on the north side of the building were weatherstripped. The red barn has been moved to a foundation at the rear of the high school gymnasium. Plans for its development as an adjunct to the shop are now in process.

An enlarged parking area has been constructed northwest of the gymnasium. About a thousand yards of dirt were moved by a power grader and the surface filled with good gravel. After weathering, the area may be tarred to make a hard surface.

The high school janitors are redecorating portions of classroom walls which show the most wear after six years' use.

Mr. Elmer Simmons of Vine Street is the assistant janitor at the high school. Tilton-Northfield is fortunate to have conscientious, efficient janitors in Mr. Worthen, Mr. Adams, and Mr. Simmons. These men keep the school property in good condition, ready for inspection by outsiders at any time.

#### DISTRICT FINANCES

The balance, \$4,000, on a note held by the Citizens National Bank, was paid in advance of the due dates. This saved the district the annual interest charges, and wipes out any deficit, leaving bonds only to be retired.

The bonded indebtedness of the school district is now \$57,000, a reduction of \$28,000 from the original \$85,000 in  $2\frac{1}{4}\%$  bonds dated October 15, 1938.

Bond payments are to be \$4,000 annually through October 15, 1948; \$5,000 annually from October 15, 1949 through October 15, 1953; \$4,000 annually from 1954 through October 15, 1958 inclusive when the district's obligations for the Tilton-Northfield High School construction costs will end. The balance on hand June 30, 1945 was \$5,776.30, earmarked in school district accounts as follows:

#### TEACHERS AND SUPERVISORS

There were no changes in teacher personnel at the Union School in the 1944-5 school year. Miss Irene B. Luneau, a conscientious staff member here since September 1927, has resigned to be with her family in Concord, N. H., and to accept a teaching position in the Concord school system in January, 1946. No successor to Miss Luneau has been chosen.

There were several changes on the high school staff. Mr. Sherburne M. Buckler went to Pinkerton Academy faculty. Mr. Chris Sakelarios of Manchester, 1945 graduate of the Keene Teachers College, veteran of World War II, was selected to be coach of boys' sports and to teach some junior high school subjects.

Miss Rosalie Rushlow became assistant librarian at Hunter College. Miss Helen E. Martin, rated an excellent teacher at Belmont High School, accepted a contract here to teach most of the divisions in high school English.

Miss Hortense A. M. Levesque of Nashua, graduate of Rivier College, with two years' teaching experience in Charlestown High School, is the present teacher of French and Latin. She replaces Mrs. Irene Whitten who was married during the year. Miss Cecelia R. Dryden, contemplating marriage, did notseek reappointment. Miss Merle E. Fottler of Concord, 1945 Keene Teachers College graduate, directs the girls' sports and teaches homemaking and elementary science in the junior high school.

Miss Beatrice A. Pelletier, since 1938 successful in teaching both elementary and high school pupils here, accepted an offer from Guilford, Conn. Miss Jane R. Vogel of Manchester, Plymouth Teachers College graduate, 1945, starts her initial year here teaching history and mathematics.

Education Week was observed from November 12 to 16, 1945. There was a fine display of pupils' work in the window of the Public Service Company. Over 300 people attended the evening program on November 15th.

A small TNHS Musical was held on December 13th, under the direction of Miss Priscilla E. Marrotte. This may become an annual event.

The capacity of the gym is taxed by the attendance of large numbers of spectators at basketball games. Some attempt is being made to relieve the congestion, but good or improved teams result in increasing attendance at recent home games.

For those who attend public programs at the high school, a space has been designated for "smoking room." It is in the ground floor vestibule, near the three sets of exit doors.

There have been few changes in the Program of Studies offered for high school pupils.

#### Health Report

Mrs. Lurline H. McCook, School Nurse, has carefully attended to the health of pupils and teachers. She reports that children of both buildings have been weighed and measured, and inspected by Dr. Lyman C. Burgess, School Physician.

Children who did not have a hearing test in 1944 did so in 1945, using the state audiometer.

Union School pupils have been given dental inspections by Drs. Forrest and Nordholm. 96 have had care at the dental clinics sponsored by the Tilton and Northfield Women's Club, making it possible for 204 of the 301 Union School pupils to have their names placed on the Dental Honor Roll.

Approximately 450 hours were spent in school work, more than 100 hours being devoted to dental work and nearly 100 more on various kinds of inspection. Inspections showed the following defects:

These figures show a marked increase in deformity but most of the cases are minor defects of the feet. Many less diseased tonsils were removed.

There have been 28 cases of chicken pox, 16 of scarlet fever, 2 of measles, 36 of pediculosis, 18 of various skin diseases, and 1 of spinal meningitis.

#### Entrance Age

With the continued influx of children six years of age who are not ready for first-grade school activities, the entrance age has been changed. To enter school in September as a first grader, or beginner, a child must have reached his sixth birthday on or before December 31 of that year.

#### Transportation

Three-year contracts for the transportation of children have been made with Messrs. Archie Wheaton, Horace Wheaton, and Edmund Harbour. These contracts are written with a "base rate" and adjustments are to be made for increased costs of operation by mutual agreement. If conditions become normal the base rate will be in effect. If wartime prices or postwar prices are maintained, upward revision in payments for services rendered will be made.

#### Sale of War Stamps and Bonds

The final report on the purchase of War Stamps and Bonds by pupils in the two schools from January 1, 1945 to July 1, 1945 shows:

146 pupils purchased stamps valued at \$1,144.10

88 pupils purchased bonds, maturity value, \$6,300.

#### TEACHERS' RETIREMENT SYSTEM

In the spring of 1945, the Legislature amended P. L. Chapter 135, Section 8, Revised Laws, to assess school districts a portion of the expense in the teachers' retirement system. The present rate is 4% of the annual salaries of member teachers. In 1945-6 the charge to Tilton-Northfield for this system will be \$680.

## STATE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM

The 1945 Legislature established the State Employees' Retirement System and charges each school district in this school supervisory union a portion of the total expense for the superintendent's retirement. In 1945-6, approximately \$68 will be Tilton-Northfield's share.

# IMPROVEMENT OF INSTRUCTION THROUGH TEACHERS' MEETINGS

During the War years, and gasoline rationing, it was not feasible to hold teachers' meetings in which all teachers in the supervisory union engaged simultaneously. With the release of the restrictions, we may now continue our former custom of holding meetings for the improvement of instruction.

The first meeting in the 1945-6 school year was held in Belmont on September 4th. The topics discussed are current problems.

- 1. Ways of teaching international understanding and brotherly love.
- 2. Teaching through pictures
  - a. In reading books
  - b. By slides, films, and projected views
  - c. In drawing lessons

The second meeting was held in Tilton in conjunction with the Supervisory Union No. 59 Board meeting on November 14th. The points were:

- 1. Demonstration of Lip-Reading Teaching
- 2. Devices to Correct Hearing Deficiencies
- 3. Brief Histories of the Towns in which We Work
- 4. Geography All Teachers Should Know to Interpret Commonplace Scenes

#### CONCLUSION

In submitting this sixth annual report, I express my appreciation again to the members of the school board for their sincere consideration of school problems, to the teachers, nurses and other workers for their individual efforts to promote the school program.
