## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### TOWN WARRANT

Cheshire, ss.:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, 1939, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Auditors, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Collectors of Taxes, Trustees of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary officers.
- Art. 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and such other current expenses as may accrue.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$8,000.00 to oil the streets of Walpole Village, North Walpole, and town roads.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to gravel and improve the Kingsbury road, beginning at the dry bridge and continuing north.

- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to improve the March Hill road, beginning at the corner at old No. 6 schoolhouse and continuing past George Edwards' toward the Alstead line.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 to repair the washout on the Brewery road, caused by the September flood.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 for improving the Tony Wolfel road.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200 for straightening two dangerous curves in the road leading from High St. to Prospect Hill Road.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$745.32 for Class V roads, the State to contribute \$2,981.28.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid, and raise and appropriate \$2,043.75, the State to contribute a like amount.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for equipment and material to carry on W. P. A. road project.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 for replacing window shades and refinishing floors in the Town Hall which were not cared for in last year's interior repairs.
- Art. 15. To see what action the town will take in regard to paying the rent for the land used for the purpose of storing the logs and lumber of the Timber Salvage Administration, and raise money therefor.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for the support of The Mousley Hospital, a community institution.

- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$350 for replacing in our village the public shade trees lost in the September hurricane, the work to be done under the supervision of the tree warden.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$365 to the Monadnock Region Association of scenic New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising calling attention to the natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other 37 towns of the Monadnock Region.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer and dispose of and deed any real estate acquired by the town by tax collectors' deeds.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds as have been left it during the past year.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400 for eradicating the White Pine Blister Rust.
- Art. 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TOWN LIBRARY

The library committee feels that the circulation of books and magazines in both parts of the town shows a real appreciation of the libary.

The number of books taken out in the home library was 10,488 of which 5,797 were adult fiction, 1,259 adult non-fiction, and 3,432 juvenile. 697 magazines were issued.

There is an increasing demand for books among the younger children and we feel that in encouraging these children we are helping them to form the habit of using some of their spare time profitably.

3,811 books were taken out in North Walpole, making the circulation for the town 14,299, a very satisfactory showing.

More calls have been made on the State Library than ever before, about 30 books having been borrowed. The near by libraries in Keene, Bellows Falls and Brattleboro have loaned us books that could not be obtained elsewhere.

Some repairs were made on the roof of the building after the hurricane.

306 books have been added this year of which 46 were given, 114 have been purchased for North Walpole in addition.

We wish to express our appreciation for gifts of books and magazines from Mrs. Neil Stevens, Mrs. Alice Gilbert, Miss Lila Pierce, Dr. Houghton, Mrs. Harley Rogers, Miss Caroline Hilliard, Prof. H. B. Hastings, and Mrs. Butler.

Miss Ola Hubbard is taking a well deserved vacation from the library through the winter months. Her place was filled through November and December by Mrs. John Galloway who has now been replaced by Miss Langdon Bellows.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

#### ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

At the close of the school year the following teachers concluded faithful work in the service of the Walpole schools: Mrs. Helen Galloway—8 years, Mrs. Dorothy Macnaughton—5 years, Miss Helen Binkunski—4 years, and Miss Barbara Henry—2 years.

Miss Ruth Paulson was elected to teach the high school courses in English and Latin. Miss Paulson graduated from the University of New Hampshire in 1935 and taught for two years at Nute High School in Milton.

Miss Catherine Sullivan was employed for the English and French teaching position at North Walpole. Miss Sullivan is a graduate of Keene Normal School and completed her work for a degree at the University of New Hampshire in 1937. Her previous teaching experience covered a period of seven years and included work in both high and elementary schools in the state.

Miss Mildred Emerson, Keene Normal School, 1938, was elected to fill the vacancy in the home economics department at Walpole.

Miss Ruth Herbert, the new teacher of general mathematics, English, and French at Walpole is a graduate of the four year curriculum at Plymouth Normal School.

The school year consists of a total of 180 days including the days on which the teachers are present at conventions. Because of the large number of holidays which must be observed during the year, the school year extends over a thirty-eight week period. Days lost on account of storm have been made up on days agreeable to the School Board.

The organization and program of our schools have undergone many changes. We have come to realize more and more that the educational program must be a flexible living thing which grows, expands, or changes to meet the needs of the changes in our social and economic life. One of the most significant trends has been the shifting of emphasis from subject matter to child development. It is now generally believed that the value of content in all courses should be measured in terms of its value in the life of the growing child. As a result of a study of the real needs of life, much new material has been added to the program while much that has become obsolete has been eliminated.

A reading program has developed which more nearly meets the needs of children according to their varying levels of ability. The newer teaching methods in reading recognize the importance of guiding the growth of children in accordance with their degree of readiness and background rather than emphasizing unified performance in the acquisition of specific knowledge. It is now possible for the teacher to ascertain which of her pupils are ready to read and which ones are not. The application of simple tests may lead the teacher to discover difficulties or defects which must be overcome before much progress in reading can be made. Books for the primary reading classes as now composed and illustrated appeal to the interest of the children and the simple thoughts expressed may be interpreted in terms of their own experience.

In arithmetic also there is a tendency to emphasize operations that have value in the experiences of real life. Consequently many impractical problems and exercises have been replaced by extended practice in more useful and practical material.

The words used in the spelling lesson have been selected as a result of investigations which have been conducted to determine their proper grade placement. A correlation has been established between the words used in spelling and those included in the reading vocabulary.

The aim in history as taught in the lower grades is to build up background through the child's natural interest in people and simple social customs. It is now accepted practice in the upper grades to emphasize the cultural contributions of each civilization rather than the strictly chronological treatment of wars and dynasties.

The change in attitude regarding discipline indicates, I believe, one of the most wholesome trends in modern education. The movement has been in the direction of humanity and common sense and is an important indication of the greater respect for the personality of the child.

Several changes have been made in the general testing program as a result of suggestions proposed by the teachers. The revised program should more fully meet our needs as a basis for remedial instruction designed to correct deficiencies in the fundamental processes.

Special mention should be made of the unusual attendance record (100%) maintained thus far this year by the pupils in grade 7 at the John Kilburn School.

#### BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The following repairs and improvements were made at the various schools during the year:

#### Walpole Village School:

Walls of main room and laboratory painted.

Laboratory bench tops painted.

Walls of Junior High rooms repaired and painted.

Metal filing cabinet added to headmaster's office equipment.

School clocks cleaned, adjusted, and repaired.

Desk taps stained in some of the rooms.

Fire escape exits installed in 5th and 6th grade room and manual training building.

Fire fighting equipment installed in each building.

Fire alarm system for all buildings installed.

Walls in grades 3-4 room papered and painted.

New steel ceiling in lower rear hallway in high school building.

Repaired damage to Hooper forge shop caused by hurricane.

Added saw bench and electric grinder to equipment of Hooper building.

Added silverware and dishes to equipment of Home Economics Department.

#### North Walpole:

Washed and painted walls and ceilings in some of the rooms and hallways in both buildings.

Painted under-half on south and rear exterior of Kilburn building.

Resurfaced tar roof on Kilburn building.

Painted walls in toilets—both buildings.

Installed fire fighting equipment.

#### Drewsville:

School room walls, ceiling, and woodwork painted.

Wood shed repaired and clapboarded.

Repairs—playground equipment.

Fire extinguisher installed.

#### Number 14:

Extensive alterations were made to adjust two situations requiring immediate attention; viz: (1) Some arrangement had to be made whereby the small children from distant homes could be properly cared for and protected from the cold weather without causing interruption to the other classes during the long primary noon and after school period. (2) Immediate attention to the toilet condition was urgent.

The necessary change in the toilet arrangement made it possible to provide a small library or play room.

Two windows were added to the school room to improve the inadequate lighting condition.

Walls and ceilings were painted in both rooms and in the hallway.

Desk tops were painted.

A fire extinguisher was installed.

The exterior of the building was painted.

This building is now in excellent condition and adequate for an enrollment of twenty-four pupils.

# HEALTH

Health inspection in Walpole showed the following defects:

278 pupils were inspected.

- 3 pupils showed defective hearing.
- 13 pupils showed defective vision—uncorrected.
- 20 pupils showed poor posture.
- 24 pupils were underweight.
- 184 pupils were in need of dental care.
  - 6 pupils were unvaccinated—without proper excuse.
  - 5 pupils were vaccinated once unsuccessfully.

7 pupils were recommended to have throat and nose examination by a physician.

Inspection in North Walpole showed the following defects:

- 190 pupils were inspected.
  - 6 pupils showed defective hearing.
  - 9 pupils showed defective vision—uncorrected.
  - 10 pupils showed poor posture.
  - 22 pupils were underweight.
- 115 pupils were in need of dental care.
  - 7 pupils were unvaccinated—without proper excuse.
  - 3 pupils were vaccinated once unsuccessfully.
- 19 pupils were recommended to have throat and nose examination by a physician.

Dental clinics were held in Walpole February 14th, and March 9th, to March 22nd. They were held in North Walpole March 23rd to March 31st, 1938, with work done as follows:

The bill for this work was paid for by the parents of pupils having work done.

A tuberculosis skin test clinic was held in Walpole and North Walpole on March 12, 1938. Under the direction of Dr. Robert B. Kerr of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association.

86 pupils of the Junior High and High School were given the test.

- 72 pupils showed a negative reaction.
- 14 pupils reacted.
- 12 pupils were taken to the Keene Community Hospital for X-rays.
  - 59 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.

14 pupils had special eye examinations and defects corrected.

- 7 tonsil cases were treated privately.
- 7 tonsil cases were treated at clinics.
- 5 pupils were vaccinated successfully.

Much time is spent each year on home calls, business calls, providing clothing for needy children and transportation of pupils to clinics, dentists and oculists.

We wish to express the appreciation of the district to the local Red Cross Chapter, the Walpole Grange, and to individuals who have assisted with the work of this department.

#### MUSIC

Music instruction in the Walpole schools has been divided into three parts; viz., music appreciation, vocal music, and instrumental music.

The high school orchestra has grown steadily and has improved greatly due to the influence of the instrument classes. Classes in both string and wind instruments have been organized. Three of the orchestra members went to Nashua last May to participate in the concerts of the All State High School Symphony Orchestra.

The chorus work in both junior high and high schools has shown much improvement. Pupils are gaining in ability to sing and understand music.

A sextette has been organized in Walpole with Miss Emerson as accompanist. The new operetta chosen for this year is "The Old Fashioned Charm."

The kindergarten at North Walpole has been included in the school music schedule. Rote singing and folk dancing have been taught to this group. Two sextettes have been organized in the seventh grade room at North Walpole. Grades four, five, six and seven of the Kilburn School joined in a Christmas carol sing which was greatly enjoyed by all the children. The school music program has been expanding and now affords greater opportunity for the boys and girls. More pupils are included in the school orchestra than ever before. It is recommended that a drum outfit and bass horn be supplied for the use of the orchestra. The expense for these instruments is too great to be borne by the individual pupil.

#### ADULT AGRICULTURAL GROUP

This year for the first time the facilities of the agricultural department at the Hooper building have been made available to a class of young men who are interested in farming as a vocation.

This group, consisting at present of sixteen young men over sixteen years of age, was organized by the agricultural teacher and plans to meet each week for lectures and discussions on various phases of agriculture.

Walpole has the honor of being the first school in the state to organize such a group.

# REPORT OF HEADMASTER NORTH WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles D. Dalzell, Superintendent of Schools: Dear Sir:

I submit herewith my annual report on the work and condition of the North Walpole, N. H., schools.

#### ENROLLMENT

The registration is: Grade X, 15; Grade IX, 14; Grade VIII, 22; Grade VII, 15; Grade VI, 20; Grade V, 15; Grade IV, 16; Grade III, 20; Grade II, 18; Grade I, 14; Sub Primary, 21; total boys, 107; total girls, 83; grand total, 190.

Miss Catherine Sullivan of Manchester, N. H., is teaching the High School French and English classes and some eighth grade subjects filling the only vacancy created last summer.

#### ATTENDANCE

Averages for attendance of pupils for the first twenty weeks are high and indicate a satisfactory condition. The percentages are: Grades IX and X, 97.43; Grade VIII, 97.4; Grade VII, 99.85; Grade VI, 97.84; Grade V, 98.19; Grade IV, 98; Grade III, 98.19; Grade II, 97.96; Grade I, 98.84; Sub Primary, 95.22.

Our punctuality record is seen from the following number of tardy marks: Grades IX and X, 32; Grade VIII, 9; Grade VII, 9; Grade VI, 10; Grade V, 9; Grade IV, 4; Grade III, 1; Grade II, 10; Grade I, 3; Sub Primary, 5, total 86.

## SCHOLARSHIP

The general condition of the scholarship of our pupils should be known to the parents through the term reports sent out every six weeks. We urge the parents to inspect these reports closely. We invite them also to consult with us if the marks of their children are not satisfactory. Good results almost invariably come from such conferences.

The annual Intelligence and Achievement tests given about the mid-year have been completed. The results show a satisfactory level of attainment. These tests are given not only to see what the pupils can do in their various lessons but also for the purpose of revealing class and individual weaknesses with a view to their correction.

Our program of studies remains the same as it has been for the past few years. I suggest the consideration of making either Commercial Geography or Bookkeeping in the second year of High School a full year subject. Each is now a half year course.

There is an urgent need of developing in pupils' minds a desire to take more of the so called cultural subjects. Parents can help in instilling this desire in their children. There is too great a tendency to take the apparently easy courses. While the educational aim of the day is to provide for the needs of the pupil, there is also the worthwhile object of training pupils along lines which will give them an insight into fields of knowledge supplementary to what they, in their immaturity, consider to be what they will need in the future. An eye to the future ought to have in mind a probable change in plans that will call for equipment they have not acquired.

#### DISCIPLINE

The modern trend toward group work and less restrictive measures on the freedom of action of pupils in the schoolroom requires constant supervision on the part of the teacher to keep the limits of this free movement within the bounds of good order. Various minor disorderly habits are apt to creep in unless corrective steps are enforced. This is particularly true in the higher grades where free action is allowed to a certain extent. Greater vigilance is required in these grades to maintain proper classroom order. Our classwork is conducted with the proper amount of order to insure good teaching. It might be added here that home training is reflected in habits of obedience shown by pupils. It is vitally necessary, therefore, that proper and respectful attitudes toward teachers and their authority be taught in the home.

## ATHLETICS

I would like to see our upper grade pupils have the opportunity of enjoying indoor athletics. Pupils of this age need an outlet of this kind for their development. It is good for them and helps in the morale of the school. I hope some arrangement will be made toward this end.

#### INSPECTIONS

Mr. Russell Leavitt, High School agent, visited our school in January and observed the work of the classes and inspected our system. He has made a satisfactory report.

Miss Edgett, school nurse, has completed her examination of the pupils.

An effort to form a class in instrumental music with training in the violin and guitar is being made. This is a very desirable object. I hope that parents who can afford to do so will give serious consideration to enrolling their children in this class.

# REPORT OF HEADMASTER WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles D. Dalzell, Superintendent of Schools, Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my annual report as Headmaster of Walpole High School.

The total high school enrollment of ninety-one shows an increase of five over last year and is the highest total on record. Ten withdrawals are recorded, six due to change of residence, two found desirable employment and two because they were not interested in continuing their education. Our tardiness record, showing only fourteen cases is especially commendable. The attendance record, in the Senior high school is much lower than usual and is to be regretted. Minor cases of illness appear to be the chief cause. If pupils are ill they should by all means remain at home, otherwise an effort should be made to establish regular school attendance. We solicit the cooperation of all parents in this endeavor.

#### SCHOLARSHIP

Walpole High School is maintaining its high standard of scholarship. Reports from the State Board of Education place the school above the average in all tests given. These included English grammar, place geography and mental ability. Practice in the fundamentals is being undertaken with the idea of providing practical work in the basic skills so necessary to all in everyday life.

By the use of differentiated assignments we are endeavoring to maintain high scholastic standards and provide levels of attainment comparable with individual abilities. The unit plan provides an opportunity for steady, faithful pupils to execute their best work. Ample opportunity is given pupils who have been absent to make up their work.

Diagnostic tests in English grammar, arithmetic and silent reading have been given in grades seven to ten. From the results of these tests remedial work will be developed in the phases needing additional drill and study.

Records received from the various post-secondary schools, where our graduates are continuing their education, have been very commendable and bear evidence of good basic high school training.

The percentage of failures, in the high school, is decidedly less than for the past few years.

#### ORGANIZATION

In an effort to broaden our athletic activity periods, especially for girls, a new tournament system has been inaugurated. All girls are now represented on one of two general teams. Groups from these teams compete in the various sports and records kept of the results. The losing team in fall sports gave the winners a party at the Hooper School. An afternoon of winter sports including skiing and skating races, obstacle races and games was enjoyed. All felt the new plan had increased interest with more girls participating in wholesome activity and companionship.

Boys' athletics have continued with the same general plan. During the fall and spring a very definite outdoor activity program is provided for all. Lack of adequate gymnasium facilities hampers this necessary training during the winter months.

The Dramatic Club has been very active, holding regular meetings with planned programs relating to the various phases of dramatics. The group has made five public appearances with play presentations. Comment on the manner in which the plays were presented has been especially favorable. A very appropriate Peace Play was presented as a part of the Class Night activities during Commencement Week.

The Warbler staff continued the publication of the midyear "News Items" in addition to the annual June issue. Much time and effort was manifest.

# BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Crowded conditions in the high school building are very apparent. Increased enrollment in the science subjects, for two reasons, namely present requirements of two science subjects for entrance to schools of nursing and general interest in the field of science, have overtaxed our laboratory facilities. Crowded classrooms and laboratories are not conducive to the best efforts of the pupils.

## AGRICULTURE

The total enrollment in the agricultural department is twenty-five, seventeen in the freshman-sophomore group and eight in the junior-senior group.

Boys having poultry projects exhibited eggs in the high school class at the Annual State Egg and Baby Chick Show, sponsored by the New Hampshire Poultry Growers Association. Combined scores gave Walpole High second place.

The Hooper Chapter of Future Farmers of America was represented by five boys at the State Future Farmer Prize

Speaking and Judging Contest held at Coes Academy, Northwood, N. H. One boy placed first in dairy cattle judging thereby winning a place on the state dairy judging team to compete at the Eastern States Exposition.

The local Hubbard Farm prizes of fifty chicks each, awarded to five boys for the most outstanding poultry practice programs, were very much appreciated. In the annual state wide contest, sponsored by Hubbard Farms, and based on the records of the previous year's poultry projects, two prizes of fifty chicks each were won by Walpole boys.

The Future Farmer organization carried on the school greenhouse project as usual. Plants were supplied to people in the community as well as to members of the classes who desired them for school projects at home.

Our apple spray program was continued in the Hooper orchard and throughout the community. Members of the agricultural classes also fertilized, pruned, mulched and protected the trees in the Hooper orchard against rodents and borers. Production of fruit was very limited due to the late spring frosts.

The freshman-sophomore group planted 4,300 pine and spruce seedlings on the Hooper land in continuation of work started in previous years.

A delegation of five boys represented the Hooper chapter of Future Farmers in the Sesqui-Centennial parade held at Concord last June.

The thirteenth Annual School Fair was held on October sixth in the Town Hall. Exhibits of project and class work were displayed. This was in its entirety a school function, ably managed by the superintendents of the various departments. The interest and cooperation given us by many townspeople added much in making this a most successful fair.

Thirteen boys attended the Regional Future Farmer Getto-Gether at Alstead in December. The Future Farmer degree was conferred on boys from Chester, Vermont, Winchester, Alstead and Walpole by the officers of the Hooper Chapter.

Class work, based on the four-year plan as set up for Walpole High School included the following enterprises: dairy, orchard, poultry, live stock, potatoes, vegetable gardening, farm management, farm engineering and the various phases of farm shop work.

Instruction trips to surrounding farms have made possible our judging activities as well as practical experience in various farm operations. We greatly appreciate the cooperation of the farmers who made this work possible.

#### HOME ECONOMICS

This year the two courses offered the girls taking Home Economics are The Family and Its Members for the junior and senior girls and Foods and Nutrition for the freshmen and sophomores.

The class in Foods and Nutrition study the principles of food preservation and preparation. Meals are planned, prepared and served to members of the class or group from the school. Foods for children are also studied. Food buying is stressed and an extensive study is made of food products, their costs, value and use.

Serving the hot dish for lunch has many values. Besides providing something hot for about twenty-five children it gives the girls an opportunity to prepare and serve food to a large group. The Walpole Grange has been very cooperative in helping supply the foods for lunch.

The Family class has studied home and community relationships and responsibilities, leisure time activities and the choice of a vocation. First aid, home nursing and child care are also included in this course.

A set of dishes and silver have been added to the equipment of the kitchen.

The Home Economics club filled a basket at Thanksgiving and made toys for children at Christmas.

Both the Foods and Family classes did their part in making the Annual School Fair a success. The cooperation of women in the community who exhibited their handiwork was greatly appreciated.

The teaching staff gratefully acknowledge the cooperation of the School Board, Superintendent and townspeople in making our work successful.
