Indebtedness over assets Feb. 15, 1904

It was thought best this year to include the Hibbard and Simonds Legacy notes under the head of indebtedness, as they are virtually an indebtedness of the town. This will make it look as though the town had increased its debt the past year, but by deducting these notes, we find the total indebtedness about \$400.00 less than it was one year ago.

TRUST FUNDS.

The town has three legacies which it holds in trust: The Hutchins legacy of \$1500.00 consists of three bonds of \$500.00 each, the income of \$60.00 from these is used for the care of the Village and West Bath cemeteries, the balance, if any, is for the use of the town. The Simonds legacy of \$500.00 has an income of \$20.00, which is used to care for the Simonds lot, the balance is for town purposes. The Hibbard Legacy of \$1000.00 has an income of \$40.00, which is for the care of the Hibbard lot, the balance to be used for school purposes.

To the people of the town of Bath the following report is respectfully submitted:

During the past year 36 weeks of school have been maintained as usual. At the close of the school year last June Mr. Brown, Miss Hayward and Miss Bittinger resigned their positions, compelling us to secure a new corps of teachers for this year.

After considering a large number of applications Mr. John J. Mullowney was elected principal. Under his management the school seems to be doing very well.

Miss Alice E. Charles of Chatham, N. H., was selected for the position of assistant. Miss Charles is well qualified and doing exceptionally good work.

Our teacher in the primary room, Miss Sara A. Wood, is a Normal school graduate. Miss Wood has a difficult position, having 39 pupils under her charge, but seems to be doing good work.

We have three scholars attending High school in other towns. Two at Lisbon, costing at the rate of about \$30 per year each, and one at Tilton costing \$40 per year.

Everyone in the district should make an effort to visit school and see how it is conducted; then any critcism could at least be intelligently made.
