

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Bethlehem:

I herewith submit my second annual report relative to your schools.

The report on statistics showed the total enrollment last year to be 228. There were 54 enrolled in your high school and 174 in the elementary grades. The average membership was 188 and the percentage of attendance was 95.

This year the enrollment in the senior high school is 60 and in the elementary grades 172, making a total of 232. Except for a week or two during the first of January the attendance has been excellent.

Your school district pays the sum of \$150.00 and the town of Bethlehem pays \$150.00 to the Littleton-Bethlehem Nursing Association. Your school pupils in return receive the same careful attention from Miss Bryant that the school pupils in Littleton do. Miss Bryant and Dr. Page show marked interest in the physical welfare of the pupils. Your pupils have profited from the clinics of last summer and previous years for remedial work.

The gymnasium and playground now available at the new building offer excellent opportunities for healthful physical activities. Mr.

Cummings and Miss Tewksbury are doing much to develop a proper attitude towards high school athletics and the elementary teachers are supervising games for the younger pupils. Some playground equipment should be purchased in the near future for the benefit of the elementary pupils. With the addition of that no school in the state would offer better facilities for the physical development of its pupils in simple games and sports.

The instruction is good in all schools and in all departments of work. All of your teachers are well trained, efficient, and earnest in their endeavors. The seventh and eighth grades in the new building have been organized with the senior high school as a six year system with departmental instruction throughout. The graduates of the school now in post-secondary institutions are doing good work. The school activities, plays, musical programs, and basketball games have reflected careful training. Bethlehem should be proud of its school as well as of its new school building.

Your new building was formally dedicated on April 26. Commissioner James N. Pringle was present to give the principal address. Mr. Maurice Sullivan of the building committee told the story of its construction. Mr. C. Warren Woods, Chairman of the Building Committee, formally presented the keys to Mrs. Florence N. Turner of the school board. Mr. Harold C. Owen, the architect, gave a very clear description of the building. Mr. Jordan paid a brief tribute to the interest Mr. Whyte has shown in the schools of Bethlehem, and to his long service as chairman of the school board. Music was furnished by the orchestra and glee club of the high school.

The building now has excellent equipment in all departments in use. The auditorium is a beautiful room with good furniture, excellent curtains, and simple stage scenery. The color scheme shows the artistic efforts of the architect. Mrs. Glessner gave a piano to complete the furnishings of the room.

Two rooms on the basement floor provide the setting for instruction in Home Economics. At some future time courses in cooking, sewing and the more advanced work in Home Economics should become a part of the school's curricula. At present all of the pupils who bring their lunch eat in these rooms. A hot dish, cocoa, or soup is being served under

the direction of Miss Caswell. Three of the teachers are on duty every day to supervise the noon period. The rooms are well equipped with tables, chairs, a gas stove, and ample facilities for serving the lunch.

On the other side of the basement floor is an unused room that can be made an excellent work shop for Mechanic Arts instruction at any time that the expenditure for equipment and instruction seem wise. Practical arts courses in Home Economics and Mechanic Arts would add to the value of the instruction you now offer for the benefit of many boys and girls. Probably more would profit from these courses than from the courses now offered in Latin, and French, or from the advanced courses in Commerce.

Last year the cost of operating the schools in different buildings was more than estimated when the annual report was written. The school board had to assume the cost of insurance, more than \$1,000.00, which was not recognized at that time. The year closed with a real deficit of \$1,054.59. The cash balance on June 30 was \$345.41 and \$1,400.00 had been borrowed from this year's appropriation to pay current bills.

This year the expenditures have been \$18,443.75 as shown on page 77. The estimated amount needed for the ermainder of the year is \$12,658.00, making a total expenditure of \$31,101.00. The receipts for this year will total approximately \$30,180.00. This will leave a deficit of about \$900.00.

The revised budget for this year is \$1,000.00 less than the budget that appeared in last year's report. The Gilmanton Hill School was closed and the total transportation expense for this year is less than the amount paid last year. While some items in the budget are slightly more than last year, savings have been made in several others. The current cost of operating your schools is \$2,000.00 less than last year, and \$1,700.00 less than two years ago.

The expense of operating the Gilmanton Hill School and the expense for high school tuition have been saved. All of your high school pupils now attend your own high school.

The school board considered the advisability of closing the school at Bethlehem Junction but recognized a petition presented by the citizens of that section as a valid reason for continuing its operation. A saving of several hundred dollars can be made by closing that school next year. The parents of the children attending that school wish to have it continued. The school has an excellent teacher and the pupils are doing good work.

The budget for next year is \$30,105.00. This budget is presented with the expectation that the Junction school will be continued. Deducting the amounts for bonds and interest it is \$21,405.00. The receipts from sources other than taxation this year are only \$235.00. The deficit at the close of this year will be about \$900.00. If this deficit is added to the proposed budget for next year the total amount required is \$31,025.00. Some money will be received from the Forest Reserve Fund, and probably some dog taxes. As this amount is indefinite, I recommend the district raise the sum of \$30,000.00 for school purposes. This is \$1,000.00 less than the amount raised last year.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my annual report and summary of work. Bethlehem High School ended the fiscal year of 1931-1932 in June with a total enrollment of fifty-four. Seven pupils completed the prescribed amount of work and were granted diplomas. Three of the above graduates have entered post-secondary schools and are doing very satisfactory work in their respective schools.

The enrollment this year in the High School is sixty-one. This is an increase over previous years due to two reasons: all pupils from Gilmanton Hill are now transported to Bethlehem and all elementary school graduates returned for High School work this fall. There are two special pupils, fourteen seniors, twelve juniors, thirteen sophomores and fifteen freshmen, the remaining five having dropped or moved from town. There are twenty-nine pupils enrolled in commercial work, and thirty pupils studying foreign languages.

Previous to the time that basketball practice began all pupils were given gymnasium work in the gymnasium in the form of games and organized play. This same practice will be followed after the basketball season ends. Thirty-eight pupils have enjoyed training in organized basketball, the objectives health, teamwork and good sportsmanship being made primary to the winning of games.

Work in dramatics has been carried on as usual. English classes have published a monthly paper, using the mimeography duplicator.

Pupils enrolled in chemistry have organized a Chemistry Club in order to carry on further work in the sciences. The orchestra and Glee Club are at present preparing a musical program which is to be presented to the public at an early date.

All teachers are practicing the best methods in teaching procedure and are acquiring satisfactory results, the aims and objectives in all cases being health, command of fundamentals, worthy use of leisure, character, worthy home membership, vocational training and good citizenship.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the members of the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools, the teachers and pupils who have co-operated so faithfully to make our school an asset to our community.
