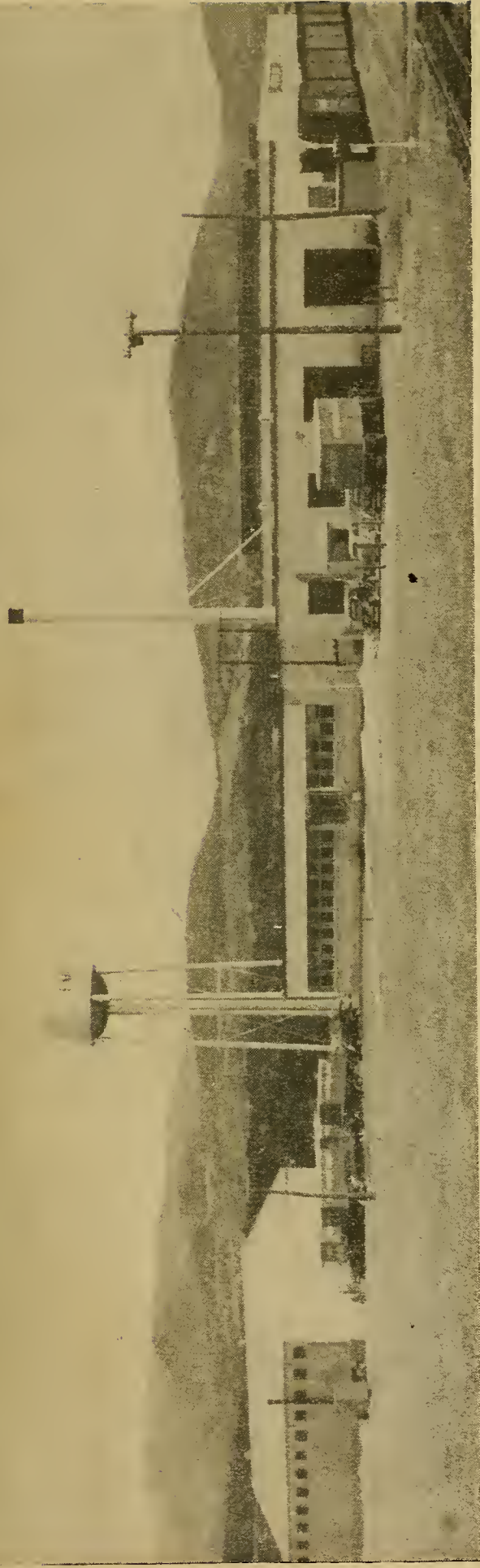

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the eighth of March, 1949, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, cemetery commissioners and any other town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one selectman for the term of three years, a town treasurer, one or more highway agents, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of one year, one trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary town officers.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the town, as recommended by the finance committee in its budget report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for the purposes so determined, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V highways as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945, and to raise and appropriate the sum required for this purpose.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue interest bearing notes or orders to provide for the current year's expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks by mail or

at the time they examine the taxable property.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to appoint or elect a budget committee to supervise the appropriations of the town and to recommend to the next annual meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to convey all its right, title and interest in and to all leased lots in said Town to present lease holders in good standing or who become in good standing by July 1, 1949, and to authorize the selectmen to execute all necessary papers to carry this vote into effect.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to rescind all leases on leased lots in said town not in good standing on July 1, 1949, and authorize the selectmen to sell said lots on which the lease has been rescinded at public auction or otherwise on or before December 31, 1949.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue as an open highway the road described as follows: It being the dark-hollow road so called abandoned to public use by the construction of the new road on Route 10 so called, said road being about one-eighth of a mile in length located on the east side of the present highway and bounded on the east by land of Perry Hastings and on the west by land of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to purchase from Don J. Hammond a lot of land located on the southerly side of the highway leading from North Haverhill to Center Haverhill containing twenty acres more or less for use of the New Hampshire National Guard, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars for this purpose.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to discontinue as

an open highway the road described as follows: Beginning at the eastern boundary of the highway past the residence of Angus J. Beaton and southeasterly of said residence, thence in an easterly direction to the new highway known as Route 10, it being the road formerly used to the homestead farm of Perry Hastings.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to execute and deliver to New England Power Company such agreements, contracts or other instruments which they, in their judgment, may deem necessary and proper in relation to those portions of the town highways, roads, bridges, culverts, sewers, drains and other property which will be affected by the construction and operation of the so-called Wilder Project by New England Power Company.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer to serve residents of the area southeast of Woodsville known as the four corners as requested by petitioners of that section.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to lease or purchase land suitable for a town dump, to authorize selectmen to execute all necessary papers to carry this vote into effect, and to raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to carry this vote into effect, and such further sum of money as may be required to maintain said dump for the current year.

Article 18. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SELECTMEN

To the taxpayers and citizens of Haverhill:

We herewith submit our report for the year ending January 31, 1949. Our detailed statement will be found on the following pages.

The town books were audited by Emile Blank and D. R. Newbold, town auditors. The books were found to be in excellent condition. The Audit was made during the middle of January.

Old Age Assistance and Town Poor are expected to continue to rise, and the anticipated amount required has to be raised in the present budget.

It will be noted in this report that a large sum of money has been spent on municipal buildings. A good share of this has been spent on the much needed repairs to the Town Hall. New toilets have been installed, a new heating system has been installed, certain alterations had to be made to meet the requirements of the fire laws. The hall has been completely capped with insulation. It is hoped that before town meeting we can complete the redecorating of the interior. In addition to the Town Hall it has been necessary to make certain repairs to the other properties owned by the town to the extent of over \$500.

Your Citizens Committee: Lewis Pike, Ray Wells, Friend Jenkins, William Koch, Ed Spooner, Robert Clark, Roland Ames, James Morrill, Burt Curtis, Ralph Gove, T. Bordon Walker, A. P. Hill; working with the Selectmen put in a good deal of time and much effort into the selection of a suitable location of an Armory. It was necessary to work with General Charles Bowen, Adjutant General, in this selection and the final site was selected by him.

In recent months there have been several meetings with the manager of the New England Telephone Company, Mr. Sliney, to arrange for the Emergency System of telephoning in the town. The Fire Chiefs and the Chief of Police worked with the Selectmen on this project. We feel that the town of Haverhill will be well covered, in this respect, when the cut-over comes to the Dial System in May.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equaling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90 per cent of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

The Alumni Attainment Award was given to John Bagonzi; the Perley N. Klark Award for excellence in music was awarded to Helen Gowitzke and Eugene Webster; the Bausch & Lomb Award (science) to Reita Boyd; the Sgt. James M. Jackson Award (U. S. History) to Janice Darby; the Alumni Scholarship to Marjorie Davidson; United Nations Essay Contest-Certificate of Merit to Janice Darby; Becker Junior College Key (commercial) to Marjorie Davidson; Reader's Digest year's subscription to Marjorie Davidson; Danforth Foundation books—"I Dare You" to Elaine Cummings and Eugene Webster; Rotary Athletic Cup to Robert Smith; the Cogswell Scholarship—University of New Hampshire—(\$125) to Janice Darby.

Athletic Activities

The athletic activity program consisted of the following sports: Physical education for boys and girls, touch football, soccer, softball, baseball, track, and basketball. For the first time in the annals of Woodsville High history an organized track team was formed, and participated in a Y.M.C.A. meet at Littleton, N. H., in May, placing third among some twenty schools entered.

The boys' basketball team, for the third consecutive year, captured the Ammonoosuc League title and was invited to the New Hampshire Interscholastic Basketball Tournament at Manchester, where it lost out by two points, to the Milford High team.

The girls' basketball team, under the able coaching of Miss Litz and Miss Callahan, also won the Ammonoosuc League Championship.

Curriculum

In September, 1948, Miss Katherine Rogers replaced Miss Lois Perry in the Commercial Department, and she, with the aid of Mr. Connor and an able staff continued the publishing of the Cycle, the quarterly school publication, which is always very popular with the student body.

One new course was added to the curriculum—Psychology. It was offered to the Juniors and Seniors, and proved to be exceedingly interesting as well as popular.

Teaching Staff

The teaching staff at the High School lost only one member at the end of the 1947-1948 school year. Miss Lois Perry resigned, as commerce instructor, and was replaced in September by Miss Katherine Rogers of Ashland, B. Ed., Plymouth Teachers College, Class of 1948.

The staff at the Graded School welcomed two new members in September. Mrs. Seraph McDanolds, a Keene Teachers College graduate with several years teaching experience in Massachusetts and New Hampshire, replaced Miss Natalie Clough, who took a position at Littleton. Miss Alice Rosa, a teacher of several years standing in Woodsville in Grade III, accepted a position in Massachusetts, and was replaced by Miss Beverly Bishop of Lisbon, also a Plymouth Teachers College graduate, Class of 1948, holding a B. Ed. degree.

Buildings and Grounds

The heating plant in the High School Building has been completely renovated, and an insulation job done by capping the ceiling above the second floor of the building. A material saving of fuel, as well as a much more comfortable atmosphere in which to work, is anticipated. An asphalt

tile floor was laid in the hall of the first floor. New cupboards, counters, and partitions were constructed in the domestic science laboratory, thus increasing the efficiency of this department.

The program of installing more adequate lighting fixtures was continued by replacing the old ones in Room 8 of the Graded School Building by fluorescent units.

The Graded School yard had a final surfacing, completing the project started two years before. Another basketball standard has been erected, also a merry-go-round, as new playground equipment.

A moving picture projector was purchased for the exclusive use of the elementary pupils. New audio and visual testing apparatus was bought by the Union to aid the School Nurse in her physical inspection work.

The District is fortunate in having two efficient custodians of buildings in the persons of Charles George at the Graded School Building, and Francis Rock at the High School. The latter relieved Ralph Daniels who, for several years, was janitor for both the Community Building and the High School Building. Much more efficient work can be done by each at his respective building, as well as the completion of many duties which, because of time, were physically impossible under the dual system of previous years.

May I direct your attention to the progress of the Co-operative Secondary School District Committee, whose report will be given at the District meeting, March 11.

Meetings of this committee, composed of Norman McMeekin, Thelma Strobridge, and the three School Board members, as well as joint meetings with the committees of the other districts of Union No. 23, have been held throughout the school year. The findings of this committee show a need for such a Co-operative District. Many facts substantiate this premise, a few of which I present for your consideration:

1. A secondary school with less than 300 pupils cannot

be economically administered. The proposed school would enroll 350-400 pupils, grades VII-XII.

2. A small secondary unit cannot offer a program of sufficient scope to meet the varying interests of the majority of its students. The proposed school should include such additional practical courses as the following: Vocational Agriculture; Cabinet making; Sheet Metal work; Shop Mathematics; Distributive Education; Paper-hanging; Dress designing; and Beauty Culture.

3. The small local secondary units necessitate duplication of instructors on the staff.

The secondary school, to be effective as an educative institution, should offer a curriculum that will enrich our children's ability to do a better job in a complicated society. This can only be done by a school unit of sufficient size to include a faculty competent to offer a varied program.

Conclusion

I wish to express sincere appreciation to the Teachers for their loyalty and industriousness during the year; to the members of the School Board for their individual cooperation, and to commend them to you for their sincere interest in the welfare of your schools; to the citizens of the District for their interest and support.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

HAVERHILL, N. H.

We, the undersigned members of Haverhill School Board, beg to submit the following report:

As in former years, many minor repairs and improvements were made at the High School, Alumni Hall, and graded Schools, and we wish to mention the most important ones. At the Academy building, four Sylvania fluorescent lights were installed, three in the Laboratory room and the other one in one of the teachers' rooms. At North Haverhill School, owing to the overcrowded conditions in the, heretofore, three rooms, the Board, on the recommendation of the Superintendent, decided to equip a fourth room, necessitating the hiring of an extra teacher. The cost of equipping the room, providing same with fluorescent lighting, was about \$350.00. However, the chief benefit derived from establishing a fourth room at that school, lies in the fact that only two grades are now taught in each room, thus greatly relieving the strain on the teachers. We also wish to state that hot water has been installed at the building.

At Pike School, replacement parts for the boiler, with about twenty years' service, were unobtainable, and it became necessary to have a new boiler, together with safety water gauge, installed, the cost being about \$500.00.

We desire to call the attention of the Taxpayers and Voters to the Annual Reports of Superintendent Phil A. Bennett and Headmaster of Haverhill Academy, Friend H. Jenkins.

Regarding the Budget, covering the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1949, the same has been prepared with great care and we submit for your consideration the amount of \$49,103.00 which compares with \$45,462.00 for the current year, and showing an increase of about \$3,600.00. This increase is chiefly made up by the salary of \$2,000.00 for the additional teacher at North Haverhill school, and an

annual raise of \$100 each for all the other teachers.

The retiring member of the Board is Mr. Roe McDanolds of North Haverhill.

Teachers and Pupils

Several changes in the teaching personnel have occurred since the end of the 1947-1948 school year. At the Academy, Mrs. Doris Evans, B.Ed., a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, replaced Mrs. Mildred Dagnon as commerce teacher.

The Haverhill Corner school opened in September with Mr. Howard Evans, B.Ed., Plymouth Teachers College, as Principal, replacing Mrs. Ellen Chase of Bath as teacher of grades VII-VIII. The grades are now grouped 2-3-3, giving Mr. Evans grades six through eight; Mrs. Ashley, grades three through five; and leaving Mrs. Underhill free for primary work in grades one and two.

The Pike school has a completely new staff. Mr. Theodore Blanchard of Francestown, New Hampshire, a Keene Teachers College graduate, replaced Mr. Gendron and is

Principal. Mrs. Gertrude Minaert of Warren, New Hampshire, a Plymouth Teachers College graduate, replaced, as primary teacher Mrs. Louise Wilson. The latter is to be commended for thirteen years of faithful service in education in the district.

The North Haverhill school experienced a forward step toward better educational procedure by adding the fourth teacher to its staff. Mrs. Nora Davidson, another Plymouth Teachers College graduate, was employed to teach grades three and four.

An evening class of Veterans, pursuing a course in vocational agriculture known as "On-the-Farm" training, has been established in conjunction with the Veterans' Administration Bureau, and meets at the North Haverhill building.

Buildings and Grounds

General repairs have been made to all school buildings in the district. I wish to commend the School Board for its foresight in modernizing the North Haverhill building to the extent of installing hot water fixtures. Also, fluorescent lights in one room at North Haverhill and in two at the Academy have replaced the old fixtures.

General Information

The reports of Headmaster Jenkins, and of Mr. Blank, Chairman of the Board, give further details of building activities. The report of the Co-operative Secondary School District Committee is also a matter meriting your consideration. Meetings of this committee, composed of the three School Board Members, Francis Partridge, and Lawrence Smith, have been held throughout the school year. The findings of this committee show a need for such a Co-operative District. Many facts substantiate this premise, a few of which I present for your consideration:

1. A secondary school with less than 300 pupils cannot be economically administered. The proposed school would enroll 350-400 pupils, grades VII-XII.
2. A small secondary unit cannot offer a program of sufficient scope to meet the varying interests of the majority of its students. The proposed school should include such additional practical courses as the following: Vocational Agriculture; Cabinet making; Sheet Metal work; Shop Mathematics; Distributive Education; Paper-hanging; Dress designing; and Beauty Culture.
3. The small local secondary units necessitate duplication of instructors on the staff.

The secondary school, to be effective as an educative institution, should offer a curriculum that will enrich our children's ability to do a better job in a complicated society. This can only be done by a school unit of sufficient size to include a faculty competent to offer a varied program.

Conclusion

The integrity and co-operation of the School Board, the loyalty and industry of the teachers, and the interest and support of the citizenry is greatly appreciated and acknowledged.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my twenty-fifth annual report of Haverhill Headmaster and High School.

The total enrollment to date for the current school year, 1948-49, is seventy-six. The distribution by classes and by boys and girls is as follows:

There are *twelve* tuition pupils of whom *seven* are from Piermont, *four* from Benton, and *one* from Ryegate, Vt. One senior, one sophomore and two freshmen have left school to date, leaving a present enrollment of seventy-two.

Diplomas were awarded to the following graduates last June: Alice Aremburg, Arthur Bixby, Donald Blake, Gertrude Burbank, Corrinne Fillian, Polly Hines, Rena Hood, Mary Marcou, Madeline Millette, Natalie Smith, Carl Patten, and Dorothy White.

Scholarship honors were won by Corinne Fillian, Rena Hood, Dorothy White, and Polly Hines in the order named. Alice Aremburg won the Scholarship, Loyalty, and Achievement medal.

Soccer was added this Fall as a major inter-scholastic sport and the team won three of its four scheduled games. The boys made a creditable showing, for a first attempt, in the track meet at Plymouth Fair. The girls also played a short schedule of soft ball in the Spring.

The above mentioned activities in addition to the regular inter-scholastic schedule of basketball and baseball, constitutes a physical education program that should give all

the pupils an opportunity to participate. However, about 25% do not. Since none of these activities are required of any of the pupils and all of them are competitive in nature, only those pupils who enjoy competition of a physical type participate in the activities, and, as a rule, they are the ones least in need of it from the standpoint of physical development. Hence provision, both as to time and instructors, should be made for a compulsory physical training program. The activities of such a program should, of course, be geared to the needs, abilities, and limitation of those required to participate.

Another activity that should be put on a more consistent and permanent basis is the music program. The extent to which this program has operated and now operates is purely accidental; depending upon the accident that as a new subject-matter teacher is hired she may be able to handle the music. It is quite unlikely that a teacher who has met the requirement of Majors and minors in subject-matter fields during her college preparation, would or could at the same time earn anything approaching a Major in Music. The solution is, of course, a qualified teacher. With such, music could be offered as an elective subject carrying credit toward graduation, and at the same time both broaden the program of studies to meet the interest and needs of more pupils, and to relieve others of the necessity of carrying certain highly academic subjects for which they neither have an interest nor ability. Music, of course, is only one of several so called liberal-arts subjects that a modern school, with an adequate staff of teachers and with a sufficient number of pupils enrolled to justify it, and with a tax base broad enough to make it financially possible, could and should be offered to boys and girls with their wide diversity of interest, needs, and abilities.

While the immediate "housing problem" at Haverhill Academy is not acute, it will be only a very short time before it will become acute. With a present senior class of

only *nine* to be graduated in June, and a possible entering class of around thirty-five in September the enrollment next Fall would be close to one hundred. There are thirty-two in the seventh grades of the Haverhill school district alone. Adding to this the increasing number of tuition pupils, there may well be an entering class of forty in September, 1950. With but *fifteen* in the present junior class graduating in June 1950, the enrollment could reach the 1932-33 all-time high of one hundred twenty-three. Considering, the increase in the number of subjects offered since 1932 and the consequent necessity of combining classes, an enrollment of such numbers as can be anticipated for 1950, would make several classes larger than could be accommodated in our small class rooms.

The three problems specifically mentioned in this report, viz:

(1) A more adequate physical education program; (2) A broader offering of vocational and liberal-arts courses; and, (3) the approaching housing shortage, might find a partial, if not perfect, solution in some sort of co-operative school district. It is not the intent of this report to argue for such a district but merely to point out some rather imperative needs which seem quite impossible of realization under existing conditions.

The two principle possibilities suggested would be the supplementing of the Woodsville plant with the construction of an additional building, or the building of a complete new plant at a central location, yet to be determined. The cost of a complete new plant seems prohibitive with the resources available. However, there is a possibility of the Federal Government, at some future time, contributing a substantial share of the cost of the project.

The committee respectfully recommends further study of the project during the ensuing year.
