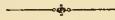

To the inhabitants of the town of Hill, in the county of Merrimack in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Academy-Hall, in said Hill on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Public Library.
- 4 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 5 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, to provide for the tarring or calcium chloriding of the roads in town, and if so, how much.
- 6 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the work of control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 7 To see if the town will vote to accept state aid maintenance.
- 8 To see if the town will vote to accept trunk line maintenance.
- 9 To see if the town will vote to accept trunk line construction.
- 10 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a new bridge at Cass Mill, or vote to discontinue same.
- 11 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell the fire house.
- 12 To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to confer with the selectmen of Bristol with a view of discontinuing the Axtell Bridge, so called, and authorize them to take such steps as may be necessary to discontinue same in the event of an agreement with Bristol.
- 13 To see what action the town will take to properly drain the water from the premises of Ormon J. Calley.
- 14 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

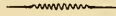

REPORT OF THE

Superintendent of Schools.



TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HILL:

I herewith submit my third annual report.

At the last school district meeting it was voted to send the eighth grade pupils of Hill to Franklin Junior High School. As a result of this vote nine entered that grade there, last September. I have watched the work of these pupils especially, thus far, that I might be better able to report to you their progress and advise you as to future action. Of those entering the grade last September six are now there and making their grade satisfactorily. Two moved from town and one became discouraged because of difficulties encountered and withdrew from the school. This is a good record. I am sure that these boys and girls feel as I do that they will be better prepared to do high school work next year than they could have been had they taken their eighth grade at home. I am more convinced than ever, that for those intending to take a high school course, the present plan should be continued, until such time as the town feels that it can furnish and adequately equip another school room and employ a specially trained teacher for its 7th and 8th grades.

The present 7th grade pupils of the Village school should be better prepared for the eighth grade work of the junior high school next year than the class which

went there this year, because we are directing our studies with that end in view. It was expected at the time of the last school district meeting, that the Grammar school would have but three grades this year—fifth, sixth, and seventh—thus affording more time for the extra work to be done with grade seven. However, the crowded condition of the Primary room, at the opening of school in September, necessitated the moving of the fourth grade into the Grammar room. This has interfered somewhat with our plans, but not too seriously, we hope. At the present time, both rooms are filled with pupils to the limit of the number of seats. The teachers are handling the situation admirably. The work being done is of good grade, and the town is to be congratulated upon having two such excellent local teachers. The registers show excellent regular attendance by nearly every pupil which in itself is good evidence of school interest. There are a few parents who seem deliberately to keep their children from school whenever they will. This is in violation of the State "School Attendance Law" which requires parents to see to it that their children are in school "*every day the schools are in session.*" This law also provides a penalty for failure of the parents to meet its provisions. If parents would fully realize that keeping a child from school every other day, or twice a week, or several weeks out of the school year, is injuring the child, there never would be need of such a law nor need of enforcing it.

I have replaced this year some books badly worn and soiled and bought some needed new ones, that were up to date.

We sadly need reference books in the Grammar grades. It is impossible to teach History and Geogra-

ply according to modern methods without supplementary material. The regular appropriation for books and supplies does not average to more than pay for replacement of worn out text books and the commonly required supplies. I wish we might have an extra fifty dollars next year to be used especially for reference books.

Hill has twenty boys and girls' away to school. Such a number from so small a town speaks well, not only for the intelligence of the parents but also for the schools which are awakening in these boys and girls a desire for higher education. The money spent for tuition of these pupils should be regarded as an excellent investment for the town.

I again wish to acknowledge the courtesies of your Board and those of the citizens to me personally, and to express my appreciation of the co-operation of teachers and parents in making the schools of Hill better.
