TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsboro, County of Hillsboro in said State qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet in Childs Opera House in said town on Tuesday the Ninth day of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk, a Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustee of Trust funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, Community Building, appropriations for street lights and all current expenses of the town and such amounts as may be necessary to apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

- Article 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges, culverts and sidewalks.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.
- Article 8. To se if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for Memorial Day purposes.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of band concerts for the coming season.
- Article 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Frank D. Paige, Chief of Police, the total amount expended by him in connection with the suits of Alves and Lozey against him, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$385.48 for that purpose.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to sell any and all real estate, or interest therein, not needed or used in con-

nection with town affairs, to such person, or persons, and for such price and upon such terms and conditions as to said Board seems advisable; and to authorize and empower said Board, as agents for the town, to execute and deliver all necessary deeds in connection therewith.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to rescind any and all prior votes relative to the adoption of Chapter 9 of the New Hampshire Session Laws of 1935 known as the Municipal Budget Act; or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 15. Is it expedient to revise the constitution?

Article 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Last June four boys and girls were graduated from the schools of the town district. Graduation was held at the Lower Village chapel before a large audience. The musical numbers, the class parts, the superintendent's address and presentation of diplomas, and the reception to the graduates afforded the people present one of the most enjoyable events of the year.

During the summer vacation the board of education had the schools thoroughly cleaned, and repaired.

An effort has been made this year to introduce similar text books, and courses in the town schools, as in those of the special district, in order to give all the Hillsboro schools more uniformity. This is desirable both from an administrative and educational point of view. Frequent teachers' meetings have been called by the superintendent of schools in order to freely discuss and talk over such questions as courses of study, adapting the school work to the ability and interests of the children, promotions, tests, the annual prize-speaking contest, the observance of National Education week, school needs in the way of books and supplies, and so forth, all resulting in a one-ness of purpose and cooperation in all school activities.

At this writing standardized tests have been placed in the teachers' hands to measure the pupils' ability, and to see how well they do for the ability which they possess. The teachers were instructed to give the tests on the same date. A report will be made when the results are available.

It is suggested that the sum of fifty dollars be raised in addition to the customary amount which the school board provides for books. The schools are in great need of supplementary reading on Travel, Science, Literature, Economics, Magazines, and periodicals. This kind of reading will do a great deal towards broadening the children's conception of present day life and problems. The great majority of the children are not sufficiently provided at home with this type of reading.

The superintendent has given the town schools a substantial amount of his time, as he has to the schools of seven other school districts in this supervisory union. The teachers are commended for their hard work and interest. Thanks are due the school board for their efforts to fulfill the duties of their office namely, to provide elementary and secondary education for the children of the district. May everyone connected with the schools make the children's interests and welfare his greatest motive for his services.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

We present herewith our financial report for the year ending June 30th, 1936, together with that of the Treasurer's. Expenditures for the school year ending June 30, 1936, amounted to \$31,322.80. The original budget called for \$31,449. This represents a saving over the original budget of \$126.20. Details will be found in the following report.

We estimate expenses for the current year to be in the vicinity of \$35,000. This includes the additional payment of \$3,000 and accrued interest on the indebtedness of the district.

During the present year we were obliged to purchase three new typewriters for the Commercial Department at a cost of \$180 due to an increased enrollment. We have had all windows in the Elementary School weather proofed by cementing between window casings and the building.

A policy has been inaugurated whereby a given number of rooms in each school are to be renovated each year and a program of minor repairs has been worked out whereby the sum appropriated for the last two years will take care of this program without added expenditures every few years.

Through the kindness of the Hillsboro Guaranty Sav-80 mm of a constraint

ings Bank we have been allowed to retire notes to the amount of \$3000 these being notes of the longest maturity. This is in addition to the regular retirement of \$4000.

Owing to the demand for a Manual Arts Course, it was decided by the Board to install, for the present, a one year course in cabinet making. It was necessary to put in a new cement floor, new ceiling, erect benches and install fixtures in the room originally designed for this purpose. This being done, seven new pieces of woodworking machinery were purchased and installed ready for the September opening. Also there were supplied hand tools for a class of twenty pupils. When this was completed it made one of the best equipped Manual training departments for a school of its size in the state.

The above was accomplished at a total cost of \$1354.33 divided as follows: Construction in preparation \$424.80, new equipment \$929.53. The services of Mr. Robert Bailey, formerly of Dover, N. H. High School were procured to fill the position of Headmaster and Manual Arts Instructor, also to teach Mathematics. Out of a possible 72 boys in the High School, 57 signed up for the Manual Arts Course which would lead us to believe that it is a very popular course. All the minor repairs and refinishing projects of the High School have been done by the students. During the first five months of the present school year about 932 student hours have been used to this advantage. Even at such a low figure as 10 cents per hour, this has been a saving of \$93.00 to the District.

Under the supervision of Mr. Thompson at the Elementary school the pupils in this course have made rapid advance in the use of hand tools. The Board feels that with two years of hand work at the Elementary School and an advanced course in cabinet making at the High School a long felt want has been filled. It is the intention of the Board to add other courses in Manual Arts at such a time as it can be done without added expense to the District.

It is the desire of the Board and also the instructors of the Manual training departments to have parents and all others interested in the welfare of the pupils to visit the classes while in session so that they may see the class of work they are doing.

We estimate the required amounts for the school year July 1, 1937 to June 30, 1938 to be \$30,900.75, details of amounts to be found in the Proposed Budget of Hillsboro Special School District.

We expect receipts of about \$4300 in addition to the amount to be raised by taxation and recommend that the sum of \$26,600.75 be appropriated for the school year July 1, 1937 to June 30, 1938. This represents a reduction of \$548.25 from the amount appropriated at the last annual meeting.

The Board wishes to thank the Superintendent and the members of our teaching staff for their full and hearty cooperation during the past year. We also wish to express our gratitude to Mr. John S. Childs for lumber donated, Mrs. Eva W. Rickard for sewing machine, Mr. J. Arthur Towle for hardware, Mr. R. N. Johnson for Projector, and the Hillsboro Garden Club for the landscaping of the High School grounds.

General Discussion

The pulic schools of Hillsboro Special school district opened last fall with enrollments as follows: First grade, 26; second grade, 25; third grade, 17; fourth grade, 28; fifth grade, 27; sixth grade, 30; seventh grade, 25; eighth grade, 30; high school, 151, making a total of 359 pupils.

Last June thirty-six pupils were graduated from the elementary schools of the Hillsboro Special school district, and twenty-nine were graduated from the Hillsboro high school. The two graduations were held in the high school auditorium before capacity audiences. The graduation activities of the two schools proved to be among the most outstanding events of the year in Hillsboro.

The school buildings have been kept up in the ways explained in previous reports. Among the many improvements special mention should be made that every room in the Grammar school has been equipped with modern electric lights, the importance of which speaks for itself. Two class rooms were thoroughly repaired and painted in the same building, and many other smaller repairs were made both inside and outside. A great deal of unused space under the stairways and other parts of the high school has been turned into much needed closet rooms. The construction of a fine tennis court behind the high school,

the clearing of brush, trees, and old lumber by the boys working under the National Youth Act, and the planting of attractive shrubs and trees by the Garden club have made the high school premises much more attractive. Much remains to be done in the way of minor and major repairs. It is our intention to do it gradually in a manner which will not cause too great a financial burden on the school district.

Elementary and secondary education has been provided along traditional lines, and also by the introduction of new courses to provide for the interests and needs of the young people who come to us to be educated. Considering that General Science is taught in the seventh and eighth grades, this subject was discontinued in the high school, and a course in Biology has been introduced. This course together with Chemistry, Physics, and Mathematics gives an excellent background to those pupils who contemplate the pursuits of Nursing, Medicine, Engineering, Sanitary Biology, and similar scientific professions. In compliance with present day trends in secondary education a first class Manual Arts room has been equipped in the high school, with modern machinery, to enable the boys to continue the manual training to which they were introduced in the seventh and eighth grades two years ago. Nearly sixty boys are enrolled in this course taking real cabinet making. Unlike other subjects this course shows immediate results. Without any attempt to minimize the importance of any subject taught, perhaps less loafing is evident in the shop than in any other class room or laboratory. These facts are indicative of the value which the boys themselves attach to this new activity.

Athletics, club activities, and the general life of the schools are items on which the community is well informed, making further elucidation unnecessary.

The teachers and the principals are to be commended for their interest and hard work. The thanks of the entire community are due the school board for their untiring efforts to provide elementary and secondary education economically and yet on progressive principles.
