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## REPORT OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY AND READING ROOM

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The total circulation for the year is 13,910, divided as follows :

Fiction,	10,462
Magazines,	1,866
Miscellaneous,	1,582

The largest monthly issue was 1,421 in January last, the smallest being 959 in June. The largest daily issue was 146 on March 15, the smallest was 11 on January 8. The average daily circulation is 46.

372 new books have been purchased of which 156 are miscellaneous and 216 fiction. Of these 108 are juveniles and 8 are duplicates or replacements. The total number of volumes in the library is 9,634.

There is also in the librarian's hands \$28.67, interest from the Althea Stearns fund. It is the desire of the library officials to use the income of this fund of \$200 left to the library by the will of the late Althea Stearns, in much the same way that

the John D. Hooker fund is being used, viz., for books of lasting value to the library. They plan, also, to have each book suitably labeled, as are all books purchased with the Hooker fund.

While our fiction percentage remains in the seventies this year, being again 75% instead of 73% as last year, this is hardly a fair estimate as many volumes of miscellaneous books have been out on "extended time" for the use of teachers and students. If, instead of tabulating the volumes of fiction and non-fiction borrowed, we should tabulate the number of days those volumes were retained by the borrower, we should be nearer the truth regarding their comparative use. There are many attractive and instructive miscellaneous volumes, however, upon our shelves which are not being circulated as they deserve.

It has been a matter of regret to your library officials for several years that residents outside the village did not take more advantage of its benefits. At no time in the library's history, we believe, has this been done to so great an extent as at present. Boxes of books have been sent to schools outside the village with the privilege of retaining them one month for the use of pupils wherever means of transportation could be obtained and the willingness of the teacher to take charge of them secured. This idea could be carried still further and books included in the boxes for citizens near the school if desired. In one section of the town two ladies are securing a number of books and distributing them to their neighbors. As it is not possible always for such books to be returned on time, greater leniency in regard to time is allowed than to those in the village. We would be glad to further extend distribution in such localities.

For several years, it has been the aim of the library to aid the schools so far as possible. In order to further this work, there have been distributed from the library this year lists of books suitable for each grade.

The stock room is becoming more and more crowded and soon action must be taken to provide more shelf-room. Just how this trouble can be met in a room seemingly already full is no easy problem to solve.

The charging system at present used has been unsatisfactory for many years. The cards are so easily lost as to become a nuisance to both borrower and librarian, particularly as the books have contained no pockets to hold them. An up-to-date charging system, known as the Browne system has been begun, whereby the use of cards will be dispensed with. We feel that this change will be greatly appreciated by the borrowers and will be much more accurate for the librarian. At the same time a much needed shelf-list will be installed. Since the decision that the library could not afford to keep its printed catalogue up-to-date, and is, in common with most public libraries, keeping a card catalogue only, the card shelf-list has become a necessity. This will give the books in order by subjects as they appear on the shelves. As these improvements involve the writing of two cards, as well as the pasting of a pocket in each book, it will be readily seen that considerable time is necessary for its accomplishment. The cost of this is being met by funds in the hands of the librarian.

The attendance in the reading room the past year has been 4474, average daily attendance 15, largest daily attendance 34, smallest 5. Practically the same variety of monthly and weekly magazines are found upon the tables as formerly and four daily and two weekly papers are to be found on the newspaper racks.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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*To the Board of Education, Hinsdale, N. H.*

My second annual report is hereby presented for your consideration.

The general condition of the schools is reasonably good. Our chief aim has been to unify and strengthen the teaching throughout all the courses. Manual training—sewing for the girls and basketry for the boys—has been introduced into grades VI, VII, VIII and IX. Each class receives a lesson for about an hour and a quarter on Monday of each week, making about forty-five hours per year. The classes are in charge of two students from the Keene Normal School, who work under the general supervision of the special teachers of that school. The boys do their work at their desks. This arrangement has its drawbacks, and it is hoped that next year a suitable room will be available. Benches could then be installed and a wider range of work undertaken.

One of the high school recitation rooms is used as a sewing room. It is equipped with a cutting table and chairs, a sewing machine, and a chest of drawers in which the unfinished work is kept. The interest and thought which the pupils put into their work, and the pleasure they show when they look upon a finished piece made by their own fingers, is evidence enough that the time given to this subject is not in vain. Near the close of the year it is planned to hold an exhibition in which will be displayed the work done in both departments.

Two teachers of the high school, the principal and one assistant, declined a reelection in June, and, in view of the small

membership of the school, it seemed best to reduce the teaching force, and to employ only two teachers in this school, a principal and one assistant. This was accordingly done. Miss Mowry was retained in the language and history department, and Mr. James Monohon, a graduate of Darmouth College, and a teacher of much experience, was engaged as principal. Mr. Monohon has made many friends in the community and is laboring earnestly for the upbuilding of the school. In remodeling the courses to adapt them to the new conditions, Latin was made a requirement for the first year, while it becomes an elective in the other three years. This arrangement was undoubtedly a mistake. Latin should, I believe, be made an elective for the entire four years, and biology, or some kindred subject, should be offered as a first year substitute.

Chapter 93 of the Public Statutes was revised by the Laws of 1913. As the law now stands any child over fourteen years of age who attended school during the previous year no less than 300 half-days, and who has a health certificate from the school physician, is, on the approval of the superintendent of schools, entitled to a Labor Certificate. But he must continue school attendance, until he completes the grammar school course, or until he reaches the age of sixteen years.
