TOWN MEETING WARRANT

- To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, qualified to vote in town affairs:
- You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 10th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Highway Agents.

• Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, for the public library, for the recreation commission, for free hospital beds, toward the maintenance of a District Nurse, for observance of Memorial Day, for band concerts and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance with Chap. 155, Laws of 1909, of Chaps. 158, 162, or 168, Laws of 1913, of Chaps. 51 or 93, Laws.of 1915. Article 4. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for Trunk line maintenance of highways in this town in accordance with Chap. 133, Laws of 1911, Sec. 27.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in cooperation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money, from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for 'the construction of a cement bridge to take the place of the wooden bridge on the Patridge Lake road, near the Pattenville saw-mill.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the repair of the foot-bridge which crosses the Ammonoosuc River near the Saranac Glove Shop.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the completion of the footbridge to be suspended from the side of the Boston & Maine Railroad bridge near the Norfolk Knitting Mills.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the care of the Meadow Cemetery, so-called, on the Lisbon road.

Article 11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint an agent to act for the town in the transfer of real estate owned by the town.

Article 12. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give any druggist, doing business in this town, a.prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquors for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chapter 147 of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 13. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 14. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the citizens of Littleton:

The School Board hereby submits for your consideration its report of the schools of the town for the year now passing. We thank you for your cooperation and support of our efforts and trust that your interest may be even greater in the future.

Since it was your pleasure that a committee be appointed at the school meeting one year ago, for the purpose of investigation and recommendation in regard to a new High School, we deemed it unwise to spend any more money than absolutely necessary upon the old building. For this reason we decided not to shingle as had been planned and made only such repairs as we considered to be most needed. All necessary repairs were made, however, upon the other buildings used in the town and they are in fairly good condition at the present time.

We feel that the teaching end of our school system is in competent hands and that through the tireless energy of our Superintendent, aided by his corps of teachers, it is being well taken care of. For details of the educational part of the work, we refer you to the special reports.

Many problems have confronted your School Board from time to time. We have tried to meet them squarely and treat them all with a fair mind. Let us share with you a few of the questions constantly before us. How shall we seat 178 boys and girls in our High School assembly room where there is only seating capacity for 123 and every available space is used? How can we adequately care for our commercial department in a room not one third large enough to accommodate it and how can we care for the health of the boys and girls of this department and also the Manual Training and Domestic Science departments, who travel from one building to another through snow and rain, mud and slush (for it is not all sunshine) to every class? How can we raise the morale of our school and instill in the minds of the youth of our town, a love of beauty and neatness, a due regard for law and order, and also a proper respect for property whether private or public? With the present environment are we giving our young people a fair chance? In the minds of your School Board there is only one solution to this problem. The need is great! The need for a new High School! Will you not give your support to this big project to be presented at our school meeting? Our boys and girls are the future citizens of this town. Are we giving them of our best?

To Mr. Orin M. Holman, Superintendent of Schools, Littleton, N. H.

I herewith submit my third annual report as headmaster of Littleton High School.

The past school year has been marked by several distinct changes and achievements. The percentage of attendance has been excellent. There has been a very small percentage of tardiness and few dismissals. The tables giving statistics on attendance, withdrawals, and distribution of pupils follow.

TEACHERS

As in my last year's report I wish to urge upon you the need of holding good teachers for at least a few years. A school the size of Littleton High School demands experienced teachers for efficient work. Experienced teachers cost more money, in most cases. than we are now paying. I believe that a salary schedule with annual yearly increases, and with a fixed maximum, stated and known to all, would be an incentive for good teachers to remain with us. Allowing an excellent teacher to move on because of a few dollars is a poor investment.

ADMINISTRATION

The requirements for graduation and the course of study have been somewhat modified. The more important changes are listed below.

*1. No pupil shall count as a unit of the 16 required for graduation more than 8 unit courses in which he or she has attained a D grade only.

*2. Every pupil must attain in at least 2 units of work a grade of B or better.

*3. No Senior may present all of his Senior work in the grade of D.

*It is recommended that provisions 1 and 2 be administered as follows:

(a) That the class of 1925 be exempted from 1 and 2.

(b) That the class of 1926 be allowed under 1 to have not more than 10 D's.

(c) That the class of 1927 be allowed under 1 to have not more than 9 D's.

(d) That the class of 1928 fulfill both 1 and 2 as they stand.

(e) That the classes of 1926-1927 be required under 2 to fulfill it as it stands.

Next Fall a second year course in Manual Training is to be required in the General Course and a choice between French and General Mathematics will be allowed.

The Domestic Arts Curriculum is to be merged with • the Commercial Curriculum. Nursing and Physiology are to be offered in the Sophomore year. In the Junior year Household Organization and Management will be given as one course, as an elective.

ATHLETICS

This year, as formerly, the control of athletics has been vested in an Athletic Advisory Board, composed of the Athletic Coach. Headmaster, one School Board member (for this year Mr. Earl Ellingwood) and two student members. Last Spring a baseball league, known as the White Mountain Inter-Scholastic Baseball League, was formed, of which your headmaster was elected president. Such an organization was a very decided help in the arrangement and control of games. A suitable trophy was offered by A. G. Spaulding & Son. This was won by Lisbon, with Littleton and Woodsville tied for second place. In football we had a very successful season, playing a hard schedule, and winning the big majority of our games. The basketball season for both boys and girls gives promise of good success.

NEW EQUIPMENT

During the year in Manual Training many needed hand tools, as well as a combination power machine have been added which has greatly improved the efficiency of the department. In the Commercial Department several new typewriters and a fine mimeograph were purchased. All this equipment has added materially to the good work that was already being done in this department.

I would recommend that a lathe for the manual training department be added in the Spring or Fall.

In physics and chemistry only a few supplies have been purchased. Another year quite a large expenditure will have to be made for physics laboratory equipment, I should say in the vicinity of \$300 or \$400.

PRIZES

Last Spring the American Legion and Auxiliary prizes for leadership, scholarship, etc., to the boy and girl in the graduating class were awarded to Ursula Holly and Daniel McLeod. The prize medal for the best essay on Lincoln was awarded by the Illinois Watch Company to Marion Craigie.

COLLEGE ENTRANCE

Littleton High School has retained its college certification privilege and may admit to any college on the New England College Entrance Board without examination. The privilege does not expire until January 1, 1927. Representatives of Littleton High School were admitted last Fall to the University of N. H. and the University of Illinois without examination. Recent reports show that these people are doing a passing grade of work.

BUILDINGS

As you know, our classes are now obliged to work in three buildings. We have no assembly room or gymnasium. The ventilation, the light and heating arrangements are all poor. The desks and equipment are faulty and worn out. The morale engendered by such conditions is bad and does not make for efficiency. Nearly 1-7 of our day is now lost in passing to and from classes. Pupils have to be sent back and forth whatever the weather conditions, or the travelling between the buildings, without sufficient time for preparation to do it. Basketball is prohibited in our present school building and we are obliged to use a place unsuitable for the game, expensive and inconvenient to all concerned. The rooms are overcrowded and many times two pupils have to occupy one seat. In short, the high school teachers know that our most urgent and prevailing need is adequate housing facilities.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Littleton:

I have the honor of submitting my second annual report of the schools of Littleton.

I will reiterate that we have to present data covering three years. This report will cover largely the school year that closed June 30, 1924. There is no occasion to submit estimates for the year in which we are engaged. Unless very unexpected emergencies should arise, demanding considerable money, the appropriation of last March is ample for the current year. An estimate of expenses for the coming school year is a part of the report of the School Board. My own report will cover certain statistics which may be of interest, certain objectives toward which we aimed, and recommendations for the days ahead.




Diagram showing how each dollar of public school money was divided and expended.

Referring to the Treasurer's report, your attention is called to the item under head of Manual Training receipts of \$5.60. It would be unjust to this Department if we did not state that during the year, this Department from its earnings by sale of materials and finished products bought and paid for \$78 worth of tools and supplies. It also carried on an extensive line of repairs on school property which at a conservative estimate would have cost \$125. In other words this line of work actually rebated to the District more than \$200.00.

OBJECTIVES

One of our objectives was publicity. It has been and will be my chief desire to have the public know the work that is going on in school and the conditions that surround that work. The Courier has been especially generous in giving us space and attention. Other types of advertising have been through the school itself, through the local churches, and in no small way through the aid of clever posters designed by certain pupils who have marked ability along this line. The Colonial Club gave a good opportunity for the exhibit of school work at their educational meeting. This exhibit was allowed to stand until after the annual school meeting. Our record shows that during the school year the personal visits of the Superintendent number 254, the visits by members of the School Board 54, and meetings held by School Board were 12. It also shows that there were 711 people who visited our schools either to observe school exercises or to observe the plant itself. This represents, roughly, 1-6 of the population of Littleton. It is encouraging.

Another objective was to secure a spirit of cooperation between pupils and teachers to the end that school work might be more effectual. We had a measure of success. Certain results and privileges were attained by the High School which have been mentioned by the Headmaster. Good relationship between teacher and pupil is an essential for good work.

Supplied as we are by the recreations offered by the Community House, a beautiful park, and Skyline Farm, we lose sight of our own lack of playground facilities with organized play, and the dreariness of our old building, and much of our equipment which is old and battered. These factors, however, are powerful influences in the joy, or lack of it, in attending school. It is most unfortunate that so many of our upper grade children leave school at the earliest legal opportunity to become wage earners. Experience and fact show that in a majority of cases this is a lifelong loss both to the individual and to the community.

Our biggest objective was to try to bring to the attention of our citizenship the discomfort, inconvenience, and loss occasioned by the old high school building, and to create a sentiment to leave our "outgrown shell" for something that could adequately give the education of today.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. I recommend the annual expending of a definite sum of money, not less than \$750, for the thorough repairing of our various school properties. A carefully organized campaign in this line means much to the appearance, endurance and economy of maintenance of our school plants.

2. I advise a careful gradation of our wage system, to the end that efficient, loyal community builders may desire to remain with us.

3. I recommend the selling of various school buildings, now rapidly deteriorating, where conditions give a reasonably long guarantee that these buildings will not serve again for school use.

4. I urge upon all homes their thoughtful cooperation in making home attractive and a social center of wholesome, moral uplift. Our present year has been marred by pool-room influences, by petty stealing, by loose scholarship, and all these evils seem to center around aimless, evening wanderings. No greater responsibility rests upon the homes of Littleton than to keep alive a moral conscience.

5. Finally I wish to emphasize, and I utterly lack powers of expression to do it fittingly, the need to adopt the report of the new High School Building Committee who will recommend the erection of a suitable, safe, sanitary building.

I urge this because our present building, which has faithfully served since 1867, has now reached a condition which is unsanitary by every modern standard. It cannot, by any possible overhauling, house the work we are trying to do. It has elements of danger in its worn-out heating system. It has no play-ground facilities suitable for use. The rough, uneven area is so thickly studded with sharp rocks and stones that bodily accidents are frequent and the grinding away of shoes and clothing is terrific. It has no gymnas.um and the burden of supporting athletics is made unusually expensive and inconvenient and then placed upon the shoulders of boys and girls. It has no dining room facilities, but sixty children crowd into a few class-rooms every winter day to eat their lunch. In spite of every effort grease and dirt and messiness accumulate and are a portion of the after-noon work. If anyone doubts this, will they entertain sixty live children some noon and test the result? In addition the building breeds lack of self respect. It invites, by every mark and cutting of generations preceding, the destructive wasteful side of youth. It forbids comnunity pride in its most vulnerable spot. We try to keep educational conventions away from Littleton because, frankly, we are ashamed to have our surrounding neighbors; see the conditons that surround our high school pupils. I would much prefer to write otherwise, but as I understand my relationship to your schools, I must write things that I see and know.

In conclusion, may I be allowed to publicly thank all citizens who liberally support the work of education. I would especially mention all agencies who have assisted in the publicity of our work, the merchants who have given us window space for advertising and have more than generously loaned us from their stock in trade to aid our enterprises. More personally do I record grateful acknowledgment to the School Board for their courtesy in making it possible for me to attend the National Superintendent's meeting in Chicago, and for their stimulating support in every effort toward improvement. Nor would I forget the other more immediate co-laborers who face the daily routine and who in both rural and village schools bring vision and service to the work committed to their keeping. For clarity of vision, for cheerfulness in approach, for good sense in administration, we need the earnest support of all good citizens, that our work may successfully "carry on."

LIBRARY NOTES

Library reports may, and usually do, cover the different phases of library work, aside from the general statistics, which in themselves are usually uninteresting only to those having the affairs of the library much in mind. This report, while it has no very unusual activities to record, as the past year has been on about the same plane as for several years previous, will bring to the people, the necessary additional expense the library was obliged to assume, in order to make the repairs in the children's room, where a falling ceiling was threatening the welfare of the children from day to day. The library was fortunate in se-

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curing a much needed increase in the annual appropriation in order to carry out the proposed plan for the repairs; and as a result a new steel ceiling, with fresh paint was the outcome, so that now, provided more repairs can be made in the main reading room, reference room, and lobby, the inside of the library will be much improved.

Aside from the mentioned repairs in the children's room, was the cement walls which had to be constructed to replace the old brick walls which had partly caved in. The expenses of these repairs far exceeded the extra appropriation, and had to be made up from the general fund, thus reducing the amount usually had for the purchase of books. As will be seen from statistics the number of books purchased was less than usual, and with the increasing demand, has been a great disadvantage to both the public and those serving the public.

During the week set aside by the American Library Association for Children's Book Week, when all libraries were expected to promote the interest of the community in the work for children, and when clubs. scouts, and the various organizations, united to assist the library in this work, the time here was used to try out a drive for funds in order to be able to purchase books for the young folks, these books to be chosen as the approved "Best Books for Children." The children with the public in general were asked to contribute in small sums, and as a result the sum of twenty dollars was collected, and to this was added part of the fines and subscription fees, also a gift of ten dollars given by friends, and the money was used for the much needed increase of new books for the younger grades, but the older grades are still waiting their turn as not enough was available to purchase these books. It now is a permanent plan to use the money collected from fines for this purpose, and it must be borne in mind that all library fines are legal debts, thus a plea is sent out to all who may be indebted to the library from this respect to try and not forget their obligations, and what it will mean to the library, and to the children especially, if all such debts could be collected. It is the duty of every patron of the library to willingly meet these small obligations and the library is not expected to run accounts, thus making it impossible to collect these dues, without extra work and time, which belongs to other duties.

Each year the libraries of the country, through the American Library Association are asked to advance library work along some special way, and as last year the work was in making the Library an Educational Force in the Community, this year many articles on the Spirit of General Uplift have been in evidence, and all libraries are urged to bring this béfore the community, so that all may cooperate, as it is impossible for the library to work alone.

The library has been the recipient of the usual number of gifts in the way of books, from friends interested, publishers, authors and the regular number from the Carnegie Peace Fund, numbering about fifteen each year, of especially useful books along the line of International Peace. These books now number seventy-five volumes and are often read and consulted by many interested. Gifts of money to the amount of ten dollars was given by friends from the Skyline Colony as an appreciation of the services of the library during the summer months.
