Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$437.10 towards the support of the Children and Youth (C&Y) Project. This sum to be used for clinic and office space. Petition signed by Jon Bagley et al.

So Voted

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$528.68 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Petition signed by Candyce Geshelin et al.

So Voted

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,368.80 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.45 per person in the Town of Madison. Petition signed by Joan Lanoie et al.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be added to the \$6,000 which was raised and appropriated for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser in Article No. 10 of the 1978 Annual Report.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$92,135.00 for the purchase of a Oshkosh Model P2323 All-Wheel Drive Truck, with V-Plow, Wing and Dump Body; to determine whether \$66,269.00 of said appropriation shall be raised by the issuance of sale of bonds or notes on the credit of the Town of Madison in accordance with the provisions of N.H.R.S.A. Chapter 33, as amended; to authorize the

Selectmen for the Town to determine the time and place of payment of principle and interest, fixing the rate of interest, the provisions for the sale of notes and/or bonds, to, further, determine whether \$10,000.00 of said appropriation be allocated from the Town of Madison New Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, and authorize the Selectmen of the Town to withdraw the same; and to, further, determine whether the remaining \$15,766.00 of said appropriation be allocated from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, and authorize the Selectmen of the Town to withdraw the same and to determine all other matters in connection with this article; or to take any other action relative thereto.

To qualify a member must be in the Department at least one (1) year and must attend 75 percent of the meetings, drills, fires or rescue calls.

Article 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Conservation Commission to withdraw from its capital reserve one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) plus interest to protect natural areas for the Town by the purchase of conservation easements or the equivalent.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a multi-year contract or agreement with Lord's Ambulance Service to provide Ambulance service to the town and appropriate the

sum of three thousand four hundred dollars (\$3,400.00) as the first year's payment.

To see whether or not the Town will vote to accept a deed to the Town of the four (4) roads in the so-called "former Bolduc Development" at Pea Porridge Pond, depicted on plan delivered to the Selectmen entitled, "Composite Plan of Road Network, Pea Porridge Pond, Madison, New Hampshire", surveyed and drawn by Thaddeus Thorne-Surveys, Inc., last drafted November 2, 1979, subject only to the conditions as to improvements as noted on such plan, and final approval of the constructed improvements by the Selectmen. Recommended by the Selectmen.

Motion made and seconded to amend this article as follows: There be no major relaxation of Town standards and not to accept the 100 ft. spur road.

Article 30. To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, a road known as the "Black Brook Road", running north from the Freedom Town Line, through Lot Nos. 4 & 2, and along the westerly line of Lot No. 7, all located on Madison Tax Map No. 2.

To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, a road known as the "Daniel Ward Road", running easterly from the Lead Mine Road, near the Frank Ward place, so called; through Lot No. 13, located on Tax Map No. 5; then, through Lot No. 16, located on Tax Map No. 2; and then, through Lot No. 13, located on Tax Map No. 5, to its intersection with Gove Hill Road.

To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, a certain road leading from the Abner Harmon Farm and the Madison Village Road (or East Madison Road) to the Ami Kennett Road; as it runs northerly, along the easterly line of Lot No. 1, located on Tax Map No. 36; and through Lot No. 15, located on Tax Map No. 6.

Article 36. To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, the "Ledge Road", as it runs southerly from the Glines Hill Road; through Lot No. 38, located on Tax Map No. 9.

Article 37. To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, a certain road leading from the Bertha Davis place to the Hamilton place and the Modoc Hill Road; as it runs westerly, through Lot No. 25; and along the southerly line of Lot No. 9; and the northerly line of Lot No. 16, all located on Madison Tax Map No. 12.

To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, the a/k/a "Albert Allard Road"; as it runs northerly from the Mooney Hill Road to the Colby Hill Road, along the easterly side of Lot No. 13; the westerly side of Lot No. 14; the easterly side of Lot Nos. 15-1 & 15; and the westerly side of Lot Nos. 31, 31-2, 31-3, & 31-4; and through Lot Nos. 1, 9-5, 9-4; and along the easterly line of Lot No. 7, all located on Madison Tax Map No. 12.

To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, a certain road running northerly from the Colby Hill Road to where it intersects with the Old Eben Farm Road,; as well as the Old Eben Farm Road, which runs easterly from Route 113 opposite the Boulder Road; to a dead end; passing through Lot No. 8, located on Tax Map No. 12; and through Lot Nos. 3, 4, & 5, all located on Tax Map No. 15.

cellar hole and running north to Bertha Davis land.

Article 42. To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, a road known as the "Oak Hill Road", running northeasterly from Route 113; to the Allard Hill Road, just off the Tasker Hill Road, portions of it abutting or passing through Lot Nos. 5-1, 5, & 6, all located on Tax Map No. 17; through Lot No. 14, located on Tax Map No. 15; through Lot Nos. D115, D89, D90, & D101, all located on Tax Map No. 41. After leaving Lot No. D101, said road is estimated to run close to the following roads; Old Town Road, Bergamo Road, Little Shore Road, Eidelweiss Drive, as identified on Tax Map No. 15.

Amended to read: To start at Lot 6 and continue as written

To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, a road known as the "Ledge Pond Road", running southerly from Route 16; through Lot No. 13; and westerly along the north line of Lot No. 3; to the northwest end of Ledge Pond; and then, continuing southerly along the eastside of said Ledge Pond; along the east line of Lot Nos. 4, 5, 6, 7 & 8; to a dead end, all located on Tax Map No. 16.

Article 44. To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, a road known as the "Mason Road", running easterly off Salter Hill Road; to a dead end, as located in Lot No. 1 on Tax Map No. 14.

So Voted

Article 45. To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, a road

known as the "New Road", running westerly from Route 113 on the east side of Deer Hill; along the northerly line of Lot No. 48-1; through Lot No. 48; along the southerly lines of Lot Nos. 49, 57 & 75; to the Tamworth Town Line.

So Voted

Article 46. To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway, and make subject to gates and bars, a road known as the "Moore's Pond Road", running westerly from Route 41; approximately opposite the north end of the Snake Road, so called; as it crosses the power line and railroad tracks to Moore's Pond; passing through Lot No. 1, as located on Tax Map No. 4.

So Voted

Article 47. To see if the Town will discontinue, as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars, an extension of the road known as "Iron Ore Road"; running northwesterly from Route 41; through Lot No. 10, Tax Map No. 1; crossing the power line and railroad tracks to the Tamworth Town Line.

So Voted

Article 48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, at their discretion, at public auction, any real estate in the Town, to which the Town has title by Tax Collector's Deed except when it is being sold back to the former owner, or to a party who has succeeded to the title of the former owner, in which case, private sale may be utilized. Any such real estate to be sold and conveyed on or before the next annual Town Meeting.

Article 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to Mrs. John T. Bouzon for the sum of \$1,000.00 that property identified as Lot No. 2B in Madison Shores, formerly the property of John H. Croteau, which was sold to the Town of Madison for

non-payment of taxes on August 1, 1967. A condition of this sale is that said Lot No. 2B is to be annexed to and become a permanent part of and form a permanent merger with the abutting property owned by Mrs. John T. Bouzon.

Article 50. To see if the Town will vote to spend the sum of \$476.00 for the purchase of two adding machines for town office use and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw this sum for this purpose from the Anti-recession Fund of 1979.

Moderator John A. Zemla opened the meeting at 7:30 p.m.

The moderator read the special town warrant and then proceeded to Article One for consideration.

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$85,000.00 or some other sum to conditionally lay out, as a Class V Highway, and construct to conform to current T.R.A standards an existing private right-of-way known as Forest Pines Road; said cost to include the construction, engineering, and damage expense for said lay out; to determine whether said appropriation shall be raised by the issuance or sale of bonds or notes on the credit of the Town in accord with the provisions of RSA Chapter 33, as amended; to authorize the Selectmen to invest said monies and to use the interest earned thereon for said project; to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment of principle and interest, fixing the rate of interest, the provisions for the sale of notes and/or bonds and all other matters in connection therewith except that said bond or note shall be for no more than a ten (10) year period; and that the entire cost of said project to be assessed as a Betterment Assessment against the owners of the property abutted or served by said road in accordance with RSA 234:23 (a-f), in such reasonable and proportional manner as the Selectmen deem equitable and just; or take any other action relative thereto.

Yes votes - 58 No votes - 33 Discarded - 1

This article was defeated because it did not receive the two-third majority vote needed on a bond issue.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$39,000.00 for the repair of flood damage to town roads caused by the downpour of April 10, 1980.

This article was passed with a near unanimous "yes" voice vote, and so declared by the moderator.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and save harmless from loss or damage occurring said vote any person employed by it and any member or officer of its governing board, administrative staff, or agencies, included but not limited to, Selectmen, Treasurer, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Planning Board Members, Conservation Commission Members, Health Officer, Building Inspector, from personal and financial loss and expense, including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit, or judgment by reason of negligence or other acts resulting in accidental injury to a person or accident damage to or destruction of property if the indemnified person, at the time of the accident resulting in the injury, damage, or destruction was acting within the scope of his/her employment as provided in RSA 31:105.

## TEN YEAR MASTER PLAN — ROADS

### PROBLEM:

No comprehensive formal long range plans exist for road improvements for the town of Madison, N.H.

### FACTS:

- 1) An up to date map of Madison roads has been prepared:  
See att. No. 1.
- 2) Recommendations for road improvements and priorities have been received from town selectmen, road agent, planning board, fire chief, and school bus drivers.
- 3) Approximately 40 percent of the roads in Madison do not meet T.R.A. standards (Town Road Assistance.).
- 4) "Town Road Assistance" is a program to encourage road improvements and the state of N.H. pays about 80 percent of costs.
- 5) The State of N.H. expects the town to plan completion of roads where T.R.A. projects have done sections.
- 6) Madison, N.H. has approximately 34 miles of road of which about 17 miles are paved.
- 7) Madison spends about 12 percent of the town budget on roads: (110,000 dollars).
- 8) The Madison "Steering Committee" in their 1979 report states: "We should develop a program to up grade existing and proposed roads to T.R.A. specifications".
- 9) The Steering Committee also states "Conceive a ten year comprehensive plan subject to continuous modification for road maintenance, improvement, and development".
- 10) The Town of Madison voted to designate "Scenic Roads" in 1973 (see att. No. 2).
- 11) A list of town roads appears in att. No. 3 of this report.
- 12) In preparing this report maximum attention has been given to public safety in establishing priorities.
- 13) PRIORITIES:
  - A) Earliest attention to hazardous situations, and fire and rescue service.

B) Upgrade very narrow, rough, muddy, areas to prevent accidents.

C) Correct problems that make snow plowing difficult.

D) Correct expensive repeat washouts or deterioration.

E) Fulfill town T.R.A. agreement.

F) Provide attention to new housing and industry.

#### DISCUSSION:

- 1) In reaching "conclusions" of this report, consideration has been given to hazards, very muddy and narrow conditions, expensive repeat wash outs and public safety. Also T.R.A. obligations, service to the taxpayers, and expected new housing or industry.
- 2) Logically greatest attention is focused on those areas where fire trucks or rescue vehicles could not reach the scene because of very bad roads. Of equal concern is the safety of school bus passengers.
- 3) It is recognized that the great majority of Madison citizens wish to "preserve the character of Madison". The many "scenic roads" so voted at town meeting will be retained.
- 4) Serious attention has been given to the whole town in preparing this report. Too often some of us demand immediate attention to "our roads" and have little interest in roads we never use. Recognizing this normal human trait, this ten year Master Plan is intended to expend funds efficiently, providing the best reasonable service for all users.
- 5) The so called T.R.A. standards are not considered excessive or luxury standards. They are minimum standards for public safety and in the long run are expected to lower expensive road repairs.
- 6) While the intent of this report is to set forth a ten year plan, it is essential that the selectmen have the freedom to deviate, amend, and up date the broad recommendations as they see fit, when such action is in the public interest.

## RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1) It is recommended that approximately one and one quarter miles of road be up-graded each year in Madison, N.H. as set forth in recommendation No. 4 of this report.
- 2) It is recommended that approximately \$35,000 be programmed per year for up-grading the one and one quarter miles of road (estimated at \$5 per foot) based on 1980 costs.
- 3) It is recommended that this road plan be up-dated biennially.
- 4) Schedule by year.
  - 1981 - Maple Grove Road (Plimpton Rd. to E. Madison Rd.) (Bridge at Frost Brook under T.R.A.)
  - 1981 - Bolduc Section (Near Pea Porridge Pond).
  - 1982 - Lead Mine Road (Black Brook Road to East Madison Road) - Two Bridges under T.R.A.)
  - 1983 - Colby Hill to Modoc Rd. (Complete T.R.A. obligation) (Danforth Lane under T.R.A.)
  - 1984 - North Div. Rd. and Danforth Lane under T.R.A.
  - 1985 - Tasker Hill (top of hill to Mark Wiggin) (Plimpton Hill to four corners under T.R.A.)
  - 1986 - East Madison Rd.
  - 1987 - King Pine Rd. and Cross Rd. Salter Hill Rd. to Tamworth line under T.R.A.
  - 1988 - Tar Winter Rd. and Cross Rd. and Ossipee Lake Rd. (T.R.A. proj. - Salter Hill west of Orchard Rd.)
  - 1989 - Four Corners on Glines Hill to Downs Rd. (T.R.A. - for bridge on this same Rd.)
  - 1990 - Bickford Rd. to Glines Hill Rd. (T.R.A. - Bridge on this same Rd.) Tar last 300 yds. of Boulder Rd.

## MADISON TOWN AND SCHOOL LIBRARY REPORT FOR 1980

1979 was a critical year for the Library. 1980 has been a challenging one. In January we settled down in our new location with a full cellar under us.

During the year we have been dealing with the problem of turning our new cellar from a damp liability into the valuable asset it should be. A sump pump was installed by the Selectmen. Temporary shelves have been improvised in the cellar (thanks to the ingenuity and volunteer labor of a devoted Trustee) to hold the backlog of books not currently in circulation. Pending improvements are: a door at the foot of the bulkhead stairs, cellar insulation, better control of humidity, a more convenient location for firewood, most of it the gift of a generous friend.

The need for more shelf space in the library proper grows more acute as our collection expands. Mr. Albert Lyman is now at work on additional shelves for the one space we have left. He has already made us a gift of a table specially designed to hold the new card-catalogue drawers.

More and more children are learning how to use the catalogue. The training program initiated last year has resulted in the library's being used by the older grades for research on two extra mornings a week under the supervision of volunteer mothers. The library and the school are also launching a cooperative project in landscaping the areas surrounding all the buildings.

Our calendar of activities for the year opened with a tea for Madison's new minister, Linda Snyder. The Calligraphy Class ran for a successful four weeks. The Great Books Discussion Group, in its eighth year, met once a month from September to June. Story hours for the younger children were held in August. In June the Friends of the Library held their homecoming tea to welcome back summer members. A successful Book Fair was held on July 5. The reprinting of the Brief History of Madison with map has met a need and is selling well. Copies are still



available at the Library and Emporium. The greatest contribution the Friends of the Library made to the nitty gritty of running a library was their help in making a complete shelf list of our books of fiction. This list is to be included in a computerized catalogue of the fiction held by all the North Country libraries.

Our small Bearcamp Libraries Association has undertaken its own Union Catalogue of reference materials, without benefit of computer. Our own librarian was instrumental in obtaining the simple duplicating device for each library which will give all of us access to each other's reference books: a real outreach.

Gifts of books, phonograph records and pictures not to mention additions to our endowment, are evidence of the interest and generosity of our friends. Gifts include: a Thomas Register more Madison memorabilia, an old map of the "Pascatway" River Basin and subscriptions to needed magazines. Victoria Furman presented us with a copy of her own book, "Five in a Tent". Thanks to the foresight of our devoted librarian, we have all the New Hampshire telephone books. No charge for Information!

On Dec. 11 our building was listed in the National Register of Historic Places as "Madison School, District No. 1". This was due to the careful photographs of a member of the Historical Society and the expert guidance of Linda Wilson et al in the New Hampshire Historic Preservation Office.

## PROGRESS REPORT FOR RECREATION 1980

Clearly the support, given to the Recreation Committee by the townspeople, has resulted in much improved recreational facilities. The Committee, on its part, has provided detailed budgets so as to highlight where money is to be spent. The voters have appropriated the money. The committee is pleased with our relationship with the Selectmen, who in turn have directed the actions and achieved our published goals. During 1980 the Selectmen and the Committee have received much support in the form of work parties, equipment use (gratis), labors of specific individuals and support from other town organizations. The Committee is most grateful to all these people and groups.

Our specific accomplishments in 1980:

1) The Swim Program was a success. Under the leadership of Cheryl Littlefield, her aids - Wendy Eldridge and Douglas Fortin (authorized Water Safety Instructor) they ran a 3 hours /day - 5 days a week - 7 week program, which reached over 100 children! Lessons for beginners to advanced swimmers plus classes in basic water safety and rescue techniques were given and were positive results for each participant. In 1981, however, major changes will need to be addressed because the Red Cross is not going to finance any swim programs. The changes are already being reflected in our 1981 program.

2) The Summer Recreation Program took place simultaneously and at the same beach with the Swim Program. This program was under Mikel Beyerle's able leadership. This year it was especially efficient and successful for parents and kids alike. The kids' interest remained strong as they enjoyed games, nature walks, arts, crafts and theatre. Our plans call for a 1981 program headed by Mikel and her volunteers.

3) Skimobile trail renovation continued on a high plane from 1979. The Scrub Oak Scramblers Club, aided by town appropriations seed money expended \$660. of their own treasury for equipment rental and materials. About

760 man hours were donated to rebuild 4 bridges, renovate the B & M right of way, and continue other trail improvements. A trail map shows the extensive system we back in Madison and that is a major contribution the club makes to our recreational use.

4) Burke Field has really blossomed with a full schedule of games played during 1980. Little League, men and women's softball leagues and Chick's men's softball team kept the field busy from May 15th to late August. After the season another 1½ acres were loamed, seeded, fertilized and mulched. A solid "take" resulted. About ½ acre to seed is left and that is in 1981's plans. Work on Burke field will be a continuing thing, especially maintenance now that it is grassed, and the committee is pledged to address that task. With soccer now on schedule we see use of the field right thru fall.

5) The skating rink, with its 4' side boards was ready for the winter season. Two major wind storms before the ground was frozen set us back, but the rink was usable by late December. Additionally two 35' poles have been set - labor contributed by Bruce Jones - for skating rink lighting and power wires for the pump to flood the rink and irrigate the diamond.

6) A review of the feasibility of the building of two tennis courts was studied. Our committee decided, based on engineering data, that the site costs were too high for us to proceed on this issue. It remains a part of our monthly discussions and we will make some recommendations as the years go on.

We take this opportunity to thank the Town for their support of our past requests and feel that your committee is proceeding at a steady pace and in accordance with your wishes.

## 1980 FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Madison Volunteer Fire Department has continued through another successful year with high membership, interest, and, through training and luck, little property loss. The present 25 active and 2 Junior members have a nearly 100 percent attendance of at least half of our meetings and training sessions and 16 members attended three quarters of them. The Department trained 6 new members this year, 2 of which have not as yet reached the age of 18 so are not included on the roster. All members not having commercial licenses were tested by the State Motor Vehicle Dept. and are now covered legally to drive the trucks. Programs of daily station and equipment checks, log books for each truck, and others have increased our awareness, interest and control of our Department.

The Department's chief of the past 2½ years, Loren Shackford, Jr., took a new position in Freedom, and therefore resigned his position from the Department. His work while he was a member and officer helped very much to make our Fire Department what it is today. Of the more important things Loren accomplished is our greater awareness of the importance of training and the creation of a basic 2 month recruit training program. The men of the Department and Town of Madison owe him a lot, and we would like to take this opportunity to thank him and wish him well at his new position.

Three members have just completed the 120 hour State Firefighters I course qualifying them as State Certified Firefighters. They plan to take a 4 day instructors course in the Spring which will qualify them to teach other members of the Department on a regular basis. These two courses, plus the annual summer two-day course were sponsored by the Ossipee Valley Mutual Aid Association. Our regular bi-monthly training sessions have centered around the new pumper reel truck. Sessions with neighboring towns and within our own Department have

given us an opportunity to pre-plan areas of the town and learn how to use our equipment to its best advantage.

At present we have 14 people on our Rescue Squad of which one is a Registered Nurse+EMT (Emergency Medical Technician), 3 are EMT's and 10 are Advanced First Aiders.

Training for Rescue Squad members is also a continuing process. We have bi-monthly training meetings, all members must have a yearly CPR refresher course, Advanced First Aiders and EMT's must be recertified every two years and our EMT's must take at least 20 hours of continuing education each year. In addition, our 5 certified CPR instructors conduct classes for the general public as well as Department personnel.

The fire house has been better insulated this fall to aid in the fuel bill. Monies from the Department and Rescue Squad along with group effort has helped to tighten heat loss areas.

Due to insurance and State laws, the Rescue Squad has been included by vote of the Department into the Department. Since the Rescue Squad's beginning, they have supported themselves completely with the exception of the purchase of their vehicle. This year the budget will include monies for the Squad as well as other items not usually included in the regular budget.

Members receiving the \$50 compensation voted last Town Meeting for the 1979 Fiscal year were: Jon Bagley, Don Colcord, John Colcord, Robert Colcord, Sr., Robert Colcord, Jr., Lee Drew, Robert Emmel, Richard Gaudreau, Alton Lovering, Wayne Lyman, Fred Shackford, James Shackford, Jesse E. Shackford, III, Loren Shackford, Jr., Paul Shackford, Steven Ward and Raymond Ward.

This winter's cold weather has no doubt lead to many

more families use of alternative heating methods. Extreme care must be taken when installing stoves, etc., that proper equipment is used and regular maintenance performed. If there are any questions as to your situation, please feel free to ask for advice. In 1980 there were 57 calls for the Fire Dept. and 26 calls for the Rescue Squad.

## **REPORT OF THE MADISON CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

The selective cutting of timber on a portion of the McNair Conservation Easement area has been completed with the approval of the Conservation Commission.

Mr. Tom Hadley, Forester for the North Country R.C. & D. Project, has succeeded Mr. "Gib" Dodge in guiding "Measure 301" for Madison's Town Plan for Intensive Forest Management in cooperation with the Conservation Commission. With his help a timber trespass amounting to five acres or so in the Burke Town Forest was verified. Town counsel has initiated steps for damages.

The Old Home Week workshop included a W.E.N.H.-T.V. School Series film on land use in New Hampshire. The film was followed by a lively discussion of forest management led by Mr. Tom Hadley.

The Old Home Week hike this year went from the Grandsire Bickford cellar hole to the great cave, the Rock House, on Rock House Mountain. There were sixteen hikers.

The policy of joint action by the Planning Board and the Conservation Commission regarding wetlands has been re-affirmed.

During 1980, the chairman served on the nominating committee of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions. Also, the chairman participated in an excellently conducted and well attended Workshop on Wetlands Protection for Municipal Officers and Others on September 18 and 25 in Holderness. The emphasis of the workshop was on the increased "home rule" now guaranteed to towns in the protection of wetlands, and on how to exercise home rule responsibly.

ARTICLE 1. To see whether the voters of the School District will vote to exercise its option to renew its current tuition contract with the Conway School District, which option will renew the contract for a five (5) year period from 30 June 1983 through 30 June 1988.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,500 to be used by the Madison School Board for the purpose of studying the feasibility of enlarging the current school in order to serve grades K-8 and to prepare a proposal for action at the 1982 Annual School District Meeting.

ARTICLE 3. ## **SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT**

**by Robert B. Kautz

Once again it is with great pleasure that this report of the past year's activities is provided. The goal of everyone in our school system is to serve children better, educationally.

As we have reported in the past, school construction continued to be a major undertaking. At the A. Crosby Kennett High School we can state that there remains only a number of small items to be completed in our total construction program. The vocational addition opened in September of 1980. This beautiful facility now allows our communities to feel, with great reason, that our high school has the facilities to provide all students an educational opportunity that will respond to their needs and interests. Those areas still to be completed include a greenhouse for the vocational agricultural program and some minor work. It is unfortunate that to this date we are still experiencing some problems with heating and ventilation. Work to have these corrected is taking place, but it is a frustrating and uncomfortable problem for teachers and students.

Construction at the Madison Elementary School was completed, and their two-classroom addition and renovations have been used since the opening of school in September. This fine facility is a welcome addition for the Madison Elementary School program. Another welcome addition is just being completed in Bartlett. This includes development of a fine library facility, multi-purpose room, kitchen, and classrooms for Science and Practical Arts. The Josiah Bartlett Elementary School is now accessible to the handicapped and meets public safety requirements.

In addition to these construction projects, progress is occurring in the reroofing of a large portion of the original Kennett High School building, the Kenneth A. Brett School

in Tamworth, and the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett. In Freedom, more storage space was provided as well as replacement of the septic system. All of these, as well as the regular maintenance, occurred during the year in all of our schools so that our facilities would be adequate for school and community use.

Besides facility projects, much work on our educational program took place. Curriculum committees in Science and Social Studies continued their work. The Social Studies Curriculum was adopted by all School Boards. The Accountability Committee continued its task and is at the point of test development. Valuable assistance from the state has been received, and the School Administrative Unit has budgeted \$10,000 to be used for this purpose. All of the elementary schools embarked on an evaluation process which will conclude in the 1981-82 school year. This process involves a self-evaluation by the school and then a review of this by an outside visiting team. It is anticipated that this work will result in an affirmation of what is currently occurring as well as recommendations for improvement. The Conway School Board has established an Educational Planning Committee with the purpose of involving persons from all sections of the community in reviewing our total educational program and developing long-range plans where necessary. All of these tasks are accomplished only because of the dedication, care, and generous involvement of our teaching staff and community members.

In addition to efforts to improve our educational programs, many of the towns have, or are in the process of, establishing study committees dealing with the 20 year contract for education of high school students at Kennett High School. This 20 year contract for all towns (except Tamworth which occurs one year later) will expire in June of 1983. The sending towns do have an option to continue the contract for two periods of five years if they so elect. The purpose of these study committees is to review any and all alternatives that may exist so that each community can make an informed decision.

During this past year, evaluations of our Staff Development, Special Education, and Vocational Education Programs were conducted by the State Department of Education. We were very pleased with the outcomes of these routine evaluations. The recommendations that were provided have been, or are in the process of being, completed. We are especially proud of the many commendations that our programs and personnel received.

As our fifth year of working in the communities of SAU No. 9 draws to a close, we would like to express some thoughts concerning your schools and schooling. Public school education must endeavor to serve all students. Public schools are asked by many to fulfill a plethora of needs. Your School Boards and personnel employed by them endeavor to fulfill the goals of public schools as well as they can be. We are conscious of the problems of the economy, and we all strive to make every dollar spent be one that will provide the greatest impact. Our schools serve approximately 2,400 students and employ approximately 285 people. Besides education we are involved in transportation, food services, health services, and buildings and grounds maintenance and construction. The buildings that are under our care and supervision range from storage facilities to the large Kennett High School complex and include a total of 9 schools. Our responsibilities are complex, and yet we feel that our chief responsibility - educating our children - is being accomplished in a very fine manner and with very good results.

Our high school students have done well on college entrance exams in comparison to their peers. The standardized tests given to all students in grades 2-8 provide indications that our programs are successful and that our students rank very well in a comparison with students throughout the country. We receive compliments from many who have recently moved here from other areas as they compare our schools to those that their children previously attended. When we compare the cost of

education in our schools to those throughout New Hampshire, again we compare favorably. In a fact sheet provided by the New Hampshire State Department of Education for the 1978-79 school year, our high school cost per pupil ranked 47th out of 75, while our enrollment was 21st out of 75 and our school tax rate per \$1,000 of equalized valuation ranked 57th out of 75. Our junior high cost per pupil in Conway ranked 27th out of 42 and the school tax rate 32nd out of 42. On the elementary level they vary, but the comparisons are as favorable as those mentioned above. Our graduating students have been successful in applying to institutions to further their education.

The point being made is that we all deserve to be proud and have reason for this pride in our schools, in the performance of our students and in the diligent, dedicated work of our teachers and non-instructional staff. Principals, classroom teachers, tutors and aides, secretaries, cafeteria workers, custodians, bus drivers, the volunteers in our schools, and your SAU administrators - all of these with you the community member cause the schools to be successful. This partnership of community and schools is necessary and must continue if our schools are to continue to provide a quality education and continue to strive to improve. All of this is for our children; all of this is so that they will inherit and contribute to the society we know and the world we live in.

We would like to thank everyone for the cooperation and support our schools have received. Your interest and viewpoints are necessary. The cooperation and coordination of the school, the home, and the community is essential. We are now happy to provide a more detailed report from the Director of Special Education and the principal and staff of your school(s).

# **SPECIAL EDUCATION DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

During the past year the SAU No. 9 special education program has been reviewed by the N.H. Department of Special Education and the U.S. Bureau of Education for the Handicapped. The program reviews consisted of on-site visits in each school; interviews with principals, teachers and parents; and review of student files. Both reviews were very favorable, citing several commendations. Areas of weakness were identified in documentation procedures, and steps have already been taken to assure full compliance with State and Federal regulations. As a result of these reviews, the SAU No. 9 special education program has been approved for the next three years.

The Conway, Jackson and Tamworth School Districts have developed a consolidated regional program for multiple handicapped children. The class is self contained and staffed with a special education teacher and aide. The program curriculum focuses on sensory stimulation, self help, communication, and adaptive and gross motor skills. The class is housed at the Conway Elementary School and administered by the Conway School District.

The special education program for moderately or trainable mentally handicapped secondary aged students at Kennett High School has been expanded. This program stresses functional academics; social, independent living; and vocational and motor skills. The students also attend the Center of Hope in the afternoon for work activities training.

SAU No. 9 has engaged in extensive "Childfind" activities to identify individuals, birth to 21 years, who are educationally handicapped and in need of special education services. The emphasis has been on early identification and intervention. All public school kin-

dergarten and first grade children were screened for special education needs. Throughout SAU No. 9, fifteen handicapped pre-school children have also been identified and receive special education services.

Impedence screening, a new hearing screening program, has been cooperatively undertaken by school nurses and speech and language therapists. Impedence Audiometry is a much-improved procedure over the present pure tone hearing screening program, for it can detect possible middle ear problems, including the presence of middle ear fluid. The major benefit of this program is prevention of learning problems through early identification and fast referrals for medical management of children with chronic middle ear problems.

Parents, classroom teachers, special education teachers, building principals, and other support personnel have worked diligently through the Pupil Evaluation and Placement Team process to develop individual education programs for each special needs student. Their cooperative efforts, as well as the continued support of the school boards and communities, are to be commended for this has resulted in quality special education programs for the handicapped children in each school.

# MADISON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

For the past few years my message to you has reported on the changes and improvements which have occurred within and about the Madison Elementary School. The past year has been no exception to the energies devoted to benefiting the academic, social, and developmental preparedness of our young people. While some changes have been subtle and others dramatic, all have contributed to a more meaningful educational experience.

The construction of two classrooms was completed and ready for the September opening. The grounds around the school and library were landscaped and seeded, providing an improved appearance and a more appropriate playground area. The parking area and walkways were expanded.

Curricular programs have been continued, investigated and improved. The Reading Program, now in its third year, appears to have been successful and will undergo evaluation during this year. A more individualized Math Program is operating at all levels. A Social Studies Curriculum has been developed and approved. An Individualized Language Arts Program has been studied by staff members with significant implementation currently taking place. A Science Curriculum is also being developed. All curricular areas have undergone greater coordination throughout the grades. The Kindergarten (being housed within the school building) has joined the school population for the first time.

Student activities have continued and expanded. Soccer again proved successful with over thirty participants in Grades 2-6, including a J-V and Varsity squad.

Drama, following an enthusiastic first year, has worked with marionettes. In conjunction with the Junior Ski Program, an activity program at the school has been implemented to serve those youngsters not in the ski program. Last spring the school held its first annual Bazaar Day to support student activities. Also, a student council was formed through the election process to direct and coordinate student activities.

Of significant value and importance is the expansion of parent and community involvement in the school. The PTO has continued to be active in RIF and other student programs. Initiated through the PTO several years ago, a Parent Volunteer Program has grown and expanded to include over thirty parents and community members in classroom aiding, duties, library, media coordination, and special projects.

The Madison Staff, School Board, and many community members have embarked on a two year evaluation of our local school. This involves a comprehensive plan for identifying where we as a school are, where we are going, and by what means we will get there.

Education is a process which begins at birth and continues through one's life, ever changing and improving. Only a part of that process is housed within the four walls of a classroom. With the help of an involved community, a dedicated staff, and a sincere belief in the abilities of our youngsters, that part of education which is charged to our local school will continue to better serve our children and their futures.



## **THE MADISON JUNIOR / SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE**

The Committee, after reviewing the State of New Hampshire's requirements for mandatory subjects to be offered at the high school level, concluded that the Town of Madison's cost would be prohibitively expensive to recommend establishing a high school here.

The Committee also considered the programs, courses, and the vocational section offered at Kennett High School. The conclusion was that dollar-for-dollar, Madison's students were receiving an outstanding value.

Therefore, the Madison Junior / Senior High School Study Committee is recommending that the current contract be extended for five (5) years. We are, however, recommending that Madison seriously consider expanding the current building facilities at the elementary school to include the seventh and eighth grades. A report by the Committee follows, outlining their philosophy, necessary additions, and an estimated cost.

### **Madison Junior / Senior High School Study Committee**

The Madison Junior / Senior High School Study Committee would like to present a number of justifications and rationales for the Town of Madison assuming the responsibility for educating students in grades 7 and 8. The Committee's recommendations in brief are that the Town of Madison would provide an appropriate facility, faculty and educational program on the current school grounds, so that Madison students in grades 7 and 8 would receive their education in Madison. The following justifications, while admittedly based on projections, are presented so that the School Board members will be aware of the Committee's perspective.

- (1) **Local Control of Education** - Educating grades K-8 locally would extend the Town of Madison's control over the curriculum, staff competence, student in-

volvement, educational costs and any number of local educational variables.

- (2) **Conway Growth** - At present the new junior high school facility is at full capacity and is expected to remain there in 1981-82. If Conway or any of the outlying towns continue to grow, the junior high facility in Conway will be overcrowded.
- (3) **Current Conway / Madison Relationship** - At present there exists no contractual basis between Conway and Madison for the tuitioning of students to Kennett Junior High School. It appears that at some point Conway could refuse to accept Madison's grade 7 and 8 students. This is purely conjecture, but what happens when the Conway facility is paid off or if the Conway facility is only able to handle Conway's junior high population?
- (4) **Madison's Future Needs / School Growth** - Given Madison's school population growth over the past two years (20 percent increase) and Conway's building situation, it could be projected that in five years we may have to provide for the education of our 7th and 8th graders in Madison. Projecting 10 years down the road, we may find Madison having to form a cooperative high school with towns to our south.
- (5) **Pay Back and Ownership** - Consider that the taxpayers of Madison are currently helping to pay for Conway's building costs. When these costs are paid for, will the Town of Madison own any part of Conway's secondary educational facility? Please consider the pay back figures presented later, along with the fact that if the Madison voters agreed with this proposal, at some point in time they would own their own junior high facility.

The first five justifications deal in terms of projections and finances. The most compelling justifications in the Committee's eyes were in terms of the students.

Again, let us emphasize that this proposal is made only under the assumption that the Town of Madison could and would provide as good an education for its 7th and 8th grade students as Conway currently does.

- (6) **Social Setting** - It is common knowledge that a certain amount of the interactions between junior high students and between the junior and senior high students at Kennett are not in the student's best interest. Negative social interactions, peer pressure, and disciplinary problems could be better controlled and handled in a small school situation.
- (7) **Overall Teacher / Student Ratio** - The proposed plan would allow for a smaller overall student / teacher ratio than at Kennett. Kennett Junior High's student / - teacher ratio is approximately 30 to 1 whereas Madison's could conceivably be 25 to 1.
- (8) **Continuity / Communication** - Grades 1-8 educated in one facility will allow for greater continuity of instruction, as well as increased communication between those teachers responsible for each child's basic academic skills.
- (9) **Adjustment Problems** - It is the feeling of the committee that a ninth grader, having spent eight school ears in Madison, will be more mature and better emotionally equipped to deal with the adjustment problems inherent in the move to Kennett.

### **Kindergarten Through Grade 8 Madison School**

**Projection:** Assuming school will grow between 15-20 percent per year (as during the last 3 years), it is estimated that there will be 25 students per grade.

**Needs:** Increase of students and addition of 2 grades (7th & 8th) will need 4 classrooms -

1 - science, lab, home economics;

2 - math;

3 - social studies, English;

4 - shop (optional);

(or) - alternative, using old cafeteria as home economics room

Teachers for grades 6, 7 & 8 - will need 4 additional -

- 1 - math\* \* shop, home ec., phys. ed.
- 2 - science \*
- 3 - social studies \*
- 4 - English
- 5 - special education (2 / 5)
