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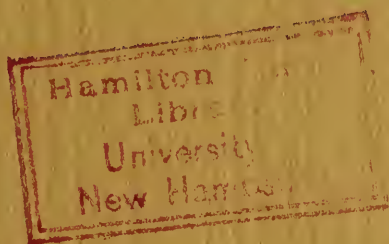

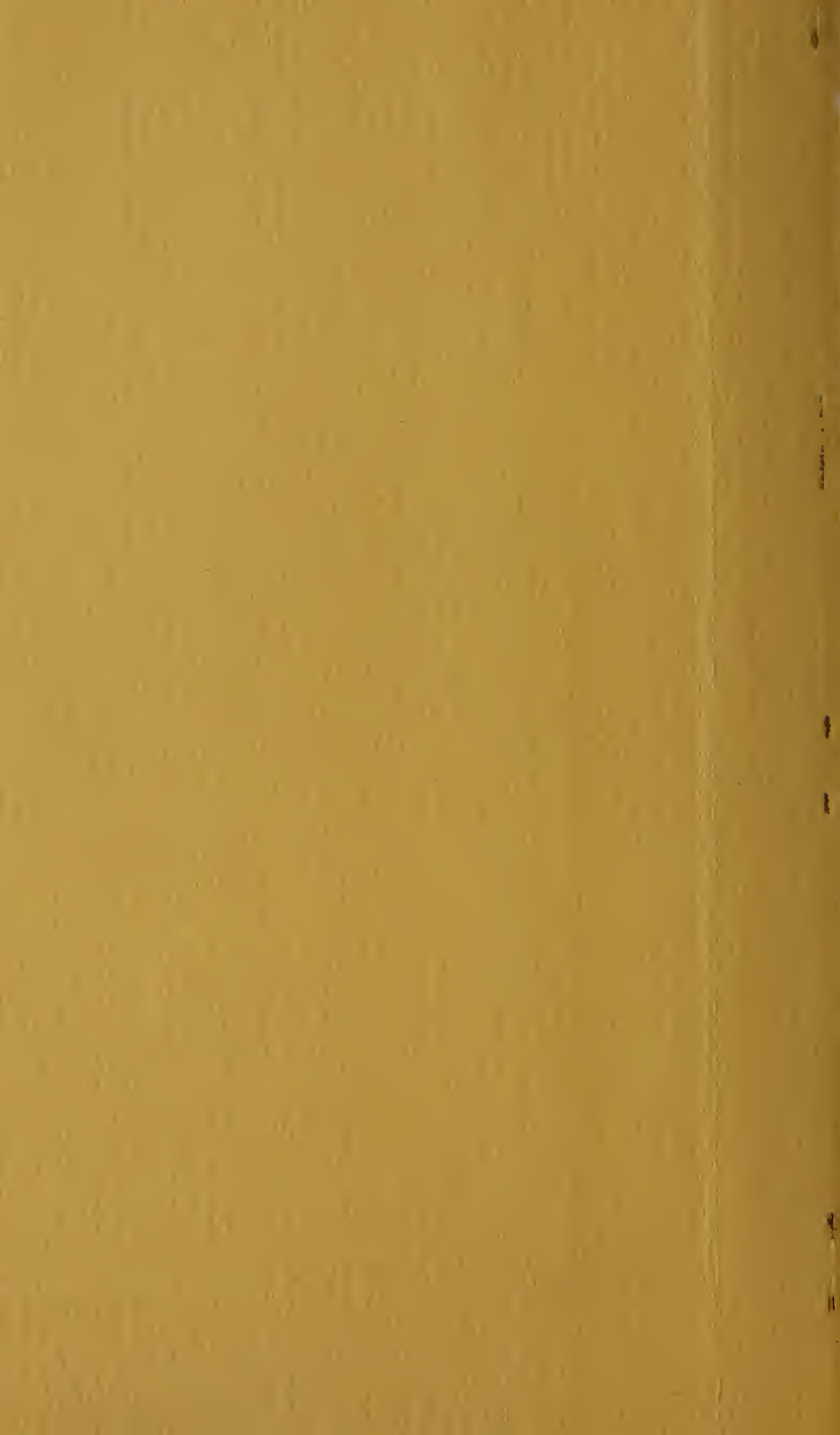

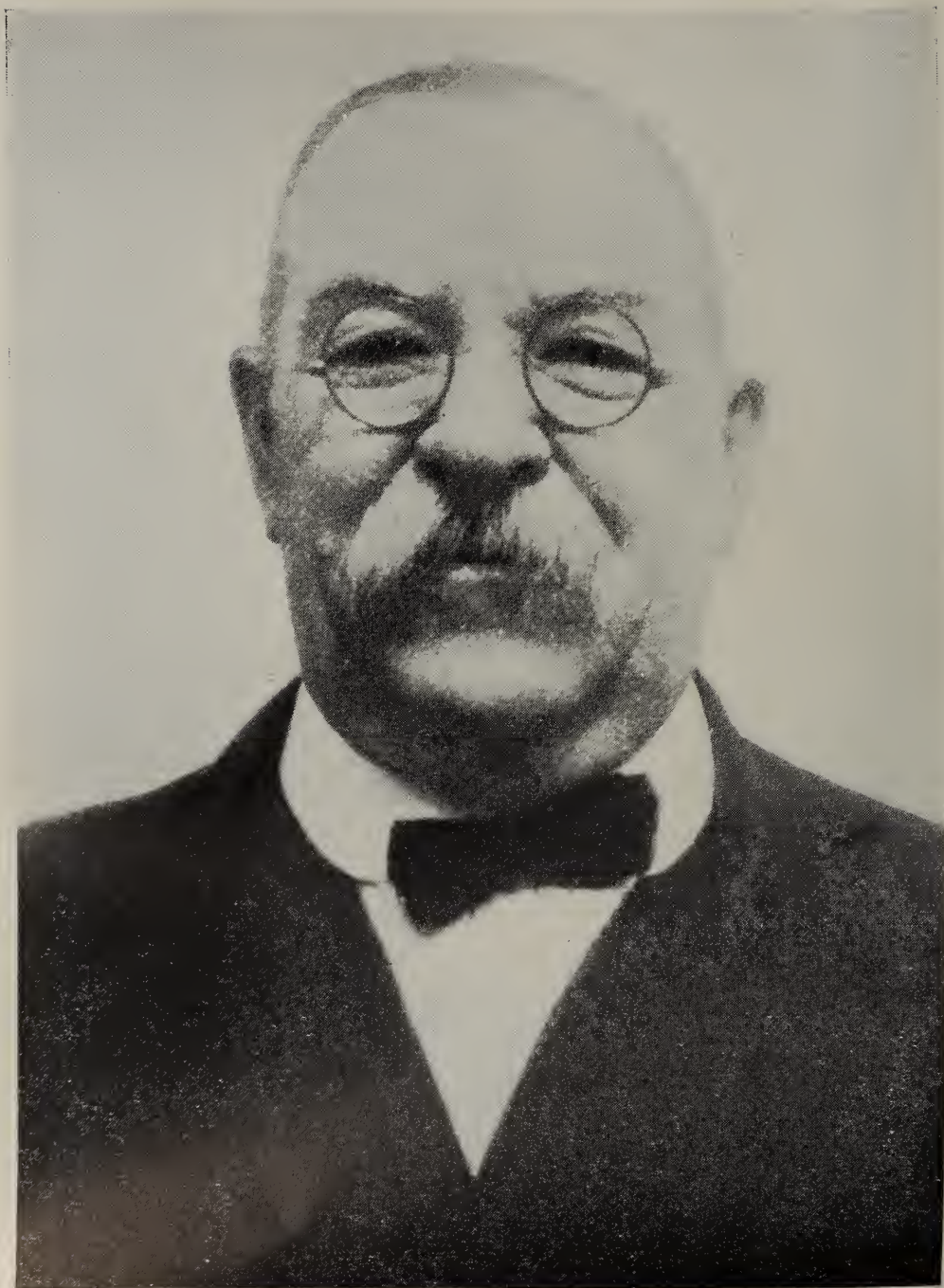

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the town of Milton in the County of Strafford in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine-thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for Town Officers, and to vote on the following question, to wit: Is it expedient to revise the constitution?

2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) for repairing highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for sidewalk construction and repair and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to pay for breaking roads and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be expended on the road to Spaulding's Mill by the way of Spaulding Avenue so-called and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) to be expended on the highway leading from Milton Mills Village to Wakefield town line, known as Jug Hill Road, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred sixty dollars (\$1,260) to pay note and interest.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750) for maintenance of the Fire Department for the ensuing year and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

9. To see what salary the town will vote to pay the First and Second Engineers and Firemen in addition to the amount allowed by law; to see how much per hour the town will vote to pay the Engineers and Firemen while fighting fires and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed nineteen hundred dollars (\$1,900) for the maintenance of street lights for the ensuing year.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for the benefit of the Free Public Library at Milton Mills and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) for Memorial Day expenses.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) for the construction of the Farmington road, the State having appropriated the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the same purpose.

14. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of four hundred ninety-one dollars and eighty-six cents (\$491.86).

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay town charges and expenses and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100) for improvements and maintenance of the lots in front of the station and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for white pine blister rust control, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire on notes of the town a sum of money necessary for the current expenses in anticipation of the taxes of 1937 and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

19. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to obtain W. P. A. Projects and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) for maintenance of hydrants in the Milton Fire Precinct.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) to be expended on the highway leading from the Town House toward "New Bridge" so-called, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to be expended in grading and oiling on Western Avenue and Church Street in Milton Mills Village.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to move and repair the crusher plant.

By petition of Stanley Tanner and nine others:

25. Raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three hundred dollars (\$300) to repair the Town Farm buildings and also dig or drive a well on same property.

26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or dispose, any land purchased from the Maine Sand and Gravel Company, Inc., when it would be an advantage to the town, and pass any other vote or votes relative thereto.

27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000) to pay for the real estate purchased from the Maine Sand and Gravel Company, Inc.

28. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

In rendering my report of the Fire Department for the year ending January 31, 1937, I will state that we have had but three (3) bell alarms this past year. The Department has responded to twenty-two (22) calls.

13 chimney fires.

3 fires where buildings were involved.

1 brush fire.

1 tar fire at State Highway pit.

1 leather chip fire.

3 chimney fires in town of Lebanon.

Report of the Commissioners of Milton Fire District

To the Selectmen and Voters of Milton:

On August 23, 1935, a petition signed by fifteen voters of the Milton Fire District was presented to your Commissioners. This petition requested that a special meeting be called to consider a water supply project and to take action thereon. Your Commissioners took the necessary steps to secure a permit from the Superior Court to hold such a meeting and duly posted a warrant for the same.

A special meeting was held on September 10, 1935, at which time it was voted to construct and equip a water supply system for fire and domestic purposes. It was also voted to authorize your Commissioners to raise upon the credit of the District a sum not to exceed \$36,000.00 and to issue and sell the bonds of the District for that purpose. It was also voted to authorize your Commissioners to make application for a grant from the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works to be used to aid in the construction of a water supply system. It was further voted to authorize your Commissioners to take any action necessary and incidental to carrying out the project.

In accordance with the instructions of the voters, as above stated, your Commissioners proceeded to make application to the Federal Emergency Administration for a grant to assist in the construction of the water supply system. They engaged the services of an engineer and legal counsel to assist them in preparing plans and carrying out the necessary details.

After investigation, it was found that the best offer for the purchase of bonds was from the National

Shawmut Bank of Boston, Mass. The National Shawmut Bank had the law firm of Storey, Thorndike, Palmer & Dodge investigate the validity of all the proceedings leading up to the vote to issue the bonds and found that they were in complete and proper form. After the investigations of the legality of the vote and the credit of the District were completed the National Shawmut Bank offered to purchase the \$36,000.00 of bonds paying interest at 3.75 percent. This offer was accepted and the bonds were executed and sold at par to the Rochester Trust Company who acted in cooperation with the National Shawmut Bank of Boston.

The bonds are in denominations of \$1,000.00 and \$500.00 each, and are numbered from 1 to 48 inclusive. The odd numbered bonds are of the \$1,000.00 denomination and the even numbered bonds are for \$500.00 each. The bonds mature at the rate of \$1,500.00 each year. Bond No. 1 for \$1,000 00 and Bond No. 2 for \$500.00 will mature on November 1, 1938. Each year thereafter one \$1,000.00 bond and one \$500.00 bond will mature until the last two bonds, No. 47 and No. 48, will mature on November 1, 1961.

Each of the bonds has coupons payable on November 1st and May 1st of each year until the date of maturity. The coupons on the \$1,000.00 bonds are for \$18.75 each or \$37.50 each year. The coupons on the \$500.00 bonds are for \$9.37 and \$9.38 each, making a total of \$18.75 for each year.

The interest on all of the bonds became payable on May 1, 1936 and November 1, 1936. Both of these payments of \$675.00 each or a total for the year of \$1,350.00 have been paid and are included in the cost of the water supply project. The next interest payments will become due on May 1, 1937, and November 1, 1937, and should be provided for in the budget for the coming year. No bonds will mature in the coming year. The

National Shawmut Bank of Boston is to act as the fiscal agent of the Milton Fire District and will handle the interest payments to the bond holders.

Application blanks upon which to apply for water service were mailed to all of the property owners in the District. A total of 140 applications were returned and have been connected to the system. These services are on a flat rate in all cases except the Salem Shoe Company and the Milton Leatherboard Company where meters were installed. The total revenue from the 138 flat rate services adds up to \$1,372.00 per year. The revenue from the two metered services cannot be accurately predicted as it depends upon how much water they will consume. It is expected that they will be fairly large consumers and that they will bring the total revenue up to \$1,500.00 or more per year.

After plans and specifications were completed advertisements for bids were inserted in the Manchester Union and plans and specifications were placed on file with three agencies in Boston who furnish such information to contractors. The low bidders were Ames-Sheahan, Inc. of Somersworth for the general contract, and the Starkweather Engineering Company of Boston for the equipment for the pumping station. Ames-Sheahan sub-let the steel standpipe part of their contract to the Pittsburgh-Des Moines Steel Company. An itemized statement of these contracts is given elsewhere in this report.

A summarized statement of the cost of the water system given elsewhere in this report shows that the total cost was \$65,561.78. These figures were taken from the records of the government inspector on the job, checked by the engineer, audited from time to time by traveling auditors sent out by the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works and finally audited again in Washington. The amount paid out to date is

\$58,451.10 which leaves a balance to be paid of \$7,110.68 which is due Ames-Sheahan, Inc. The final grant payment from the government has not yet been received. This payment will be \$6,545.40 and this sum with the balance now in the bank of \$611.55 will be sufficient to make the final payment to Ames-Sheahan, Inc., with a surplus left over of \$46.27.

All money received and paid on the water supply project has been kept in a separate account at the New Public National Bank of Rochester. The regular operating account of the Fire District is carried in another account at the same bank.

The regular income and expense account of the Fire District has just begun to reflect the operation of the new water system. The first bills for water rent were out about the middle of January. Sufficient time has not elapsed for all payments to be received for water rents. There are quite a number of services installed by the District where the property owner has not yet completed his part and begun to use the water. In these cases it has been agreed that the water rent shall not start until the use of water begins.

The cost of electric power and soda ash used at the pump house for the first few months was charged to the cost of the project and was paid for by the Starkweather Engineering Company. The labor of attending to the operation of the pumping station is small and has been performed by the engineer up to the present time without charge. The principal operating expense has been for range oil used in the heater to keep the pump house warm enough to prevent the pipes from freezing. The total income to January 1st payable for water rents is \$187.58. The total expense for electric power and oil is \$20.65. These figures have been included in the regular income and expense statements. At the end of the accounting year no water bills had

been paid in and only \$20.65 had been paid out in connection with the new water system.

The amount of water pumped up to February 12, 1937 was 2,140,600 gallons. The amount of electric power used was 3,621 K. W. H. which is purchased at the rate of two cents per K. W. H. This will amount to a total for power of \$72.42 from the time the pumping started on August 21, 1936 until February 12, 1937.

It is believed by your Commissioners that the income from water rents for the coming year will be approximately enough to cover the interest payments on the bonds and the cost of operating the pumping station. It is anticipated that there will be a few more applications for service connections. The cost of these services will be borne by the District from the mains to the owner's property line. It is recommended that at the annual meeting of the District the voters authorize the Commissioners to install services if applications are made for them, to borrow money in anticipation of water rents or taxes, and to perform such other duties as the voters may direct. It is the opinion of your Commissioners that it is not necessary for the District to appropriate money this year as the anticipated revenues are believed to be sufficient to cover operations and interest. This statement is based on the assumption that the Town will appropriate \$500.00 for fire hydrants, and that the Commissioners will be authorized to borrow money in anticipation of water rents and taxes.

Your Commissioners anticipate that for the second year, in which the first bond retirements occur, on November 1, 1938, that it will be necessary for the District to appropriate approximately \$1,500.00 for the purpose of retiring the bonds. If it is the wish of the voters, an appropriation by the District might be made this year to build up a surplus so that the appropriation would not have to be so large the following year.

Your Commissioners wish to thank all those who have in any way assisted them in carrying out this project.

8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.

9. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars for the benefit of Nute High School.

10. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Thousand Four Hundred Dollars for the purpose of paying the Transportation of Pupils attending Nute High School and living at a distance from said school.

11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars for General Repairs.

12. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars for Insurance on School Property.

13. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to sell the Hare Road Schoolhouse.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Milton School Board and Citizens of Milton:

I have the honor to present my third annual report. The usual statistics are for the year ending June 30, 1936. The total enrollment was 195 in 1935 and 221 in 1936 and for the present year to date 199. The total before the end of the year will probably exceed that of 1936. Milton Mills has at present only 34 pupils and unless there is a considerable increase there the State Department will insist that only two teachers be employed next year.

Transportation is still the major problem as a study of the financial report will show. Nute High School should receive a larger appropriation if the school is to maintain a respectable standing as an approved school. The report of the Headmaster follows this report.

Two changes in the teaching force were made this year. Mrs. Helen Chamberlain was succeeded by Miss Louise Sayward, who is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College, with experience. Miss Whiting was elected to a position in Rochester and Miss Mary Willard, a graduate of Keene Teachers' College who had been teaching for me in Rollinsford, was elected to fill this vacancy. Grades two and three were combined this year, enabling Miss Bickford to spend more time with a large class of beginners. At this writing teachers and superintendent are checking results from the Metropolitan Achievement Tests. It is too early to announce definite figures but the forecast shows that our teachers and pupils need not be ashamed of their achievements. In October the Detroit First Grade Intelligence Tests were given to the entering class. Last June the Standard Graduation tests were again given and no pupils failed of promotion from the eighth grade and it is planned to give similar tests this year.

The attendance record continues high. During the second weeks of the fall term, October to December 18th, 1936, grades 7 and 8 and grades 1, 2, and 3, at Milton Mills, Mrs. Thurston and Mrs. Pike, teachers, reported 100% attendance and no tardy marks. Nute Ridge, for the same period, had only one absence. The Honor Roll of attendance for 1935-1936 accompanies this report.

No federal funds have been made available for milk distribution. I wish that a small sum might be secured, perhaps fifty dollars, to provide milk for the

undernourished children. I suggested this in my last report.

The Oscar Moorhouse Post of the American Legion again presented scholarship medals to Charles Logan at Milton and Virginia Laskey at Milton Mills.

During the summer the Milton Grammar school was renovated and this fall the town water was piped into the school and at a small expense our water supply was made adequate.

Both village schools are now in good condition and should not need extensive repairs next summer. At Nute Ridge, Mr. Nute's will stipulates that a school must be maintained there. It is a good sized school and will continue to be large. This year we have been able to transport pupils from the eighth grade to the Village and we hope to continue to do this. Releasing the teacher of the eighth grade enables her to do better work with the seven grades remaining and the school is improved by the removal of adolescent pupils. This building should be given adequate toilet facilities as those in use are below state standards and could be condemned. We are asking that money be appropriated to install modern septic tanks approved by the State Department of Public Instruction.

Your school board has given freely of its time to your school problems and the board and teachers deserve your continued support.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF NUTE HIGH SCHOOL

*To the Superintendent of Schools and the Members of
the Board of Trustees:*

I hereby submit my first annual report of the Nute High School which opened its forty-sixth year on September 8th, with an enrollment of 58 pupils. Transfers and withdrawals have reduced the registration until at present there are 57 pupils divided as follows: Post-Graduate, 1; Seniors, 12; Juniors, 9; Sophomores, 10; Freshmen, 25.

There have been three changes in the teaching staff. Mr. Austin L. Howard, B.S., M.S., former instructor at the University of Vermont, replaced Headmaster Philip R. Burlingame. Mr. Robert R. Anderson, B.A., replaced Mrs. Mary Timmins Dickson. Miss Ruth A. Paulson, B.A., replaced Miss Beatrice Nutter.

Three new subjects have been added to the curriculum. They are: Chemistry, Advanced Algebra, and General Mathematics. An extra period has been added to the school day. This period is called an "Activities Period" and it is used for the various class and school extra-curricular activities as well as for the teaching of the fundamentals and the automotive course.

New equipment which has been purchased this year includes the following: A complete set of chemistry laboratory apparatus and chemicals; the chemistry laboratory has also been equipped with Phil-Gas; four Royal typewriters for the commercial department; a set (ten volumes) of Doubleday's Encyclopedia for the main room; a permanent record book recommended by the State Department of Education. New text books were purchased for the following courses: Chem-

istry, General Mathematics, U. S. Constitutional History, Advanced Algebra and Law.

The heating plant has been improved by the addition of vacuum valves to the system.

Each member of the school has been weighed and had a thorough examination of the ears, eyes, throat and nose by our school nurse, Miss Marion Northway, R. N.

Athletics have been self-supporting and have furnished a surplus for the purchase of basketball equipment and a first aid kit.

The attendance has been excellent, the average attendance to date being better than 97 per cent.

There is a big demand and need in our school for Domestic Arts courses for the girls and Practical Arts courses for the boys. Outside of the initial cost of equipment, the only added expense would be the salary of another teacher. It is believed that the additional tuition that would result from the installation of these courses would defray a sizable part of the added expense.

The project which has been planned, under W. P. A. funds, for a public playground and athletic field should receive the serious consideration of every member of this community. We are in great need of a playground and athletic field and we should have it as soon as possible.

The many helpful suggestions of our Superintendent have been beneficial to the school and staff.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Trustees and the Citizens of Milton for so cordially receiving me into their midst.
