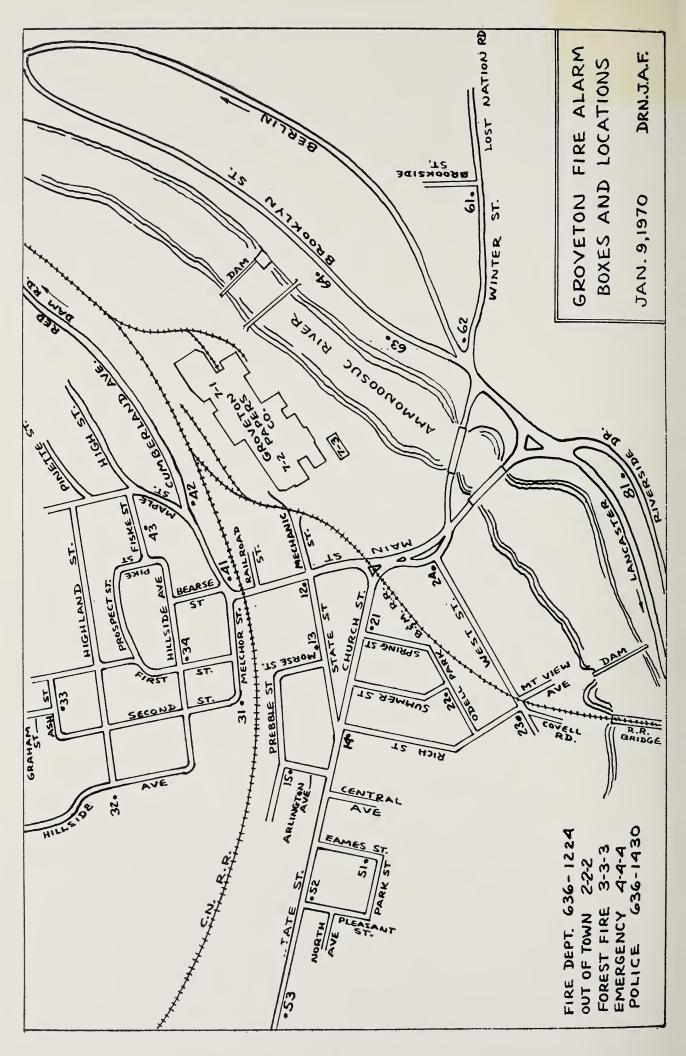

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Much has happened in Northumberland since last Town Meeting so we decided to give you a report of activities following the almost complete change in Administrative Officers of the Town.

We were most concerned in the beginning by the fact that several fire hydrants were not working at the time of the disastrous Dupuis fire. During the summer we completed repairs on those hydrants that could be repaired and installed new hydrants where repairs were not advisable. At year's end all hydrants were in working condition.

Some of the Town Officers were under Civil Suit when we entered office. We are pleased to report that this was settled to the satisfaction of all parties, with a minimum cost to the Town.

We have made quite a few appointments to various town boards and commissions. Without being critical of previous board members we feel that generally our appointments have strengthened our town government.

In May, in response to changes in the U.S. Fair Labor Standards Act, we improved working conditions for most of our hourly-paid Town Employees with adoption of a basic 40 hour week with time and one-half after 40 hours.

With generous contributions from the Groveton Foundation and the whole-hearted cooperation of your Selectmen and Town Manager, Reverend Huntley Halvorson and his committee have been offering an excellent home-cooked meal every Wednesday to our Senior Citizens. We have been informed recently that matching Federal and State funds are not available for privately funded projects so we are asking an increased appropriation for Senior Citizen Programs. This will enable us to increase the program and allow the Foundation to do something else.

Through cooperation between the Town and Groveton Papers Company, we believe that this Town is much closer to an ideal solution of its solid waste problem. The Company Incinerator should be in operation before Town Meeting and will be available to the town.

The work that seemed to bring us most favorable comments during the year was the new sidewalks installed on Spring Street, Odell Park and near the High School. As a result, we are asking an increased appropriation for new sidewalks this year.

As a result of Art. 17, 1974, we requested an audit by the N.H. Department of Revenue Administration. Their response was that we could expect considerable delay inasmuch as they were two years behind on some requests. Because of this we later withdrew our request for aduit.

At the suggestion of Anderson-Nichols and EPA, the procedure called for in Art. 9, 1974, was broadened to include an updating of all Town Sewerage and Sewage Treatment facilities.

The new Recreation Facilities under Art. 15, 1974 were delayed through 1974 due to the temporary transfer of practically the en-

tire staff of the Concord office which oversees such projects. We have been informed that the matching funds are definitely available and we will be moving on recreational improvements in the Spring.

Through revaluation of Industrial and some Residential property we increased town valuation by nearly \$400,000. This enabled us to hold our Tax Rate increase to \$.21 despite nearly \$90,000 increases in spending.

When it became apparent that local people would have trouble getting food stamps because there would be no local place for them to be purchased, we went into the Food Stamp business. Our Police Dispatcher, Robert Roby, sells Food Stamps as a town service.

With the assistance of Groveton Papers, emergency repairs were performed on the Swimming Pool and building, which also

got a brightening-up before the pool opened.

Due to the generosity of town service clubs and several individuals we have a portable Defibrillator and Cardiac Monitor installed in our Ambulance. This item cost nearly \$3,000 and is one of very few available in the area.

We prepared two separate appeals regarding the Flood Hazard Map and expect the final map will include no properties in town without an actual hazard. There are several articles in the Warrant which, if passed, will enable the town residents to purchase flood insurance.

After a very dusty summer, the residents of Rich Street were rewarded with a fine hot-top paving job. Our Public Works Superintendent, Mickey Maguire, believes that when we have a completely new street such as this, hot-topping is a much better job and cheaper than tarring in the long run.

In December we were allowed to employ five local jobless people, with the cost handled by Tri-County Council under Federal funding. We expect at least two more positions under this program

which runs until June 30 and may be extended further.

The Selectmen and Town Manager have been working very closely with the Northumberland Housing Authority, trying to make our Low Income Housing a reality. Present plans call for 24 one-bedroom units, 5 two-bedroom units and 3 three-bedroom units, with construction possible this summer.

The proposed location for a new Groveton Reservoir has been checked by the State Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission and by U.S. Soil Conservation Service. If test borings confirm that the site is as good as it appears, we should have no trouble developing a one-acre pond on the site. This would give us at least ten times as much water for fighting fire as we now have.

We have also applied for funds under the Community Development Program. If our requests are approved we expect to be able to separate storm water from regular sewer lines from Emerson's Store to the catch basin near Joe Emery's, including Pleasant, Park & Eames Streets and Arlington Ave. & Preble Streets, at no

cost to the Town.

#### **GROVETON PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT—1974**

In February Miss Anna Marie Tippitt joined the library staff as library page. She works one evening a week typing, reading shelves, mending books or covering the desk if the librarian is busy elsewhere.

Our display case had many interesting displays this year: Fly tying exhibit by Wendell Anderson, Button collection, Sea shell collection. Nature exhibit of fungi and bark, a hand woven bed spread made in 1820 by Mrs. Lucille Bryan's Great Grandmother, and a needle point picture of a Black Stallion made by Mrs. Ruth Delea's Grandmother.

During Library Week in April a Library Tea was held for the public to acquaint them with the many facilities available. Film strips were shown to entertain the children while the adults browsed. Posters for this event were made by the elementary school children.

The Reading course was resumed again in the summer. The children met one morning a week for six weeks to read to and be helped by one of the volunteers. The sixth week was fun week, film strips were shown, refreshments served and certificates awarded. There were thirteen children enrolled and eight ladies volunteered their time and help. Without the help of these volunteers this program cannot be carried out and I would like to take this opportunity to thank them once again.

Through a N. H. State Library Special Grant the White Mountains Regional Library Cooperative was formed. Weeks Memorial Library of Lancaster is the Administering Library and Service Center. Other libraries involved are Whitefield, Twin Mountain, Jefferson, Dalton, Colebrook and Groveton. The last six libraries each received a grant of \$500 and Groveton is considering using theirs toward the purchase of a movie pro-

jector. A Library Consultant was hired to study the needs of small libraries and to make more services available to them. The librarians meet once a month at the different libraries to discuss various ideas for improvement and to observe each other's libraries and methods. The Service Center has purchased a large number of books and these are on loan to all participating libraries.

Mrs. Crawford decorated a float to enter in the Stark Bicentennial parade. She always took advantage of every opportunity to make people more aware of the library and its various services.

1974 was a sad year for the library staff and the patrons. In August, Elton Bennett, trustee and treasurer for many years, died after a short illness. Also in August, Mrs. Crawford entered the hospital and was hospitalized most of the time until her death on November 6. She had been librarian for five years and had spent many hours besides library hours to improve facilities and to better serve the public. She often remarked, "I love my work and enjoy every minute of it." This was very evident in everything she did. Memorial donations were made to the library by Miss Ella Keene, a former resident and teacher, the White Mountains Regional Library Cooperative and the Colebrook Library.

In November, Mrs. Sandra Cross was appointed librarian. Mrs. Frances Rich is the new trustee and treasurer.

I appreciate the help and encouragement given me by the trustees, Anna Marie, the patrons, the members of the Library Cooperative and the Bookmobile staff.

#### **GROVETON YOUTH CENTER—1974**

The Groveton Youth Center has had a busy year at all of its facilities. The pool averaged 130 swimmers (afternoons and evenings) during each day of June 22-30, 133 swimmers per day in July, and 114 per day in August. The Arts and Crafts program had about 150 participating each week. These participants also went on bike trips, picnics, and to the Waumbek ballet "Peter and the Wolf." The annual girls trip was to Old Orchard Beach, Maine. The playground was constantly being used by some 150-175 boys and girls involved in Little League Baseball, basketball, softball and other sports.

The basketball clinic with Sanders and D'Allesandro included 90-100 boys and girls. The annual Halloween party was fun for 150-200 elementary school boys and girls and for a large number of Junior and Senior High School students at the dance afterwards. We end the year as we began—trying to keep ice on the skating rink. We have a total of \$4,208.32 in our account; \$1,641.20 of this coming from pool receipts.

# THE NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

The North Country Council (NCC) is the official planning organization (RSA 36:45-53) for the North Country. The Council undertakes area-wide planning programs, when appropriate, and provides community planning services and information to Towns. The Council's Board of Directors, two representatives from each of the 19 Member Towns, determines the work program and budget.

During 1974, the Council completed an Economic Base Study, assisted 30 Towns in solid waste by organizing site inspections and planning by providing information on volume, cost and transportation of solid waste. The Council also prepared a model Town Kit Fact Book, and a model flood district ordinance. The Council is preparing a Public Transportation Plan for the North Country and has submitted an application to the Federal Highway Administration for a rural transportation demonstration project. NCC has updated the State's Outdoor Recreation Plan for the North Country. This enables communities to maintain eligibility for federal funds. The Council has sponsored meetings and conferences on flood insurance, solid waste, land use, and septic tank disposal.

While working in the Town of Northumberland, the Council has reviewed and commented on the Town's zoning ordinance. The Council provided assistance on how the Town can become eligible in the flood insurance program. The Council presented information on Community Development funds. The Council can assist the Town in applying for funds.

What's in store for the future? NCC hopes to continue its work with the Town by providing an on-going program of planning services and information in order to help the Town cope with potential growth. NCC is developing legal information on land use which is available to Member Towns. The Council is also a point of information and assistance for potential sources of federal funding. In conclusion, the North Country Council hopes to continue working on a regular basis in areas of local and area-wide concern.

# TOWN OF NORTHUMBERLAND THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northumberland qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Groveton High School Auditorium in said Town on the first Tuesday in March next, March 4, 1975, to act upon the subjects hereinafter mentioned. You are hereby warned that on said date and place the polls will be opened at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and will remain open until 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the reception of your ballots under the Australian Ballot Laws, (Articles 1, 2, 3 and 4). You are also hereby warned that on said date and place at 7:00 o'clock in the evening the matters of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

ARTICLE 1.\* To choose by ballot one Selectman for a one-year term.

ARTICLE 2.\* To choose by ballot one Auditor and one Library Trustee for the ensuing two years.

**ARTICLE 3.\*** To choose by ballot the following Town Officers for the ensuing three years: one Selectman, one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Library Trustee and one Trustee of the Trust Funds.

ARTICLE 4.\* Are you in favor of the adoption of the building code ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board as follows? "The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage."

**ARTICLE 5.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 to extend the Northumberland Town Water Main from its present end opposite the Dollard LaRoche property, proceeding South with an eight inch main to the Charles Nelson property, a distance of approximately 5300 feet. (Inserted on petition of 13 voters).

**ARTICLE 6.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 to extend the Town Water Main from its present end near the Top Gas Station to a point between the Village Motel and Dupuis Store. (Inserted on petition of 13 voters).

**ARTICLE 7.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$214.88 to cover the cost of one street light to be installed at the intersection of Dean Brook Drive and the street leading to the residences of Shepard Mahurin and Raymond LeClere. (Inserted on petition of 13 voters).

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will request the State of New Hampshire Highway Department to install a traffic light at the intersection of Dean Brook Drive and Route 3, and eliminate the North entrance to the Ames Shopping Center. (Inserted on petition of 12 voters).

**ARTICLE 9.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to construct a new sidewalk on Summer Street. (Inserted on petition of 12 voters).

**ARTICLE** 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift of the land located between Wemyss Drive and Route 110, as described in plan accepted by the Northumberland Planning Board June 25, 1974. This land is to remain forever in Open Space. (Inserted on petition of 10 voters).

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Non-Partisan Ballot system as provided by Chapter 59 of the Revised Statutes Annotated. (Inserted on petition of 13 voters).

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the operation and maintenance of the White-field Regional Airport.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in amounts indicated or take any other action hereon:

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to cover the cost of Perambulating Town Lines and surveying lot lines of Town property.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,150 to pave 845 feet of Grandview Drive and 286 feet of Maple Street with 3 inches of Bituminous Concrete, machine laid and rolled.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,550 for the purchase of two portable Radio Transceivers for the use of the Town Nurse and Public Works Department.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$11,650 from the account shown as "Excess Income, Fontie Thorpe Estate" for the purchase of land around the present Groveton Reservoir. Land purchased will be adequate for protection of the present reservoir, to provide area to construct new reservoir, to provide area to construct road to reservoirs and adequate to lay and service pipelines from reservoirs to present chlorinator building.

ARTICLEe 18. (If vote on Article 17 is affirmative) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$25,000 from Capital Reserve Funds for the purpose of constructing a new water storage reservoir on land acquired in Article 17, to construct a road to the new reservoir and to install a new water main from the new reservoir to the present chlorinator building. If required, these funds could also be used to renew or acquire rights-of-way or easements to Route 110 from present chlorinator building. This appropriation to be contingent upon the receipt of at least an equal amount in federal funds.

**ARTICLE 19.** To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the following Town charges for the ensuing year: (1) Town Officers' Salaries; (2) Town Officers Expenses; (3) Election & Registration; (4) Municipal Court; (5) Town Hall & Other Buildings; (6) Retirement & Social Security; (7) Police Department; (8) Fire, Incl. Forest Fire; (9) Blister Rust & Care of Trees; (10) Planning & Zoning; (11) Insurance; (12) Civil Preparedness; (13) Damages & Legal Expenses; (14) Health Department, Hospital, Mental Health & Ambulance; (15) Vital Statistics; (16) Sewer Maintenance; (17) Dump Maintenance; (18) Town Maintenance—Summer; (19) Town Maintenance—Winter; (20) Town Road Aid; (21) Street Lighting; (22) General Expenses of Highway Department; (23) Street Maintenance; (24) Sidewalk Maintenance; (25) Public Library; (26) Old Age Assistance; (27) Aid to Permanently & Totally Disabled; (28) Town Poor; (29) Memorial Day & Veterans Assoc; (30) Parks & Playgrounds; (31) Senior Citizen Programs; (32) Water Maintenance; (33) North Country Council; (34) Cemeteries; (35) Advertising, Regional Assoc. & Town Meeting House; (36) Interest on Bonds; (37) Principal on Bonds; (38) Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the report for, design of, and construction of any sewage disposal or storm separation system and pass any vote relating thereto.

**ARTICLE 21.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, and accept aid, relative to disasters.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to establish a scale of discounts for the prepayment of real estate taxes. The scale of discounts to be as follows: 3% if paid on or before June 1, 1975; 2% if pad on or before August 1, 1975; and 1% if paid on or before October 1, 1975. Discount will be allowed on \$100. minimum payment.

**ARTICLE 23.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts in anticipation of taxes of the financial year. Such debts are incurred in order to pay current maintenance and operation expenses, and to issue notes therefor in accordance with the provisions of RSA 33:7.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to grant site plan review authority to the Planning Board in accordance with RSA 36:19a. This will provide the Town with an opportunity to review and approve or disapprove plans for non-residential development.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Building Inspector and fix his compensation, pursuant to RSA 156: 1-5.

ARTICLE 27. WHEREAS, the Town of Northumberland has adopted and is enforcing a Zoning Ordinance, and

WHEREAS, Article X of the aforesaid prohibits any person, firm or corporation from erecting, constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, improving, moving or demolishing any building or structure without first obtaining a separate building permit for each building or structure from the Building Inspector, and

WHEREAS, the Building Inspector must examine all plans and specifications for the proposed construction when application is made to him for a building permit.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Town Meeting of Northumberland as follows:

- 1. The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board amend their regulations pertaining to the flood hazard area to assure that (i) all proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage, (ii) all public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems are located, elevated, and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage, and (iii) adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and
- 2. The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board amend their regulations pertaining to the flood hazard area to require new or replacement water supply systems and/or sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood

waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding, pursuant to N.H. RSA 36:21.

ARTICLE 28. WHEREAS, certain areas of Northumberland are subject to periodic flooding from streams and rivers, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of the flood and/or mudslide hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to N.H. RSA 31, 36, 156, 156A,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Town Meeting hereby:

- 1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and
- 2. Vests the Town Manager with the responsibility, authority, and means to:
- (a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in Delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.
- (b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain.
- (c) Cooperate with Federal, State, and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify flood plain or mudslide areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plain in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
- (d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain management measures.
- 3. Appoints the Building Inspector to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.

4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required by law.

ARTICLE 31. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees, or other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 32. To transact any other business that may be legally brought before said meeting.

To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title III, Public Law 89-10, (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.
- To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for, to receive and expend in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U.S. Government and/or State Agencies.
- To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payments of the statutory obligations of the district.
- To transact any other business that may lawfully come before said meeting.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

There have been several significant developments at the Supervisory Union level since my last report.

The Union is now, for the first time, receiving some state support for the position of assistant superintendent.

A Union staff development committee has been working very effectively, under the leadership of Richard Merrill, to have the Union #58 plan completed and approved well before the July 1, 1975 deadline set by the State Board of Education.

The activities and progress of the Experimental Schools Program will be reviewed in a separate section by its director, Dr. Peters.

Our Union Board at its spring meeting last May adopted a resolution covering three specific areas of concern which is brief are as follows:

- (1) The education program should include a recognition of the values inherent in our American heritage. Students should become actively involved in patriotic exercises, the discussion and clarification of American values, and expressions of national sentiment through the use of the arts and humanities.
- (2) The perpetuation of moral standards commensurate with the highest ideals prevailing in our communities. We recognize the need for our youth to develop a respect for themselves and others and that it is important that these values and ideals find expression in our curriculum and school activities.
- (3) The establishment and maintenance of standards of behavior which provide direction and order for our young people as they grow from childhood and assume their place in the adult society.

One of our major thrusts has continued to be in the area of providing individual programs for children with special needs. We are utilizing the services provided by our own Union special education staff, as well as the Center for Exceptional Children in Berlin, the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Agency, Speech therapy through North Country Education Services, and the New Hampshire Vocational Rehabilitation Department.

Space continues to be one of our major problems. Following the resounding defeat of last year's building proposal the plant planning committee decided not to present a new proposal this year. We are currently leasing two classrooms at Saint Francis Hall (Kindergarten and Grade 2) and at the Methodist Church, one large room (Grade 2) and four small rooms for special education and remedial reading. It appears that next year we will need an additional section of kindergarten because of a projected large enrollment and will need additional space for this class.

The elementary programs are functioning very well despite these limitations of space.

### Elementary Program Developments

- 1. We are in our third year of our individualized basic reading program grades K-4. Grades 5 and 6 are to be implemented in 1975.
- 2. The staff has developed a curriculum guide for mathematics which identifies the scope and sequence of topics grades K-6.
- 3. New materials are being introduced in grades 1-3 for the teaching of health and safety.
- 4. With the assistance of the ESP project work is progressing in the language arts area to finalize a continuous, sequential program.

- 5. Career education concepts and lessons are being introduced with the help of the ESP coordinator.
- 6. Music and Art are on a shared basis with Stratford and Stark.
- 7. Physical Education classes, grades K-6, are available now by the utilization of Emergency Employment Act Personnel and the use of Saint Francis Hall.
- 8. North Country Education Services is also providing media materials, A-V equipment repair, a special education consultant, and speech therapy.

Lack of space is the most serious problem at the high school and has made it necessary to limit and cut back on some programs. In the seventh and eighth grade, science lab periods have been decreased, shop and home economics are available to only part of the junior high and we are not meeting the minimum standards for art and music. It has also been necessary to limit physical education to one semester a year.

There are seventeen junior and senior students enrolled in one-half day vocational programs at Berlin High School. Plans are well on the way to provide a building trades program for next year in cooperation with Stratford. Several students are also receiving work experience arranged by ESP.

The business department cooperative vocational-education program is also functioning very well and the office simulation program has received state-wide recognition as an outstanding model.

A full program of co-curricular activities is being maintained although scheduling the facilities is sometimes a problem because of the increasing demand of the various groups for time. Our projected total student enrollments for next year should increase slightly over the present 764 students.

There are many more activities, issues, and programs that I could bring to your attention but instead I recommend that you visit the schools and see them in operation.

Once again I extend sincere thanks to the staff, the students, and the citizens of Northumberland for the excellent cooperation and support which we have received throughout the year.

## Summary of ESP Activities For The Fall of 1974

### Adult Education

Courses were offered in Union 58 communities:

1. Typing; 2. Upholstering; 3. Oil Painting; 4. Ceramics; 5. Crocheting.

### Career/Vocational Education

In grades K-6, a career awareness program has been developed. This student program includes the "Bread and Butterflies" film series.

Union 58 students in grades 7-8 have been involved in career guidance sessions. High school students have been placed at work area sites.

Mini courses have been offered to students in Union 58 schools: 1. Arts and crafts; 2. Crocheting; 3. Fly tying; 4. Surveying; 5. Architectural drawing; 6. Making outdoor education equipment.

### Language Arts

Teachers are currently involved in writing a skills-oriented curriculum guide for grades 1-12.

Remedial and functional reading programs are currently being developed for students in grades 7-9.

This past fall, the Scott Foresman reading program was introduced into the Stratford School.

Students in grades 1-6 have been tested—to identify reading deficiencies.

The Sony Video Rover II VTR equipment is being used in Union 58 schools.

### **Outdoor Education**

An environmental education program has been developed for grades K-6.

As part of this program, students have been involved in field trips, have had guest speakers visit their classrooms, and have conducted nature studies.

Last fall, nearly eighty students in grades 7-12 went on weekend day trip hikes to places such as Unknown Pond, Percy Peaks, and Zealand Falls.

# SUMMARY PROGRAM OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

### 1974 (37th Year)

Your Region Association during the year 1974 was active in several cooperative programs. They included the White Mts. Center for Music and the Arts, an experimental mass highway transportation system, and the White Mts. '74 summer advertising program.

With respect to the Center (formerly called the White Mountains Art and Music Festival), your Region Association has contributed substantial in-kind services. As a board member and secretary, your Association's Executive Director handles many of the day to day details for the Center. In addition, the Association provided office space for the Center during May and June and was responsible for much publicity. Furthermore, the Association's secretary was on loan to the Center, half-time, for May and June.

Your Region Association provided assistance in setting up and implementing an experimental bus system. Communities served by the 10-week summer system included Berlin, Gorham, Milan, Groveton, Lancaster, Whitefield, Littleton, Franconia, Bethlehem, Twin Mountain, Jefferson, Randolph, Conway, North Conway and Jackson. During the first half of 1975, it is hoped a federal proposal will be approved which will permit the experiment to continue and to provide service to other communities.

Your Region Association was a major participant in White Mountains '74 cooperative advertising campaign designed to bolster the economy of the recreation industry this past summer. Your Region Association appropriated \$2500 to participate in the program. In addition to investing \$2500, your Association answered all written and telephoned inquiries which were generated by the advertising. As a result your Association responded to those inquiries with some 3500 vacation planning kits. Those participating included the White Mts. Attractions Association, the White Mts. Center for Music and the Arts, the New England Regional Commission, the Governor's office and Waumbek Village.

Other activities and projects of your Region Association include: participation in a newly created N. H. Travel Council, annual solicitation for the two accommodations brochures, distribution of WMRA folders, sponsorship of a conference on proposed wilderness areas in the White Mountain National Forest, solicitation for business memberships, presentation of 4-H awards and certificates, subscriptions to National 4-H magazines for group leaders in the three northern counties, assistance at the N. H. information booth at the Springfield Exposition to promote travel in northern N. H., the writing of several letters to the N. H. Congressional delegation and others protesting the proposed closing of numerous campgrounds

and picnic areas in the White Mt. National Forest, also the writing of letters to many of the same group protesting the low priority tourism and recreation was to receive under a fuel allocation program, financial contributions to the restoration of the Bedell Covered Bridge, to the Mount Washington Observatory (in memory of Joe Dodge), and to the White Mts. Museum of Forest History. The WMRA also has helped out on some publicity for the proposed museum as well as some modest fund raising.

In addition, earlier in the year, the WMRA surveyed some thirty gasoline stations each week. The information on gasoline supplies was then relayed to the Dept. of Resources and Economic Development where it was used to aid out-of-state travelers.

Finally, your executive director wrote numerous news releases, two newsletters, some special articles for publications, and spoke on several radio programs in the region.

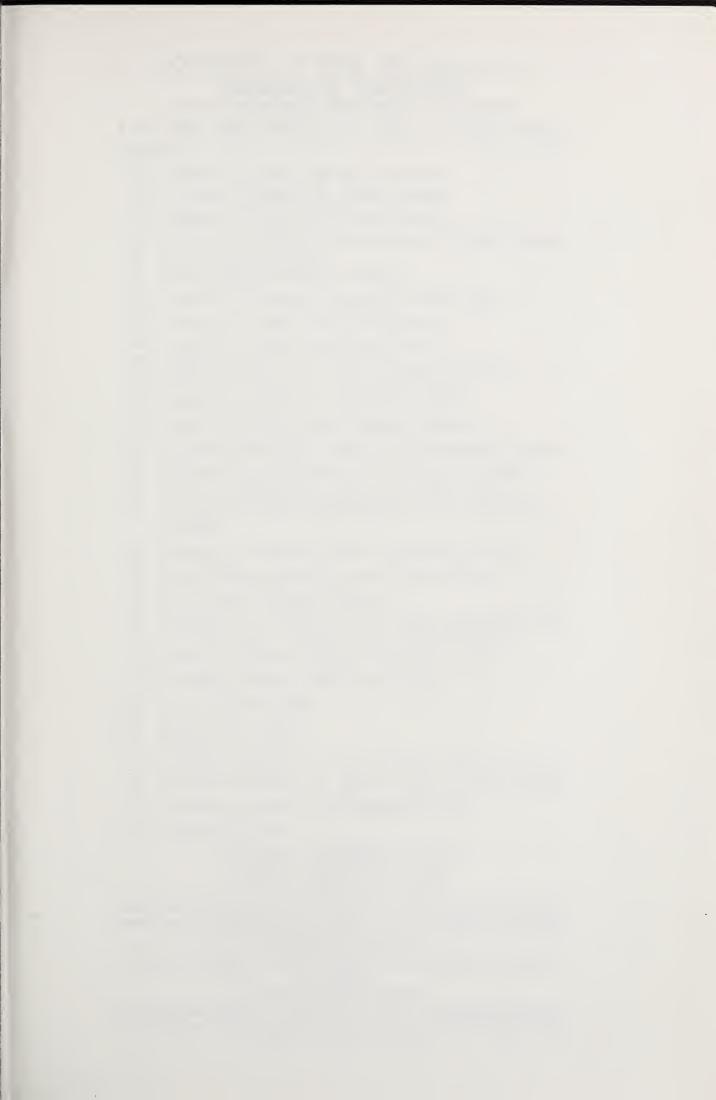
Answered 5,942 inquiries and wrote 101 personal letters.

Planned activities for 1975 are: (1) investigate the possibility of helping to provide regularly scheduled air service to Whitefield and Berlin; (2) publish a new quarterly magazine for the region; (3) modernize and revise the White Mountains Map; (4) publish the Where to Stay and the New Hampshire Accommodations and Dining directories; (5) participate in the joint experimental rural highway and transportation project; (6) continue the Association's work with the White Mountains Center for Music and the Arts; (7) explore further the possibility of preparing and publishing a Christmas tree dealers vendor list; (8) participate in the Springfield, Mass. Exposition; (9) continue to answer some 6,000 inquiries generated through advertising; (10) distribute WMRA folders to information booths around the region and to some State Highway Rest areas; (11) continue the Association's efforts on behalf of the White Mountains Museum of Forest History; (12) continue writing news releases about White Mountains Region Association's activities and help promote other regional events; (14) keep abreast of all important legislation that pertains to the region during the next legislative session; (15) continue to participate actively in the newly created New Hampshire Travel Council; (16) continue to publish the Bulletin of Lodging Inquiries and Real Estate Bulletin.
