

2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment numbered Article II, Section B, Paragraph 2; General Provisions Section C; and Article III Section A, Paragraph I, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Ordinances.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Coe-Brown Northwood Academy in said Northwood on Saturday, the 10th day of March, next at 1:00 of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for interest on same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,950.00 for the Northwood Public Library.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 for Recreation, Parks and Playgrounds.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the care of Cemeteries.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Highways.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,750.00 for the purpose of Street Lighting.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$692.17 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the States share to be \$4,614.47.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$338.00 for the Concord Hospital.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300.00 for Ambulance Service, to be paid to the Barnstead Center Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,698.00 for the Town's per capita share of the Rural District Health Council.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,450.00 for the purpose of supporting the North-wood Community Action Program.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of increasing the Highway Construction Machinery Capital Reserve Fund.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 to support the Northwood Bi-Centennial Committee.

15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$10,000.00 for new Machinery and Maintenance of the Town Dump and authorize the withdrawal of \$5,000.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 with the balance to be raised by Taxation.

16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1,250.00 for a four band Police Car Radio with scaner and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

17. To see if the Town will vote to leave the sum of \$5,217.00 in the bank, for the purpose of re-modeling and enlarging the present Town Hall and Offices, together with future Revenue Sharing Funds as voted at succeeding Town Meetings, and allowed under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept a new Right-of-Way from Carl Wallman for the purpose of easing and re-aligning two curves now existing in road by his home in exchange for the right of way now owned by the Town.

19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of R.S.A. Chapter 76, 15-A which provides for the semi-annual collection of taxes in certain Towns and Cities.

20. To see if the Town will vote to change the price of a cemetery lot in the Town Cemetery to \$300.00, \$200.00 of which to be placed in trust for the perpetual care of the lot and \$100.00 to be paid to the Town for the purchase of the land.

21. We, the undersigned Taxpayers and Residents of Northwood, N. H. respectfully submit this petition for the purpose of establishing and acquiring nominal road maintenance on a recurring annual basis for that portion of the access road at the south end of Pleasant Lake within the Town limits of Northwood, N. H. The desired maintenance is primarily for the purpose of maintaining this road passable for adequate and required fire and police protection, as well as for normal public use. (By Petition)

22. To see if the Town will vote to lay out a highway from the area known as Gulch Mt. Acres along the old Gulf Roan and through the woods to the Winding Hill Road. (Entered by Request) 23. We the undersigned residents of Northwood, do petition the Town of Northwood, N. H. to return to the organization known as the Harvey Lake Improvement Association the four (4) parcels of land as indicated on the original Harvey Lake Estate map attached to this petition forthwith. (By Petition)

1. The following are parcel No. 1 -that abuts Raymond Howe property on the southerly side known as Lot #1.

2. The parcel No. 2 - commonly known as the Public Beach and abuts to Charles Faulkner property on the Northerly side known as Lot #14 and Guilfred Boisvert property on the southerly side known as Lot #13.

3. The parcel No. 3 – as indicated on the map that abuts to the Harold Johnson property on southerly side known as Lot #27.

4. The parcel No. 4 - as indicated on the Harvey Lake Estate map that abuts to the Lewis McIntosh property on the northerly side known as Lot #45 and extends to the southerly side of the brook.

5. We the undersigned do agree to give the right-of-way to the following abutters known as George V. Linscott property, Allen and Kenneth Barton property and any other parties who have deed rights within the original Harvey Lake Estate map boundaries. (By Petition)

24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell property of the Town acquired by Tax Collectors Deed as a result of Tax Sale.

25. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Shoe Shop to be relocated with a foundation on the Town property and to remain in its new location until removed by vote of the Town.

26. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL

January 1, 1972 – December 31, 1972

The Rural District Health Council is continuing to provide comprehensive health services to the member towns: Northwood, Nottingham, Deerfield, Barrington, Strafford, New Durham and Middleton. The nurses provide visiting nurse services as ordered by the physicians, and physical, occupational and speech therapy is available through a contractural agreement with the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center. There is an active Family Planning program for anyone interested.

The Well Child Clinics continue to be a very important part of the program. Monthly clinics were held at the Deerfield Community Center for preschool children from Northwood, Nottingham and Deerfield with Dr. William Whitney of Exeter as attending physician. The New Durham Community Center is the site for a monthly clinic for preschool children of New Durham and Middleton with Dr. Wendy Tinklepaugh of Amherst, N. H. attending. In August, a new monthly clinic was initiated at the Barrington Congregational Church for preschool children of Barrington and Strafford with Dr. Tinklepaugh in attendance. Physical examinations and immunizations are done at each of these clinics.

In August, Mrs. Madeline Sullivan moved from the area and Mrs. Ardala Houle has been employed to fill the vacancy. Miss Arlene Thorne continues in the program with a dedication known to all who have the privilege of knowing her. These two nurses provide excellent care for their patients and their spirit of cooperation is a great factor in the continuing success of the Rural District Health Council.

Recently, the towns of Farmington and Milton have expressed interest in joining the Rural District Health Council. This is to be acted upon at their town meetings. The Council representatives are also investigating the possibility of locating the office in one of the member towns and establishing the agency independent of the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center. With the continued expansion of the Council, the coming year could prove to be a busy one for all involved in the program. The Rural District Health Council has been supported by the funds contributed by the towns at a rate of \$1.00 per capita, a state grant and fees for service.

NORTHWOOD COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM REPORT 1972

On March 1972, the town of Northwood voted to sponsor, for the third consecutive year, a summer recreation program for its youth. This was a continuation of a program introduced by the Spaulding Potter Trust Fund in 1970. The program, operating under the direction of the Northwood Community Action Program, provided an educational-recreational adventure for the youth of our community.

The prime purpose was to provide the youth with creative and constructive use of their leisure hours.

Hired as director was Mr. James O. Breen; Assistant Directors, Mrs. Sharon Walton and Miss Susan Eldridge. In addition, the Board of Directors were fortunate enough to secure the services of Linda Allen, Francis Downs, Priscilla Downs, Patricia Emerson and Arthur Nutter who were employed by the Rockingham County Neighborhood Youth Corps at no cost to the town.

The program utilized the Northwood Elementary School and operated Monday thru Friday, June 12 thru August 11, 9 A.M. to 2 P.M. A total of 144 children were registered with an average daily attendance of 72 children. A bus, driven by Mrs. Grace Parsons, was hired to transport the children to school in the morning hours. It is believed that the bus service extended the opportunity of participation to many youth who otherwise might not have been able to attend. Throughout the course of the summer a variety of physical, cultural and social activities were offered. Among the most popular were field trips through the State of New Hampshire which included a trip to Benson's Wild Animal Farm, the Merrimack Fish Hatchery, Polar Caves in Rumney, Bear Brook State Park in Allenstown and a trip to historic Salem, Massachusetts by the older children. In addition, CAP participated in the Northwood Recreation Commission's Red Cross Swimming Program where we recorded 66 youths in attendance.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Lest We Forget – It Can Happen Here

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative Statetown program. The Town Forest Fire Warden appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

NORTHWOOD CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Northwood Conservation Commission has met regularly throughout the year and has held many discussions regarding the areas in which the Commission should devote its attention.

On November 4, 1972, three members of the Commission, George Linscott, Noel Perkins and David White, attended the Seventh Annual Meeting and Field Trip of New Hampshire Municipal Conservation Commissions, held in Conway, New Hampshire. The meeting was sponsored by the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions and its theme was "Solid Waste Disposal and Community Recycling." The members viewed, with much interest, Conway's open pit incinerator and landfill recycling depot, and also heard reports of home town projects covering such subjects as soil and land use maps, town forests, scenic roadways, questionnaires, wetland surveys, swimming or picnic areas, nature trails, sending children to conservation camps, roadside cleanup and beautification.

Our Chairman, David White, was appointed a member of the Land-Use Subcommittee of The Northwood Citizens' Study Committee. The Conservation Commission has kept abreast of the fine work this Citizens Study Committee has done, and wishes to commend them at this time for giving us much valuable material.

There are also three students being educated at other schools at district expense because of physical, emotional, or intellectual handicaps. The district liability does not exceed statutory requirements.

Staff members new to the school this year are Mrs. Pamela Thayer, Mrs. Mary E. Brand, Mr. David Hinman, Mr. John Rowe, Mrs. Eleanor Byrne, and Mrs. Arlene Bassett. Miss Durkin replaced Mrs. Parks who resigned after school started. All of the teachers employed, except one, had had experience in other districts before coming to Northwood. This tends to indicate the continuing willingness of the School Board and the District to improve its staff.

The decision of the District to offer salaries competitive with those of nearby districts has been instrumental in enabling the Board to secure good faculty replacements. However, it seems wise to point out that in spite of the President's efforts to curb economic inflation, the process continues. The District may thus anticipate that there will continue to be pressure to increase salaries and fringe benefits to keep pace.

As reported a year ago, the enrollment of pupils in the Northwood School continues to increase. Since 1970, the enrollment has increased by 53 students, enough to fill two classrooms. Last year, space was at a premium, and with the continued increase in the number of pupils, there is no decrease in this need. It would be prudent for the Board to provide additional classroom space with the concurrence of the District. Admittedly, building is expensive, but the District must find some solution to the space problem. Possible answers might be the extended school day, the four-quarter school year, or some other method of providing for the additional pupils.

In connection with the space problem, the increased number of pupils has created a problem in transportation. At present, this has been solved by adding an additional bus to the system.

As enrollment increases, it is obvious that other supports must be increased, such as additional staff members, books, supplies, and services. The cost of building is really quite small when one considers that these other costs continue from year to year and do not end, as with a bond issue, when the building payment is complete. The decision of the District to install accoustical ceilings in the class rooms merits commendation. This improvement has made a much more favorable educational environment for the children.

At the time of this writing, the School Boards of Northwood, Barrington, Strafford, and Nottingham are meeting in an effort to find solution to their common problem of providing for children with educational handicaps. It is hoped that a mutually advantageous program can be developed cooperatively by using funds available under the terms of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, Title I. It is hoped that a means may be found to help most children with educational handicaps by employing a learning disabilities specialist to do analytical testing and to instruct the regular classroom teachers in dealing with problems. This will make it possible, if successful, for these pupils to stay in their own districts and with their own friends, rather than being sent to schools outside their home district. Admittedly, such a program will not be beneficial to all handicapped children and some will still be better served by assignment to other schools.

The cost of public education is not diminishing. Although education at public expense is generally looked upon as an investment in the future, it is the hope of the undersigned that other sources of support may be found. State and Federal support of local educational efforts has been very weak, yet the local communities have continued to tax themselves heavily. It is possible that the implications of the recent much discussed court decisions in favor of spreading the burden of educational support more equitably may be realized soon. Should this occur, it might be possible to expand local programs somewhat in order that the pupils from the poorer districts may start their economic lives in a more competitive position. There has been new support programs for the municipal governments, such as the Business Profits Tax replacing the Stock-in-Trade tax, and the Federal Revenue Sharing program. Hopefully, there will be programs which will help the school district developed in the near future.

In completing this report, the undersigned would like to express their appreciation of the cooperation which they have received from local citizens, School Board Members, students, and staff members. Your continued cooperation and support is earnestly solicited in our attempts to improve educational opportunities for the children of Northwood.

Status of E.S.E.A. Title I Funding for 1973-74, Northwood

As most of you may know, the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, which is the source of "Title I" funds, is presently being operated under a continuing resolution due to the President's veto of the most recent H.E.W. bill last fall. As a result, there has been no increase in the amount of funding available over that of previous years. It is expected that there will continue to be appropriations for E.S.E.A. for another year.

If the District is to continue receiving Title I funds, there are some conditions which must be met. What follows is an attempt to outline the conditions which appear to be most critical to the district.

If a Title I program has been funded for three years by federal monies, the district has the responsibility of determining the value of the program to the district. If the project has been successful and is valuable to the district, it should then be retained and supported by the system. If it has proven to be marginal or of little value, it should be abandoned and supported neither locally or federally. In either case, at the end of the maximum three year support, the local district should develop a new program to receive federal funding.

The other factor of immediate importance is the following, quoted from Volume V, Number 1, of the publication of the New Hampshire Title I Office in Concord.

... this office would no longer be able to approve what was termed "non-cooperating cooperative projects." The implications of this move are several. Whereas, in the past it has been possible for the several school districts in a cooperative project to conduct separate and distinct Title I activities, this will no longer be possible. It, therefore, becomes obvious that when the smaller districts join together to form a cooperative project, it will have to operate on the basis of shared services for disadvantaged children. . . .

... Additionally, we will be seeking justification related specifically to the local situation explaining why any program of less than \$10,000.00 is not being combined....*

Therefore, starting in November of 1972, the districts of Barrington, Northwood, Nottingham, and Strafford, began a series of several meetings of their School Boards in an effort to cooperate in the interests of disadvantaged children. As a result of this effort and the interest and support of the Special Education Division of the State Department of Education, the amount of funding from outside sources to support the program for the educational handicapped has doubled.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Northwood School Board and citizens of the town:

In the past year, the Northwood Elementary School has experienced a year of growth academically as well as in student growth.

Our Junior High program realized a tremendous increase in students, jumping from an anticipated enrollment of 58 to an actual enrollment of 72. This increase put us far over the suggested teacher-pupil ratio that is recommended for Junior High students.

The remainder of the school was heavily affected by the increase, also. We went from a June enrollment of 286 to a September enrollment of 324.

With these problems in mind and looking forward to another increase next year, additional space should be our major concern for the coming year. The present facility will not handle the students we have at present disregarding any increase in the coming year.

Even though the conditions were crowded, we were very pleased with our ungraded program. We feel that students who are experiencing success will be better citizens of the school in every way.

We introduced our new reading program which is completely ungraded and found that many youngsters who were considered serious reading problems were advancing well in this program. Much credit in this area must be given to Mrs. Brand, our Reading Co-ordinator.

The library received more federal and local help, and we now are well on our way to having a fully certified library which is a great asset to all students from Grades 1 through 8. The art program was introduced to our electives section for the first time and was well received by the student body. Mrs. Byrne was the instructor and opened many new avenues of creativity to youngsters who sometimes do not excell in other areas. Typing, woodworking, Home Economics were continued with increased materials which benefited the elective program a great deal.

The music program, directed by Mr. Forest, increased to over 50 students who took advantage of the opportunity to learn how to play the many musical instruments offered in this program.

The new staff members who joined our faculty this year were as follows: Mrs. Arlene Bassett, Level I Teachers' Aide; Mrs. Pamela Thayer, Level II; Miss Sheila Durkin, Level VII; Mr. David Hinman, Level VI; and Mr. Philip Gross, Math 5-6-7-8.

Every year at Graduation, we are pleased with the quality of the student that leaves our school. We hope that the lessons they have learned at school, not only in the academic areas but other areas such as respect and discipline, will follow them through the years.

In closing, may I again thank the citizens of Northwood for their continued support of education in the Town of Northwood. And a special thanks to the Northwood School Board who have unselfishly given of their time and energy to make the Northwood Elementary School a facility of which we can all be proud.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT Northwood, N. H. 1971-1972

To the Superintendent:

The health program for the year 1971-1972 was carried out in the usual manner with an annual physical inspection of each student by the nurse. When defects were noted, the appropriate referral and followup were made.

The students received the benefit of preventative dental care through classroom visits by a hygienist sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Public Health. One hundred and forty seven children responded to the cleaning and flouride clinic held during December, January and February. Seven students received corrective dental care through the Northwood matching funds program sponsored by the Northwood P.T.A.

The Heaf Test was offered to all school personnel. A total of seventeen adults were tested. Thirty-six children were registered for school entry at the pre-school clinic in May. First aid was offered to approximately 137 students, 31 home visits were made, and 11 ill students were transported home by the nurse. Several students were transported to pediatric clinics during the year.

One faculty member completed the Red Cross Multi Media First Aid Course taught by the school nurse. Throughout the year weekly health education classes were taught to students in grade 5. The 6th grade students completed a Johnson and Johnson First Aid Course.

The following films were shown in conjunction with the health program for the year:

dental health	smoking
first aid	personal health
nutrition	drug abuse

The school nurse also spoke to the Extension Club in September and attended the monthly Rural Health Clinics in Deerfield.

During the 1971 legislative session the following health requirements were passed.

"All children shall be immunized prior to school entrance according to the current recommendations of the State Health Agency".

The immunizations listed below must be completed prior to school entry.

- 1. Measles Vaccine regular
- 2. Oral Trivalent Polio Vaccine (Sabin)
- 3. Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus
- 4. Rubella (German Measles Vaccine)

All children shall be examined prior to school entrance to detect symptoms of Tuberculosis. All children shall have a routine physical examination by a physician before school entry.

At the Feb. 1972 meeting, the Northwood School Board adopted the above policy relative to Immunization Requirements and Examinations for school entrants.

I would like to express my thanks to the Superintendent, School Board Members, teachers and parents for their cooperation and support during the past year.
