ABOUT THE COVER—This high altitude photograph of the western two thirds of Plainfield was furnished by the U.S. Army Cold Regions Research and Engineering Laboratory. The photograph shows virtually all of the land area of the town which comprised the original layout by the Royal Governor to the proprietors of Plainfield—an area six miles square. The portion of the town to the east was annexed from Grantham in 1856. The white patches which appear are clouds beneath the photo plane's camera, and the shadows they cast are the black patches just to the right and above. The Connecticut River forms the west boundary; the line roughly north and south through the middle is the New England Power Co. transmission line from Wilder Dam to Bellows Falls; village areas and crop land appear in light shades. The photograph was taken in 1973.

Any resident may use a minor portion of his or her dwelling, outbuildings, and/or a portion of the homestead premises for a 'home occupation' which is customary in residential areas and does not change the character thereof. The establishment and continuance of a 'home occupation' shall be subject to the following conditions:

- (1) Such use shall be conducted on the homestead and only by the inhabitants thereof.
- (2) There shall be no advertising display or other indications of home occupation on the premises except a customary sign or nameplate for identification purposes only, such sign not to exceed two square feet in area.
- (3) A 'home occupation' shall provide additional offstreet parking area reasonably adequate to accommodate the needs created by the home occupation. Such parking shall be not less than one space for each 300 square feet of floor area devoted to the 'home occupation.' Such parking shall be provided on the lot utilized for the 'home occupation.'
- (4) For further requirements and definitions, see Section 8.7 of Article VIII." Article VIII Section 8.7:

"Home Occupation: An accessory use of a service character that is incidental and secondary to the use of the homestead for residential purposes, and does not change the residential character thereof. 'Home occupations' shall include the production and sale of home grown agricultural products and such customary uses as workrooms for craftsmen, artists, tutors, beauticians, dressmakers, milliners, photographers, cabinet-makers, radio repairmen, as well as incidental work and storage areas in connection with off-premises trades such as those of builder, carpenter, electrician, painter, blacksmith, plumber, tree surgeon, or landscape gardner. The business of selling merchandise, supplies or products other than incidental retail sales in connection with other permitted uses shall not be considered a home occupation use."

Question 16: Do you favor amending Article III Section 3.6 and the Mobile Home Ordinance Section 2.3 by deleting each section and substituting in its place the following: (yes) (no)

"Section 3.6 Travel Trailers, Occupancy and Storage. Camping trailers (whether of the truck-mounted or towed varieties) or motor coaches may be occupied for a period of 14 consecutive days in the Town of Plainfield without a special permit hereunder. For a period of longer than 14 consecutive days, a special permit authorizing occupancy must be issued by the Zoning Administrator. Such special permit shall be for a period not to exceed 90 days in any 12-month period. Camping trailers or motor coaches may be garaged or stored on premises in the Town occupied by the person in charge of the trailer or coach."

"2.3 Mobile homes that are not occupied as residence may be temporarily parked or stored in the Town of Plainfield only as a special exception hereunder pursuant to prior permit issued by the Board of Adjustment and subject to such terms and conditions as the Board of Adjustment may find necessary in order to safeguard the purposes of this ordinance."

"Section 4.2 Combination of Contiguous Lots. When two or more lots or parcels of land, either of which lacks adequate area and/or dimension to satisfy the requirements of the

zoning district in which they are located, are contiguous and are held in one ownership for a period of more than three years, they shall be considered to be one zoning lot or parcel for the purposes of the Ordinance."

ARTICLE IV: To see if the town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the following sums for use as setoffs against operating budget appropriations: Welfare, \$9,000; Libraries, \$9,000; Visiting Nurse, \$2,000; Ambulance, \$1,500; Landfill and solid waste removal, \$5,500; Conservation, \$1,000.

ARTICLE V: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a dump truck, and to authorize the selectmen to sell or trade the 1969 International dump truck now owned by the town and apply the proceeds of such sale or trade to the purchase price of the new truck.

Report of the Selectmen

The most significant area of progress in the affairs of Plainfield's town government in 1976 was improvement in the town's overall financial condition. While the town remained in a debt position at the close of business on Dec. 31, the significant reduction in the town deficit compared to a year earlier is a good sign, and barring any more disasters such as the floods of 1973, the town should be able to return to firmer footing in the near future.

Still to be resolved is the matter of the promised aid for flood repairs from the federal government. The town is seeking some \$53,000 as yet unpaid, and the selectmen have negotiated with state officials who handle damage assistance claims without much progress. The person in charge of the town's claim promised action when the selectmen, road agent and town lawyer met with him in March, but he was later fired by the governor, so the town had to start over again. At one point the town was offered a "deal" to take 12 cents on the dollar and settle, but this was rejected, and the selectmen are ready to go to court if necessary to collect what was promised the town for work carried out in good faith.

In 1976 the town accomplished a number of highway improvement projects, including construction of a new segment of Center of Town Road to replace the bridge at Mill Village, repair and improvement of Whitaker Road and numerous small improvement and maintenance projects. Looking ahead to 1977, the selectmen plan to stress work on maintenance projects, with special emphasis on improving ditches and drainage. The selectmen have appointed a new road agent, Thomas Bircher, to succeed Arthur Thompson, who had held the job for five very successful and productive years.

Much time was expended in 1976 on legal matters, and this aspect of Plainfield's public administration seems certain to continue to take up a large part of the selectmen's time in the months and years ahead. Meanwhile the volume of paperwork and routine business keeps growing, taxing further the parttime system of town government that we have.

The selectmen wish to express thanks to everyone who assisted them in conduct of town affairs in 1976 and hope people will continue to help them in 1977.

Report of the Finance Committee

The Finance Committee met at the Plainfield School on Bonner Road on Thursday, January 20, 1977 with the School Board, and on Thursday, January 27, 1977 with the Board of Selectmen, for the purpose of reviewing their respective budgets for the year 1977/1978.

The proposed budget for the Plainfield School District for the year 1977/78 is \$504,404, an increase of \$33,038, or 7% over the previous year. The most significant increases were: Transportation up \$10,279; In-State Tuitions up \$9,605; Health Insurance up \$6,834; Salaries up \$5,487.

The Selectmen's budget for 1977 totals \$314,731. Revenues to be raised by property taxes \$158,731, an increase of \$23,906 or 18% over the previous year. Significant increases were:

Police up \$2,500; Town Maintenance up \$2,000; Fuel and Oil up \$1,000; Debt Service up \$11,500.

The Selectmen advised that the only Special Article to appear on the Warrant this year which will require expenditure of funds will be to replace a 1969 truck, requiring a \$5,000 expenditure for 1977 and the balance to be financed by issue of notes over a three-year period in the amount of \$18,000.

During the past year The Finance Committee met with the Selectmen and School Board quarterly. It is suggested that this policy continue in an effort to give all concerned a better understanding of the complexities, particularly relating to the financial problems in the operations of the town.

Report of the Planning Board

1976 was another busy year for the members of the Planning Board. In addition to our regular monthly meetings on the third Monday of each month, the Board held eight special meetings, including meetings with members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, town counsel, and interested residents. A total of 12 public hearings were held during the year on such matters as scenic roads, historic zones and proposed zoning changes. In addition, there were hearings relating to 18 proposed major and minor subdivisions. The Board allowed a total of 11 minor subdivisions and 4 major subdivisions. We also made a total of 11 recommendations to the ZBA concerning special exceptions and made several recommendations to the Moderator concerning appointments as members and alternatives to serve on the ZBA.

Throughout the year many landowners dropped in for informal discussions of proposed subdivision plans. Many of these continued on to make formal applications, while 4 or 5 others did not. The Board would like to take this opportunity to encourage individuals having questions or who are contemplating the subdivision of their land to come to one of our regular meetings to discuss their plans before any great amount of time or money is spent. It is the feeling of the Board that better communication will almost certainly result in smoother processing of applications as well as fewer hard feelings on the part of all concerned.

A large share of the Board's time throughout the year was spent in working on proposals to amend the present zoning ordinance, which has not undergone any major changes since its enactment at the 1974 town meeting. The proposed amendments include several minor "housekeeping" changes as well as some significant changes in content. All of these changes have grown out of the Board's experience over the past few years in implimenting the ordinance in its present form. Also, some major additions to the "permitted uses" and "special exceptions" listed in Schedule A are being considered. These items will be presented to the voters at town meeting in a new format allowing voters to single out individual types of uses zone by zone. It is the hope of the Planning Board that every voter will take the time to understand the nature of these items and will carefully consider their impact, so that the outcome of the vote, which will become part of the ordinance, will properly reflect the views of the majority of the voters in the Town of Plainfield.

The Board wishes to express its appreciation to Sylvia Hayes, Wallace Pickering, Marjorie Spalding, Stephen Taylor and Howard Zea who served on the special committee looking into the creation of historic districts. A word of thanks is also due to all the concerned citizens who attended various hearings to offer their views and testimony as well as to keep themselves abreast of changes being made or proposed. Special recognition must go to the two members of the Board who left us this year; Louis Houser, who served as member ex-officio for so many

years, and John Stephenson, whose service included terms as vice-chairman and chairman. Finally, we welcome Stephen Taylor and Joseph Longacre who have filled these two positions.

Report of the Board of Adjustment

On Jan. 12, 1976 Raymond Sanville was denied special exception to construct and operate an auto repair shop on High Street in Meriden.

At a special Hearing held Feb. 21, 1976 the Town of Plainfield entered into a legal agreement with Sol Brandstatter to allow him to operate Vernon's Mobile Home Park at the expanded level of 18 mobile home sites. The agreement was signed by H. Fenton Smith and the Plainfield Selectmen on March 8, 1976.

A request by Stanley Jenks to operate a Construction Service business on his property in the Village Residential Zone in Plainfield was denied at a Hearing held March 8, 1976. At the same meeting Henry Therrien, Jr. was granted a one-month permit to hang a 2X3 foot sign advertising his Model Home Business.

At an April 12, 1976 Hearing Henry Therrien, Jr. was granted a permit to allow him to sell and display homes and home carpeting at his residence in the Village Residential Zone.

On May 10, 1976 the Singing Hills Christian Fellowship, Inc. was granted a permit to allow the temporary location of up to five camping trailers on their property for a 90 day period beginning June 20, 1976.

At the same meeting Stanley Jenks was denied a Special exception to conduct a retail business concerned with the sale of construction products, goods and equipment on his property because the proposed use would adversely affect property values in the adjacent area.

On June 30, 1976 Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Joslyn, Jr. were granted a variance to allow the construction of an addition to their home with less than the required side lot dimensions and to exceed the maximum lot coverage.

At a hearing on Sept. 20, 1976 re Stanley Jenks, the Board of Adjustment agreed that prior to the adoption of the present ordinance there was some use of the Jenks' property for the storage of construction equipment. The Board resolved that utilization of the property for the storage of heavy equipment to an extent in excess of that in existence on the effective date of the Ordinance is prohibited.

A request of Blair Wood on behalf of Mrs. Joyce Wiley for a rehearing on the Stanley Jenks case was denied on Oct. 11, 1976.

On Nov. 8, 1976 the Board approved the transfer of the existing Mobile Home Park Permit of Sol Brandstatter et al to Roland Raiche DBA "In Town Mobile Home Park" under section 4.2 (h) of the Zoning Ordinance.

Health Officer Report

A total of 51 inspections, conferences and site reviews were performed during 1976.

These included 6 system approvals, 2 rejections for layouts not in accordance with the State approved plans. These were corrected and the systems approved after repairing and reinspection.

Four sets of approved plans were received from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, down from 18 sets received in 1975.

One well was declared unfit for drinking by the State and the owner was advised by mail that the State required an owner to supply acceptable drinking water to a tenant.

Report of Overseer of Welfare

Plainfield's Board of Selectmen in 1976 adopted comprehensive guidelines for administration of local public assistance programs. These guidelines were originally prepared by a task force of state and local welfare administrators, attorneys and other officials led by the New Hampshire Municipal Assn. They were drawn up in response to U.S. District Court action in the town of Raymond, and meet the court's requirements for uniformity and fairness under the constitution and statutes.

Thus Plainfield welfare applicants now must complete a detailed application questionnaire, are given written notice of the welfare overseer's decision on their application, have the right to appeal all overseer decisions and be subject to formal procedures for administering grants.

All of this is to protect the recipient from unfair or unreasonable treatment at the hands of local officials, although in Plainfield's case it often means much less flexibility and prompt handling of the day-to-day difficulties of the indigent. Copies of the guidelines for administration of Plainfield's local assistance program may be examined by any citizen at the town office or at the home of the overseer of public welfare.

Through the year 1976 the town assisted an average of four families and two individuals each month. As usual, the majority of welfare costs were attributable to illness, loss of employment and other misfortune over which the individual recipients had no control. The town now automatically places liens on the real property, if any, of welfare recipients to insure repayment of grant funds advanced when their individual circumstances improve, but the majority of welfare recipients in Plainfield don't own real property.

A major cost to the town in 1976 was a court order directing the town to pay for the maintenance costs of an institutionalized child. This situation is one in which state officials simply hand down an order and the town has to pay the cost, however large.

Here is the procedure under which a typical application for local assistance is processed:

- 1. The needy person contacts the overseer of welfare and states his or her situation and needs.
- 2. The overseer attempts to provide for immediate needs at once, such as through issuance of a food order for groceries or guaranteeing payment for terminated oil delivery service.
- 3. The applicant is given a detailed questionnaire on which to list employment, assets, family data and cash needs.
- 4. The overseer verifies the information given by the applicant and then renders a written decision as to whether the case will be accepted as a town charge. A written statement of assistance limits is given the applicant if accepted.
- 5. The applicant is directed at once to the food stamp bureau of the state Division of Welfare in Claremont to initiate an application for food stamps. The applicant is also referred

to the Division of Welfare caseworker if it appears he or she may be eligible for a state categorical assistance program such as AFDC.

6. The case is reviewed by the overseer each week, usually through personal interview. Once the case is closed out, a written notice of termination is given the recipient.

The overseer and the other selectmen make every effort to assist welfare recipients in searching for employment, medical care, psychiatric treatment and any other service or help in restoring them to self-sufficiency.

In closing, thanks are extended to the local clergy, school officials, business people and citizens who have assisted in many ways in administering the town of Plainfield's welfare program in the past year.

Meriden Fire Department Report

The Meriden Fire Department has completed its first full year in our new house (Harold (Pete) Pringle Memorial Fire Station).

We are happy to report that we had no serious structural fires or fire losses in the town this year.

We responded to three chimney fires, one false alarm, one automobile fire, one brush fire and one tree struck by lightning. Meriden Engine 1 and Engine 2 also responded to two calls on the Plainfield side of town. Our Tanker made one mutual aid run to a Lebanon house fire. Engine 1 also responded and stood by at the Cornish train wreck. Our Engine 1 covered the town of Cornish while Cornish assisted the Claremont Fire Department at a large fire one evening.

Engine 1 and the Tanker took part in a Disaster Drill at the Lebanon Airport.

The Department is now holding the monthly meetings on the first Monday of each month and these meetings are open to the public. The second Monday of each month is our regularly scheduled drill night and we invite those interested in fire fighting to join this volunteer department and drill with us.

Report of District Fire Chief and Town Forest Fire Warden

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

Annual Report of Representative Sara Townsend — 1976

The New Hampshire Legislature was called into a special session in 1976 so as to correct some errors and oversights in the comprehensive mental health bill, passed in '75. During this fifteen day session we also were able to examine the revenues and expenditures for the state and adjust certain of the budgetary items in various departments to keep up with inflation. It is increasingly difficult to budget for two years, especially as we are approaching the billion dollar figure. I would favor annual sessions, without an increase in the total number of days over what the present law allows. Our work could be better planned, more attention given to details of legislation, and certainly a more sensible approach to budget-making would result.

At the suggestion of town clerk, Howard Zea, I introduced a bill in the special session which put the town meeting date back to its original and traditional one: the second Tuesday in March. This was overwhelmingly approved and became the law of the land. During our research into the statute in which this wording is located, it was discovered that the Presidential Primary for New Hampshire had been set to be one week ahead of that of any other New England state, whereas the popular belief was that ours would be ahead of any other state in the nation! Apparently in '71 when the Primary date was changed and the town meeting along with it, the words 'New England' had been used—so the bill was amended in '76 under my proposal to actually make our Presidential primary one week ahead of that of any other state in the nation! It is interesting to see how changes in the law come about. Now what will happen if N.H. faces a threat to this 'place in the sun?' We still have our "militia" and "Navy" under the N.H. Constitution at least!

As I write this report it would appear that at long last N.H. has come to the end of any surplus, and we are looking at a menacing deficit. This being the case, it will be very hard to fight casino gambling bills, jai-lai, sports card betting and the like—they will be touted as the "answer to all our needs"—I feel sorry that New Hampshire comes in last in all of these kinds of schemes to raise revenue—behind the liquor companies, the tobacco industry and the racing entrepreneurs. They get theirs off the top and the state is last in line. I believe that we must sooner or later face up to a responsible and fair way to tax the people, and one which is easy to budget, where N.H. State coffers get the whole amount.

The casino measure will propose that each county be allowed three gambling operations—I believe we must insist on a statewide referendum before any such measure can be made law. This is definitely a statewide matter, as well as that of any town which wants to have a casino. The whole character of New Hampshire will undergo a radical change, and the people ought to have a say in this pattern. What will follow gambling? Legalized prostitution? Think about it.

I am generally in Concord Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from January until July. If I can be of help to any of you, please call upon me. Thank you for electing me again.

Report of the Plainfield Conservation Commission

Seeking to preserve some areas of the Town in their natural state, the Commission has investigated conservation agreements, with the aid of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. A conservation agreement is a legal arrangement between a landowner (the "grantor") and a government body or charitable group (the "grantee"). The grantor puts his or her own permanent restrictions on the use of the land so as to protect its environmental quality. The grantee agrees to keep an eye on the property and enforce the landowner's guidelines. The Commission has discussed conservation agreements with several landowners and will gladly furnish information about them upon request.

The planting of trees and shrubs in front of the school, which began in 1975, was completed in 1976. We helped to plan and pay for this project, and hope that it will be a long-lasting reminder of our Nation's Bicentennial.

The Commission assisted conservation education in several ways. We sponsored Gary Ward and Roseanna Rondeau at the Youth Conservation Camp, and co-sponsored Nancy Brandis at the Conservation Workshop for Teachers. We helped to sponsor the all-day visit by Vermont author-naturalist Ronald Rood to the school, which had been arranged by the Meriden Bird Club. We have been encouraged by the increased teaching of conservation at the school, including the devoted work of one of our members, and by the response of the students.

Last August, the SPNHF organized a ten-day Conservation Caravan that visited many places and events related to natural resources and environmental issues in New Hampshire. The Caravan had its biggest day at the Taylor farm in Meriden, where more than 200 people attended a variety of demonstrations on agriculture and appropriate technology. Among these, the Commission gave a presentation on land use planning in Plainfield.

At the request of the Selectmen, the Commission examined a piece of property and gave its opinion as to eligibility for tax reduction under Current Use regulations. We also met with the Selectmen and the Road Agent to seek better communication between town officials and landowners before roadwork is carried out. Members of the Commission testified at hearings of the Planning Board about work on a scenic road and on proposed amendments to the ordinances on zoning and mobile homes.

We received a plan from the Soil Conservation Service for the long-range management of the Town Conservation Land on Columbus-Jordan Road. We would like to carry out our responsibility to review applications for dredge and fill work but have not yet been able to accomplish much. Our town map continues to be available without charge at the Town Office and from Commission members.

Plainfield Village Water District Commissioners' Report

The Plainfield Village Water District system provided good service to its members throughout 1976 with the exceptions caused by a gardens watering overdraw on an evening in June and a leaking shut-off, which became critical, in the last week of 1976 and the first week of 1977. Gallons output required was then nearly twice the normal amount; this was considerably above the well's capacity.

The present system should be able to provide service to several more families but the Commissioners are most reluctant to consider taking on more users because of the slim margin of supply to cover break or leak losses.

A line leak from as little as an eighth inch diameter hole can deplete nearly one-third as much water as is being consumed presently.

In order to utilize, more fully, the output capacity of the well, so that more water can be provided for consumption, and in order to provide a four to six days reserve of stored water which could level the effects of normal consumption variations, as well as emergency demands for water, the Commissioners recommend that consideration be given now to the designing and constructing of a reservoir for the system.

An automatic power generating alternator should be incorporated at the same time, to provide security from power outages.

A special article is entered in the Warrant providing for an appropriation for a feasibility study and the designing of such an addition to the system.

The Commissioners may find that prompt action should be taken upon completion and analysis of the study; a special meeting of the District may be called to authorize construction earlier than could be done by the next annual meeting.

The Commissioners take this opportunity to thank the people and organizations, who and which, have given of their time and resources to help the District system and operations to provide good service to the community.

The meeting was called to order by William A. Smith, moderator of said district and he read the articles of the warrant.

David A. Gaskin offered the following resolution and moved its adoption: That the District raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray District costs for 1976 and any assignments to debt service and/or capital reserves. Motion was seconded by Paul Roeber and it was passed in the affirmative.

Article III: To fix District officers' salaries to be paid for the ensuing year, and to establish expenditures in 1976, by and for the district to be paid by the Treasurer upon authorization by the Commissioners.

Joan Roeber offered the following resolution and moved for its adoption: That the District fix officer's salaries to be paid for the ensuing year, and to establish expenditures in 1976, by and for the District, to be paid by the Treasurer upon authorization by the Commissioners. The motion was seconded by Wallace Pickering. A motion was made and seconded that we return to Article I, the vote was in the affirmative.

Clerk for one year: Motion was made by Paul Roeber and seconded by Paul Amidon that the clerk cast one vote for Joan Roeber for clerk. The ballot was cast and said clerk declared Joan Roeber elected.

Report of the Meriden Village Water and Sewer District

The water system was improved with the installation of a 10,000 gallon pressure tank in February, 1976.

Chlorine treatment of the water has continued to be unnecessary due to the high quality of water in the system.

Problems continue with leaks in the water system. These leaks are causing loss of water pressure at the top of the hill and lowering of the water level in the well. The patience and cooperation of the users during the period of locating and repairing these leaks are appreciated.

An engineering study was initiated for a waste water treatment collection system and a waste water treatment facility within the Meriden Village Water and Sewer District. A federal grant of \$33,000 was received from the Environmental Protection Agency, with an additional state grant from the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission of \$6,600. The project was started in October, 1976, by Dufresne-Henry Engineering Corporation, and the study is expected to be completed by September, 1977.

Plainfield School District Report of the Superintendent of Schools

This has been a very productive year for the Plainfield School District. An ongoing analysis of the achievement test scores of our students indicates that our instructional programs are successfully preparing our students in the basic skill areas. This academic success is reflected in the performance of our graduates at both Kimball Union Academy and Lebanon High School. The Plainfield community can be proud of the students from our school.

The 1976-1977 school year is the first year that this School District and others have functioned under the New Hampshire Public Employee Labor Relations Act. Thanks to the spirit of cooperation shown by both the School Board and our teachers, we have successfully negotiated a "Professional Agreement" to comply with the requirements of the new law.

1977-1978 School Budget

Two major factors beyond the control of the School Board had significant impact on the budget proposed for 1977-1978.

- 1. The costs of transportation have increased by \$10,280, with the expiration of the transportation contract negotiated in 1972.
- 2. Tuition costs have increased by \$9,600.

Other increases are the result of extending health insurance coverage for employees and the impact of inflation on the materials used in school programs.

Financing Education in Plainfield

With the New Hampshire Legislature meeting this spring, it is appropriate to consider

whether local property taxes are the best way of financing education. The Constitution of the State of New Hampshire establishes education as a responsibility of the state government. Perhaps 1977 should be the year that the State Legislature takes positive action to provide increased financial aid for our schools. We may not have a sales or income tax, but taxpayers in Plainfield know that our property tax shows the effect of the absence of a broadbase form of state tax in support of education.

Plainfield School District Principal's Report

This year has brought many changes in our staff. Several valuable teachers left us to pursue other interests. We have, however, hired some excellent people to fill these positions.

Linda Zoller replaced Patricia Reynolds who was Physical Education teacher on our staff for five years. Linda, a graduate of Keene State College, has initiated many new and different ideas into the curricula.

Marjorie Porter, formerly our reading teacher, is teaching a third grade class this year. Anne Tetreault, a new teacher, is working with children in grades one through six who have reading and spelling achievement difficulties. She has several years of experience in administering various tests to diagnose individual learning problems and has helped our children greatly in this area.

Elva Mikula, a third grade teacher last year, is now teaching first grade. She replaced Durward Brandis who taught in Plainfield for four years.

Melinda Meyerhoff, a graduate of S.U.C. at Oneonta, New York, joined our staff in March, 1976, replacing Peggy Williamson who had been with us since 1972, minus a year when she left the area temporarily.

Linda Blocker, a fourth grade teacher, left our staff after four years of teaching here, then returned to us as an instructor for a federally sponsored project, a Title IV grant. She worked for 10 weeks with a small group of gifted students from grades four, five and six on a special interest project.

My position as principal-teacher was changed to a full-time principal. This change has enabled me to spend more time in classroom observation, assisting teachers with projects and generally being available for guidance, supervision and administration of the school.

This has been a good and productive year, and we appreciate the fine cooperation of the community.

Plainfield School District Report of the School Nurse

Registration of incoming first graders was done in the spring when the parents brought the youngsters to visit the school. Immunization records were reviewed at that time and parents were expected to have the required physical examination and incomplete immunizations brought up to date during the summer months.

Sports physicals were done on pupils in grades 5-8. Dr. Whitney is impressed with the improvement in dental care and general good health. We have had a few cases of scabies and have tried to isolate them. Parental cooperation in cleanliness is needed here.

I would like to be seech the parents to be more aware of the youngsters' health needs. Frequently, we find them coming to school with sicknesses and often without the proper rest.

Our health education in dental care has been reinforced with sessions on nutritional needs, giving the children a clear understanding of a balanced diet.

Each child is weighed, measured, has vision, hearing and teeth checked. Pupils after fifth grade also have blood pressures taken. In this manner, we attempt to teach about good health and each person's responsibility to promote it.
